MURDERED GIRL'S **IDENTITY KNOWN** 

Police Find Clue to Chicago Hotel Tragedy

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, July 11.-A dispatch to the Tribune from Minneapolis, Minn.,

The identity of the woman who was killed by a mysterious assailant while she slept in her room at the National hotel here yesterday was established ast night by the Ellsworth, Wis., police. A telephone message said the murdered woman was Miss Nellie Elliston, a milliner of Ellsworth and daughter of a farmer living about ten miles from Ellsworth. She left Ellsworth alone for Minneapolis. Nothing is known by her relatives as to her relations with any man.

Head Crushed With Hammer

The woman's head was crushed with a hammer blow, the body tied to a couch which was saturated with wood alcohol, then set afire. The discovery of smoke and flames issuing from the room revealed the murder. While emploves were beating out the fire the woman recovered long enough to utter the words "Elliston, Ellsworth." Then she died. The upper part of the body was terribly burned. Later physicians said the wounds on the head were sufficient to cause death.

A man who registered at the hotel as "M. P. Wilson, Milwaukee," and occupied a room directly over that of the woman is believed by the police to be the murderer. He was seen running from the woman's room a few minutes before the fire was discovered. He instantly left the hotel, carrying two grips. The police have been

The murdered woman arrived at the hotel Monday morning and registered as "Mrs. Johnson, Detroit." She was assigned to a room on the second floor A few hours later "Wilson" arrived and was given a room on the third floor directly above the woman's. "Is it true," I asked Mr. Bryan yesterday, "that President Roosevelt aught you in swimming and stole your clothes? Over in America they say that is what has happened." "He did not get all my clothes," Mr. Bryan answered, laughingly and quickly added: "I doubt whether what he

"It is hard uphill work for Mr. Roosevelt to make his administration respond to the country's evident demand for reforms, for the country gave him no mandate. The platform on which he was elected does not declare that our laws and our government should aim at the welfare of the whole people, but if a Democratic President is chosen in 1908 he will undoubtedly represent a party committed to this reform idea and will be in quite a different situa-

Wealthy Change Attitude.

"There is no doubt about the peoole's wish in this respect. Views that were considered revolutionary a few years ago are now accepted as sane and necessary. A change has come over the country. An American asked me today: 'Mr. Bryan, how do you explain the change that has come over some of our rich men in respect to their attitude toward Democratic principles?' I replied: 'The explanation is very easy. People who live in a valley watch the dams above them and if a flood is threatened, they know that the higher the dam the greater the danger and some of them have made up their minds that they cannot afford to dam public sentiment any longer.

Scores Money Makers.

"There is another thing to be considered," Mr. Bryan remarked, after a pause, "namely, the ethical movement A great many men are beginning to learn that there is something in the world more valuable than money, and it has gratified me to hear of numbers of cases where men have taken a larger view of their relations to their fellows and of their responsibilities. This introspection is making some of them ashamed of the questionable methods to which they have resorted in the past."



#### INVITATION IGNORED

North Texas Rate Men Refuse to Discuss New Order.

The Sap invited a conference of the freight traffic men of the state in relation to the new common point rate, which conference the freight men of the northern part of the state ignored. They held that there was nothing to discuss, for the reason that the Texas commission has no right to base its threats as to reduced rates to benefit the heretofore common point places, cut off by the tariff, which became effective July 5, as they are legally advised, and this in the face of the declaration of the commission in its circular bearing on this subject, that the interstate rates are unjust and therefore there is a demand that the Texas rates be reduced.

It is said that the Texas Central, cutting itself off from the through business, as it has done by its published declination to abide by the new common point rates, will simply get no through business. It has a redress, say the railroad men, if it can come back into the fold and give adherence to a rate it consented to making.

Freight men contend that the Texas commission if it holds the hearing on the question of re-establishing certain common point rates, will be met with the argument that they are benefiting the St. Louis jobbers at the expense of the Texas jobbers and especially those of Fort Worth and Dallas and in the northern part of Texas.

