THE MOVEMENT OF SOUTHERN CATTLE

The movement of southern cattle to the range country of the northwest this year was the smallest in the history of the great live stock industry.

It is a well known fact that Texas was remarkably short on the usual supply of steers, such as is wanted by the northwestern ranchmen this year.

There is one fact that should be borne in mind by those of our northwestern friends who expect to perhaps continue the purchase of Texas steers for several years yet.

And as the demand from the northwest has been annually falling off for several years, the Texas producer has been compelled to look for other avenues as outlets for his surplus.

There are problems in this matter of feeding and finishing cattle yet remaining to be solved in Texas, but they are not insurmountable.

an effort to bring about results that will bear investigation. These men are engaged in a great and noble work which will not be without its ultimate reward.

This in turn will solve the problem of the southern cattle movement. Instead of the surplus going to the northwest as twos and threes to mature on the range, or to the feed lots of the corn belt as calves and yearlings, all Texas stuff will pass out to market through Texas feed lots, finished and ready for the block on Texas products.

ORGANIZED LABOR FRIENDLY TO BELL

Recently there was published in the morning papers a very adroitly worded report to the effect that labor organizations all over the state were supporting Campbell for governor almost solidly, and efforts were being made to bring all the organizations in line.

If Colonel Tom Campbell should be so fortunate as to be nominated and elected governor of Texas he could not constitutionally take the oath of office as governor if he has done what this article claimed.

As a matter of fact, it is well known that the labor leaders of Texas feel very kindly toward Judge Bell, and some of them at least are giving him a cordial and unstinted support.

Perhaps there are more demagogues in Texas at this time than during the past two years. Factions self-constituted leaders are crying "to, here" and "to, there!"

There is a lot of money being spent in the Texas gubernatorial campaign. The question is, where is it coming from?

Judge Bell is making no effort to pander to the labor vote in Texas by specious promises. He is a man who sprang from the depths himself—a self-made man—a man who knows what it is to do an honest day's toil, and a man who is a strict believer in the principle that the laborer is worthy of his hire.

The department of justice at Washington announces its intention of convicting the Standard Oil people. And it was this same department of justice that once made pronouncement of the many things it intended to do to the so-called beef trust.

The Democratic editors in attendance upon the National Editorial Association in Indianapolis this week, have declared unanimously for William J. Bryan.

The big corporations are refusing to contribute to the republican congressional fund this year, and give as their reason the pernicious activity of the President in dealing with such institutions.

Chairman Cecil Lyon, the official pie distributor of the Republican party in Texas, is preparing to do some swatting on his own account.

The next thing we hear from south Texas will be that the Houston Post is ascribing the dry weather prevailing in that section to Judge Bell.

And in the meantime, J. Pluvius came to the rescue and resumed the work of sprinkling at the old stand. J. Pluvius' sprinkler, too, is not involved in any kind of a contract.

There is no occasion for a frenzy of alarm over the appearance of one case of yellow fever in the state of Louisiana. Prompt steps will be taken to prevent any further spread of the infection.

When Editor Hearst gets his new party organized he will be in position to get almost any kind of an old nomination without having to so often tap his barrel.

The TEXAS PRESS

Mr. Crane is a wise statesman and has many warm friends over the state who would delight to see him serving the people, but he is also a little too wise to start out to beat Joseph W. Bailey for the senate on the strength of Mr. Hearst's pipe-dreams.

Crane has declined to become a candidate against Bailey and the movement is significant only to the extent that it indicates there are some people in Texas who do not believe Senator Bailey is altogether infallible.

Fort Worth now boasts eighty-seven passenger trains daily. Not so bad that for progress, when there are hundreds of people who can remember when Fort Worth was a very small village.—Collingsworth Courier.

Fort Worth is the railway center of the southwest and is growing faster than any other Texas city. And the time is not very remote when Fort Worth was a village. Her present proud and enviable position is a striking illustration of Texas grit and energy.

The worst thing Judge Bell's opponents say about him is that he is Governor Lanham's choice, meaning that Governor Lanham has chosen him as his successor. This may or may not be true, but more likely it is nothing but campaign buncombe, but if true it is no discredit to Judge Bell for Governor Lanham, who is his near neighbor, to favor his candidacy.

The trouble with Judge Bell's opponents is they are unable to say anything against him that will stick. The charge that he is the friend of Lanham and should be defeated for that reason only serves to disclose the desperate expedients to which the opposition is reduced.

Quite a ripple of excitement was created in the gubernatorial campaign this week by the announcement that Candidate Wade had failed to comply with the Terrell election law and would miss the pleasure of seeing his name appear upon the official ballots of the coming primary election.

Candidate Wade has gone to join Candidate Moore among the cutbacks. It now only remains for Candidates Colquitt and Brooks to also do the proper thing, and let Judge Bell and Tom Campbell finish the race in which they should have been the only starters.

