CASSATT TO BE PROSECUTED

Violation of Anti-Trust Law Is Alleged

ROAD TO FIGHT

The Railways Under Charges May Be Shaken Loose from Coal Fields

NEW YORK, June 25.—The Times in a special dispatch from Philadelphia today says: Philadelphia is to be the scene of the first great precautions to be brought by the government against the Pennsylvania railroad and the Standard Oil Company. Arrangements for the prosecution will be completed this week in New York at a conference between Alexander Simpson Jr. of this city and Charles E. Hughes.

The chief question under consideration is the advisability of individual prosecutions against A. J. Cassatt, president of the Pennsylvania. Tals was plainly indicated today by a lawyer who has been intimately associated with interstate commerce commission hearings.

Cassatt to Be Prosecuted

By both the commissioners and the special counsel appointed by the attorney general to follow the testimony and prepare for the prosecution, it is believed more good can be accomplished by centering prosecution upon Mr. Cassatt than by scattering energy over the prosecutions of the railroad and the oil companies concerned, seven of which are directly or indirectly controlled by the Pennsylvania.

Although Messrs. Simpson and Hughes were lawyers especially appointed to report upon the prosecutions, it is understood they have the consent of the government to associate with themselves other counsel and when the first cases are called President William A. Glasgow Jr., who has conducted the examinations for the Interstate Commerce Commission will be found with them.

Road Plans Defense

District Attorney Thompson has been directed by the attorney general to prepare for the prosecution. Pennsylvania railroad lawyers are working night and day making plans for defense. The charge to be made by the government will be conspiracy.

The charge if proved will carry a penalty of imprisonment. Mr. Simpson before leaving Philadelphia said that there has been in constant communication with President Roosevelt and the attorney general and that the great mass of testimony brought out at the recent hearing is by no means all that the prosecution will have to depend on.

Urges Government Ownership

Since the hearings have closed he has had a large amount of valuable information from private sources. It is said on the authority of one who has been closely connected with the investigation of the coal carrying roads by the Interstate Commerce Commission that the commission in its report will advocate government ownership of the railroads. This, it is declared, will be urged as the only means of protecting the public from extortion.

The report will directly charge five roads with violations of various anti-trust or interstate laws. It will advocate further legislation, which will completely divorce railroads from any connection with the coal industry, and it will urge that other industry along their lines.

