ZAR REFUSES TO ACCEPT PREMIER'S NEW CABINET

Stolypin Must Resign or Face Scorn of World

DIKTATOR NEEDED

Large Bodies of Troops Pour Into Capital City and People Fear Bloodshed

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 3.—The report last night that Emperor Nicholas flatly refused to accept the conditions which Premier Stolypin agreed in negotiating with Count Heyden...

"Report that non-bureaucratic elements will enter the cabinet is untrue. Count Heyden and his conferees have now washed their hands of the government. The count has already left St. Petersburg for his estate in the country and all of M. Stolypin's glittering promises of the 'strong handed reform' has thus suddenly dashed to the earth."

There is no doubt the panic created at the court by the mutiny at Cronstadt within a matter of a few days has made victory for the camrilla easy. It is difficult to understand how M. Stolypin can now remain in office without outstaying himself in the eyes of the people of the world.

They have been marching in all night. Patrols in the streets again have been reinforced. All public buildings are heavily occupied by troops and a demoralized army of camrillas is being drilled. Authorities act as if they are deaf and not knowing what to expect next.

The Reich has been confiscated and even such high-toned papers as the Bavitzvale (Quality) and Prof. Kovalevsky's Ekstrans have been suppressed. Only the Novoe Vremya and the Svet of the unofficial papers seem to be immune from seizure.

Last night incendiary fires did not spread, giving relief to those who feared the whole city might be set on fire. The reports from Cronstadt say all has quieted down and that the mutiny is being suppressed.

The officers at Cronstadt showed splendid courage and all those killed fell fighting. Colonel Alexandroff received the mutineers with a revolver and Captain Evroschinsky of the submarine miners, after a desperate struggle, was bayoneted by the assassins and his head split open with butt end of a rifle.

RIGA, Livonia, Aug. 3.—A secret revolutionary meeting, which was attended by 500 persons, was surrounded last night by dragoons, who captured every man present.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 3.—All stations of the Finnish railway between St. Petersburg and Viborg, as well as the entire length of the coast line, have been occupied by troops.

3,000 STRIKERS CHASE SMELTERS

Demanded Company to Hire Discharged Men

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Aug. 3.—The electrolytic smelters of the Boston and Montana Company of the Amalgamated Copper Company closed down last night as the result of a strike of the smelter men, following the refusal of Superintendent Felt to recognize a committee of the Mill and Smelter Men's Union, which demanded that five discharged smelter men be reinstated.

PRISONERS LEAVE JAIL

Escape From City Bastille in Early Morning

SEVERAL REFUSE

Bars to Northwest Window Thought Shaved From Outside—Chief Talks

Five white men and four negro men escaped from Fort Worth city prison Thursday night, but a half a dozen were left, refusing to break jail. Those missing are: Will Newman, white; charge, vagrancy. R. H. Franklin, white; charge, disturbance. W. Burkes, white; charge, vagrancy. H. C. Graham, white; charge, vagrancy. Will McCleod, white; suspect. Allen Stoutt, negro; charge, disturbance. E. Randle, negro; charge, trespass. Henry Franklin, negro; charge, trespass. Will Johnson, negro; charge, vagrancy.

Prisoners in the Fort Worth city prison refusing to take advantage of the chance at freedom while risking a term in the state penitentiary said that the jail delivery was made about 4 o'clock in the morning.

The city prison is in the basement of the city hall, in the northwest corner of the building. The long bunk used by those "in durance vile" for a pallet during the night lies next the north wall of the building. Underneath this bunk and about thirty feet west of it is a small gate. This was cut and the brick in the wall at the base of a window in the northwest corner of the bastille taken out. The brick was thrown out the passage made by the work of removing the brick were sawed. The opening made in this manner measures twelve inches square and four of the stout iron bars in the lower part of the window were cut in two. The implement used in sawing the bars is thought by Police Chief Max Cox to have been a small saw used in steel work. The chief thinks that the sawing of these bars was done by some one on the outside of the jail. There was not a clew left.

