NEW BUILDINGS SHOW HOW FORT WORTH GROWS

Another of Fort Worth's banks has started improvements in its banking rooms, which, when completed, will make them among the most comfortable and elegantly finished in the city. This latest bank to take up the matter of better quarters is the American National and when the improvements are finished at the expiration of about ten weeks the building at the corner of Sixth and Main streets will have quite a different appearance. The plans for the work call for the placing of new fixtures in the place of those now in use, the changing of the entrance from the south side of the east end of the building to the north side and putting in the present doorway a large plate glass window, the cutting of a new door on the south side to the rear, where there has been a half-height window, and the entire refinishing of the interior walls. The interior arrangement will be changed so as to place the lobby at the north side of the room, thus giving the working force better light and allowing it to come in from the rear of the desks. The new fixtures will be of oak throughout and all interior woodwork will be of the same material. The bank will continue business in the room while the improvements are in progress.

Work has begun again on the Western National Bank building at Ninth and Houston streets after some delay on account of lack of material. The iron and steel work for the first two floors is in place and masons have begun laying the exterior walls for the superstructure.

A handsome and elaborate soda fountain has recently been installed in Weaver's pharmacy, 502 Main street.

F. F. Westerman, contractor, has taken out a building permit for the improvements on Cadet Hall at Fort Worth University. The cost is given as \$1,800. This includes only the carpenter work. The plumbing and painting will be done under separate contracts. The total cost is about \$3,000.

D. M. Smith has secured a building permit to erect a five-room dwelling on lot 4, block 5, College Hill addition, to cost \$1,000.

ARMISTICE DECLARED

JUDGE ALEXANDER TALKS TO VOTERS

Weatherford Man Heard at County Courthouse

Before a small group of men in the county court room at the court house Tuesday night the candidates for election to the state legislature from Tarrant county and the Tarrant county district voiced their views on the questions of municipal government, control of public schools, the adjustment of taxation, a home for widows and orphans of Confederate veterans, uniform text books for the public schools, the Terrell election law and the control of trusts. The speakers vied with each other in their eulogies of Confederate veterans and their widows.
Judge Alexander Heard
Judge D. M. Alexander of Weatherford was the chief of interest, because of the fact that it was his first appearance before a Fort Worth audience and because of the withdrawal of the two candidates from this county in his favor. Other speakers were A. J. Baskin, unopposed legislative candidate from Tarrant county; W. P. Lane and Clarence Stewart, candidates for the legislature from this district. Clarence Ousley called the meeting to order shortly after 8:30 o'clock, when about thirty men had assembled. Mr. Ousley made some complimentary remarks about Judge Alexander and suggested that the small attendance might be considered a compliment in that the people of Fort Worth felt confident that Parker county would supply a wholly adequate number of representatives to the legislature in favor of Parker, and because of this confidence gave more attention to the officers for which there were disputing candidates. In outlining the purpose of the meeting Mr. Ousley mentioned some of the matters which voters of Fort Worth consider of vital importance and said that the candidates had been asked to speak on these subjects. Judge Alexander, upon introduction, addressed himself almost immediately to the subject of city government and said:
"Personally, I am frank to say that I am heartily in favor of commission form of government for any city. I go farther and say that I favor an elective commission, because, as suggested by Mr. Ousley, when the people themselves elect a whole make unwise selections, they will make wise selections. There may be scattering instances where the people as a whole make unwise selections, but these instances are very rare."
Patrick Henry said, I have but one lamp by which my feet are guided and that is the lamp of experience. For a great many years the people of the United States have tried the aldermanic form of government for cities and all over the country, complaint has arisen. It has only been in recent years that the commission form has been tried by the cities of Galveston and Houston and from a consideration of the operation of the system there, we can arrive at the conclusion that the step has been a wise one."
He read from the annual report of the mayor of Houston showing that the conditions there had been remarkably improved since the adoption of the commission form of government. He said that in closing his remarks on this subject that his position would be: "If the people of Fort Worth desire a commission form of government, they should elect the members of the commission to be left to the people of Fort Worth. Then I shall use my utmost endeavors to secure for them what they desire and their efforts in the senate will be turned toward this goal. If they fail to agree as to what they desire, then I shall use my best judgment as to my actions on the matter. It shall be my pleasure to lend my efforts to whatever step bids fair to advance the interests of the city."

Wichita, Kan., a much smaller grain market than Fort Worth, already has a market organized and it is believed that at Fort Worth the largest market of the southwest can be established.

