### PRECEDENT ESTABLISHED

Vote for Nominees to Come Bfore Platform Is Adopted, Following Suggestion of Cone Johnson—Taken to Mean That Platform Will Be Built to Fit Candidate—Culberson's Reference to Prohibition Cheered

ONVENTION HALL, Dallas, Texas, Aug. 15 .- The democratic convention by adopting the Cone Johnson amendment to permanent organization committee report this morning set a new precedent for democratic conventions by deciding to proceed with nominations before the platform is adopted, if the platform committee is not ready to report when nominations are reached.

Heretofore the platform has been adopted first, then the candidate nominated to stand on it. The innovation is construed by some to mean that the platform will be built to suit the candidate for governor.

The most remarkable incident of the convention Wednesday was when Senator Culberson appeared on the floor of the convention. Governor Lanham was speaking at the time and the Culberson demonstration was so great the governor's voice was drowned by the roar of applause. He waited a minute for order to be restored. The cheering of Culberson continued and increased to such an extent that the governor bowed and retired. Whether it was intended or not the action is regarded as a discourtesy to Governor

There was another remarkable incident following the statement of Senator Culberson's declaration that the liquor traffic must be controlled and its evils minimized. The convention simply went wild. Hats were thrown in the air, coats pulled off and waved in the air, and men howled themselves hoarse. The demonstration continued two minutes.

There is no probability of balloting for governor commencing before tomorrow, unless a night session is held.

The real test of strength came for the first time when the credentials committee made two reports, the majority recommending that proxies from

nine counties be seated as follows: Roberts, Reagan, Moore, Irion, Zavalla, Refugio, Pecos and Cottle one each, and Bandera county two. The vote was taken by roll call, resulting in 341 to 270 on a motion to substitute a minority for majority report. The minority report provided for not seating the delegates by proxy. Dayton Moses of Burnett county, secretary of the committee, spoke for the majority report and Mr. Moseley of Parker county for the minority.

The announcement of the result of the vote was received with terrific cheers and in the midst of the general excitement the convention adjourned to 4:30 p. m. It looks like a night session.

The vote on the credentials committees report was a victory for the small vote counties in remote sections of the state, and by adopting the majority report it recognized proxies from those counties whose delegates are not present at the convention. Tarrant county voted solidly for the majority report, admitting the proxies, and standing up for the representatives of the Panhandle. Dallas voted solidly against admitting the proxies.

Delegates to the convention were slow in arriving at convention hall Wednesday morning on account of the late hours kept Tuesday night. Chairman Cockrell was promptly on hand at 9:30 o'clock ready to call the convention to order, but only half the

delegates were present.

Following order of business was announced: Report of the committee on credentials; report of the platform committee; nominations for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, land commissioner, treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, railroad commissioner, justice of the supreme court, judge of the court of criminal appeals; election of chairman of the state committee; election of

members of the state committee. The credentials committee not being ready, the report of the platform committee was read. Cone Johnson moved an amendment

making the nomination of United States senator first, and said that if the platform committee were not ready to report when the nominations were reached, the convention should proceed to nominate any way. Permanent Chairman Howard Templeton was escorted to the platform by

H. O. Head of Grayson county, T. M. Jones of Smith and State Senator Arch Grinnan. Mr. Templeton expressed his appreciation of the honor made peculiar by the fact that this is probably the last nominating convention in the state. He reviewed the history of the democracy from the foundation. He praised the party principles and was frequently interrupted by cries of "that'll do." He said the people of Texas demand.

ed the right to name their own candidates for offices and that this is the result of progress. He said the corporations must be kept out of politics and after a rap at corporations in general the chairman took charge of the work before him.

The chair called for the report of the committee on credentials, but the report was not read. It was moved that Governor Lanham be asked to address the convention, Governor Lanham was on the platform. He was escorted to the front and said:

### TWO CANDIDATES FOR REPUBLICANS

Conventions at El Paso and Houston Nominate

More trouble is brewing in the camp of the Republicans of Texas than for even the Democrats who didn't sup-

port Bryan six years ago. Two state tickets in the field, one put out by the Lyon Republicans at El Paso, and the other by the Acheson wing or faction at Houston, are enough to puzzle any partisan.