When the last prisoner was placed in the city jail Thursday afternoon one of the prisoners is reported to have said: "We'll be out before morning." The man who made this remark was supposed at the time to have been joking. Later events proved that he meant what he said, for he awoke several of his cell mates when the passage was clear, saying: "Com'on, dubs; let's blow; do hole's tru, see?"

FRISCO STRIKERS TIE UP CAR LINES

Men Demanded an Eight Hour Work Day

ST. FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 3.—A third strike took place in the United Railroads when the oilers, firemen and wipers struck last night and without warning shut down the Bryant street and North power plants, which for a short time tied up several car lines.

Twenty-eight men walked out early in the evening, ostensibly to enforce the demand for an eight-hour day, but the real reason is said to be that the oilers, wipers and firemen are in sympathy with the striking electricians and do not wish to work with the non-union men.

The delay to traffic was of short duration and the company claims that it put thirty-two men at work in place of those that struck in less than half an hour after the strike took place.

PREDICTS FALL OF AMERICA

Divine Says Country Is Rapidly Declining Morally

RICH DENOUNCED

Pittsburg Millionaires Come in for Hot Shot and Forecasts Ruin Like Rome

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—The World today says: After a record-breaking trip to Ireland to cast his vote for T. M. Kettle, nationalist M. P. Rev. Joseph Toner, pastor of St. Lawrence's Roman Catholic church of Pittsburg, returned yesterday on the majestic. He had a denunciation of American society and Pittsburg society in particular to deliver.

Speaking of a recently enacted tragedy in this city, Father Toner said: "This is another evidence of the moral decline of the rich of this country. So-called fashionable society is so rotten now that it reminds one of the days of ancient Rome and Greece. And that is just what we are coming to. We are on the decline morally, and unless some great power makes itself manifest in the near future this country will be as Rome was at the time of its fall."

He fully agreed with the views of Helen Gibson and said that, although his home was in Pittsburg, he must pronounce the so-called upper society of that city "morally rotten."

Denounces Millionaires... "Society's immorality exists almost entirely," he continued, "among the millionaires—men who have come up from almost nothing. These men are really not Pittsburgers, although they are casting a blight upon the name of the city. Just as soon as they gain their wealth, to go to New York, London and Paris to spend it in pleasure and debauchery. Pittsburg is too busy for them—too commercial."

HIGGINS SENDS HIS

New York Governor Contributes Dollar to Campaign Fund

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Governor Higgins sent his dollar yesterday to the republican campaign committee. With it he sent this letter to Representative Sherman of the committee: "Permit me to follow the splendid example of President Roosevelt and in close my dollar as a contribution to the campaign fund, which the committee is raising."

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—The United States cruiser Tacoma anchored off Tompkinsville last night, received a wireless message from the United States cruiser Columbia, saying that the vessel had found and torpedoed a derelict on the Atlantic coast that had derelicted her mission, the Columbia would sail for Tompkinsville at once and arrive there today.

BRYAN RESPONSIBLE

Before he arrived, and without suggestion from anyone, I had decided to ask Mr. Sullivan to resign. I expected to do so when I should see him, but learning of the early meeting of the convention I concluded to communicate with him through you.'"

German Emperor Calls Anti-Imperialism an International Pest—Twits France

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—A cable dispatch to a morning paper from Paris says: The Matin today publishes an interview had by its Berlin correspondent with Emperor William, in which his majesty said that the yellow peril was not the sole danger threatening the world, there being also the red danger. "The heads of states," the emperor added, "whether of absolute or constitutional monarchies or republics, hourly risk their lives. President Fallieres runs the same risks as the czar and President Roosevelt the same risks as King Alfonso. Those aiming at the abolition of all authority and order by governments are thoroughly agreed, while those charged with the duty of making order respected are unfortunately disagreed."

GETS TWELVE YEARS

300 SHIRT WAISTS AT HALF PRICE
HELSINGFORS, Finland, Aug. 3.—Sveaborg fortress is completely in the hands of the government this morning. The prisoners have been marched out and were sent to Skatudden Island, where they await trial.

