CUBAN INSURGENTS BURN PROPERTY OF AMERICANS

Reported U. S. Citizens Flee to Escape Death REBELS SCRIPT GIVEN

Rebel Leader Shows No Respect for Foreigners Is the Claim Made

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 12.—Marked diversity of opinion regarding the Cuban insurrection were obtained today from a canvass among the passengers who arrived here last night on the steamer Excelsior from Havana, some saying they were running away from Cuba, while others declared their trip to the United States only in the regular course of their business.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—With a view to caring for the American interests in any emergency that may arise connecting with the Cuban revolution, the cruiser Denver, several days ago was ordered to proceed from New London, Conn., to Havana. She is due there tonight. The gunboat Marietta, which has been doing patrol duty in Dominican waters, was ordered from Monte Cristi to Cienfuegos, on the south coast of Cuba, which port she should reach tonight.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—It is reported that the rebels are planning a concentrated attack on the city. They claim to be several thousand strong. The government is taking precautions.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—Andrew C. Gray, son of Judge George Gray of Delaware, has been appointed assistant secretary of the international policy holders' committee, and will be one of the active staff of the organization here for the rest of the life insurance campaign.

INVENTION WILL STOP DROWNING

Frenchman Has Device Which Conquers Waters

The French inventor who devised the motor boats has now conceived an adaptation of the motor for supplying the human body with mechanical power for propulsion in the water. Every man may thus become his own motor boat.

Other parts of the apparatus comprise a saddle-like arrangement, on which the user sits; air bags to give the necessary buoyancy and a propeller, which is operated by the engine. Two rods give control of the speed, while the steering is accomplished by altering the position of the rudders.

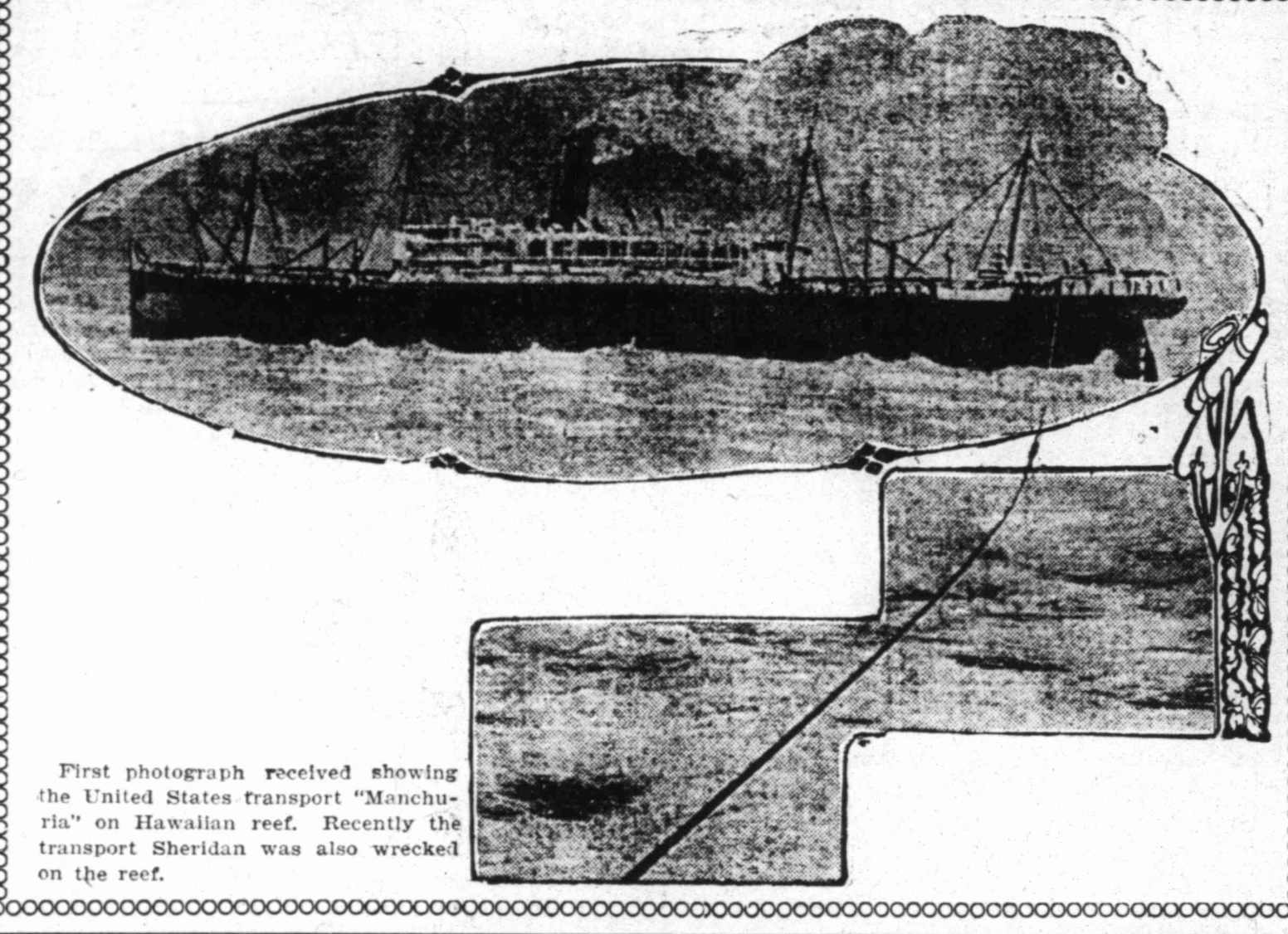
The inventor thinks that the chief use of the apparatus will be in life saving, for in an emergency the operator has only to start the motor by turning a little crank, sling the box on his back, get into the saddle and launch himself into the water.