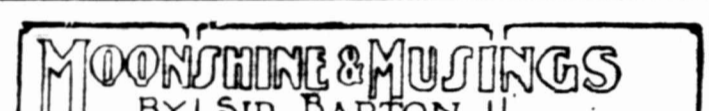

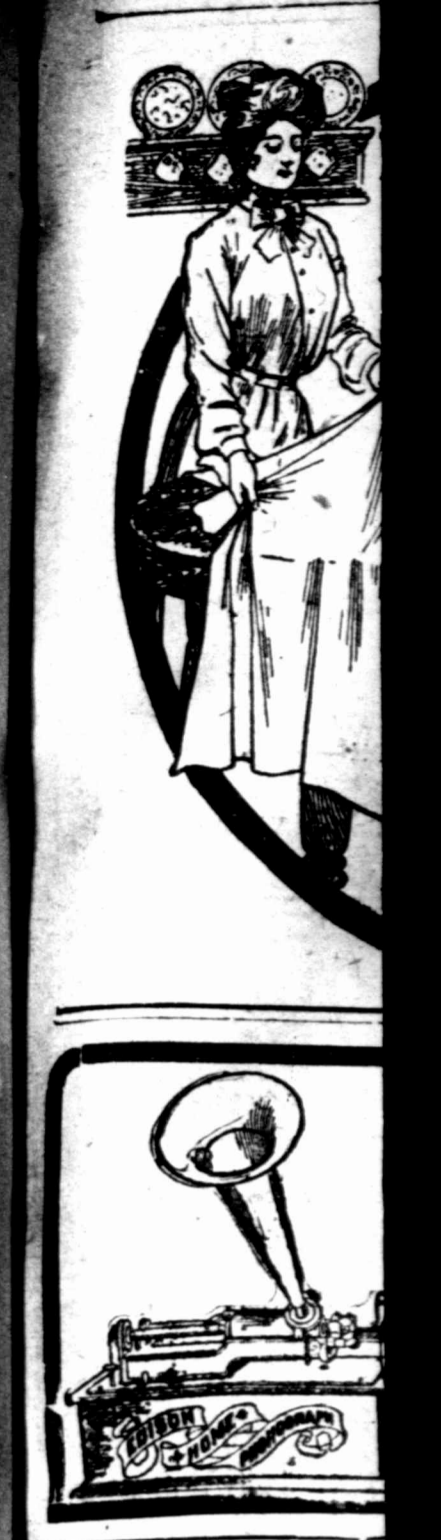

NEW AUDITORIUM WORKERS NAMED

Board of Trade Selects Committee of Five
TO MEET ARMOUR MAN

Representative of Chicago Packer Expected Here This Week to Discuss Project

A meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the rooms of that body Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock with the following present: President George Manning, Secretary B. B. Paddock and Directors E. H. Carter, J. L. Cooper, J. B. Burnside, G. C. Mountcastle, Paul Waples and Sam Davidson and Arthur Goetz and Louis Wortham.

A report was made on the status of the auditorium matter and the fact that a representative of J. Ogden Armour is to be in Fort Worth this week, probably before Friday, was stated.

The work of the first committee on this subject was commenced. A new committee to take charge of the auditorium matter at this time was elected, the committee consisting of Martin Sanson, J. W. Spencer, Ireland Hampton, W. G. Burton and Paul Waples.

When Stanton Palmer of Chicago, Mr. Armour's representative, comes here he will go into consultation with the Board of Trade about the auditorium, and as he will have as nearly as possible discretionary powers, the whole question may come close to a solution this week.

Secretary Paddock called attention to a series of colored photographic transparencies, which are on view in the office of the secretary. They were admired by all at the meeting and then it was stated that they were part of an advertising scheme which seemed to have such merit that Captain Paddock had promised some aid to the promoters. The plan is to fix the pictures in frames, accompanied by advertising matter, and the consideration for the help that Captain Paddock is to give to the agents is that they are to display Fort Worth views and views of the vicinity of the city in northern cities which might have value in directing the attention of the people who see them to this city's advantages. The frames are to be put up on street corners.

Street Improvement Urged

Dr. J. L. Cooper offered a resolution, the general terms of which were that as the Board of Trade had taken the initiative in the matter, and in order to the charter which permitted the levying of a tax of 25 cents on the \$100 for a permanent water supply and for the permanent improvement of the streets, and as the former purpose had been accomplished, it was claimed, it was time now that the fund should go for the original purpose, and the city council was requested to so order the disposition of what may come into that fund for the purpose specified in the resolution.

