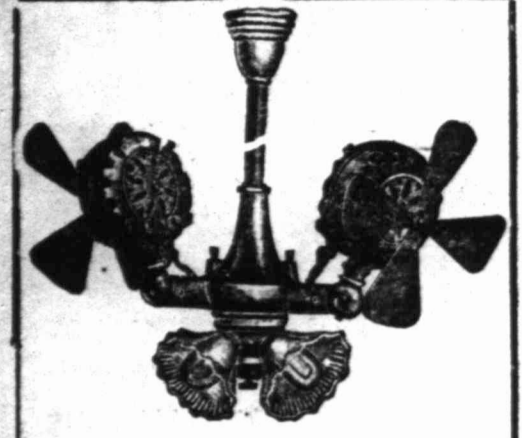

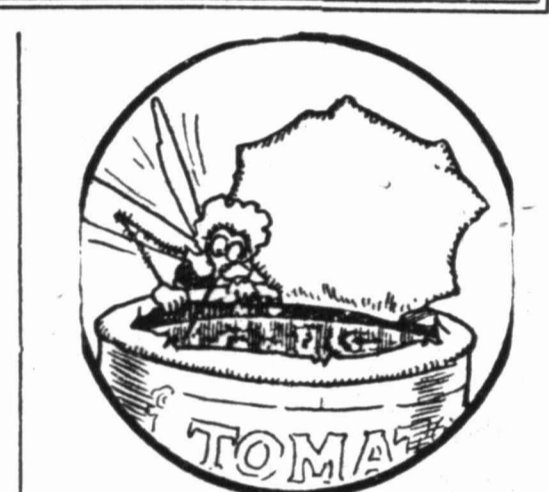

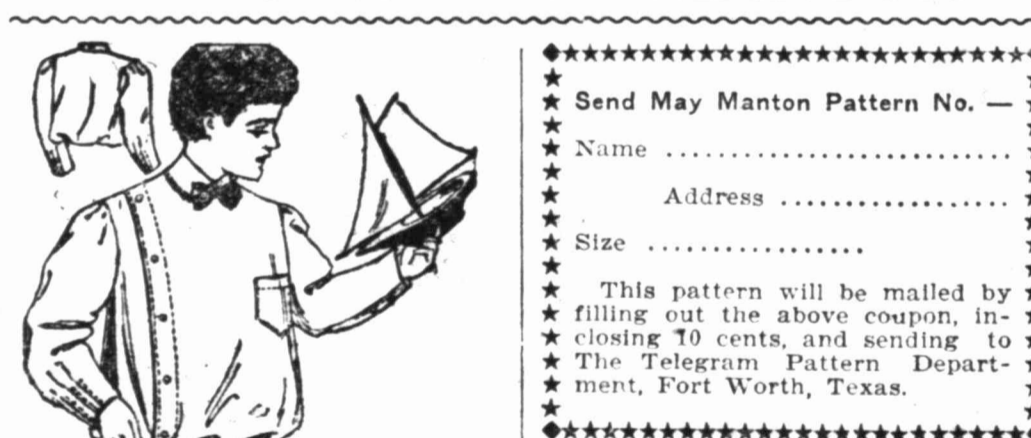

LIVE TOWNS ARE NEVER FINISHED.

