In average precipitation the month was .61 inches in excess of the mean for eight years, the total being 4.13 inches, nearly one-half of which, 2.04 inches, fell on the afternoon and night of June 20. Sunday a Scorcher Sunday was the fourth day of the present year on which the temperature has reached 97 degrees, and being the first day of July, it may be said that the month has started off well toward keeping up its record for hot weather. The heat of the day was especially oppressive, as there was but very little wind moving, and the high temperature prevailed until late in the evening. At 7 o'clock Sunday evening the

KATY SUED FOR FORTY THOUSAND

Boy Alleges Loss of Leg By

Claude Nichols, by his next friend, Pat Doyle, filed suit in the Seventh district court of Tarrant county against the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway Ompany of Texas, asking damages in the sum of \$30,000, alleging the loss of his right leg. Tone Shows Some Improvements, but Bearish Sentiment Still Perdominate-Prices Work Upward

Special to The Telegram. NEW YORK, July 2 .- Although developments over Sunday did not change the situation materially and the generality of weekly reviews was rather pessimistic, the stock market exhibited a better undertone throughout the early session and prices for the list as a whole worked upward gradually and at midday a fair advance from Saturday's closing figures had been attained. Bearish sentiment, however, has not been eliminated and although the opening was firm with prices generally higher, gains of a point or more being noted in several issues, there was a slump during the initial trading which carried prices for some of the leading issues down substantially, a break of 21/8 points in reading, which placed that issue at the lowest level of the movement, being the feature. The recovery which followed was due probably as much to the fact that some of the leading issues, notably the Steels, are selling at their intrinsic value as to any other reason, although a very large short interest was a weighty factor, announcement of the engagement of gold for import, which will relieve the money situation, inasmuch as it will provide for the July dividend disbursements, without creating any great stringency, causing liquidation of some of the smaller accounts. 

NEW YORK STOCKS NEW YORK COTTON CHICAGO GRAIN

Bears Timid Despite Developments Favoring Their Cause—Evening Up Transactions

Special to The Telegram. NEW YORK, July 2.-With the weight of influences almost entirely in their favor the advocates of lower prices failed to gain any material concessions today, the chief obstacle being their own lack of energetic action, looking to the desired result, occasioned by a wholesome fear of the bull crowd, whom they have learned to respect in times past. Bearish crop reports and the very disappointing character of the early cables were ignored and owing to covering by: shorts the market opened steady with prices better than expected, being a point each way for the new crop options and unchanged to 2 lower for summer months. As usual on days immediately preceding a government report, the trading was light and confined to evening up transactions, sales for the first hour aggregating 37,400 bales.

A saggy tendency developed soon after the call and prices eased off some 7 to 10 points before the noon hour. July, after working up to a net gain of 4 points, weakened, prices dropping 15 points, a portion of which was recovered. The market closed steady with prices at the lowest for new crop options being 8 points below closing figures of the previous session. Final figures for July showed a net loss of 6 points.

The spot market ruled quiet, prices being unchanged at 10.80c for middling.





Untiring Effort on Part of Pastor and Congregation Has Yielded \$18,500 Structure

From a struggling church with no home or ground upon which to build one, to a healthy, growing organization with 144 members, owning a beautiful lot in the heart of the residence section of the south side, on which has been erected an attractive and commodious church edifice practically free from debt, all within a period of three years-this is the record of the to the public the following program of First Congregational church of Fort special events to be presented this Worth, the new building of which was dedicated Sunday. This remarkably rapid growth has not been accomplished without untiring effort on the part of the pastor, Rev. George W. Ray, and the membership of the church. Much of the money to defray the cost of these improvements has been raised in small amounts and an interesting incident is related in this

> Little Girl's Effort It is said that a little girl whose parents were members of the church desired to have a part in the erection of the new church home and wanted to earn some money on her own account to add to the building fund. Accordingly she set to work and soon she earned 5 cents. This she turned over to the pastor and he related the incident to some members of his congregation. Mrs. C. R. Post heard of the little girl's effort and thought of a plan whereby she might make use of this example of devotion to interest others to give more to the fund. Mrs Post had in her possession a sma'l alabaster box which came from the home of Abraham Lincoln, and in this box she placed the 5 cent piece which she had obtained from Rev. Mr. Rav. Going among her friends, she would take the box and "sell" the coin to the friend for as much as possible, sometimes getting as high as \$10, but always keeping the coin in the box ready to "sell" to the next friend. By this means, and others which friends of Mrs. Post say that only she could devise and use she succeeded in rais-

ing over \$300 for the building fund. Webb, whose death occurred in this city on the 28. of June, 1906, beg leave to report as follows for the consideration of our brother members of the bar; Judge Webb was born in the state of Mississippi fifty-four years ago, and after a liberal education at the University of Mississippi began the prac-

tice of his profession in his native state which he pursued with the diligence and application characteristic of the man until his removal to western Texas in 1877. The he soon attained the high rank in his calling which he held with ever increasing progress till the day of his death. His constituency, in a short time, honored him with a place on the district bench, which position he filled with eminent satisfaction to his friends until he chose to take his stand as a number of the bar in a practice that brought him flattering results. In the meanwhile he turned his facile mind toward authorship, which leaves us a heritage of great use to the profession, and his "Record Title" stands as a monument to his genius for taking pains in arraying decisions in admirable order on this abstruse subject. His other works are positive forces for good in the line of our profession. For ten years he has been building a reputation as a careful and industrious collator of decisions of the court of civil appeals of the Second supreme judicial district of Texas, as reporter of this court. The mode of his selection to this important trust argues most certainly as to his qualifications as guard. ian of this most difficult post, and the fact that he has held it without a rival so long, exemplifies the work he has left, which will last as long as the anlife, with its varied obligations and intense and most strenuous duties, we