The secretary thought a few whereas might give some additional strength to the resolution and it was passed with the understanding that the additional might be made.

In the debate on the resolution, in which Messrs. Cooper, Paddock, Mountcastle and Davidson took part, it was stated that the first collection, in all or greater part, on account of this special tax, went to pay for the viaduct over the Texas and Pacific tracks. The balance, practically, to this time for the permanent water supply except that which had been paid for permanent street work, and now it was time that the total proceeds of that tax, or so much as was possible, should be devoted to street improvements. It was estimated the fund might run to \$50,000 this year.

There was a kind of running debate on the pending franchise applications for the right of way over certain streets asked for by two different railway lines, and the conclusion was reached that the best course to pursue would be to carefully consider the whole subject, and then at the next meeting of the Board of Trade, decide on some plan of action that most favored being the calling of a mass meeting to consider the general question. "Should any more franchises be granted for the use of the streets of the city of Fort Worth without some provision for compensation?"

It was left open, the members and officials to endeavor to inform themselves fully as to public sentiment and ask the cooperation of those interested in the welfare of the city.

The desirability of some general means of transportation from the

outlying parts of the city to the center of the city was granted and that fact prompted Mr. Burnside to say he had been asked for, and that he had no regret on the subject, for he believed it was for the best for the people of the city.

Commission Government

Incident to the discussion it was stated that all of the candidates for the legislature had given adherence to the idea of a commission form of government for the city.

This whole question was made a special order for the next meeting, the first Tuesday in July.

NOW IN NEW QUARTERS

ALL RAILROADS SHORT OF CARS

Problem of Getting Equipment Becoming Serious

Notwithstanding the extraordinary additions which have been made to the equipment of the railways of the country, they now stand face to face with one of the worst conditions as to supplies of cars on the demand of those who wish to use them that has ever generally existed. The increase in the transportation business of the United States last year and the early part of this year to large increases in the rolling stock and an even greater increase in the carrying capacity of the roads. But even with these the roads are not able to meet the demands with promptness.

Should the present crop prospects hold out the country will be hampered in the transaction of its business by one of the worst car shortages in the history of the United States ever been forced to consider.

Extraordinary steps have been, and are being taken to meet the demand, and the difficulty and in this connection the statement which follows is of interest, an authoritative statement from Chicago.

The equipment of the western roads have become so inadequate to meet the requirements of traffic that some of the large corporations have begun borrowing on notes from Chicago banks during the last week in order to increase their facilities for handling the immense tonnage. The Illinois Trust and Savings Bank alone has issued \$7,000,000 of notes which proffered their notes instead of marketing bonds at this unpropitious period of the year, with a discount of 10 per cent. The rates ranged today at 5 1/2 to 6 per cent.

With crop prospects never more rosate the roads are facing a serious proposition when the next grain begins to move more freely, and are making strenuous efforts to add to their equipment.

ROCK ISLAND OFFICIALS HERE

Confer with Local Representatives Over Fall Business

A party of Rock Island officials, who have been in Texas for a few days, came to Fort Worth Tuesday night and left the same night for the north. They were in their private cars and were accompanied by members of their families.

Those in the party were: Vice President B. E. Mudge of Chicago, D. E. Cain, general manager, Topeka, Kan.; Mr. Allen, general passenger agent, Chicago; James Stewart, general agent passenger department, Kansas City; J. S. McNally, division passenger agent, Oklahoma City; and H. B. Berry, chief engineer of the Chicago, Rock Island and Gulf at Fort Worth.

Colonel S. E. Hovey, vice president and general superintendent of the Texas end of the Rock Island, and C. W. Strain, general passenger agent of the Frisco, went from Fort Worth to Dallas to meet a party of officials and returned to Fort Worth with them.

Mr. Cain stated that the purpose of the visit was to confer with Texas officials of the roads in relation to the fall business and to look over passenger situation in Texas from the Rock Island point of interest.

Railroad Notes and Personalities

The track laying on the Wichita Valley extension from Seymour to Stamford is progressing rapidly and the steel is down about ten miles beyond Monday.

The Santa Fe has let the contract for the building of the new passenger station at San Angelo, of which the cost is estimated at \$25,000. C. H. Paige Jr. of Austin is the supervising architect.

That he may hurry them along, C. G. Elliott, chief clerk of the general superintendent of the Denver road, has gone to Topeka to supervise the shipment of several new engines, that road, which are to arrive in a day or two.