One of the bills Mr. Hudspeeth proposes to introduce in the state senate next winter is one asking for \$100,000 appropriation for the extermination of wolves. A few years ago an appropriation of \$50,000 was made, but the amount did not go very far.

It is said wolves are greatly increasing in Texas and are doing much injury to the live stock industry. Some steps should be taken to wipe them out, and a bounty law would exert a wholesome influence in that direction.

In the case of two of the candidates it is coming from the salaries they are supposed to be earning as judge of the court of criminal appeals and member of the state railroad commission.

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The senate has a joke on the house. The house committees pride themselves on the accuracy and finish of the appropriation bills, and it was something of a surprise today when the reading clerk in the senate reeled the following passage from the sundry civil bill:

For hospital, namely, pay of assistant surgeons, matrons, druggists, wardmasters, cooks, hospital carriage drivers, horse drivers, grave diggers, funeral escort, and for such other services as may be necessary for the care of the sick.

Several senators began to scan their copies of the bill, and suddenly Spooner arose and suggested that horse drivers, grave diggers and funeral escorts were not exactly needed for the care of the sick.

It was not easy to correct the bad grammar without endangering somebody's job, but finally Spooner offered as an amendment the insertion after "funeral escort" of the words "or for the burial of the dead" and the clause was passed.

"I am not opposed to this provision for the expenses of the President," said Senator McClaurin. "If we pass it now it will be the law when in 1909 our next President enters on his term of office, and William Jennings Bryan."

A loud clapping was heard at the main door, and every face was turned to see who had the hardihood to applaud the name of "the peerless" on the floor of the senate.

Senator Scott wore a perfect dream of a suit made of fine cream linen, coat, waistcoat and trousers all alike, and cut to the king's taste.

When Grosvenor came over to the senate, John Kean hunted around until he found Scott, and brought him in to show him to Grosvenor and let the latter have a sight of the West Virginia senator.

"Look at Grosvenor," was a byword in the house all day. Adam Bede scored by dubbing him "Old Purity," and the sobriquet stuck.

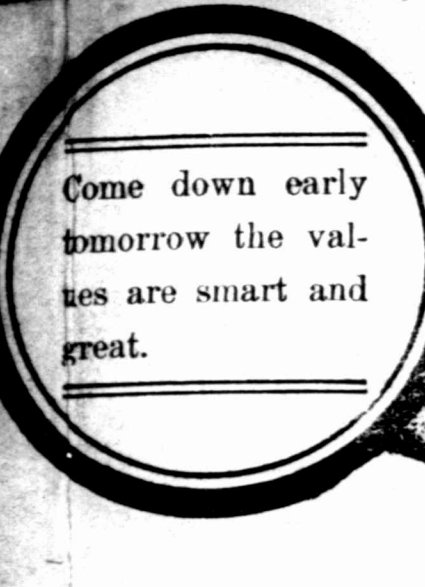
TALL TALES FROM THE TALL TIMBER

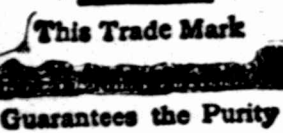

## ORDER DELAYS CUT IN RATES

Commission Restrained from Reducing Passenger Rates

## SEEK INJUNCTION

All Texas Roads Will Unite in Effort to Secure Permanent Enjoining

Special to The Telegram.

DALLAS, June 26.—By an order issued by Judge Andrew P. McCormick of the circuit court of the United States for the western district of Texas, the railroad commission of Texas is temporarily restrained from enforcing its order to reduce passenger fares on the Houston & Texas Central from 3c a mile to 2½c, effective July 1.

This temporary restraining order is to hold good until the application of the complainant for a temporary injunction can be heard, and the same is set down for hearing before Judge Maxey, or any other judge of the western district, at Austin on July 16.

The complainant further asks that all of the commission's rates, both freight and passenger, shall be permanently enjoined upon a final hearing of the case. All other principal Texas lines will join in this petition.

Garwood Presents Bill.  
Judge H. M. Garwood, one of the general attorneys for the Houston & Texas Central, arrived in Dallas on Saturday morning and presented to Judge McCormick the bill asking for relief against the railroad commission. This bill set forth the position of the railroad company with much particularity and requested that it be left with Judge McCormick at some length. Judge McCormick asked that the bill be left with him, saying that it was a very important matter and he would take it under advisement.

On Monday noon he decided to grant an order temporarily restraining the railroad commission in the matter of the passenger rates, as is stated in the foregoing.

The practice in this case differs materially from that which was observed in the original injunction case against the railroads and in the injunction case of 1919. In those cases the federal court enjoined the body of the commission's rates pending a hearing, and they lit so.