The socialistic red guard yesterday evening made a last effort to bring about a general strike. They marched in force to the power house of the street railroad and ordered the men to strike.

Battle in Street
Upon refusal the guards attempted to destroy the buildings. The police and the communal guards were summoned and a fight followed, resulting in the killing of the assistant chief of police and several communal guards and a number of the red guards. Cossacks were then summoned and they separated the combatants.

Cossacks Use Care
The red guard consists of the proletariat, while the communal guards are made up of the middle and wealthy classes and are organized to maintain order and protect property. They are armed with rifles and under almost military discipline. The government is handling the situation carefully, fearing the movement may spread throughout the country. Cossacks were used only in extreme cases and then dispersed the more gentle than they do in Russia.

Rear Admiral Killed
Rear Admiral Beckenscheff, who received many wounds, died during the night. When the admiral was shot the admiral immediately went out with his staff, heedless of warnings, and entered the barracks. Within a few seconds he was killed by a bullet through the chest. A crowd of civilians who joined the mutineers included a large number of women.

Women in Fight
They were armed with rifles, revolvers and swords. One wounded captain was spared because he wore the St. George cross. Captain Frodinoff, who was killed, fought in the battle of the Sea of Japan on one of the Russian ships which foundered. He was fourteen hours in the water before he was picked up.

It has been ascertained that the Yenisel regiment played the most prominent part in the mutiny. The latter had broken into the arsenal after overpowering the guards and had seized a quantity of arms.

Mutineers Forced to Flee
After firing several volleys, the Yenisel regiment charged, driving out the mutineers, who fled into the streets, pursued by the regiment, who shot at them to the last. Some shots were fired at the loyalists from houses.

Many mutineers sought to escape from the town, but they were met by a hot fire and driven to the barracks, where they surrendered. An attempt was made by a party of mutineers to capture the harbor batteries, but it was repulsed by the fire of the machine guns.

Cannons Supports Troops
It transpired the sharp firing heard from Sveaborg between 4 and 5 o'clock yesterday morning came from infantry reinforcements dispatched there for the purpose of constructing pontoon bridges from island to island in order to protect the fortifications from the mutineers.

The troops were supported by cannonade from the fortress on Sandhamm Island. The attempt was successful and the government flag was hoisted at noon showing the Sveaborg fortress was in the hands of loyalists, some two thousand reinforcements of troops are now arriving at Helsinki.

Deaths
During the night the telegraph lines were cut, severing the connection with Viborg and a small railroad bridge between here and Viborg was blown up. The bridge was subsequently repaired. Trains from St. Petersburg are arriving here after great delay. One of the railway bridges has again been blown up with dynamite but it was soon repaired.

Casualties at Sveaborg are many, but five hundred is undoubtedly an exaggerated number.

Officers' wives showed unerring devotion as nurses. Wounded mutineers suffered considerably as they were ill provided with medical supplies.

Snake's Bites Kill in Seven Hours

STROUDSBURG, Pa., Aug. 3.—While picking huckleberries in company with his two cousins near Evans Falls, Grant Doll, formerly of East Stroudsburg, was twice bitten by a rattlesnake. He died seven hours later. In the opinion of the physicians a main artery had been touched at the first bite.

ALL ACCOUNTS OF POLICE ACCURATE
Up Every Day

"Many people either don't know how the police department is working or they are talking hearsay when the report is made that we pay no attention to the said Day Sergeant Charles Newby, every person treated on that day might be working out fine on the streets of the city. It is explained that there is a strict record kept of every person arrested. The name, color, age, stated occupation, the name, charge on which arrested and disposition of the case.

