Admiral Rojestvensky was on trial on the charge of surrendering to the enemy after the battle of the Sea of Japan, which began before a court-martial here July 4. The court deliberated for nearly ten hours. Four officers of the torpedo boat destroyer Bedovi who were placed on trial with the admiral, were found guilty, having premeditatively surrendered the Bedovi, and the four are condemned to death by shooting. But on account of extenuating circumstances the emperor will be requested to commute the sentences of the four officers to dismissal from service and be denied certain rights which they would otherwise enjoy.

LAWTON, O. T., July 10.—Rev. J. L. Ray, a preacher who has been holding services on the streets at Mangum considered mentally unbalanced and a dangerous character, shot and killed Dub Stephenson, a saloon man of Mangum, last night. Ray immediately escaped capture by officers and last night succeeded in making his way nearly across Greer county southward. Telephone messages to the authorities at Altus resulted in the raising of a posse there, who started out in search of Ray early this morning.

## "GRASS IS FINE AND CATTLE FAT"

## Ike T. Pryor Says South Texas Is Booming

Ike Pryor paid a visit to the city from his home in San Antonio on his way to Mineral Wells, where he will spend two weeks or more. When requested to give some idea of cattle and crop conditions down in the Uvalde country where his ranch is located, he said:

"Conditions are fine, just as fine as could be. We had good rains in May, when we needed them, and this month we have had other good rains that have kept things going. Grass is fine and cattle fat, and with no sickness of any kind and a good crop of young ones things could not be much better in the cow line; that is, on the

"Early corn will make a full crop, for it got rain at the right time, but the late crop of that grain will be cut short, for it got caught in the middle of wet and dry and failed to make good. Cotton was never better and all other things that have been planted are up to the same standard. All the western part of Texas has had good rains and will go through the summer months all right.

### DRY AT MORGAN

### L. Whisenant Says Water Is Pumped for Cattle

R. L. Whisenant, who does a cattle business, came in with a load of stock for market and said: "It is very dry with us down at Morgan, where I make my home. I am now engaged in pumping water for my cattle and they are not doing well. We have had but little rain this year, to tell you the truth, and this summer's dry spell just makes things crack. The earth has cracked sure enough, and if it does not rain things will come to a worse pass. "Corn is a failure this year, but cotton is fine and no boll weevil to

pester it. "What averaged about ten bushels to the acre and was not very good. "Oats was fine and will average any where from fifty bushels to seventy Cattle are getting very ticky and this, with the scarcity of water, makes them fall off very fast, instead of gaining flesh. When cattle are on the mend and picking up flesh, stock will shed the ticks and cleanse their skins. There is a little alfalfa planted in our section and it does well, but I pin my faith to Johnson grass. Well cured, it can't be beat, and any man can make a crop feeding only Johnson grass. Of ourse, alone it takes a big lot of it. I rode my horse all summer and fed him nothing but Johnson grass and he held up well. I gave him about a bare of it a day. Johnson grass can be out easier than cockle burrs o crab grass, and it requires only a little constant and hard work to do it,

Let Bexar county demand of her candidates their platform on the quality of the legislation on these points that they favor. Equal taxation in fact, wise election laws, proper incentives to capital by fair treatment, consideration for vested rights of all kinds, these are the things this coming legislature should stand for.—San Antonio Light.

While there is an effort being made to inaugurate a crusade against corporations in this state, it does not meet with popular approval. The average citizen of Texas is a strong believer in the principles of right and justice, and while he is a firm believer in the principle that every corporation doing business in this state should be made to conform to the provision of every law upon our statute books, he does not subscribe to the theory that all corporations are bad just because they are corporations.

