"We, the members of the police committee, find that several saloons in North Fort Worth are selling liquor on Sunday in direct violation of the law. We hereby instruct the city marshal to issue the following instructions to the police committee on Sunday, who shall also make it his personal business to see that these instructions are complied with, and if they are not, we will proceed to arrest them in accordance with the laws and city ordinance regarding same."

"We further instruct that the city marshal shall instruct the police on duty that they must not loiter around or drink in saloons and must not be caught at any time drinking intoxicating liquor while wearing uniforms."

PUBLISHED THIRTY YEARS AGO HERE

Paper Shows T. & P. R'y. Has Six Men Here Then

Captain B. B. Padlock, secretary of the Board of Trade, occasionally looks over the files of the old Fort Worth Democrat, of which he was publisher in the early 70s. Recently he noticed many of the board of directors of the Texas and Pacific railway of July 21, 1876, the following:

"T. F. Youkum of the Larimer series called at this office and showed some fine fruits."

In the issue of Aug. 12 of the same year, he found a list of the names of the Texas and Pacific railway of Fort Worth at that time, and there were just six of them. These were: I. Swingley, agent; A. Leo Hunt, clerk; B. F. Simms, freight clerk; W. L. Hendricks, labor clerk; Z. J. Bess, telegraphman; and E. P. Turner, ticket agent.

It is interesting to note that of the men mentioned here, one, B. F. Youkum, has risen to the position of chairman of the board of directors of the Rock Island-Frisco system; another, E. P. Turner, is now general passenger agent of the Texas and Pacific, and B. F. Simms is in charge of the Fall college curriculum in literature.

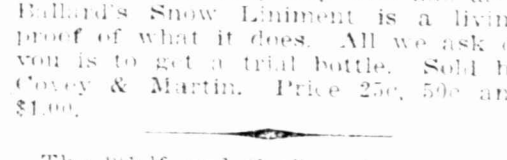

CITY'S SUNDAY SINS SCORED

Methodist Ministers Preach on Day's Observance
WORLD'S PLEASURE
Dancing Sunday Baseball and Roller Skating Condemned at Mulkey Memorial

That the lid has never been off in Fort Worth, that every street car company, operating trolley cars to summer resorts on Sunday deserves condemnation by the citizens, and the report that some of the church women of the city drink intoxicants—these are some of the topics discussed by the Rev. Dr. Alonzo Monk in his Sunday night sermon at the First Methodist church, corner Fourth and Jones streets, of which congregation that minister is the pastor. At the same time, over on the south side of Fort Worth, at the Mulkey Memorial Methodist church, Rev. Dr. George S. Slover, pastor there, bombarded "Worldly Amusements," specializing among other things, Fort Worth as a "vice city," the modern dance as lustful and a school of passion, attendants upon Sunday baseball as "in crowds of toughs," the theater as the most dangerous kind of error because it is mixed good and evil, and that pleasure resorts of Fort Worth are transformed into the Holy Sabbath Day into a holiday.