There are some people who think when a city or town has reached a certain point in development that its citizenship can afford to sit down and await the natural consequences and not labor with the same zeal as when the situation was different. Out in the live and progressive little city of Abilene conditions of this kind have arisen, and the Reporter says: For the "encouragement" of those who think things requiring money are coming mighty fast, we want to say that they are going to come fast as long as Abilene is a live town. When this town dies you will no longer be called upon to help swing anything this way. We want to leave before these calls quit coming, for we have no desire to live in a dead town. The people of Dallas and Fort Worth are still raising money for making cities bigger and better. They are paying out more money to get more industries to make more money to give for more enterprises to make more money. Well, right there you get into a circle of money making, with no end. If that is not what you want to get into, what do you want? Colleges, factories, new railroads will make a city in the desert of Sahara; to say nothing of this garden spot of nature's greatest bounty. And the Reporter is right. No progressive town or city should weary in well doing. Just because the way seems a little bit hard and the burden a little bit heavy is no reason why there should be a disposition engendered to pause in the work of pushing forward. This is a day of push and restless energy. The individual or the city or town that is content to sit down and wait for golden plums to fall for the mere matter of wishing will continually experience the keenest disappointment. Abilene is a fine case in point. That city has dreamed of converting herself into a metropolis for the past twenty years. The most progressive of her citizenship have spent money like water to advance the common interest. No public enterprise has been proposed that has not caused the people to go down in their jeans and come up with a liberal offering. The result has been that Abilene has grown and prospered in the face of many disadvantages and continues to grow and prosper. It is today recognized as one of the leading cities of its class in Texas and its very name has become synonymous with push and progress. But Abilene cannot afford to rest on her laurels. There are a number of other West Texas towns and cities that also desire to become the metropolis of the west. They have just as live and enterprising citizens, and they are spending money just as freely as ever Abilene did. The fact of the business is that Abilene may now regard herself as at the most crucial period in all her career. If she writes the word "finished" and placards it upon her outer gates, then she may well expect all the labor and expense of the past to amount to nothing. She may expect grass and weeds to grow in her principal streets and her business edifices to be transformed into bat houses. Fort Worth has undergone the same experience that is now the lot of Abilene. There are men in this city who long ago would have written that word "finished" and hung it on our outer walls. But there was too much life and enterprise here for that. The Old Guard has ever been on duty, and the result is that Fort Worth is reaching for every kind of enterprise today just as determinedly as in the days when they were more essential to rapid development. The success that has come from those already established is a constant incentive to go out for more, and Fort Worth sustains an organization for the express purpose of promoting manufacturing enterprises and encouraging home industry. And Fort Worth is today growing faster than any other town in Texas. The time will never come when progress and development will be permitted to go to seed in Fort Worth. There is too much life and vitality here for that. There is too much determination on the part of our people to make this city the real metropolis of the southwest. And the day is not far distant when



That event will be safely accomplished. But even with that the word "finished" will never be hung on Fort Worth walls. This city will continue to grow until it has distanced every other city in Texas and the southwest.

THE RANGE CATTLE INDUSTRY.

The range cattle industry of the west has undergone a wonderful evolution and the process of that evolution is still in progress. What the ultimate result will be it is difficult to foresee, but it is morally certain that Texas will never again witness a return to the old conditions that prevailed so many years in this state. Commenting on the changes that have occurred in the great cattle industry the Denver Field and Farm says: "A few shipments of Texas cattle come straggling up the iron trail these days a little reminder of the good old times when the cowboys drove up hundreds of thousands of cattle every summer. Owing to the partially narrowing of the range of Colorado and Wyoming by reason of the great acreage taken up for agricultural and irrigation purposes, most of the cattle this year are going to the Indian reservations in South Dakota and Montana. But a few years ago hundreds of thousands of head of southern cattle each spring were shipped to northern ranges to be grazed during the summer and sent to market in fall and the small shipments received this year indicate the great evolution the business is undergoing. No longer thousands of square miles of open range exist as in the past and every year more fences are built and great tracts are devoted to agricultural pursuits. It has been but a few years since hundreds of thousands of Texas steers were annually taken to populate what was at that time the unbroken ranges of the northwest. Grass was free in that section in those days, just as it was one fair day in Texas. The northwestern range country was parcelled out for the convenience of the big ranching outfits, who used the grass without money and without price. They found it much better to come down into the great Texas breeding ground and purchase the steers they needed to harvest their grass crop than to undertake to raise them in that section. And the business was so profitable that it assumed large proportions. But the tide of home-seekers from the east spoiled out the advantages of this great range country from a distance and swooped down upon it. The land was government property and could be acquired on very favorable terms. Soon the choice locations along the streams and water-courses were all taken and the range men began to feel themselves crowded. Year by year this crowding was increased until the range country has become but a memory in comparison with its former magnitude, and the demand for Texas steers to go to that section has almost fallen to nothing. And right here at home the same process has been constantly witnessed. The man with the hoe has crowded the man with the branding iron until there is but little unoccupied soil left by his weary feet. The man with the hoe has called himself a stock farmer, appropriating to himself a part of the title of the man who has wielded the branding iron, and they have made such an impress on the west that it is clear they have come to stay. The range cattle business in Texas is annually growing smaller, for the range country is annually being reduced. Where it will end no one is prepared to say and it is largely a matter of speculation. There is a portion of the state that can never be anything else but a cattle range, but it cannot support the number of range cattle Texas has boasted in the past. Improved breeds and improved methods are doing much to simplify the situation and work out the problem along natural lines. But there have developed many discouragements. The situation is not so rosy as that men are falling over themselves in an effort to engage in the cattle business. The more general trend seems to be in the direction of getting out of the business. It is true that many of the leading cattlemen of the range country have fortified themselves by purchasing outright the land they felt they needed to keep their business going. But there is little of this land that will not go on the market to the actual settler when it commands a price commensurate with the views of the owner. Big ranches are being cut up into small farming tracts every day in Texas and every one of these so treated is but a marker of the passing of the great range cattle industry. The range cattle industry of Texas for the future is an interesting problem, but it will be worked out in a satisfactory manner in the future. There is too much gray matter employed in the cattle business to permit the great industry to die of inanition. A little less criticism of Governor Lanham and a little more attention to the legitimate issues of the gubernatorial campaign would be more becoming on the part of papers that pride themselves on the quality of their Democracy. Governor Lanham is not an issue in the campaign and seems to be attending strictly to the duties of his position. The death of Governor John M. Pattison of Ohio, is generally regretted, as he paid the price of his election with his life. Accepting the nomination and leading a cause that was apparently hopeless, he smashed the Republican machine in the Buckeye state and was the only Democrat elected. His successor is a Republican. The report that Secretary Wilson will soon quit the cabinet is probably untrue. The great Iowan has done a noble work for the agricultural and livestock interests of the country and a work that is generally appreciated. There is no reason why Tama Jim should retire. New York boys who come to Texas with the expectation of running with the wild bunch will please take notice of the fact that the wild bunch in this state is speedily corralled. The time has passed when the desperado business could be successfully worked in this state. It is said that the tax rolls of Tarrant county will show another increase in excess of \$3,000,000 for the past year, and when The Telegram said Tarrant intended to stay at the front of the procession it was speaking strictly by the card. Senator Tillman is proding after national bank campaign contributions now with his pitchfork, and threatens to make a whole lot of trouble for gentlemen who would be more than willing to let bygones be bygones. There is not much being said concerning the congressional campaign in this district, and Tarrant county with her monopoly of pyrotechnics. The campaign seems to be very much on the order of a still hunt. The decision that the hanging of Rufus Martin shall be conducted in private is eminently proper. Public hangings as object lessons have long ago proven themselves complete failures.