#### COTTON BELT READY.

Expected That Bill of Complaint Will Be Filed This Week.

It is the expectation that the Cotton Belt's bill of complaint against the Texas railroad commission will be filed in Austin Wednesday and it is not improbable that the Katy's bill will also be ready on the same date. #### CAMPBELL IS ILL: CANCELS SPEECH

Gubernatorial Candidate Fails to Address Dallas Citizens

Special to The Telegram.

DALLAS, Texas, July 11.—Hon. T. M. Campbell, candidate for the democratic nomination for governor, could not fill his appointment to speak in Dallas last night, and remained sick in his rooms at th eSt. George hotel, while Hon. John M. Duncan of Tyler acted as proxy for him. Fully 1,000 men listened to all or part of Mr. Duncan's speech, and several hundred left the city hall without going up into the auditorium when informed that Colonel Campbell could not be there.

Dr. C. M. Rosser, who is attending Colonel Campbell, said:

"Colonel Campbell came to Dallas a his room. An examination disclosed the fact that to continue his campaign at this time would be imprudent, if not impossible. I had noped until late that Colonel Campbell might be able to be present to greet his friends, which he very much desired to do. ing really dangerous in the condition of Colonel Campbell and no cause for alarm. 

LAWYERS GALORE

Persons Interested in Case All Represented and Several Appear as Witnesses

Lawyers as witnesses swarmed at the police committee's investigation on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock when the case of G. G. Davis, a police officer, was called. The charges aganst this officer are to the effect that he directed insulting remarks to a white woman. He denies this, but says that he asked her a certain question in the course of following out the directions of the head of the police de-

The investigation of the case against Officer Davis being in connection with certain transactions alleged against Night Captain Blanton, the investigation Wednesday seemed to take a wider scope in certain of the specifications and the whole matter was covered several times in detail. Attorney Moreland for Captain Blan-

ion and Officer Davis stated to the mayor and the committee that he intended to show that there was peronal feeling in the charges made by Alderman Cook alleging brutality and discourtesy on the part of the night captain and were actuated by motives other than that of a desire to see the aw enforced and the dignity of the Fort Worth police department upheld. said that he had been present when good." W. H. Wright had been arrested and that he had seen him placed in the city jail, but nether saw him kicked by a police officer, nor saw him subjected to strapping following action of the "Kangaroo court," although he had heard the noise of yelling in the city bastile and heard the remark in the police office, "Guess they are 'kanga-

rooing' Billy Wright." Scott said he would have made bond for Mr. Wright, had he thought the prisoner in condition to be at large. He said he had known Wright for a year or more. He said that Wright, on being placed in jail, had said something about making bond and remarked that he had plenty of money a bank. He said that Wright wa not in a condition to be at large. Questioned closely as to why he thought this Mr. Scott said that in his opinion the man would have inflicted injury on the persons of officers. He said Mr. Wright was abusing the officers, as Wright had testified Tuesday, and for which he paid a fine in police

Thomas W. Durn, also a lawyer, was placed on the stand by Mr. Moreland. He testified to seeing W. H Wright placed in the city jail and said there were several attorneys at law about the city police station at the time. He said the lawyers frequently were about the station. He said it was his own custom and, in fact, his own habit to be found at police headquarters several times each day l and night. He said he had not seen Wright kicked or "kangarooed."

Billy Smith, a lawyer, also testified Mr. Smith said that he had seen W. H. Wright placed in the city prison and had heard him ask for bond, ar say something about being able to make bond. He said he had not seen any police officer administer any kick to Wright. He had not seen the "Kangaroo court" meeting, nor the strapping given Wright.

Davis on the Stand

At the Wednesday morning session Officer G. G. Davis was placed on the stand. He testified that W. H. Wright slapped him and twisted his nose. He said he was almost too ill to remain on duty at the time and that he was not in a condition to have physical conflict with any one without taking advantage of his position as a police officer and using his pistol. He said he would much rather have his right arm amputated than to ruthlessly shoot down a human being.