Sermon of Dr. Monk
"I find no pleasure in offending the people, much less my own people, but if to serve God offends every man and woman in Fort Worth, then I will do so without fear. I am not afraid, as long as he does right. But, on the other hand, he has everything to fear when he does wrong, one hellowing better to be a sinner than it is unworthy of respect when it does not rebuke sin. I like a sermon on the word of God once in a while, but I like to preach on heavenly things. But a gospel wholly given to such topics seldom saves anybody from hell. I never knew a man to quit sin unless he was rebuked for his sins. And a man should be rebuked publicly from the pulpit for his sins."
Preacher in Politics
"A great deal has been said concerning the preacher in politics. The public is very sensitive on that point. They want the preacher to refrain from political discussions in the pulpit. And this is true to an extent. A discussion of politics by a preacher is all right provided he lets partisanship severely alone. I have no respect for a democratic preacher who advocates democracy from the pulpit and I regard republicans and all others in the same light. The pulpit has nothing whatever to do with partisanship politics but it has everything to do with the science of civil government. It is a lamentable thing that the science of civil government cannot be taught in our schools. I do not mean that no clean men can be secured but a sufficient number cannot be obtained. Both republicans and democrats are so full of corruption that it would be hard to pick the most reliable party. It is remarkable that after men get into office, they prove dishonorable. Very few men are moral on the street have confidence in their public officers."
Continuing Dr. Monk said:
No Lid in Fort Worth
"The chief of police of Fort Worth has been calling for more rods. Why? When I came home the other afternoon I found in front of my gate a man in a beastly intoxicated state. Foddy after I had finished treating I emerged from the church. The lid was said to be on and hermetically sealed all around the rim. And yet in front of the church I found a drunken man lying in the gutter. If the lid was on the pot must have been leaking at the bottom."
"The morals of this city will never improve so long as Fort Worth is the whiskey cursed, whiskey soaked town that she is. I have said that the women are better than the men. A good woman is better than anything this side of heaven when she is good. But when a woman wants to be no good, she can be no meaner than anything this side of hell. This statement may be inebriant, but it is true."
Church Women Drink?
"A gentleman of this city who knows society, who mingles with the tables, who lives on the west side of Main street with the titled gentlemen, said to me some time ago, 'The amount of drinking among Fort Worth women is appalling.' A saloon man of this city is reported to have sent me a message to the effect that he would be afraid to show me his books, inasmuch as they would make startling revelations regarding some women of my congregation, and I know that women of the old First Methodist church are as good as those of any other church."
Condemns Street Car Companies
"I stated this morning that the Northern Texas Traction company deserves the condemnation of all good people of this community. I only modify that statement by including every trolley company that operates any kind of an amusement resort on Sunday. I include the Rosen Heights company and all others. Yes, I am against Sunday resorts with their theaters, their buffets and legs before the footlights, their skating up and down and all round, and to the effect that the council chamber recently to defeat the passage of a measure deserving the condemnation of every citizen of Fort Worth. They should have remained and made an honest fight of it. Hundreds of people are the men who stayed with him as they have in the men who left their seats. They should have remained in their places, even though a member of the council was absent. They should have made an upright, honorable fight. I have no sympathy with the motion made by one of them at the next meeting to the effect that the council members who remained be sustained. That action on the part of those who remained needed no confirmation of the people of the town."
"In conclusion, I will say that there are many thousands of people in Fort

Worth, but hundreds of thousands are remaining away because of the immoral rot that is here."

Sermon of Dr. Slover
The pastor of the Mulkey Memorial church first took up the rules of that denomination and preached directly at his congregation. He read portions of the Methodist book of discipline and said in part:
"No church proposes to raise its moral standards higher than the Bible. I consider one thing that is hindering the church, is that its actual practice its standard of life and practice is too low. I have never known any church to condemn a practice that was spiritually helpful, but on the other hand they have often waited until vice has made great inroads of evil before raising the rule of evil. The following should be considered in setting upon the right or wrong of any amusement:
"The nature of the thing itself.
"Its associations, history, conditions, circumstances, being, the time of practice. There are numerous things that are perfectly harmless in themselves that on account of their associations and general use have become sources of evil.
Dancing and Drinking
"To say nothing of the worldly spirit exhibited in the crowd that throngs the modern dance, there are two objections against it, that are unanswerable.
"That as carried on with its late hours, the frequent association with the drunk and the immoral, and with such temptations that persons of average strength cannot resist the temptation offered to excess, and that while his conduct may promote gratification of a person it is greatly derogatory to physical health.
"The usual dress of the dancing girl, together with the physical contact in the average round dance, are schools of lust and passion. These considerations and these alone are sufficient to condemn a dance as a school of sin. It is to be said that they are seeking to know and do the will of God to refrain from such practice."
Baseball on the Sabbath
Speaking of Sunday baseball games, Dr. Slover said:
"The purpose of baseball is to give mental recreation and exercise to those who do mental and indoor work. In some instances, it has been made a profession, and become the end, rather than the means to an end. As to Sunday baseball, it always violates the Sabbath and often violates the laws of the country. Many a young man spends his Sunday away from home and church influences, in hotels, and often in crowds of toughs on the baseball grounds, or other questionable places, to do so without fear, and without the fear of God, and without the will of God to refrain from such practice."
Let Baseball Have the Place
"Let baseball have the place for which it was originally intended, and it is all right. But the Sunday inter-collegiate and inter-town games have often degenerated into a school of gambling and even those and gamblers an opportunity to get in their work under the guise of an innocent sport. This, no one should afford to do with the facts, and afford to deny."