Paradoxically, the new wing of the Republicans is composed, so far as its white members go, of the oldest Republicans in the state-men who have grown gray in the party service. At El Paso the following ticket was

### \$107,000 IS ASKED IN DAMAGE SUITS

Large Number of Claims Filed in District Court

A whole batch of damage suits were filed Wednesday, some of which had been held up for days, that they might fall into the filing of certain desired courts. There is nothing unusual in that proceeding, but the result at this time was the accumulation of an unusual number of personal damage

Boy's Father Sues.

One of the number is styled Glenk et al. vs. Northern Texas Traction Company. The petition alleges that the traction company had a pleasure resort at or near Handley and that the boy, whose injuries are made the reason for the suit, was there, attending the picnic of the Retail Grocers' and Butchers' Association May 30 last. After enumerating all of the various kinds of pleasures provided for the amusement of the visitors it is further alleged that among others is a shooting gallery and that a stray bullet from one of the rifles fired therein struck the boy, Eugene Glenk, in the forehead, that it split, one of the fragments entering the brain of the child and the other part was located and removed. The permanent injury of the boy is alleged and for that reason the personal damage suit is instituted, \$20,000 being sued for, and additionally \$500 for surgeon's pay, \$103 for

hospital fees and \$30 for medicines, Asks \$10,000 From Railroad. Another suit is that of Mose Wiliams against the International & Great Northern. The petition alleges that the plaintiff bought a ticket for his wife to Calvert, that he was unreasonably delayed in getting the baggage checked: the train left before he could hand his wife the ticket, which he was compelled to have to check the baggage; she was ejected from the train at the first station south of the city, although he promptly notified the agent at Fort Worth of the mishap and that agent promised to notify the train

conductor. He wants \$10,000. Wants \$7,000 for Two Fingers. J. T. Smith sues Swift & Co. for \$5,000 actual damages and \$2,000 for the lessening of his earning capacity, because of injuries alleged to have been received at the plant of the defendants in Fort Worth and physician's fees. \$200. The petition recites that he was at work there on June 12 and was put to work at a machine used for meat slicing, with which he was not familiar and he lost two fingers from his right hand and the rest of the hand

was permanently injured. Drug Company Sued. S. D. Gibson vs. the Arlington Drug Company is the style of another suit for damages and the allegations are that the plaintiff had filled at the defendant's drug store a doctor's prescription, which was wrongfully compounded as to the kind or quantities of the drugs to be used, and the result, from the use of the prescription as there compounded, was the injury of the wife of the plaintiff, for which he easks compensation in the sum of

#### Talley Wants \$30,000.

Yet another suit is that of Arthur Talley vs. the Northern Texas Traction Company. The plaintiff alleges he was hurt unloading heavy poles and he wants \$30,000 for the alleged permanent injuries.

Another for \$30,000.

J. W. Woodson sues the Southern Trading Company et al. for \$30,000 for alleged permanent injuries inflicted on May 28 last while the plaintiff was engaged for the defendants in unloading heavy machinery from cars. The particular piece of machinery at this time was a boiler and the use of skids was necessary. His petition says one of them jammed him against a box car near at hand and broke and crushed one of his legs, so he is incapacitated for the work he was once able to do.

#### RAM'S HORN IS DEAD

Winner of the Brighton Handicap Succumbs to Intestinal Trouble.

Special to The Telegram. NEW YORK, August 15.-Ram's Horn, the four-year-old son of Bute-Aunt Tessa, who recently won the \$25,-000 Brighton handicap, died at Sheepshead Bay after an illness of several

Ram's Horn was one of the best

handicap horses that ever came out of the west. As a three-year-old he won five consecutive races, including the Montgomery handicap at Memphis. Last winter he won a number of important races at New Orleans with big weight up and was afterward brought east. In the Sterling stakes at Aqueduct Ram's Horn was beaten by Roseben at a mile, but it was afterward learned that the Bute horse was on the verge of a fit of illness that threw him out of training for a number of weeks. Ram's Horn reappeared in the Commonwealth handicap at the bay, in which he was unplaced because of a poor ride. A few days later he won the Bay Ridge handicap so impressively that his chances for the Brighton were considered excellent. In the \$25,000 handicap he ran a superb race and won easily in good time. Pennsylvania to Spend \$17,-500,000 in Equipment

Special to The Telegram. PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Aug. 15. -Program of the Pennsylvania railroad, as now laid down by the management, will require the expenditure by that company of about \$7,500,000 and by the Pullman Company of at least \$10,000,000 within the next two years for all-steel passenger equipment.