Officer Davis was much affected during his examination by the attorneys and, at times, his voice almost broke down, when he swore to

indignities heaped upon him. On cross examination Officer Davis said that if any effort was made to arrest W. H. Wright during the day preceding the night when his arrest was made by Captain Blanton and Officer Snow he did not know it, nor had he heard of it.

Officer Turner testified that he had

gone to work for the city as a policeman on Feb. 14. St. Valentine's day but that he had been on the extra list since the latter part of last year During his testimony Officer Turner charged Alderman Cook with having given him a professional card, as lawyer, and said that Mr. Cook asked him not to forget him. He testified that he had never shown any favor to lawyers practicing in the police court. He said it was an order of the chief that ne officer communicate the name of any lawyer to any prisoner (Here Chief Maddox said that the officer might further state to the committee that it would be equivalent to instant dismissal for any officer to even telephone to a lawver at the di rect request of any prisoner.) Officer Turner was asked what he did when a prisoner wanted to telephone a lawyer. He said that would be left to the officer on duty at the police desk (ser-

W. V. Wallace, a police officer, testified that it was a frequent occurrence that fictitious names would be used for prisoners paying over a "cash bond' 'to be used in entering a plea of guilty for the defendant in police court. He said this was done frequently, but that it was not the habit of department. (Chief Maddox questioned the officer.) Mr. Wallace testified that fictitious names were used when young women were arrested whose position would be jeopardized by having their names called in po-

One could have heard a pin drop in the city council chamber when Mayor Harris began a personal questioning of Day Sergeant Newby as to the lawyers who attend and practice on the police court and the habits of the police department's several officers as to these attorneys. Mr. Newby admitted that very often the lawyers would arrive at police headquarters before the patrol wagon would arrive with the prisoner in whose behalf they were there would reach the police station. Mr. Newby testified that it would be almost an absolute necessity to use automobiles as patrol wagons if the city expected to get prisoners behind the bars before the Fort Worth police court lawyers arrived. Mr. Newby was asked who informed these attorneys that prisoners were arrested from time to time and to this Mr. Newby said that, of his own knowledge, he could not testify. City Prosecutor Virgil R. Parker was drawn into the investigation hearing by being asked by attorney for Captain Blanton to take the stand. After having been sworn, Mr. Parker said that it was occasionally the case that a fictitious name would be used in making out a case where there had been a plea of guilty and an officer tendered the money for payment of the lowest fine in the cases. That this was a regular custom the city prosecutor was unable to testify, he said, but it had been frequently done and with the knowledge of the court. City Physician Lyman A. Barber was also drawn into the matter, on account of a witness at Tuesday's afternoon session saying that the city doctor refused to attend his ailment. Dr. Barber swore that he had never refused to attend a prisoner or any other person during the entire history of his medical practice, for any reason At a few minutes after 12 o'clock Wednesday the hearing was adjourned

to meet at 2 o'clock Wednesday aft-

Afternoon Session

Investigation by the committee continuing Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock lasted until after 5 o'clock, when the session was adjourned until Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. The afternoon session was devoted to the hearing of the remainder of the testimony in the case of Night Captain Blanton and Officer R. R. Porter.

Wesley Myers, a negro man who said he was 21 years of age, was called to the stand. He said his name was not Wesley Cooper, but Myers. He related that he had been endeavoring to escape from the city prison early in the morning on July 1, to the room over the city calaboose (the water works office) and was busy at that attempt when was shot through his right hand. He said he did not know who shot him.

On cross-examination he said that it was early in the morning and that it was dark in the room over the city calaboose, but that electric lights were burning in the calaboose. He said no bones were broken by the shot. He said he didn't know anyone was 'n the upstair room and didn't hear anybody walking around up there. He said that the city physician dressed his wound. He said he had been released by the city after he had been shot. He said he had been originally arrested on the charge of vagrancy on Friday night preceding his being shot.