Tommy Atkins' Tailor Hired to Make Them Natty

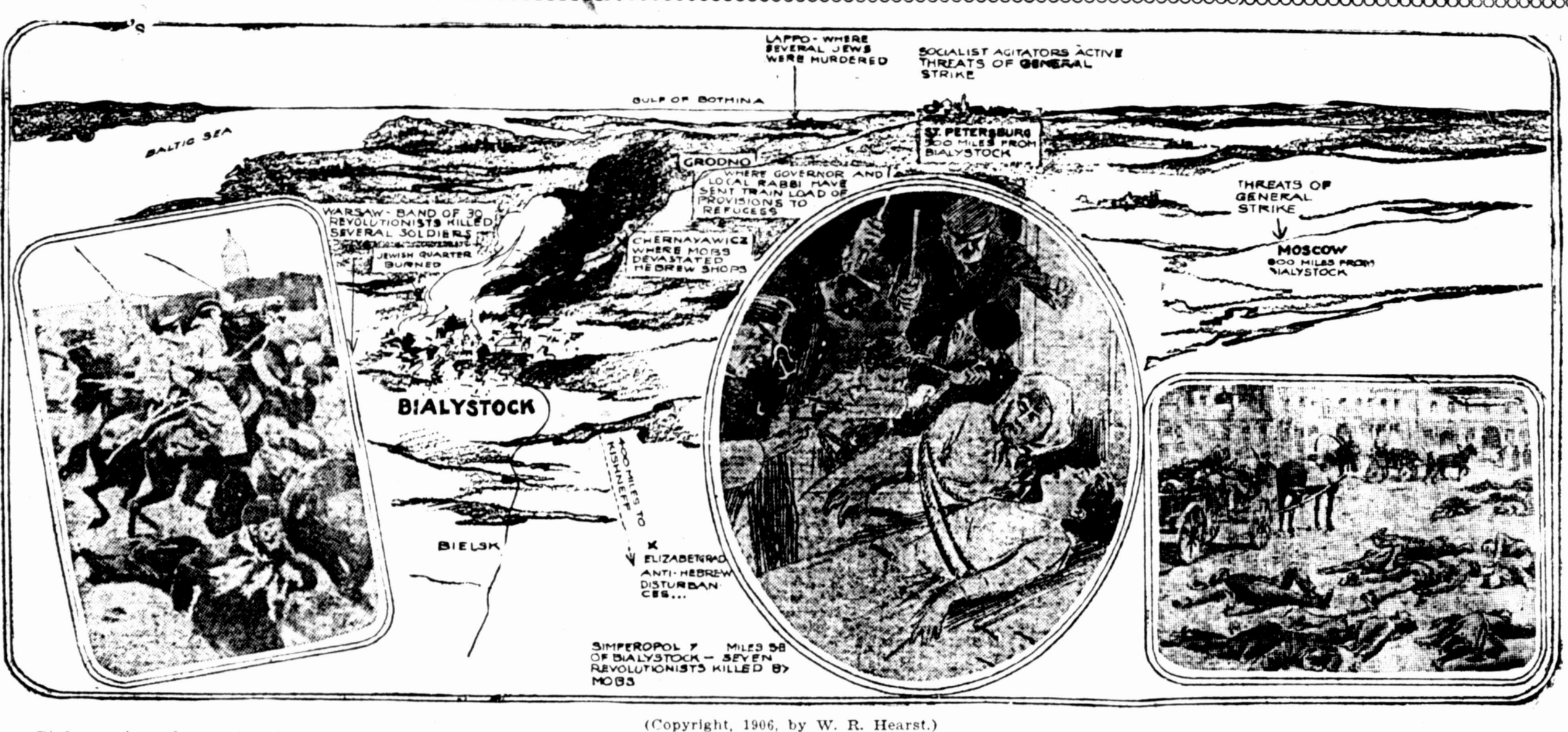

For many years there have been complaints from the enlisted men that their uniforms did not fit them. In many instances, the men, out of their meagre pay, bear the expense of having the garments recut.

BELL WILLING FOR MEETING

Will Meet Campbell at Houston if Friends Wish

PLANNING DATES

Returned from South Texas Tour Greatly Pleased With Prospects and Reception

Judge C. K. Bell, democratic candidate for the office of governor of the state of Texas, is back from a trip to the southern part of the state and is well pleased with the outlook, except, to his great regret as a well wisher of Texas, in all of her parts and regions, that there is serious suffering in some of those parts of the state to southward from a drought which has long continued and which has done and is doing harm to the stock and agricultural interests of that part of Texas.

Will Abide by Friends

Judge Bell said that nothing had been arranged definitely about the suggested joint discussion between he and Col. T. M. Campbell. The matter, so far as Judge Bell is concerned, is in the hands of his Houston friends and he will acquiesce in their arrangements.

He and some of his campaign committee are now arranging further dates for further speaking and it is not expected that the Houston date named for the joint debate and so named for the reason that Col. Campbell is to speak in Houston on that date, July 17, will conflict with any of the dates which the committee will fix here.

This article is from the Houston Chronicle: "A joint discussion between Hon. T. M. Campbell and Judge C. K. Bell may be arranged for July 17, and if so, Mr. Campbell is scheduled to speak in Houston.

"Such is the desire of the Bell campaign committee and the consent of Colonel Campbell has been asked. Judge John G. Tod, chairman of the Harris County Bell Club, on being seen by a Chronicle reporter, with reference to the proposed joint discussion in Houston, had the following to say:

"Yes, it is true that I, as chairman of the Harris County Bell Club, have requested Mr. Campbell's representative here to have Mr. Campbell agree to meet Judge Bell in Houston for a joint discussion on July 17, and it is probable that the arrangement may be made, although up to the present hour no acceptance has been received from Mr. Campbell. It is hoped, however, by Judge Bell's friends that Mr. Campbell will see fit to accept, and that the people of Houston may have an opportunity to hear the gentlemen in a joint discussion."

Bell in Harris County

"Asked as to the progress of Judge Bell's campaign in Harris county, Judge Tod said:

"It gives me great pleasure to say that the prospects of Judge Bell in Harris county were never brighter. He is now throughout the county begin to realize what a splendid record Judge Bell has made as a member of congress and as attorney general ever by Judge Bell's friends his warm and ardent supporters. His friends point with pride to the fact that in defeating the Pacific railroad bill when a member of congress in 1884 he saved to the people of the United States over \$110,000,000; and the further fact that while attorney general of Texas he prosecuted trusts and forfeited more charters and collected more penalties from corporations than all other attorney generals combined prior to his incumbency has gone a long way toward raising him supporters with all thoughtful, sober-minded men, who realize the importance of having a just, impartial, able man for governor who is not susceptible to influences of any character whatever."