Governor Blanchard of Louisiana has recommended to the state legislature that it pass a pure food law. Good, Mr. Governor, and also advise the New Orleans merchants to stop selling us old Louisiana sugar house molasses made out of gum sate, sorghum slump and Indian corn juice in the green state.—Delta Courier. A timely suggestion. In this day of cheap adulteration about the only pure lasses one can find are the fair-cheeked ones that are produced in Texas.

Judge C. K. Bell was the last to speak and so has whatever advantage the last word carries with it. Judge Bell's manner is cold, aristocratic, one might say. The grimy hand of toll he passes up without shaking. It is no doubt just his way, still it makes against a man who is out looking for votes.—Belton Journal.

Judge Bell is affable, pleasant and very sociable in his nature and disposition. He is not afraid of "the grimy hand of toll" for the simple reason he is a teller himself and has worked his way from the very bottom of the ladder. The Belton paper is hard pressed for argument with which to overcome the Bell sentiment.

Then the campaign has been abroad in the land and is getting busy telling way he is working so hard against this fellow and for that fellow. The campaign prevaricator is always with us, and goes hand in hand with his brother, who is making the race on the other fellow's demerits. Voters should be on the watch for both of these gentlemen and swat 'em every time they show their heads. The prohibition question is not an issue in this campaign. 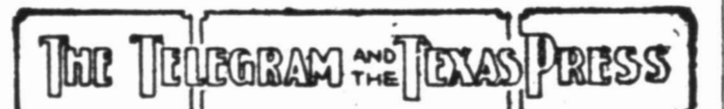
There are more than that many patriots in Texas who would be glad to accept the same position, and who are even now hoping that time and opportunity will soon be at hand.