No Present Rate Held Up.  
In this case the court temporarily restrains only the order of the railroad commission, which seeks to enforce a reduction in the passenger rates on the Houston & Texas Central. There will be a hearing upon the matter on July 16 and the court will then determine whether a temporary injunction restraining the restraining order until the final hearing of the case.

The railroad further asks that upon such final hearing the court shall issue a permanent injunction enjoining the commission from enforcing any of its rates.

In the previous injunction cases all of the commission's rates were held aside pending a final hearing. In the present case none of the present rates is set aside, but only the proposed passenger rate is held up pending a determination of the matter by the courts. In other words, the practice in this case is akin to the "limited court review" policy, so much talked of at Washington.

To Preserve Status Quo.  
"We are simply asking that the status quo be preserved until the court can hear our case," said Judge McCormick. "We do not ask that any of the freight rates shall be held up or that business shall be disturbed pending a final hearing."

Judge Garwood left for Austin last night, where he will file the bill and ask for a temporary injunction against the commission. He says that all other principal railway companies of Texas will join in the petition asking for a perpetual injunction against all the commission's rates upon final hearing, and that these petitions will be filed just as soon as the attorneys for the railroads can finish writing their petitions.

Says Colquitt Was Disqualified.  
The bill of the Houston & Texas Central sets forth all of the objections to the commission's proposed passenger rate that were urged by its counsel at the commission hearing. It emphasizes the discrimination against the Houston & Texas Central, argues that the deprivation of revenues would be confiscatory, and, therefore, charges that the commission's order is violative of the provisions of the state and Texas constitutions. It is also charged that Commissioner Colquitt was disqualified from sitting in the case because he had prejudged it, shown by public expressions wherein he promised to reduce the passenger rates on the Houston & Texas Central, and that such public expression, in view of his candidacy for the office of governor, amounts to a contract to reduce said rates.

Alleged Act of One Member.  
One of the allegations of the petition is new. It charges that the order of May 30, commanding the Houston & Texas Central to charge 2½c a mile, was not the order of the railroad commission of Texas, but is in truth and in fact the order of only one of the members of said commission, Allison Mayfield. It is alleged that at the time said order was issued Chairman Storey and Commissioner Colquitt were both absent from Austin, and that Mr. Mayfield signed Mr. Colquitt's name to the order, at his request. It is asserted that Mr. Mayfield had no authority to act for Mr. Colquitt in the matter.

The allegation made in support of the plea for a perpetual injunction against all of the commission's rates, to be granted upon final hearing, are along the lines of those made in the former injunction cases. It being urged that they are confiscatory, that they take property without due process of law.

ATLANTIN, June 26.—Chairman Storey said that he regretted the injunction suit and the litigation to which

the commission will be a party as the result of the order of a majority of the commission in adopting the 2½c rate, and to which he was opposed. He said he not only thought the reduction unjust, but that he had desired to make reductions which would prove safe and on commodities which would result in benefit to the people.

## BUILD NEW ROAD

Omaha and Denver Line Capitalizes Company at \$2,000,000

DENVER, Colo., June 26.—The Omaha and Denver Short Line has filed papers of incorporation with the secretary of state of Colorado for a road to be built directly connecting Denver with Omaha. The company is capitalized for \$2,000,000. The filing of the necessary papers has caused considerable speculation here in railroad circles and there is a suspicion that the new company is to be backed by one of the trunk lines west of the Missouri river that has long been seeking an entrance into Denver.

## MAD DOG KILLED IN HARD FIGHT

Officer Locked in Bath Room With Savage Animal

Special to The Telegram.

WACO, Texas, June 26.—Locked up in a bathroom by accident and confronted by a mad dog, Police Officer Frank Tucker fought hand to hand to save himself from a horrible death, finally succeeding in clubbing the rabid animal to death, but not until it had fastened its teeth on the clothing of the officer and had come near biting him a dozen times. He had responded to a call on South Eighth to kill a mad dog and found the ladies of the house locked in a room, not having taken possession of the rest of the house. The officer went in and the dog was then in the bathroom.

He stepped inside to see where the dog was when the door was blown to and locked with a spring lock. The dog flew at him in a moment and he had no time to do anything but fight. He had a target rifle, but could not use it as the dog was moving so swiftly. The officer finally managed to hit it a stinging blow and then clubbed it to death in the bathroom. Officer Tucker says he has never gone through anything which taxed his nerves more.

## CLOSE SODA FOUNTAINS

Lid Put On Sunday Soft Drinks, Cigars and Fruit Stands

LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 26.—Additional what were considered by a majority of citizens unnecessarily heavy weights were piled on Louisville yesterday as the result of a policy inaugurated by Magistrate Frank J. Hoffman. Magistrate Hoffman's interpretation of the Sunday closing law led to the closing of soda fountains, fruit stands, and even of butcher shops and groceries, which have hitherto kept open Sunday mornings for the benefit of citizens having no cars.