Some months ago the Pennsylvania railroad management decided that cars of wooden construction could not be used safely in the New York tunnel terminal system, where electricity at very high voltage will be the motive power. Since then experimental steel cars have been built, and one has been in service for several weeks on suburban trains out of Broad Street sta-

This car has proved all right. An-

other three feet longer has been or-

dered built at the Altoona shops, When

a standard type is reached the company will proceed to construct gradually 1,000 steel passenger cars. The Pullman Company is building an all-steel sleeping car. When this shall pass muster it will construct 500 for service on the Pennsylvania railroad The steel passenger coach now in experimental service weighs 103,550 pounds, or nearly 25 per cent more than the standard wooden car of the

same size. It seats seventy persons, and is lighted by electricity supplied from storage batteries, carried under the car. Under the floor in the center of the car is a box steel girder, 24 by 19 inches, which makes the body rigid and strong, capable of resisting a tremendous shock. There is no wood in the car, except the seat arms. Every-

thing else, including the plush seat coverings, is believed to be fire proof. Railroad Notes and Personals President B. P. mittee of the western railroads, held in Chicago last week, adopted an order that all of the transportation annuals and all not permitted by the Hepburn rate bill must be recalled and that after the 28th instant none of them will be honored, except for those who are excepted by the bill.

The Colorado Southern has decided in its building over the Louisiana lowlands, that it will use the trestle style of construction instead of earthen embankments, as was at first intended. The trestles will be filled in with earth embankments afterwards. Much time will be thus saved in the completion of the road, so that it can be used for the operation of trains.

The Katy is figuring on a fast train between St. Louis and Fort Worth and Dallas, to make the run from St. Louis to Denison in less than twenty-four hours. The time between Denison and Fort Worth will be about the same as the Flyer time. The train, unless the present plans are changed, will leave St. Louis about 7 a. m. and returning. leave Fort Worth and Dallas about 2 p. m., arriving in St. Louis about 12:39 p. m. the next day in good time for the eastern connections.

Among recent orders placed by the railroads for new equipment are the following: Rock Island, 5,000 box cars; Chicago and Northwestern, 500 flat cars, 300 coal cars, 300 stock cars, 21 cabooses and 60 passenger cars; Chesapeake and Ohio, 10 passenger cars; New York Central, buffet car. The Harriman lines are in the market for 4.000 box cars, 1.400 flat cars, 1,-000 refrigerator cars, 875 oil tank cars, 600 hopper cas, 50 gondola cars and 500 stock cars. The Rock Island has asked for bids for 5,000 box cars additional to the order placed for this number.

#### GAVE BELL LOYAL SUPPORT

The Fort Worth Telegram keeps hammering away at the idea that Bell is the choice of the people for governor and says that none of his real friends are showing a disposition to lie down, recalling the fact that Bell has stated all along in his race that the nomination would have to be made in the convention. While all know that the convention will have to nominate, there is no reason why it should have to nominate the hindmost man, and it is sickening to read in the "organs' of each candidate the repeated assertions that their particular candidate is sure to win in the convention. No one can anticipate what the convention will do.-Brownwood Bulletin

At this writing the state democratic convention is in session in Dallas and its choice for governor is not vet known. But The Telegram wants it distinctly understood that no matter who is nominated, this paper will have just as good gubernatorial candidate as is sperted by any other publication in all Texas.

The Telegram has felt privileged to support Judge Bell warmly for two reasons. One was that it considered him the best qualified man in the race for the position. The other was the fact that he was a home man, and The Telegram never turns its back on a

Judge Bell has not had a clean deal at the nands of the press of this state. It has been insisted, even while he was known to be the third man in the race that he should drop out and help to make the choice of some other man unanimous. Some of these papers have not been willing to wait for the convention to act before preaching his political obsequies, and The Telegram has but tried in its humble and unpretentious way to do justice to the man and his candidacy.