CONTINENTAL IN NEW HOME

Bank and Trust Company Occupy Building

IS MODERNLY ARRANGED

Room for Women Customers a New Feature—Furnishing of Quarters

Elegant and Commodious

Fort Worth has long been proud of her strong and growing banking institutions and any improvement in them is looked upon with interest by the people of the city. Just at present there are, as has been noted before in the Telegram, changes being made in the quarters of several of the city's banks. The Farmers and Merchants, Traders, Western and the Continental Bank and Trust Company are all remodeling old rooms of their banking. The first to move into the new quarters is the Continental Bank and Trust Company, which moved Saturday night into the new banking rooms at the Continental Bank building at Seventh and Houston streets and opened their doors for business Monday morning.

Building Changed

The building was formerly known as the Board of Trade building, but since it has come into the possession of the bank its name has been changed as well as its appearance. Former residents of the city, however, may not so easily recognize in the present structure the old building. Externally and internally the building has been thoroughly renovated and the first floor has been completely remodelled to make room for the bank. Workmen have gone over the whole exterior, scraping the red sandstone of the first story with steel brushes and painting the brick walls above, thus giving the building a much better appearance. The banking rooms of the Continental Bank and Trust Company occupy most of the first floor. The main entrance is from Houston, with a smaller entrance on the Seventh street side.

As one enters the bank he is struck with the beautiful and artistic decorations of the walls and ceilings and the pleasing arrangement of the electric lights on the ceiling. The floor is tiled and just within the entrance the name of the bank is done in the floor in a wainscoting of Tennessee marble extending from the floor up four feet around the room into the private office of the cashier, Horace W. Feltus, who will receive callers and look after his share of the business. The room is furnished in stable mahogany, furniture of the best quality and the bookshelves are of iron and brass with marble wainscoting. The counter tops are of dark brown black granite and black marble granite plates under the windows. The first two windows are for tele. The third for the bookkeeper, the fourth for the file clerk, the fifth for the teller and the sixth for the use of women customers of the bank, being within a few steps of the women's private sitting room.

Room for Women Customers

The waiting and rest room for women is one of the features of the new quarters and is toward the rear of the bank. Just to the left of the Seventh street entrance, it is elegantly furnished in mahogany and iron with a writing desk, dressing table and opening off from it will be a lavatory and toilet. The floor is carpeted with heavy green velvet carpet. On the writing desk will be kept stationary embossed with the bank's name.

The office of the president, J. G. Wilkinson, is at the rear of the building in the southwest corner. It is a large, elegant room furnished with a window on the north is the private room of the vice president, D. T. Bonmar, who is also president of the Fidelity Trust Company.

In the northwest corner is the large directors' room. In this room there are a long mahogany table, commodious chairs and other suitable furniture. From this room a door opens into the outer hall of the building near the elevator. The vaults in the banking rooms are of the most modern variety. In the basement there is a large vault for stationary, while on the banking floor are three vaults for valuables. The lining of the vault is of one-inch chrome steel throughout.

Man Dies From Injuries After Being Taken to Hospital

Looking forward the locomotive plunged against the standards and crumpled the bridge. The bridge withstood the impact and rebounding, the engine crashed into another engine, which was standing on a siding, and overturned. The wreckage of the two engines interlocked in a broken mass of twisted steel. Throughout the wild plunging of the engine Driver Robins, whether alive or dead, remained in his cab. Hours afterward his charred body was found in the wreckage of the engine. The cause of the accident is still in doubt. It is suggested that the wheels of the engine failed to take the switch.