In this state during the past year nearly 1,500 new corporations were formed, the charters being taken out under the laws of the state by Texas citizens who found it necessary to perfect such organizations in order to establish needed enterprises in different communities. To say that these new Texas corporations, together with those of a similar nature already in existence, should be summarily wiped out in order that the political ambition of designing men may be grat-

No one believes that Texas should turn the corporations loose to prey upon the body politic without any form of hindrance. But the state of Texas already has ample laws to govern and control every form of corporation that exists within her borders, and instead of clamoring for a multiplicity of new laws with the assemplage of each recurring state legislature, men should be elected to such offices as are charged with the enforcement of the laws as will do their whole

### THE THIRTY-SIX HOUR LAW

The cattlemen of Texas are greatly pleased with the emendment to the live stock shipping law which gives the privilege of 36 hours for live stock on cars without the necessity of unloading for feeding purposes. This is a measure that the Cattle Raisers' Association of Texas has taken a deep interest in and pushed in every fair and legitimate manner. The result is largely due to the fight made by these Texas cattlemen, and there is reason for the pride they are now experiencing. It will be noted from the phraseology of the bill that the privilege of longer time for stock in transit remains in the nature of a special opportunity that may be taken advantage of at the option of the shipper, who is presumed to know his own mind in the premises. Following the main provisions of the bill which has become law since the signature of the President:

That no railroad, express company, car company, common carrier other than by water, or the receiver, trustee, or lessee of any of them, whose road forms any part of a line of a road over which cattle, sheep, swine or other animals shall be conveyed from one state or territory or the District of Columbia into or through enother state or territory or the District of Columbia, shall confine the same in cars, boats or vessels of any description for a period longer than twenty-eight consecutive hours without unloading the same in a humane manner into properly equipped pens for rest, water and at the Dallas convention. feeding, for a period of at least five consecutive hours, unless prevented by storm or other accidental or unavoidable causes which cannot be anticipated or avoided by the exercise of due diligence and foresight: Provided. That upon the written request of the owner or person in custody of that particular shipment, which written request shall be separate and apart from any printed bill of lading or other railroad form, the time of confinement may be extended to thirty-six hours. In estimating such confinement the time consumed in loading and unloading shall not be considered, but the time during which the animals have been confined without such rest, food or water on connecting roads shall be included, it being the intent of this act to prohibit their continuous confinement beyond the period of twenty-eight hours, except upon the contingencies hereinbefore stated: Provided, That it shall not be required that sheep be unloaded in the night time, but where the time expires in the night time in the case of sheep the same may continue in transit to a suitable place for unloading, subject to the aforesaid limitation

That animals so unloaded shall be properly fed the custody thereof, or, in case of his default in so doing, then by the railroad, express company, car company, common carrier other than by water, or the receiver, trustee, lessee or any of them, or by the owners or masters of boats or vessels transporting the same at company, common carrier other than by water, receiver, trustee or lessee of any of them, owners or masters, shall in such case have a lien upon such animals for food, care, and custody furnished, collectible at their destination in the same manner as the transportation charges are collected, and shall not be liable for any detention of such animals, when such detention is of reasonable duration, to enable compliance with section one of this act; but nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the owner or shipper of animals from furnishing food therefor if he

That any railroad, express company, car company, common carrier other than by water, or the receiver, trustee or lessee of any of them, or the master or owner of any steam, sailing or other vessel who knowevery such failure be liable for the forfeit and pay a penalty of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500; Provided, That when animals are carried in cars, boats or other vessels in which they can and do have proper food, water, space and opportunity to rest, the provi-

sions in regard to their being unloaded shall not apply. 

## CALLS CAMPBELL ADDRESS HAZY

Judge Armstrong Calls Attention to Peculiar Phases

"The speech of Colonel Campbell last light at the city hall," said Judge Armstrong this morning to a Telegram reporter, "is the most remarkable that I ever listened to. It is the first time that I ever knew of a candidate for governor making a speech in the home county of his oppotent. It is an unprecedented breach of gentlemanly courtesy that cannot be justified unless Judge Bell is unworthy, or there are great vital issues between them. Neither of these conditions exist, nor does Mr. Campbell make any such

A Hazy Champion "In Mr. Campbell's entire speech he called atention to only one proposition that he and Judge Bell disagreed about. If there are other issues between them he did not mention them. In a general, hazy, indefinite sort of a way he posed as the champion of the people and the inference was that ali of the other candidates were the creatures of trusts and corporations.

"It is a little remarkable that a man running for so high an office should in this enlightened age assume so much for himself without producing a single act in his own record to support such a claim or calling attention to a single fact that would justify such a charge. If Colonel Campbell is the sole champion of the rights of the people in this campaign, when did he become so? Was it when he was at Austin lobbying against the fellow servants' law? Was it when he was granting rebates to the National Cotton Oil Company, an offshoot of the Standard? Was it when he was riding around in his private car and distributing free passes to public officials?