It matters not to The Telegram what other newspapers may think of its course. It matters not that another home paper that should have been loyal to him to the last ditch printed in a glaring red line across the top of its first page the morning of the convention that Bell was leading a forlorn hope against Campbell-this paper has remained steadfast and true and wavered not one particle in its allegiance. It is for Bell up to the very moment that the convention makes its choice, and when democracy has spoken then The Telegram is for the democratic nominee.

The Telegram is a personal organ of no man. But The Telegram is steadfast in its loyalty to its friends. and if that makes some of its critics sick, The Telegram regrets that they have such weak democratic stomachs.

#### \* THE TERRELL ELECTION LAW

Endorsing a criticism by the Gazette of that part of the Terrell election law, which prohibits the formation of political parties in Texas, The Fort Worth Telegram says:

People all over Texas are now wondering what they were thinking of when they permitted the Terrell bill to become a law. Perhaps the solution of the matter may be largely found in the labored length of the measure. It is so excruciatingly long and ambiguous that few took the trouble to read and try to master its provisions. Now that it has been tried in a general state primary and found wanting, however, its defects and oppressions are so many that a howl is going up from one end of the state to the other in the form of a demand for its immediate repeal.

It is clear to every unbiased mind that Texas is now ffering greatly from a too conjous de law. Few laws and simple laws that all the people can understand should be the rule in all legislation.

The people of Texas had nothing to do with the Terrell election law going into the statute books. It was put there by a lot of representatives, not half of whom understood the effect of what they were doing. It might be possible to excuse many of the blunders in the law. but that provision which seeks to restrict the political activities of free Americans to two parties, and which says we must be either democrats or republicans if we lesire to exercise the right of franchise, is beyond the pale. It is absolutely inexcusable.

There is too much in the Terrell election law that

savors of despotism, which is utterly repugnant to a free democracy. It looks like the distinguished author of this election law must have made a very close study of the methods in vogue in Turkey while he was United. States minister to that country, and must have been greatly impressed by what he saw and learned.

Until the Terrell law got in active working order the people of Texas imagined that they were the masters of all political parties, but it seems Judge Terrell has erected an election measure that transforms the people into humble servitors and sets up a master in the form of a drastic and unbearable election law, which has already become so obnoxious that the masses are arising as one man and demanding its unconditional repeal. As The Telegram has heretofore remarked, the demand of the hour is for fewer laws and simpler laws.

#### WILLIAMS NOT A TRAITOR

Some of the Texas newspapers continue to harp on the charges made by Judge Storey that Judge William D. Williams of this city was hostile to Bryan in his campaign for the Presidency. The Sherman Register The Weekly Telegram, one year ...... 50c says:

The democrats of Texas have written the obituary of William D. Williams of Fort Worth, just as they will write the obituary of any man who turns traitor to his party in time of need. The democracy nominated Mr. Bryan and Williams abused Mr. Bryan, when the heat of battle was on. Williams has no kick coming against the people of Texas who have turned his application down for the railroad commissionership, in favor of a man who is a tried and true democrat.

William D. Williams has not been a traitor to the democratic party, and the statement to that effect is unqualifiedly false. Judge Williams was opposed to the nomination of Bryan as the democratic candidate for President, and expressed his individual preferences up to the time Bryan received the nomination. Then he accepted the mandate of his party and voted for Bryan -a proceeding of which many men who call themselves democrats today cannot boast.

If Wiliams is a traitor because he was opposed to Bryan until he was the party nominee, what are you going to do with those men high up in the present alignment of democracy who voted for William Mc-Kinley? There are some of these who are today engaged in an effort to teach the common people the meaning of democracy.