All the railroads running from Fort Worth to Galveston will have excursions to the Texas City Saturday, arriving Sunday morning and giving about twelve to fifteen hours in Galveston Sunday and arriving on the return trip Monday morning.



HEAT KILLS THREE
New York Suffers in Hot Wave Which Proves Fatal

It is ordained by the city council of the city of Fort Worth: Section 1. That the Chicago, Rock Island and Gulf Railway Company be and the same is hereby required to keep and maintain at all times a watchman on its line of railway at that place, where its line of railway crosses the East First street in the city of Fort Worth.

Sec. 2. That a failure to comply with section 1 of this ordinance shall be a misdemeanor, and hereby repealed to the effect that any violation of this ordinance shall be a misdemeanor.

Sec. 3. That all ordinances and parts thereof in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed to the effect that they are in conflict herewith.

Sec. 4. That this ordinance take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 962. An ordinance requiring all persons traveling in the streets to deliver any surplus material at same place designated by the city for the use of the city.

It is ordained by the city council of the city of Fort Worth: Section 1. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to whom permit may be granted to excavate the streets, alleys or public grounds, or any of them in the city of Fort Worth, for the purpose of laying pipes, wires or any kindred thing, to remove from said streets, alleys or public grounds any of the surplus material, stone or other material excavated from such excavations which is not needed for the purpose of refilling the same, unless the same shall be disposed of under the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. That all persons, firms or corporations to whom permits may be granted to excavate the streets, alleys or public grounds, or any of them in the city of Fort Worth, for the purpose of laying pipes, wires or any kindred thing, shall at the place as may be designated by the city engineer, deposit such surplus earth, dirt, stone, gravel and material coming out of such excavation as shall not be necessary for the purpose of refilling the same, in a place not less than three thousand feet distant from the place at which such excavation is made.

Sec. 3. That hereafter all bonds or obligations taken for the purpose of securing the best location in a city of Fort Worth, for the purpose of laying pipes, wires or any kindred thing, shall be made to include a provision that the surplus material shall be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. That any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof in the corporation court of the city of Fort Worth, be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in a sum of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.

Sec. 5. That all ordinances and parts thereof in conflict herewith shall be and the same are hereby repealed to the effect that they are in conflict herewith.

Sec. 6. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

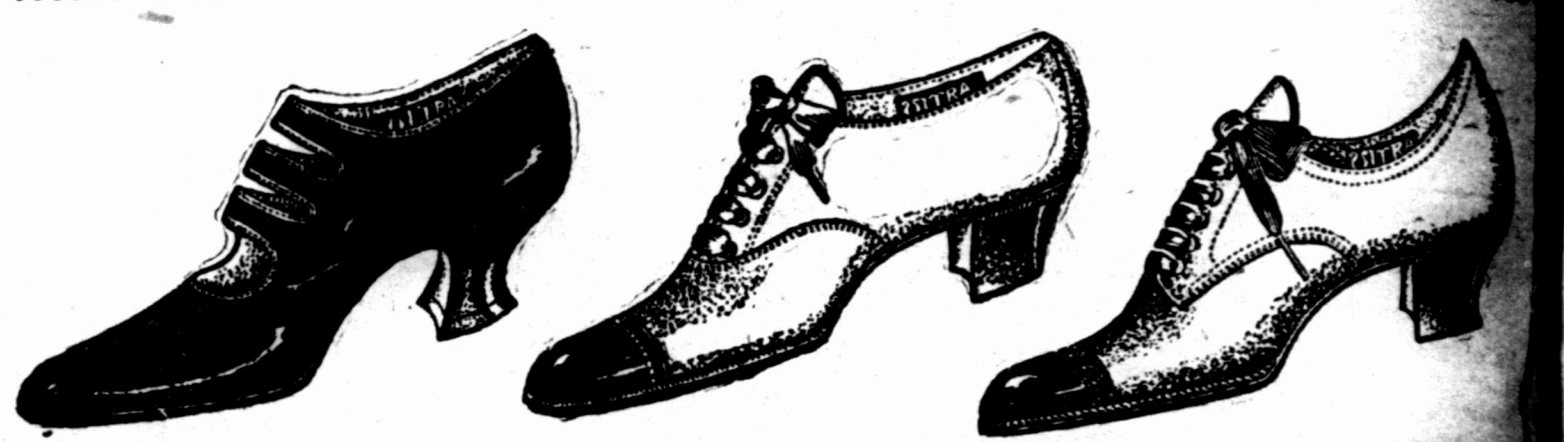