### Campbell the Only Lobbyist


"It is singular that he is the only man running for the office of governor who has been guilty of the things he complains of. He complains of lobbying. He alone has been lobbyist. The 'crowning evil,' he says, is the giving of passes to public officials. He alone has been guilty of it. He complains at great length about the low rendition for taxes of railroad property. Judge Brooks has charged, and Colonel Campbell has never denied the statement, that the year after he lost his job as general manager of the International and Great Northern that the tax rendition of that road was doubled. In other words, he rendered this property at 50 per cent less than his successor.

"Shall we measure this candidate who asks us to turn down our neighbor in his favor, by his protestations or by his record? We must choose one method or the other, for they are absolutely inconsistent. Does any man who knows C. K. Bell believe for one moment that if he had been general mager of the International and Green Northern railroad that he would have made a sworn rendition of its property at 50 per cent less than it should be that he would have violated the law and helped fatten a trust by illegally granting it rebates; that he would have granted free passes to legislators for the purpose of influencing and corrupting them; that he would have gone into that position a poor man and come out of it rich?

Judge Bell's Record "The record of his whole life shows

that he is incapable of it. He has held the office of ditch digger, county attorney, district attorney, district judge, state senator, congressman, chairman of the democratic party of Texas and attorney general. During this entire official record, covering practically all of the years of his life. since reaching his majority, there is not a blemish on his record nor an act that he is even called on to explain. "If Mr Campbell were to accomplish what he claims to favor he would set this state back ten years in its development. 

The Dark Shadow

On the subject of trusts, Col. Camp-"Hundreds and hundreds of trusts are operating in this state\_today and their power is increasing and they are measuring lances with the people to see who will run the affairs of the state and the state government. There is another trust, which, next to the Standard Oil company, threatens to snuff out the candle of governmental vitality. I refer to the railroad trust, he trust built up in this state as the result of the measures which they have hammered through the legislatures that have existed and gone. I don't believe that there is a single piece of legislation involving railroad consolidation so far as trunk lines are concerned that has not been engineered through the legislative bodies in the last seven years in violation of th constitution and in violation of decisions of the supreme court. 





## RAILROADS CLAIM RATES CAUSE LOSS

Declare Freight Tariff Against United States Constitution

Special to The Telegram.

AUSTIN, Texas, July 10 .- The Gulf Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad Company and the International and Great Northern Railroad Company have filed suits in the United States circuit court at this place attacking the entire body of rates established by the railroad ommission of Texas since Feb. 28. 1899, which was the date on which the compromise of the suits instituted by the railroad companies in the latter part of 1898 became effective.

The bills of the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe and the International and Great Northern are in their main features quite similar. Each company claims that the reductions made by the railroad commission since Feb. 28, 1899, have resulted in the diminution to the extent of several hundred thousand dollars of its revenues, and that the rates now existing as a whole are so far from compensatory that they are in violation of the fourteenth amend. ment to the constitution of the United States, which provides that no state shall deprive any person of property without due process of the law and that no state shall deny any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

## TELLS SAME STORY

The negro boy is visited every day by officers or by H. S. Crawford, one of the prosecuting attorneys, and it is hoped that he will yet confess.

Taft Says It Is Republicans' Turn in. Dixie

Special to The Telegram GREENSBORO, N. C., July 10.-Secretary of War Taft spoke last night before the meeting of the republicans

Secretary Taft said in opening when he was invited to address this meeting the committee advised him that the "situation was such that if the proper effort was made at the coming election t would be possible to carry the state for the republican party." The secretary added:

"I believe that nothing that could

happen in the politics of this country would work greater advantage to the country at large and to the south in particular than the breaking up of what has properly been known as the 'solid south.' I say this in no partisan spirit, for I am not one of those who think that this result would necessarily increase the probability of the continuance in power of the republican party. "The solidity of the south has in a measure furnished its own antidote in restraining many voters in the north who might have left the republican party but for what they regard as the injustice and danger of southern political situations.