Maddox on Stand

Chief Maddox was placed on the stand by counsel for Captain Blanton and testified that he had known the captain between fifteen and twenty years. He said the captain had served under him when the chief was city marshal the first time. The chief testified as to the rules of the department and said that it is against the rules for bond to be allowed a drunken man, that it is against the rules for an officer to strike a prisoner, except in self-defense. According to his interpretation of the rules, an officer is not supposed to resent offensive language made by a prisoner. Captain Blanton took the stand and said he had served as a police officer.

altogether, for a period of seven years. Regarding the charge made by W. H. Wright, Captain Blanton said that h did not know the man before the night that he made the arrest. He said he offered to allow the man to make a bond in his room. He said the man cursed him and refused to make a bond and that after he was taken to jail, when he decided he wanted a bond, it was the opinion of the captain that he was not in proper condition to be allowed a bond. The captain said that he thought if the man was released there would be trouble that could be avoided if he kept the man detained in jail until such time as he could think calmly about the

it had been charged that Captain Blanton collected money for the city, gave a receipt for it and failed to turn i in the city treasury, Captain Blanton said that he turned in the money but that at the request of the woman to whom the receipt was given he had agreed to have the case filed in a fictitious name for the purpose of protecting the woman's reputation from having her name called in the regular routine of police court business.

Regarding the shooting of the negro while the black man was trying to escape from the city jail, Captain Blanton said that he had not intended to hit the man at all. He said that he merely shot the hole to scare the prisoners from any further attempt ac escaping that night, because it would be impossible, he understood, for the ain that had been sawed in two to be replaced until the next day.

"Kangaroo Court"

Police Officer Lane testified as to the "Kangaroo Court" that had acted regarding the man W. H. Wright. The officer said he had seen the man whipped. He did not think the man had been injured. He said the strap used was a small one. The strap was brought before the committee and the mayor asked him if he did not think this strap was somewhat larger than he had thought it to be. He admitted that it did appear to be larger. He said a big, strong man could probably "raise welts and blisters" on another with the strap if he intended.

Blank Name in Charge The charge filed against Officer R R Porter did not specify any name, it being charged that he choked, beat Officer Porter took and abused the stand and said he thought that referred to a time when he had choked Ed Kinney a little. He said he had not attempted to injure the man, but had taken him by the throat and pushed him away. Very littl€ evidence was introduced in support of the charge against Officer Porter, but the investigation of his case was the cause of diversion for the spectators present, when James O'Connor, prisoner, was brought from the calaboose to testify in this case. The man was partly deaf and the oath was administered to him in stentorian tones by the mayor, when it was at last made clear to the man that he was expected to take the oath. He explained to the committee that he has been in the city jail some eighteen or twenty days, "taking a little vacation." He said he lost his hearing in the service of the United States navy.

It was finally found necessary for counsel to propound queries in writing. At this, the prisoner smiled inscrutably and produced a pair of glasses. Then he read the questions and explained that "the man had not been beaten up at all, at all," and said that he had been "only rolled over and choked a bit," before being placed in the dungeon for having called the officers names.

Ed Kinney, the man who said the officer choked him, testified that he had been violently ill as a result of having been choked. He said he had been vomiting blood daily ever since He averred that he continually appealed to the city physician and that the dector laughed at him. He said he had one bottle of medicine, but At this point in the testimony of

Kinney, the chief asked the witness if was not a fact that the city phyclan each day called at the jail to find out who among the prisoners needed attention. "I'm on my oath, ain't I?" said the witness, "and I swear to you he does not."

At one point in his statements the man Kinney said he was a traveling newspaper writer, a kind of tourist journalist. Asked if he had been talked to by reporters while in the i'v jail, concerning this case, he said No. I have seen only one, besides one that was in fall, drunk." He was isked to point him out, if present in ourt, and, after diligent search, fixed is eves on a man at the press table but said nothing. The incident passed without the witness locating the guilty nan and the investigation proceeded unabashed, adjourning, after miner orroborative testimony in support of statements by officers, until 10 o'clock

His engagements include assemblies in Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin, As a chautauqua speaker, ex - Governor Taylor has been one of the most popular in the United States for several years and his time is always engaged during these months. The nature of his subjects is such as is most suitable for vacation audiences and he never fails to please.