"Referring to his personal acquaintance with Judge Bell, Judge Tod said: "For two years I was closely asso-

VENEZUELA FEARS U. S. WILL CONTROL

Castro Huffly Because Pan-American Slighted Caracas

NEW YORK, June 25.—The Tribune today says: Advice from Caracas says that Venezuela will not be represented at the Pan-American congress at Rio, the reason given, semi-officially, being that General Cipriano Castro, whose resignation from the presidency, has not been accepted and who will return to office on July 5, fears that the United States will use the congress for the purpose of obtaining control over the South American republics. One of the Castro newspapers says: "Fears United States Control

"Venezuela will not take part in the Pan-American congress at Rio because there is no disposition on her part to serve as the instrument of the United States in the latter's sinister designs against the weak republics of South America."

The general attitude of the Venezuelan government toward the Pan-American congress recalls the action of President Castro when the congress convened at Mexico City a few years ago. It was at the time the Columbia and Venezuela were involved in controversies which threatened to precipitate a war between the two countries.

FOR INSURANCE REFORM

Plans Being Made For Convention of Insurance Superintendents

NEW YORK, June 25.—There will be a meeting in this city today of the executive committee of the National Association of State Insurance Superintendents to make plans for the annual convention of that body which is to be held in Washington, D. C. Commissioner Folk of Tennessee, who is in New York and who is also a member of the executive committee, said that the Washington meeting would follow up the important conference held some months ago in Chicago at which steps were taken looking toward greater uniformity in the methods of formulating state reports of insurance companies and in other life insurance reforms already made operative in New York state.

MAY ARREST HEADS OF TRACTION CO'S

Dunne Seeks Explanation of Street Car Facilities

CHICAGO, Ill., June 23.—The Record-Herald today says: Indictment of the presidents and leading officials of the various Chicago traction companies will be sought by Mayor Dunne if immediate and satisfactory explanations are not given him concerning the recent fatalities laid at the door of the street railway corporations. The mayor announced last night that he would write an open letter to the traction officials today, presenting the report of Dr. Doty, superintendent of street car service, who has notified the city executive that within fifty days twenty-seven persons have been killed by cars in Chicago.

EXTRADITION COSTLY

Government Pays \$100,000 to Bring Gaylor and Green to Trial

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—It cost the government \$100,000 to extradite Greene and Gaylor and bring them to trial. This statement was contained in a letter written by Attorney General Moody to Chairman Taft, explaining the request for the deficiency appropriation. Of this sum he says \$22,500 is to be paid to foreign consuls who have secured the extradition, he said, beyond several years ago and were completed during the current fiscal year by the return of Greene and Gaylor to Savannah for trial.

BRICK PLANT PLANNED

Proposed Company Will Have Output of 40,000 Brick Daily

WAXAHACHIE, Texas, June 25.—A company is being organized in Waxahachie to establish a large brick plant on the Houston and Texas Central, two miles west of Midlothian. Lee Ingram, a contractor of this city, and a member of the council, will be at the head of the enterprise. The plant proposed will have a daily capacity of 40,000 bricks. It is said that blue shale in inexhaustible supply has been found near Midlothian and that it is admirably adapted for making brick. A test has been made for this purpose, and was entirely satisfactory.

LYNCHING FOILED

STARTED IN SALOON

The fight started in a saloon, headquarters of the Austrian employed in the stone works. There had been strife among these men and an outbreak was expected. Goening, it is said, started the immediate trouble by trying to break up a celebration which the Austrians were having in the saloon.

CROWD MOB ASSAILANT

A crowd of people had gathered and Stuenkel began shooting at them. Hendricks was in the front rank of the spectators and fell dead at the first volley. This so enraged the crowd that an immediate attempt was made to lynch Stuenkel. He was surrounded and beaten on the head with beer bottles. When the police rescued him he was unconscious. He and four of the rioters were locked up.

20,000 BILLS IN CONGRESS

Present Congress Enacts Important Industrial Measures

CURB HOME EVILS

Home Industries Accomplish Much Attention—Foreign Affairs Very Little

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—Important measures extending Federal regulation and control have been enacted at the first session of the Fifty-ninth congress, now rapidly drawing to a close. The railroad rate and meat inspection bills will soon become laws and before adjournment of congress both houses will have passed pure food bills which, though dissimilar in terms, are both based on the same principle of Federal control. It is the present intention to try to adjust three differences before adjournment: the removal of party lines in effecting the above results, the differences being only as to ways and means rather than as to policy.