Accounts Checked Daily
The books of the police department of the city of Fort Worth are fully gone over each day and the names of prisoners whose payment of fines may expire from the office having charge of the chain gang. Upon receipt of this officer sets all free for whom he has received any authority to do so. When an order is received from the city physician, stating that a prisoner is unable to perform physical labor, such prisoner is released at once. This is one of the strictest rules of the police department and one that Chief Maddox he personally sees to his enforcement. THE LAW ON "SECOND CHOICE"

County Delegations and Not County Conventions Control the "Dropped" Vote

One of the interesting questions developed by the Terrell election law has been whether or not it was within the power of the county convention to instruct delegates to the state convention how to vote their second choice or to vote the pro rata part of the candidate whose name would be dropped after the first and second ballots.

Aug. 1, 1906.—Dear Sir: I am in receipt of yours of the 31st, and, in reply to your first inquiry, you are advised that the county convention of a county cannot bind the delegation of the county, selected by it to cast its vote in the state convention, by instruction how this delegation shall cast its vote after first ballot, or the pro rata part of it which, on the first ballot, was cast for a candidate who was dropped on the second ballot.

Replying to your second question, you are advised that no more delegates can be sent to the state convention than the county has votes in that convention. Alternates cannot be elected. If all of the delegates do not attend, the vote of the county must be cast by such of them as attend.

GROWTH OF FORT WORTH

The newspapers of west Texas are still using the name of Fort Worth as something to conjure with, and the phenomenal growth and development of this proud city still acts with magical inspiration to compel the citizenship of other Texas towns to do their whole duty.

We are indebted to our friend O. P. Thrane of the Snyder National bank for the data concerning the entry of the first railroad into Fort Worth.

With the coming of the first road the gates of prosperity were opened and Fort Worth has rapidly grown from a country village to one of the largest and most important cities in Texas.

There is a whole lot of difference between the Fort Worth of today and the embryo city of July 19, 1876. There has been a growth and development here that has surprised and amazed the entire southwest.

But the Fort Worth idea has always been to get even closer to Dallas. The Fort Worth ambition has always been to place the eastern walls of the city on the west bank of the Trinity directly at the head of navigation.

It has taken courage and determination to build the Fort Worth of today, and there was a time when Fort Worth builders almost perspired blood.

All the towns in west Texas cannot develop into Fort Worths, but there is no doubting the proposition that by emulating the Fort Worth spirit every town in the west can be materially improved.

THE MATTER OF FLOATER

The question as to who will represent this floral district in the next legislature seems to be wrapped in as much uncertainty as the gubernatorial situation.

legislature. There was a general disposition among the leading democrats of the county to stand out of the way and let the honor go to one of the other candidates, and public announcement was made to that effect.

It will take the convention to decide which of the three candidates for floater has won, but the indications are that J. B. Doyle of this county will be the strongest man of the three.

Doyle will have six and a fraction convention votes from this county, three and a fraction from Tarrant, four and a fraction from Wise and probably one from Cooke—total 14-plus.

There are thirty-five votes in the district, the "plus" of the three candidates, therefore, equalling four. No candidate will have a majority in the convention and Mr. O'Belrne will have the deciding strength.

It is possible that Denton and Cooke may scrap at such a lively rate among themselves that the matter of a choice between Doyle and O'Belrne may be an impossibility, but even while this is in progress it is reasonable to suppose they will still maintain a united front against what they must regard as the common enemy.

THE TICK QUESTION AGAIN

Dr. J. W. Parker of San Antonio, who has charge of the matter of the experiments to be conducted in Texas by the federal government, spent several days here recently looking into the situation, and also went to Quanah, where he had a conference with Judge M. M. Hankins, of the state live stock sanitary board.

"I came up to North Texas to size up the Texas fever situation, and as a side remark I might say that the Texas statutes use the expression 'Texas fever,' and when the legislature corrects this glaring error I will keep pace with them, only I think the cattle industry of this state pays enough taxes to get better treatment from the legislature in several other respects.

"Also, the state ought to appropriate enough money to enable the live stock sanitary commission to hire enough inspectors to really enforce the law. More important, however, the power of the commission should be increased so that they could actively engage in the extermination of diseases of live stock.