### \$25,000 ASKED FOR MAN'S DEATH

Widow of William Jessup Sues Light Company

Mrs. Florence Jessup has sued the Citizens Light and Power company for \$25,000 on account of the death of her husband, who was electrocuted on Summit avenue May 31, 1906, while engaged in his work as a lineman for the Southwestern Telephone and Telegraph

The petition in the case alleges that William Jessup, husband of plaintiff, was an employe of the Southwestern Telephone company and in the discharge of his duties as lineman had to elimb a telephone pole at the corner of North street and Summit avenue, May 31. 1906: that there were a number of elephone wires strung on said pole extending to other telephone poles as far as and across North and Ballinger streets, at which point there was a wire of the defendant Citizens Light and Power company, which, it is alleged, had negligently been permitted to come in contact with the telephone wires; that while plaintiff's husband was at work on the pole at the corner of North street and Summit avenue he came in contact with the telephone wires that were crossed by and had come in contact with the wire of the defendant and received electric shocks that caused his death.

Asks \$5,000 for Death

#### A STRONG NEWSPAPER CONVERT

The San Angelo Standard is a model country newspaper and has long been regarded as one of the model weekly publications of the state. Published in a live and progressive community and being such a live and fearless exponent of the thought of its people, the Standard has steadily grown in power and usefulness until it is today the strongest and best weekly paper published in the western portion of the state. In making this broad statement The Telegram does not seek to disparage any other west Texas newspaper, for there are many others in that section almost as good when their opportunities are considered. But the Standard has been able to catch on at every stage of the game and has grown and prospered with the development of its section until it has won for itself the commanding position of the leading west Texas newspaper. The Standard has never been very much given to politics, and during the pending gubernatorial campaign it has taken little stock. But the time has now come when the Standard feels constrained to announce it has a choice and is not ashamed to make that choice known. It declares for the people's candidate and falls gracefully in line for Judge Bell. The Standard says:

In reaching this conclusion the Standard has had to decide only between two men, for some time ago it eliminated from its consideration the candidacy of Judge Brooks and Mr. Colquitt. Candidate Campbell undoubtedly has some strong points and we are picking no argument with those who support aim. However, his appeal to certain class prejudice and his advocacy of exempting homesteads from taxation, in the opinion of the Standard, makes the selection of some man opposed to those things more desirable. There is no justice in exempting the homestead from taxation, for in many instances it is the only taxable property which some men possess and such an exemption would tend to cause the tax dodger, after erecting a costly home, to place the balance of his holdings in non-taxable property, thus evading his obligation to the state.

As the Standard views the situation Judge Bell is the most thoroughly equipped man for the duties of the office. His long service in state and national positions has given him a grasp on affairs not possessed by Mr. Campbell. His cleanness from contact with corporate influence and corporate service commend him to the commonality as a man of like tastes and sentiments with them. His conservatism, clear headedness, fearlessness, honesty of purpose and sterling character mark him as a man in whose hands the welfare of the whole people will be safe and every public interest conserved. His record in the past is an earnest of what the people may expect of him if chosen to head the

The primaries are only a few weeks off, the issues have been joined, the candidates have been heard in almost every county in the state. The Standard has not been the mouthpiece or outspoken advocate of any of them. It has preferred to let the gentlemen speak for themselves. It contends that no newspaper should become the personal organ of any man, but when the time comes to decide between men, and the issues and principles for which they stand, the fearless newspaper should not hesitate to make its decision, giving the reasons for the faith which it professes. And The Telegram feels it is an opportune time in this connection to explain its position fully. to appear in the arena The Telegram fixed upon Judge Bell as the one candidate the most nearly representing public sentiment in this state and standing for the real welfare of the masses. As the campaign progressed the soundness of The Telegram's judgment has been amply reflected and the paper has given the winning candidate its loyal and unreserved support. It was the first daily paper in the state to espouse the Bell cause, and its enthusiasm for its choice was just as great at the beginning of the campaign as it is now. The Telegram feels it has but done its duty to the people of Texas, Judge Bell and its home town, and has not one word of apology to offer.