Judge Williams is a democrat and will abide the action of Texas democracy after putting up one of the best races ever witnessed in Texas politics. There is rothing in the Williams campaign or the Williams candidacy to be asnamed of. Here in Texas we are witnessing the rapid disssolution of many large ranches, and agriculture is being pushed far into the districts where it was so long regarded as an impossibility. The time is near at hand when big ranches will be but a memory in much of the state where they were formerly quite abundant, but the cattleman is not suffering by the change as formerly. In the enhancement in the value of his lands which he is selling in large quantities, he is getting just about all he has coming, and for that reason there is very little kicking over developments.

### THE KING OF CANYONS

(Continued from Yesterday's Issue.)

#### (BY A. W. GRANT.)

North of Engle the Rio Grande is already at work and from there all the way to Isleta the valley is one of great natural beauty. On either side of the river are the buttes, sometimes rising into mountains. The altitude is high and the climate delightful. Apparently all kinds of grains, grasses and fruits flourish and everywhere are the veins of irrigating ditches carrying water and life to the luxuriant vegetation.

Socorro, recently famed for an earthquake which it didn't have, is in an ideal farming community with a mountain for scenic background and a prosperous and industrious community of settlers in the neighborhood to help substantiate its air of prosperity.

Belen, of which we know only as the terminus for the proposed Santa Fe cutoff, is as well situated as Socorro. Apropos of the cutoff and its purposes, Albuquerque people declare it will be used only in giving a shorter haul through the mountains for freight and that their quaint New Mexican town, half ancient, half medern, will still be a main point of interest for tourists and excursionists. In Albuquerque gambling houses are still running wide open, although farther to the eastward in the territory their day appears to be on the wane. The town is one of the best between Texas and California and is fortunate in having the appearance of being larger than its population figures indicate.

Isleta, an hour's run from Albuquerque, is one of the oldest and largest Indian towns in the southwest. The Pueblos live much as they have been living for several hundred years and are as yet uncorrupted by civic leagues, political parties, aid societies, literary clubs, labor unions, department stores or other attributes of our own highly developed civilization.

But the squaws wear garments more complicated in appearance than Worth gowns. To dress for a party must take them the greater part of a day. Elaborate ggins are a striking part of the equipment, but the comfort from going barefoot evidently takes precedence over a desire to shine as the wearer of embroidered moccasins. The squaws do not wear monograms on their leggins and whether or not the leggins are ever given as prizes at card parties I could

From Isleta the Santa Fe climbs steadily westward, up a wide mesa, thus far marked by scarcely even a tepee as a sign of settlement.

Laguna has both American and Indian settlements. The Indian town is probably more typically of Pueblo ideas than even Isleta.

The Indian village is built on a shelving cliff, with houses all of adobe, some of them placed so abruptly above each other as to give the suggestion of three and four-story buildings. The streets are irregular, but no more so than they are in Boston, and sunlight, dry air and the natural drainage of the slope have combined to make the village unusually clean in appearance. The Pueblo girls sell pottery and fruit to tourists on passing trains, while the squaws are evidently cultivators of the orchards where the fruit is

raised and makers of pottery. From Bluewater west almost to Holbrook, Ariz. the Santa Fe runs through the valley of the Rio Perco. It is not called a canyon, although the buttes on either side are almost continuous and rise to a height of several hundred feet. The name Rio Puerco is not suggestive of natural beauty, as it means "filthy river." but the tourist who passes over the route by daylight cannot fail to become enthusiastic.

Just why this strip of scenery has never been given much attention by travelersis not clear. It is fully seventy-five miles long, but the best part is concentrated in about thirty miles east from a little station called Aztec.

In this distance are more vivid colorings, probably because shown on a smaller scale, than are to be found in the rocks of the Grand Canyon itself. There are more wonderful shapes than in Colorado's farfamed Garden of the Gods. The sandstones are crimson, yellow, gray and sometimes almost purple. The most weird effects in erosion are scattered with a profusion that makes the Garden of the Gods seem like a little park. There are organ pipes, castle domes, Titanic chairs and human faces on every hand. Perched on the top of a cliff, 200 feet above the valley, are to be seen figures that look like men on guard, but they are sentinels of stone. In one place a flock of birds seem ready to sail out across the valley from the pinnacles on which they are perched, but they never move, because they were carved from solid

It is one of the most wonderful regions to be found in all the great southwest, but the trains spinning through it at the rate of thirty miles an hour give little time to stop and investigate it.