Half a dozen cigar stands, soda fountains and other business places in the central part of the city were kept open with the object of inviting "store" arrests. The remainder of the shops, etc., which could not under a right interpretation of the law be closed as works of necessity, were closed in a majority of cases shutting their doors. No arrests were made during the day. Magistrate Hoffman's constables conducted themselves with taking evidence.

## SHOT IN QUARREL

Families Have Fatal Fight Over Water Supply

## CATTLEMEN INDICTED

Accused of Unlawfully Including Public Lands in Nebraska

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 26.—Secretary of the Interior Hitchcock has received from special agents at Omaha a full report of the land fraud indictments in Nebraska. Thirty-nine indictments, at least one of which contained forty counts, were returned. The latter was against Bartlett Richards, Will G. Constock et al., who are the largest cattlemen in the western country. They are indicted for maintaining the Spauld ranch inclosure, comprising 253,000 acres, alleged to have been unlawfully fenced by them, Richards and Constock pleaded guilty to a similar indictment last year and were sentenced to six hours imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$300.

H. M. Allen, president of the Standard Cattle Company, who is now in Mexico, was indicted for maintaining an unlawful inclosure of 300,000 acres. Another indictment involves Joseph Crow, formerly postmaster at Omaha and a prominent politician. The indictment contains ten counts and charges Crow with attempting to corrupt jurors and to bribe the grand jury.

## LABOR WILL GIVE BIG EXPOSITION

Purpose to Show Superiority of Union Made Goods

CHICAGO, June 26.—President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor sent representatives to Chicago yesterday to arrange for a "union exposition." The object of the fair is to celebrate the achievements of organized labor throughout the world and especially in the United States. Minneapolis tentatively has been selected as the place for holding the exposition. The aim of Mr. Gompers, he said, is to bring together the products of union working men in every branch of industry, to illustrate the superiority which is claimed on all classes of goods, and to demonstrate the growth of the union labor movement in the United States since its inception.

All Industries Represented.  
Some idea of the character of the proposed exposition may be gained by the announcement that two million men, comprising the total membership of the American Federation of Labor, are to contribute to its success. Other countries also will be represented. There will be exhibits representing all of the industries in which union labor is interested.

## OBJECT TO BREWSTER

Denison Citizens Protest Appointment of Marshal for South Texas District

A short time after the committee took the case to the senate, however, whose brother, Dr. Acheson, lives at Denison, received a telegram saying that a protest against the confirmation of Mr. Brewster's nomination had been made.

According to the best information to be got here, the charge against Dr. Brewster is that until recently he was a member of the Ku Klux Klan. The judiciary committee had not just met today it is not likely that the nomination will be held up.

This is the second time that Dr. Acheson has intervened on behalf of his brother, the Pennsylvania congressman, to defeat Mr. Lyon's recommendation. 

## FURMAN RUNNING FOR U. S. SENATE

### Oklahoma Candidate Former Resident of Fort Worth

Henry M. Furman of Ila, Okla., and a brother of S. M. Furman of this city, is a candidate for United States senator from the new state of Oklahoma and letters to friends in this city state that he has a good show to be elected.

Henry M. Furman was for years a member of the Scott-Walker bar and was one of the leading criminal lawyers in North Texas. In 1887 he was a democratic candidate for congress from the Fort Worth district and had already secured instructions from Johnson, Bosque and one other county and it was then almost a certain thing that Tarrant, his home county, would instruct for him, which would insure his nomination and election.

### Newspapers Fought Him

The belief, however, that Furman was in sympathy with the Knights of Labor movement and the Dark Lantern political party caused strong opposition in Fort Worth that brought about his defeat. He opened his campaign in a speech in the court house yard. It was then denounced by the newspapers, and to get even the newspapers went back at him, the old Fort Worth Mail, now The Telegram, leading the fight against him. Through the efforts of the Mail, R. E. Beckham was brought into the race against Furman and Olin Willborn of Dallas, then representing the district in congress, and he succeeded in getting the instructions of Tarrant county. When Furman saw that he could not get the vote of his home county he withdrew from the race; and when the convention met at Waxahachie, Beckham came within one vote of securing the nomination, Olin Willborn was the most brilliant member of congress ever sent from Texas, was defeated and Joe Abbott of Hillsboro was nominated as a dark horse. Willborn's defeat hit him so hard that he left the state and went to California, where he is now on the United States bench, an appointee of President Grover Cleveland.

### Made Second Race

Furman made one more race for congress in this district, but failed to win, and finally went to Oklahoma, where he has won fame and fortune as a lawyer. While a citizen of Fort Worth he was recognized as a brilliant man and as a criminal lawyer no one in the state was his superior.