#### SIZING UP AVAILABLE TIMBER

The republican leaders of the country are not doing much talking over the growth of the Bryan sentiment, but there is no question but they are doing a whole let of rapid fire thinking. And the more of this thinking that is indulged in the more seriously alarmed the 1-aders become over the situation. The average republican when approached on the subject of the Presidential election will try to dismiss the interrogatory with the suggestion that it is too early to talk national politics, but at the same time the experienced observer carnot fail to note the uneasiness that is felt in republican circles, and the celerity with which there has been a sizing up of the situation in order to discover some republican Presidential timber that it is safe to use in an effort to head off Bryan. The republicans if left to their own devices had rather not do this at this time, for there are several reasons why it is not expedient to name the standard bearer at this time. But the democrats are so terribly aggressive that no other course is open except to ascertain the best available material and put it forward with a nurrah in a determined effort to put the Bryan boom out of business.

Theodore Roosevelt is today unquestionably the strongest member of the republican party, and while he is extremely distasteful to the Wall street element of the party on account of his anti-trust record, there is some evidence of a disposition to pick him up and compel him to make the race, on the ground that he is the only living republican who stands any showing of beating William J. Bryan. Roosevelt has been such an overshadowing personality that there is no one within his administration that sizes up alongside him. Like every other egotist, he is very intolerant. He has had te have the credit for everything done or attempted by the administration, and as a result his cabinet officers have been almost politically effaced.

Secretary Taft, who is believed to be the choice of the President as his successor, has a greater following throughout the country than any other leader mentioned in college boy enthusiasm. But the men in charge of Wall street do not like Taft. It believes he is fashioned too much after the Roosevelt model. Taft's action in proposing to buy canal supplies in any quarter of civilization where he could get them the cheapest was a very strong evidence of this fact, and his plain talk to Wallace when he threw up his canal job gave Wall street something like a genuine case of buck ague. To the large money interests of the country Taft now looks very dangerous.

It is said that Vice President Fairbanks is an ideal candidate so far as the business interests of the country are concerned, for the reason that he never indulges in anything radical. But the trouble with the Fairbanks boom is that its head has never yet shown any real running qualities and there is absolutely nothing about the man to evoke any approach to enthusiasm.

If the tariff was the issue, as the democrats seem lisposed to make it, there is no doubt that Secretary Leslie M. Shaw would be moving along faster in the direction of the nomination than any of his competitors. But the tariff is not yet an issue, and there is no reasonable certainty that it will be much of a factor

La Follette is not popular, for the reason that he is too much like the Strenuous One, and Foraker killed himself by taking the unpopular side in the rate bill fight, and Knox is regarded as too much the creature of the corporations. Uncle Joe Cannon is putting himself in the limelight as a receptive quantity, but the present indications are that republican support must eventually swing back to Roosevelt as the only man who can lead an otherwise forlorn hope.

The Texas railroad commission could not be satisfied while the situation was placid, but must stir up resentment on the part of the railroads and cause them to don their fighting clothes. The Santa Fe and International and Great Northern have filed suits against the commission in the federal court, alleging that all existing rates are so far from being compensatory that they are unconstitutional. It is sometimes best to let the lion sleep.

Theodore Roosevelt is to take the stump in behalf of Republican candidates for congress, and it is a very proper course. Having cut the congressmen off from their usual campaign corporation contributions, it is but proper that Teddy should try the magic of his winning ways upon the obdurate voters.

Secretary Wilson is going to lecture the packing house managers on the necessity of keeping clean house, and such procedure seems altogether unnecessary. If the packers will not keep clean after the experience they have just been up against, then their

### **INCORPORATION AGAIN PASSED**

Grocers and Butchers Reach No Decision on Question.