Besides branching off into this new field of legislative endeavor, the present session of congress has made itself important in other ways. It has added one and perhaps two new states to the union, and by so doing has disposed of four territories. The results to the people are expected from the removal of tax on denatured alcohol, and if predictions are fulfilled heat, light and power are to be supplied by alcohol made from the corn fields of the country, from sugar beets and sugar cane, from potatoes, fruits and other vegetation.

Type of Canal Determined

By a different turn of legislative points of view the questions which have perplexed congress for some time regarding the Panama canal have been settled. The President may dig a lock canal as fast as he pleases. A joint resolution was agreed to regarding canal supplies to be of American make.

Type of Canal Determined

Congress has not dwelt with the foreign relations to any degree. An making a much-needed reorganization of the consular service was passed. Nothing was done in the Santo Domingo controversy and the legislation affecting our colonial possessions was meager and unimportant, although tariff revision for the Philippines received the attention and approval of the house and an act was passed revising the tariff on the Philippines. A cleanup act for the islands also was passed.

Nearly Twenty Thousand Bills

A large number of bills were introduced in the two houses. The calendar records that the number has reached near 20,000, 600 more than were introduced during the entire three sessions of the last congress.

Before discussing the number of acts passed it is interesting to note that with all the strenuous exertions of an appropriations committee in the house with the new chairman, Representative Tawney, it has been impossible to hold the appropriations down to much less than \$900,000,000, although "economy" was the watchword from the start.

One of the important features of the session has been the careful scrutiny with which the demands of the different government departments have been received by the house. Appropriations committees. The result has been enactment of restraining legislation on nearly every appropriation bill, which it is intended will have a beneficial effect hereafter.

BAILEY IN FAVOR OF BRYAN, 1908

R. E. Burgess Says Texas Senator Will Support Nebraskan

Special to The Telegram. WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—In a statement made through his close friend, Representative Burgess of Texas, Senator Bailey of that state has declared himself in favor of the nomination of Bryan as the democratic candidate for the presidency in 1908. The announcement is regarded as of especial importance and significance, because Bailey has been looked upon as a possible candidate for the nomination himself, and has had many supporters among the southern men of both houses. Burgess' statement was given out today with the knowledge and approval of Bailey. It is believed to indicate a united sentiment in favor of Bryan among the southern democrats and to assure his nomination.

Mr. Burgess says: "It is undoubtedly true that with practical unanimity the democrats in congress would hail with delight the nomination of Senator Bailey for President in 1908. But they know that the democrats cannot and will not urge his nomination because of the section of the country with which he is identified. Senator Bailey himself has never believed that the nomination of any southern man in 1908 would be wise, and he has continually refused his independence to any such move in his interest.

"He and all of us, so far as I know, are of opinion that political conditions point to the nomination of Mr. Bryan as the logical candidate in 1908, and that the belated advocacy of the present President of all these things for which Mr. Bryan has contended for years, together with the widespread tendency of political corruption and discreditable campaign contributions, coupled with Mr. Bryan's spotless character and unquestioned ability and patriotism and reduction and revision of the tariff, strongly indicate the probability of his election.

"It can be assumed without question that Senator Bailey and his friends are in hearty sympathy with Bryan's nomination, and I have no the slightest doubt that the coming state convention in Texas will adopt a ringing platform and unanimously suggest the nomination of Mr. Bryan in 1908."

LEGISLATORS MAY BE PUT IN CELLS

Eighty Massachusetts Solons Accused of Taking Bribes

Special to The Telegram. BOSTON, Mass., June 25.—What District Attorney Moran intends to do regarding the confession of former Representative Frank J. Getthro, who was expelled from the lower branch of the Massachusetts legislature for placing bribes to defeat the Logan anti-bunk-brokers bill, is known only to himself, but it is likely he will call a special session of the grand jury. The district attorney says he will not discuss Getthro's confession until he presents the entire matter to the grand jury, which will convene next month.

It is said Getthro has presented to the district attorney a notebook containing the names of twenty-two members of the legislature who have sold their votes.

Getthro's confession that he bought and delivered votes to kill the bill implicated both republicans and democrats. He asserted that the house leaders promised him protection, and for that reason he did not betray them when he was summoned before the grand jury.

Behind Getthro's present activity certain persons see the fine hand of Thos. W. Lawson, who has long been on record as declaring the Massachusetts legislators have been bought and sold like kettles of fish. Students of literature detect in the Boston barber's speech before the house when he was expelled, the words of his constituent Timothy W. Coakley, and there are those who recognize Mr. Lawson's rhetoric in Getthro's confession letter.

"Before this thing is over," said Mr. Lawson, "seventy-five or eighty men will wear stripes."