### CENTRAL COUNTIES DRY

Recent Rains Have Not Covered All of Texas Following is the week's weather summary for Texas, issued at the Gal-

veston office of the weather bureau: The week ending Aug. 13 is marked by light to heavy showers in all divsions of the state, and no day passed on which there was not some precipttation in some part of the state. The rainfall was excessively heavy in the northwestern, northern and numerous western counties, where it ranged from two to over four inches. A number of counties in the central and southwestern divisions also received more moisture than is usual at this time of the year, but the excess was less pronounced than in the more northern counties of the central division, however, the rainfall was below the normal. In the eastern and coast counties and in parts of the Rio Grande valley the rainfall was also below the normal, the deficiency in general being greatest in the extreme eastern counties and on the immediate gulf coast. Many of the counties received too much rain and not enough sunshine and numerous complaints were received of the lack of dry weather. Thunderstorms were not numerous nor unusually severe, and in a few instances only did

they cause any damage. was from two to three degrees below the seasonal average, and in the other divisions it averaged either normal or slightly above the normal. No excessively high temperatures of 100 dethe state. The highest temperatures reported ranged from 88 degrees at Abilene, Corpus Christi and Galveston to 98 degrees at Brownwood, Cuero. Huntsville, Kerrville and Luling, and the lowest from 58 degrees at Amarillo and Ballinger to 80 degrees at Galveston. The week closed with generally fair weather in all parts of the state. except in central counties where a few local showers occurred.

Woman Commits Suicide and Husband Is Prostrated

DOVER, Del., Aug. 15.-After taking a quantity of laudanum, Mrs. Carrie Carrow, wife of Robert P. Carrow, a Dover merchant, jumped into Silver Lake today and was drowned. The woman coolly planned suicide. She removed all her outer clothing, which she laid, with her shoes and umbrella, on the side of the bridge crossing the lake. Inside her shoes were her combs, a gold chain and locket Her pocketbook, containing a small sum of money, was also found. Draper Gruwell, of near Dover, discovered the woman's clothing and notified the authorities, who found the body floating in the water. The husband is almost prostrated at the action of his wife, and no motive can be assigned for it.

### STAGNANT WATER WILL BE OILED

North Fort Worth Council Orders Sanitary Measure

The North Fort Worth city council met in regular session Tuesday night with a full attendance and Mayor W. D. Davis presiding,

Alderman Conway, chairman of the street and alley committee, reported that the new bridge across Marine creek in Main street has been finished and the work accepted by the committee. Also that the East Central avenue bridge will be completed this week and that teams are already using the span; that the Lincoln avenue bridge which was recently damaged has also been repaired; that Exchange avenue has been graded east from Main street

a distance of 180 feet. Alderman Blanke, chairman of the waterworks committee, reported that work on the new main in Lee avenue has been finished and connections are in use; that Lincoln avenue main work from Fifteenth to Sixteenth streets is progressing rapidly. Alderman Blanke stated that the committee is now entertaining a petition from property owners in Lee avenue between Firteenth and Sixteenth streets. No action has as yet been taken on same.

Application Withdrawn. Alderman Conway reported that the Southwestern Mechanical Company has withdrawn its recent application for a light franchise in this city and that it has decided to take no further action for the present. J. H. Foley, representing the Westinghouse Company of Pittsburg, Pa., was called on to explain the position his firm now holds on the meter question. Later the purchasing committee was instructed to make a purchase of 100 new meters and the secretary was instructed to make payment for same as the purchasing committee may deem wisest. It is thought that the old terms of six, twelve, 18 and twenty-four months payments will be held by the committee and accepted by the Westinghouse

An application from T. J. Clardy for the office of city scavenger was read and a vote gave the health committee power to act on the application. The office of scavenger was then declared vacant and the committee at once accepted the application and the city secretary will record the name of Mr. Clardy as such as soon as he furnishes the proper bond of \$1,000. The application offers an annual bonus of \$150. On motion of Alderman Mulholland the city scavenger was made city sanitary officer without pay.