OFFICERS ARE ELECTED

Aftempt to Pass Peddlers' Ordinance Will Be Abandoned and Marshal Asked for Relief

The Retail Grocers and Butchers' Association of Fort Worth met Tuesday evening in regular session and elected officers for the ensuing year, again passed over the question of the incorporation of the association, decided to abandon the peddler's ordinance now hanging fire before the city council, and appeal to the city marshal for relief, and dismissed a complaint made against the alleged practice of the packing houses selling meats at retail which was unanimously decided to be

without foundation. The pure food law subject was brought up, but none of the members who had copies of the law had thought to bring them to the meeting and the subject was laid over; threatened suits leveled against some of the jobbers was talked of and laughed at by those most interested. It was 9 o'clock when the meeting

was called to order by President Mack Bergman, with all of the officers and quorum of the members present. Harry Adams directed the attention of the association to the fact that an ordinance known as the peddlers ordinance, was before the city council at the request of the association, and that the city attorney had stated that it was of questionable legality. One of the members said that the assistant county attorney had expressed the opinion that it could not be enforced and Adams was of the opinion that some action should be taken to withdraw it or have it passed and tested. He added, that the practice in Dallaswas for the chief of police to have the peddlers move from set locations on the principal streets and otherwise protect those who have paid, and do pay, taxes, license and so on, against those who make no payments to the revenues of the city. The special committee having that matter in charge was continued and it was directed to appeal to the city marshal for relief.

T. P. Mulkey reported a salesman for shoe polish, representing in a way, one of the jobbing houses of the city, selling to retailers who, with a quasiconnection with that jobbing house, was making a house to house canvass, selling the polish at retail. The attention of the jobbing house is to be directed to the matter.

Treasurer Luther called attention to the fact that a habit of irregularity had crept into the practice of paying bills and this was ordered corrected. A fixed pay day was suggested, but no final action was taken, Some of the north side grocers,

dealing in meats, sent in a complaint against the packing houses, alleging that it was the practice to sell meats to private parties. No action was taken for the reasons that the association did not consider the complaints of those not members of association and then it was the unanimous expression of the association that the actions of the packing houses in the management of the trade had been, and was at all times, absolutely fair and "straight." Jobbers Not Afraid.

S. C. Jackson, representing a jobbing house, stated that the jobbers were threatened with suits for not departing from the jobbers' custom of refusing to sell to consumers. They were not afraid, he added.

Some routine was considered; some bills audited and ordered paid and the election held. These were elected officers: Mack Bergman, president; H. Hammann,

vice president; J. F. Luther, treasurer; I C. Martin, secretary, All reelections were without opposition. The election of attorney was deferred to a future meeting. Ten nominations were made for the

six directors and these elected: W. H. Tanner, Harry Adams, J. P. Bergman, Roy Bracewell, J. L. Seiley and C. L. "Three butchers and three grocers,"

said Vice President Hammann, when the result was declared. The question of a further joint tenancy with a credit association was referred to the board of directors.

The executive committee of the state Retail Grocers' Association will meet in the Fort Worth association's rooms Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The special work to come before the comimttee is to map out a program of work for the ensuing year that the general interests of the state association and its local branches may be ad-


Railroad Convicted of Rebating and Fined \$40,000

## SUBURBAN NEWS

### WATER SYSTEM TO BE IMPROVED

North Fort Worth Council Recommends Expenditure

LIGHT PLAN REFERRED

Proposition of Southwestern Mechanical Company Will Be Consid-

ered at Next Meeting

The North Fort Worth city council met in regular session Tuesday night, all members present, with Mayor Davis presiding. A lengthy report from the water works committee was first considered and was accepted in the fol-

1. That the committee had made a contract with the North Fort Worth Plumbing Company to take up enough two and four-inch water mains in Central avenue to lay 160 feet south from Twenty-second street in Ross avenue, thus supplying eighteen new customers

at a cost of \$136. 2. Recommended the purchase of fifty new meters and fifty meter boxes, and such other repairing material deemed necessady. On motion of Alderman Mulholland the matter was referred to the purchasing committee with instructions to make the purchase at the best obtainable prices after considering different makes and values. 3. That several parties residing near to but outside of the city corporate lines had applied for water accommodations. After considering such extensions, it was decided that where persons wanted to make such connections at their own expense it would be permitted.