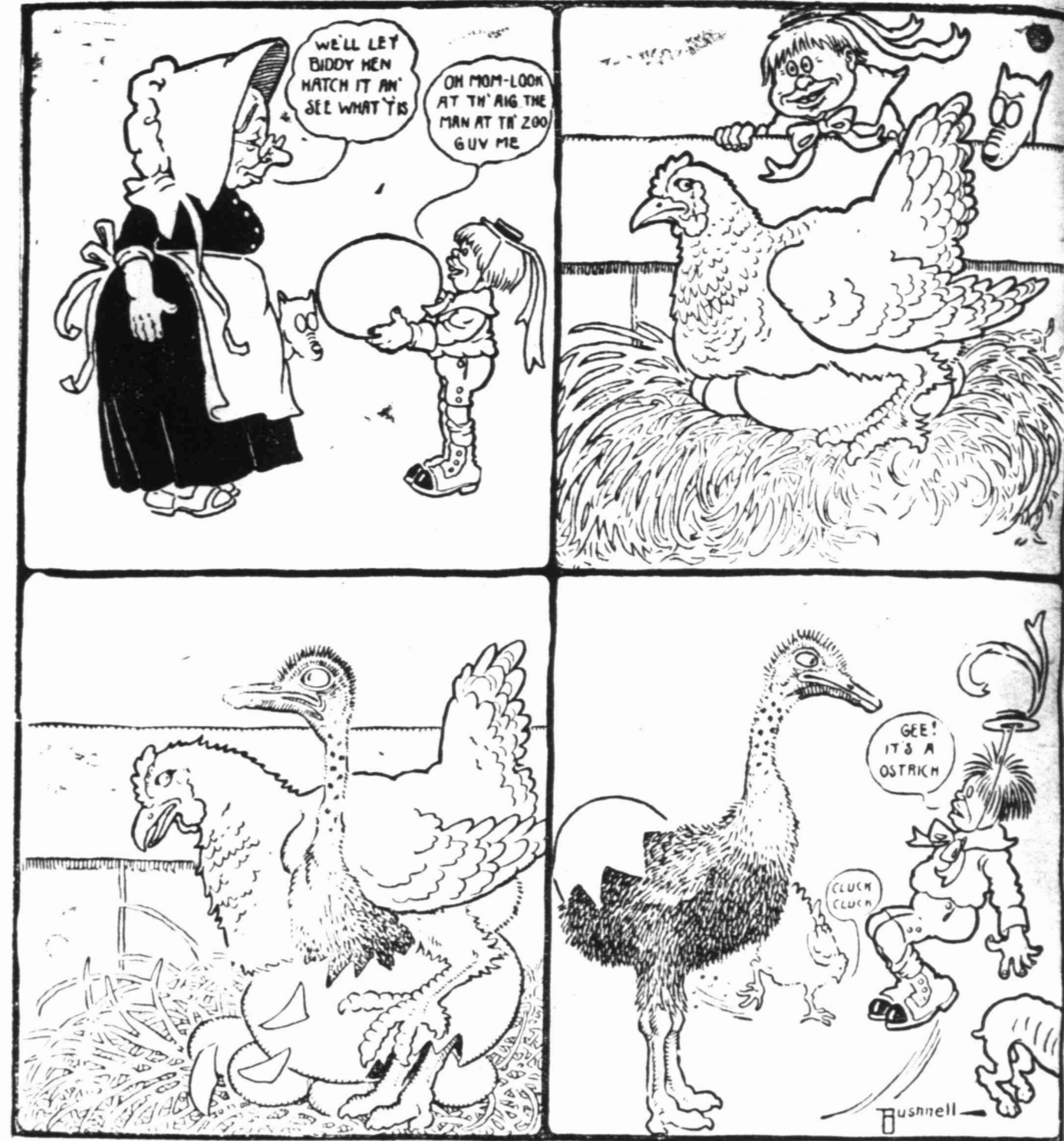

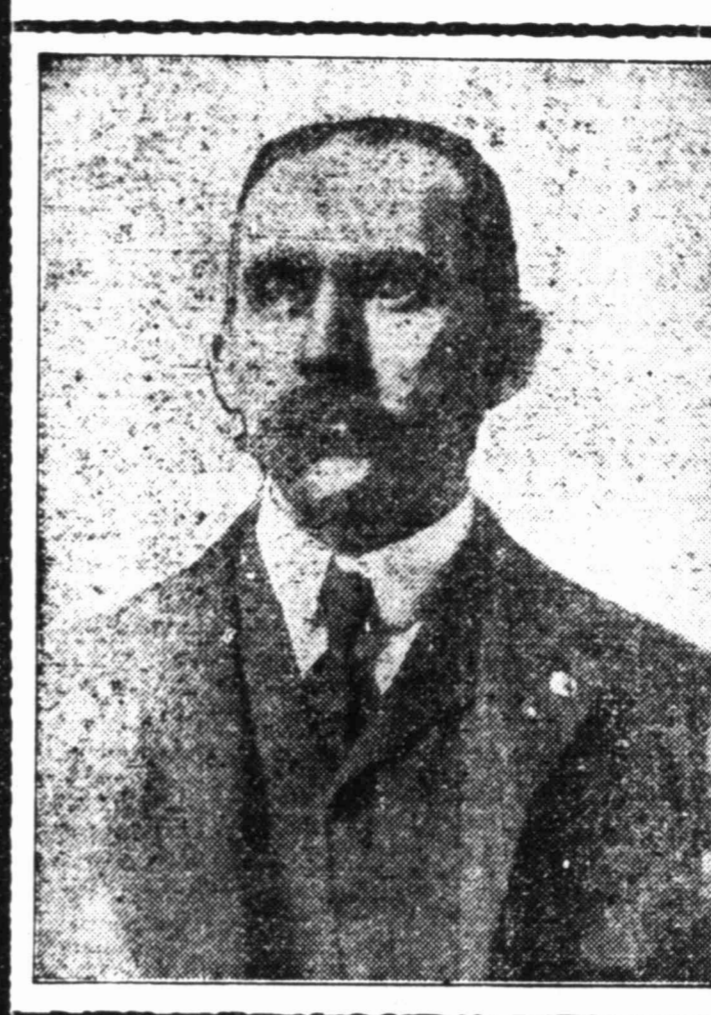

ALDERMEN SHUN SPECIAL SESSION

Only Four Members Present at Called Meeting WARRANT PROVIDED FOR City Marshal Ordered to Serve Notice on Absent Members to Appear Saturday Night

The attempt to hold an adjourned meeting of the city council Tuesday evening was a failure and the only outcome of the effort was the adoption of a resolution authorizing the issuance of a warrant to protect the city's interest in payment on bonded indebtedness which would have become due before the transmission of the funds could be made, if there had been longer delay; and the passage of a resolution, offered by Alderman Cook, directing the mayor and city secretary to issue and the city marshal an order to have the absent members left the council chamber without permission and who still remained away from the meetings of the city council, brought before that body at the time of the next meeting. The orders were issued. After a motion to adjourn was before the council for action Mayor Harris made an explanation of the situation from his point of view and the council then adjourned to Saturday evening at 8 o'clock. When the roll was ordered called at 8:25 o'clock the mayor, all of the officers of the city required to be present and four aldermen, Cook, Lydon, Maddox and Harold, answered "here."

Four aldermen present, your honor, said Secretary Montgomery. Alderman Cook had in typewritten copy of a resolution which he had signed, reciting that four of the aldermen of the city had deserted the council chamber Monday evening without warrant, and that they had still remained absent, to-wit, Aldermen Ward, Waggoner, Lehane and Armstrong, and therefore it was directed that the mayor and city secretary issue such orders, directed to the city marshal, as