"The south has been kept solid by the specter of negro domination and by stirring up racial prejudices and arousing unfounded alarm over an impossible return of reconstruction days," said the secretary.

Condemned Negro Requests Sheriff to Keep Sightseers Away During

Last Two Days of Life

Rufus Martin has two days longer to live-only two days-and he is improving what time is left him in this world by preparing himself to enter the other. He has requested Sheriff Honea to allow no more people to visit him through their curiosity, as he does not wish to be disturbed. Sheriff

Historic Rope. The rope with which Martin will be nung has done service before and when it is used in this execution it will have hung its twenty-second victim. Following is a history of this celebrated hangman's noose: According to the best record that has been kept one score souls and one have been launched into eternity by the rope.

Albert Johnson was the twenty-first person to meet death at the end of his piece of hemp. So far as is known Johnson was the first criminal on whom the rope was used after the execution of John Henry Young in Waxahachie the fourth Friday in last

Owned in Cleburne. This rope is the property of W. A ohnson county. Mr. Stewart had the rope made in St. Louis in 1898 to be ised in the execution of John B Shaw, a whi'e man. The rope was nade by a German and was hand wisted, the very best quality of hemp btainable being utilized in its manufacture. The rope is eighteen feet long and cost Mr. Stewart \$12.50. The noose made to go around the neck of Shaw has never been changed. The execution of John B. (Stokes) Shaw was the last chapter of one of the most atrocious murders ever committed in Johnson county. The records of the courts show that Shaw was convicted of the murder of Tom Crain, the deed having been committed Nov. 25, 1897. Both Crain and Shaw lived on the Pierce ranch in the western part of Johnson county. The murder was committed in what vas then and is still known as the 'Jungle pasture" on that ranch and it was several days after the commission of the crime before the body was found. Suspicion did not at once at'ach to Shaw, but when a clew was started developments were rapid. Shaw was arrested and lodged in Jail nd on Jan. 8, 1898, was convicted of murder in the first degree and given the death penalty. Later, he was senenced to be hanged on August 5 of the ame year. On August 3 Governor Culerson granted him a reprieve for one week. On the night of August 10 ne nade his escape from the jail in a nost daring manner. The death guard had gone to sleep, leaving his pants near Shaw's cell. By means of a hook, made of wire taken from a broom around which he wrapped newspaper to make it stiff, Shaw secured the guard's pants. Taking the cell key from the pockets he unlocked the cell and a few minutes had made his escape afely from the fail. When the guard awoke the prisoner was gone. He was at large about ten days and was reaptured at Malakoff, Henderson county, officers and citizens from half a lozen counties having joined in the search. When recaptured Shaw's clothing was in tatters and he was almost famished of hunger. On Oct. 27, 1889, Walter Ford was hanged at Waco for the murder of Lucindy Moore, his sweetheart, which eccurred June 25, 1898. Will King was executed Oct. 25, 1901, for the murder of Policeman Will Minthall Mitchell on Oct. 27, 1900. On Jan. 8, 1902, Anderson Norris died at the end of this rope for the murder of Mrs. Emm-t French, a white woman, which occurred in Navarro county, near Frost, Dec. 5, 1900. This case was transferred to Waco from Corsicana on a change of venue. All the parties hung at Waco were negroes, Four negroes have gone through the

## CHILEAN CONSUL **VISITS FT. WORTH**

A. A. Winslow Stops on Way to New Post at Valparaiso

Interesting, indeed, are the descriptions of life in Guatemala, and the Guatemalans given by A. A. Winslow, ex-consul general to that country, now visiting with J. L. Gerrish, 115 North Royal avenue. Mr. Winslow has been promoted to the consul generalship at Valparaiso, Chili, and is spending a short vacation here before taking up his new duties. Of the climate, Mr. Winslow speaks enthusiastically and says that the present weather in Fort Worth is the warmest he has experienced since leaving this country. He says the temperature there is never more than 80 degrees nor less than 49. The 1903 census of the country Of this number about 17,000 are foreigners, mostly Americans, Germans and English, with the Germans predominating. The natives are very interesting and are natural musicians. They also possess considerable artistic ability and excel as engravers. The men of the middle classes are very ingenious in the use of tools and espefally clever as cabinet makers and carpenters.