4. That the condition of the pumping station is poor, there being a number of repairs needed. The city secretary was instructed to communicate with the contractor regarding such re-5. It was adopted as recommended that the water mains in Central ave-

nue be plowed up and hauled to the pumping station. The report from J. D. Willard, once acting water works superintendent, showing the condition of the plant when he took charge, what he had accomplished and the condition at the ime he was replaced by Mr. Woods as permanent superintendent was read. The expenses of the plant during time of his incumbency amounted to \$110 and the income was \$285.30. Mr. Willard recommended that the meter in Exchange avenue be protected by a lock. On motion of Alderman Thannisch the report was accepted and

A report from the board of school trustees recommended that 35 cents of the 50 cents on the \$100 taxable valuation, heretofore voted as a special school tax, be allowed for regular school expenses. The mayor requested that action be delayed pending the completion of the work by the board of equalization as until that time it will be unknown what the entire valu-

ation amounts to. New Wagon Recommended

The report from the fire committee recommended the purchase of a new combination chemical wagon and hose reel for the department, in view of the fact that the present apparatus is in a very poor condition, the chemical engine being unsafe for use. Alderman Mulholland moved that the fire committee obtain cuts and prices of such a wagon and report at next regular meeting. Fire Chief Buckland recommended that the council confirm the following men as fire linemen, H. G. Smith, D. B. Smith, C. H. Puddy and John Grant, which was done on motion of Alderman Mulholland.

On motion of Alderman Mulholland the city secretary was instructed to issue warrants in payment of school bond interest now due, and the water works fund was transferred to the

Alderman Conway, chairman of the streets and alleys committee, recommended the purchase of eighty feet of thirty-six inch steel corrugated culvert for the new water way at the railroad tracks and cold storage plant

As the result of a recommendation by Alderman Frazeur and on motion by Alderman Mulholland, the purchasing committee empowered to make the best contract obtainable for furnishing coal to the water works for a period of six months. A proposition from the North Fort Worth Cold Storage Company, with prices to furnish coal, was also left to the consideration of the purchasing committee. After considerable discussion of the matter, City Attorney Baskin and Alderman Conway were instructed to confer with the Belt line officials, drawing up a franchise by which a spur from the Belt lien may be built to the water works station in order that the city may save the monthly expense of unloading and hauling coal from the present track. A report will be made

at next meeting. Information was asked by the city secretary regarding the granting of permits to use water through a neighbor's meter. On motion of Alderman Blanke no such permits will be granted in the future where the water main runs in front of the property of the

#### Electric Light Proposition

A proposition was received from the Southwestern Mechanical Company ! furnish the city with electric light, in view of the fact that that company is increasing their electric power facilities. Such lighting service to be furnished at cost price. The application for a franchise to erect poles, string wires and other necessary appliances was read and, on motion of Alderman Mulholand, the matter was turned over to electrical committee and city attorney for investigation, a report to be made at next meeting. An amendment by Alderman Frazeur prohibiting the use of narrow alleys for poles

A loss of 600,000 gallons of water, unaccounted for by anyone as yet, was reported by the water works committee, and on motion of Alderman Mulholland that committee was instructed to investigate and report at next meet-

#### New School Grounds

City Attorney Baskin brought up the matter of allowing the Townsite Company to pay the first installment on tne recent purchase of the new school ground, immediately west of school building. Manager Hopkins of the Townsite Company spoke, outlining his proposition. It seems that the school board could not raise the necessary cash on the security to be given, but the Townsite Company, as a special favor, agreed to pay the one-fourth of amount to be credited on the comeany's taxes due in the fall, the money to be turned over to the school board and paid to owner of the land. The purchase price is \$6.425. When the taxes are collected, the amount to be deducted from the school prorata by the city. On motion of Alderman Thannisch the recommendation was dopted and the Townsite Company's