will enforce the attendance of the absent aldermen at the next meeting of the city council. Alderman Lydon moved to lay the resolution on the table, but it was not seconded, and the Cook resolution was adopted by sea and by vote, there being one vote in the negative. Alderman Maddox asked the city attorney if the council, as then constituted, could order the issuance of a warrant for the payment of the interest nearly due and which matter must be attended to or the city would be in default, and he thought that a warrant for the arrest of the absent aldermen could be issued, and he was so ordered. He had consulted about all of the absent aldermen and they agreed that the warrant should be issued. Marshal Given Orders

The mayor then read his order for the city marshal to enforce the presence of the four aldermen named in the Cook resolution, and the city marshal wanted to know if he should arrest the four aldermen, lock them up in jail, or place them under bond, or what. He would like to ask the city attorney what his authority would be under the order made under the Cook resolution. No answer. City Marshal Maddox then appealed to the mayor, and Mayor Harris told him the difficulties that might arise would be met as they arose. They would not anticipate. The city marshal said he would see all of the aldermen, if they were in the city, and notify them of the meeting. Mayor Harris also expressed the opinion that if he had had the opportunity to talk with the members of the council, particularly those "misguided ones" who had left the council chamber Monday, he could show them the error of their way and he was sure they would come back to the meetings and transact the city's business. He was sure that they were actuated by the best of motives and probably were doing that which they deemed to be right.
