Bears Still Energetic—Market Does Not Respond Readily, but Values Generally Lower

NEW YORK, June 30.—Bears resumed their attack on the stock market today and although the retrograde movement was not so forceful as during recent sessions, the list as a whole sold at times, substantially below yesterday's final prices.

Foreign news was unfavorable, particularly that regarding the French and Russian situation, and opening prices were generally lower. There was some covering noted and also scattered buying for long account, which checked the decline for a time, some few issues even selling fractionally above closing prices of the previous session, but bearish sentiment was too unanimous, and the support insufficient to stem the tide for any length of time, consequently low prices as a rule were touched in the final hour of trading, there being, however, a slight rally before the close.

Although the leaders of the bear movement switched operations around quite a little among the different issues in an effort to ascertain which would be the most responsive to pressure, the Steels and Readings seemed to be the most vulnerable and were the leaders of the decline. Steel preferreds again touching a new low level at 99 a drop of 1/2 from yesterday's final, while Reading at the time sold 2 1/2, closing figures being 2 1/2.

NEW YORK COTTON

July Shorts Apprehensive of a Squeeze Avail Themselves of Opportunity to Cover

NEW YORK, June 30.—Despite the fact that conditions were against the market, weather reports being favorable and the Chronicle summary bearish, while the Journal of Commerce condition figures of 82.7 up to June 23, as compared with 82.1 last month, showing a practically insignificant detour in Texas, which state the bulls have depended upon to turn the government report in their favor, prices held up well and showed a slight gain at the close.

The anxiety of shorts to cover their July, superinduced by an incipient squeeze in that option in New Orleans, made that option the center of attraction, and sent the price up 14 points from the opening figures, while the slight gain at the close. Strength of the July option was responsible for the steadiness of the list.