Oil on Waters Needed. Alderman Daniel, chairman of the health committee, reported that City Physician Frazier has declared the need of another application of oil on the stagnant water pools and the wish of the council regarding such frequent applications was asked for. The comnittee was later empowered to employ such men as is necessary for close attention to the stagnant pools and the secretary was instructed to pay for

There was some discussion as to the feasibility of making a flat rate for water service of \$1 a month and leaving it optional with the consumer as to whether or not he would use a meter. Weighty opposition was expressed and no action was taken. City Attorney Baskin stated that he had made application Tuesday afternoon to the county commissioners' court for more voting boxes in North Fort Worth and the council was asked for suggestions as to the additional number needed. It was decided that two voting boxes would be enough where in the past one has served. The council adjourned after a session of





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
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A REPLY TO DR. COTTON Anent "Prophets, False and True" To The Telegram.

## **SHOWS BIG GAIN**

Railroad Rumors Make High Prices for Property

Rumors of activity among the rail-

roads, especially the Rock Island and the Cotton Belt, on the east side of town, have caused prices of real estate in that district to soar and sales made during the past few days show that prices have more than doubled on property east of Rusk street, between Fifth and Ninth streets, inside a year. The talk some time ago of a line up Seventh street, to be used jointly by the Rock Island, Fort Worth and Denver, Cotton Belt and the Frisco, while not confirmed, has sufficed to make investors turn toward that part of the city as a field ripe for the harvest. One sale of property in this district was completed Monday by Heaton, Bury & Co. This firm sold for Morgan Jones of Seymour to L. L. Hawes of Fort Worth three lots, each 50x100 feet, on the west side of Calhoun street, at the corner of Seventh, for the sum of \$15,-000. This price is considered by real estate men to be a very good one for land in that locality. There are several vacant houses on the property belonging to Mr. Hawes. He held a lease on the land for some time previous to the purchase. It is said that he intends to move off the rent houses and improve the property substantially.

Year's Profit Large That Ninth street property is advancing rapidly in value is shown by a sale made a few days ago, in which Mr. Hawes also figured. Less than a year ago Mr. Hawes bought six lots, fronting on Ninth street, between Grove and Pecan streets, 300x100 feet altogether, for \$16,000. For the 109 feet where the Shirley grocery store stands he paid \$7,000 less than six months ago, and he recently refused \$15,000 for this ground. He sold, however, the 100x100 on the corner of Ninth and Grove streets to Ed Selbold for \$12,000. Within twenty-four hours after the sale Mr. Seibold was offered \$3,000 for his bargain. Since Mr. Hawes sold this ground to Mr. Seibold he has refused an offer of \$30,-000 for the remaining 200x100 feet,

fronting on Ninth. Holders of property in that district think that the Rock Island is coming up Ninth street and this accounts in part for the advance in values. Then he improvements which the Fort Worth and Denver is making tend to largely increase values. The Denver people are going to fill Ninth street east of the brewery where there is now a considerable hollow and the street will be paved from Main street to the Medlin Mills. Already sufficient signatures have been secured to guarantee brick paving to the brewery, and there seems no doubt of its being put in all the way to the mill. Mr. Seibold intends to erect a four-story building for the use of a large wholesale house, which is coming to Fort Worth, as has been told before in The Telegram

Over 200 Per Cent Profit Another sale which is said to have been made some time ago, but which has been kept off the records for reasons best known to the purchasers, transferred a block of ground 200 feet square between Fifth and Sixth streets and Elm and Crump streets from the

former owner, Lee Fleming, to an agent of the Cotton Belt road. Mr Fleming received \$20,000 for his property, thereby making more than 200 per cent on the amount which he paid for it about four years ago. He is said o have paid \$6,500 at the time of his purchase. It is rumored that this is but a part of the land which the Cotton Belt is endeavoring to secure in the eastern part of town. Just what the plans of the company call for cannot be stated, but that improvements on a large scale are contemplated is