"Further, I wish to state that I am now a convert to the idea announced by Dr. Mohler, chief of the division of pathology, in the tick book recently issued, to the effect that a cattleman, even far below the quarantine line, should clean out the ticks. The demand for Southern cattle for stockers and feeders is getting smaller and smaller each day.

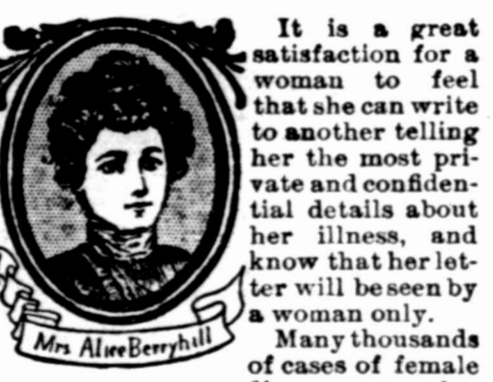

TRAGEDY AT POLLS

Two Fatalities Occur Over Election in Tennessee

Special to The Telegram.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 3.—One man was killed, one fatally wounded and a third injured in a duel in the polling place of the Fifteenth district at North Second street and the Randolph road within a few minutes after the polls closed yesterday afternoon. J. G. Wellington, a saloon keeper at Thomas avenue and Marble street, was killed with a bullet from a repeating shotgun and died almost instantly. W. J. Cooke, a watchman in a lumber yard, and engaged in election, was shot in the side and will die. He was taken to the city hospital. B. E. Conn, another judge of election residing at Second street and Randolph road, was shot in the heel. He is not seriously hurt. The trouble arose over the county election, which was held yesterday. 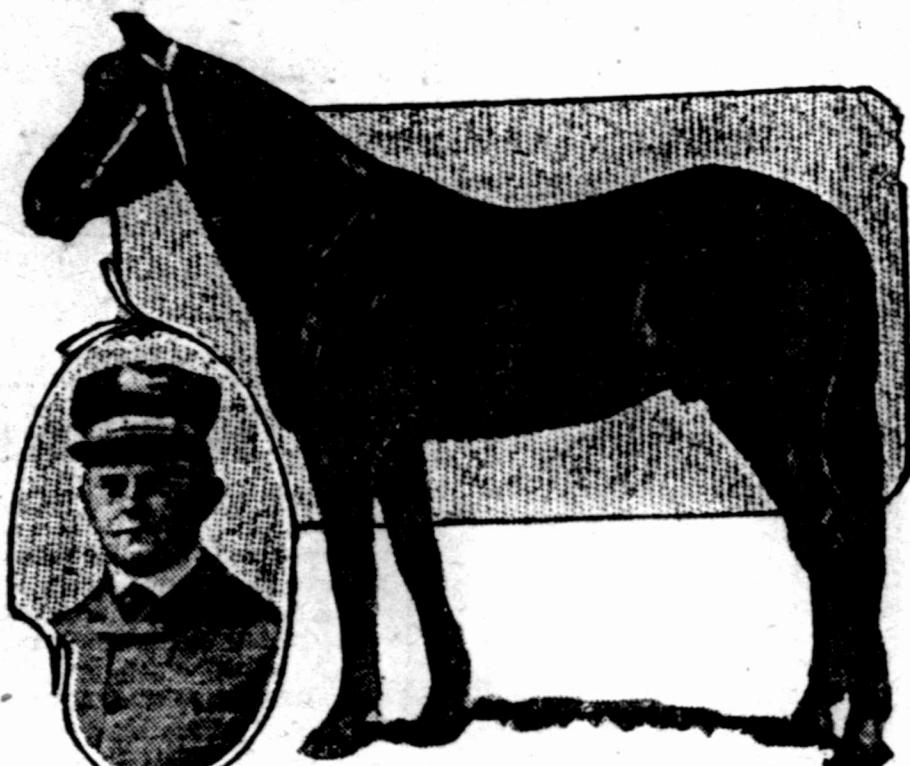