quite plain. Hawes Plans Park

L. L. Hawes has purchased a number of tracts of land recently which he intends to use as a small farm and park. He bought the land in three pieces, buying seventy acres from Chas. Evans, twenty-six acres from Tom Evans, and 61/2 acres from Simon Birdsong, the total consideration being \$19,-600. The land lies at the foot of East Belknap street and extends to the river, going north to First street. Some forty acres of it lie within the city limits. The attractive part to Mr. Hawes is a beautiful little lake onehalf mile long, which lies well situated in the tract. This lake is well stocked with fish and averages about fifteen feet deep. It is now well stocked with fish, but Mr. Hawes will add a large number of different varieties, so as to have plenty of sport when he invites his friends to go fishing with him. He has purchased a fine gasoline launch, which he will keep at the lake in a neat boathouse he is now building. In addition to stocking the lake he will make the place a poultry farm and museum of fowls. He has purchased 200 India runner and white Pekin ducks. He will put at the park peafowls, swans and in fact all sorts of water fowl which will live here. Mr. Hawes will keep the farm for a park and not divide it into lots, although as said before, much of it lies within the city limits.



### POPE CONDEMNS **NEW FRENCH LAW**

Says Church Separation Violation of Divine Rights

Special to The Telegram.

ROME, Aug. 15 .- The text of the pope's long-expected encyclical to the archbishops and bishops of France in regard to their future conduct in view of the enactment of the laws providing for the separation of church and state appeared in the Observatore Romaneo yesterday. It refers to the previous encyclical condemning the general principles of the law and says the time has now arrived to indicate what should be done to defend and preserve

the religion in France. "We deferred," the encyclical continues, "our decision owing to the importance of this grave question, and particularly through a charitable feeling for the great services your nation has rendered the church. Having heretofore condemned this iniquitous law, we examined with the greatest care its articles to see if it permitted the organization of political life in France without jeopardizing the sacred principles of the chuhch.'

After approving the recommendations of the French hierarchy disapproving of the law, the encyclical says:

Dangers Threaten Church "Therefore concerning cultural associations such as the law prescribes, we declare absolutely that they cannot be formed without a violation of the sacred rights which are the life itself of the church. Putting aside, therefore, these questions which our conscience forbids us to approve, it is opportune to examine if some other kind of organization, both legal and canonical, cannot avert the threatened dangers to the church." The encyclical then examines at

length the other forms of organiza-The pope says nothing causes him greater agony than the eventualities menacing the church in France, and therefore he hopes to find some other kind of association not endangering divine rights.



LABORER FINDS **BAG OF JEWELS** 

Fortune Stolen by Servant Hidden in St. Louis

**VALUED AT \$50,000** 

Hiding Place Revealed by Hindoo on Deathbed-Workman Rewarded

By Associated Press.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 15.-Acting under instructions cabled from England, John P. O'Brien, a laborer employed in the wrecking of the world's fair buildings, has unearthed an alligator bag containing jewels valued at \$50,000, which were stolen from Mr. and Mrs. P. Henry Clayton of Devonshire, England, during a visit to the Louisiana Purchase Exposition two years ago.

Servant Confesses Theft

The jewels were stolen from a trunk and they were not missed until the Claytons had returned to England after a tour around the world. They then had no means of knowing where the jewels had been stolen. About a month ago a Hindoo servant who had been in their employ during their trip, was fatally injured by an elephant in India and on his death bed confessed that he stole the jewels while in St. Louis.

Diamonds Out of Reach

He said that he became alarmed and fearing detection had dropped them into a hole in the wall of the manufacturers' building. Later he again wished to secure the gems, but on returning to the place he had secreted them, could not reach the bottom of the space between the plaster and the side of the building. Fearing to make any inquiries or ank assistance, the Hindoo departed from St. Louis with the Claytons, leaving the jewels in their hiding place. O'Brien was generously rewarded

and was also employed by Mr. Clayton as his personal attendant.

When it became known that the committee on permanent organization would recommend Howard Templeton of Sulphur Springs, a Brooks man, for permanent chairman of the convention it strengthened the belief that there had been reached an understanding between the Brooks and Campbell leaders under which Campbell would get a larger vote from the Brooks delegates after the latter was dropped than was at first supposed; and the claim was made Tuesday night that Campbell would be nominated on the third ballot-possibly on the second.