PIERCE VEXED BY TEXAS DEAL

Oil Magnate Annoyed by Reference to Combine SCORES STANDARD Declares System Usurped His Power—Hadley Secures Evidence Long Sought

DAYTON, Ohio, Sept. 12.—When Temporary Chairman Herrick called the republican state convention to order today there was a general anticipation of a warm session. Although the question of state executive chairmanship had been settled at last night's meeting, the new state central committee and anti-Dick forces are not yet ready to admit defeat and a continuation of the contest on the floor of the convention in some form is looked for by the delegates and spectators. The action of the resolutions committee at the night session is generally known, but it is not known what form the expected surprise would take.

DAYTON, Ohio, Sept. 12.—The work of the committee on resolutions of the republican state convention was incomplete when at 1:15 o'clock this morning adjournment was taken by the whole committee until 8 o'clock this morning. A sub-committee of five has been left to frame the platform along the lines agreed on by the members of the committee and the morning session for the purpose of receiving and acting on the report. An agreement has been practically reported on all points at issue.

On the matter of indorsements the words "no less" were for a long time the stumbling block. Hearty endorsement was accorded President Roosevelt and friends of Senators Foraker and Dick insisted the plank read "and no less cordially do we indorse the senators." However, the two words were finally dropped and a strong general indorsement given both the President and the senators.

THE PARAMOUNT ISSUE

Under this head the Boston Sunday Herald of Sept. 2 revises the position of William J. Bryan on the matter of the government ownership of railroads.

In his speech at New York Mr. Bryan said that "at present the paramount issue in the minds of the people is the trust issue."

But Mr. Bryan has had the instruction once before that the people decide for themselves what issue they shall accept and pass upon as "paramount."

"With the power the present administration possesses already," says the News, "Mr. Bryan has learned just how difficult it is to win the Presidency."

The government ownership of the railroads is distinctively a populist proposition, and utterly at variance with the democratic idea of a proper form of government.

There is no necessity for government ownership of the railroads. We have just succeeded in placing those great corporations under government regulation and control, and that is an experiment that is going to be watched with eager interest by millions of the American people.

issue, and the democratic party is not likely to join in an attempt to deprive him of it. Should Mr. Bryan insist upon it as the condition of his candidacy, the party might, and most probably would, seek another candidate.

But if the government ownership and management of more than 1,000 railroads, operating nearly 300,000 miles of tracks, with total assets of \$15,000,000,000, gross earnings of nearly \$2,000,000,000, and having more than 1,500,000 employees, shall really become an issue in the election, it is not difficult to foretell what would be the fate of the candidate and the party supporting it.

COLD IN THE EAST

It is a very chilly reception that William J. Bryan's government ownership of railroads proposition has met with in the east.

And it seems peculiarly unfortunate that Colonel Bryan should have sprung this new issue just at the time he did.

Just at the time when the prospect seemed the brightest and when every indication seemed to denote a democratic victory in the next Presidential campaign that would sweep from one end of the country to the other, the great Commoner puts a club in the hands of his enemies which they have quickly brought into action.

It would have been better for Colonel Bryan and the democratic party if there had been no reception and no speechmaking in New York. It would have been better to have let the Peerless One return unheralded and unsung and given him time to have sprung his new proposition upon party leaders in privacy, where a determined effort could have been made to keep it from being openly advocated.

Joshua Quincy, chairman of the state democratic committee: "Opinion on the merits of this momentous proposition and upon the political policy of bringing it forward at the present time will, of course, vary greatly."

"He could not claim that it is yet recognized as a party doctrine. His advocacy of the doctrine undoubtedly brings it within the sphere of practical discussion."

Boston Transcript: "He fears that unlimited ownership of the railroads would obliterate state lines, so he proposes a compromise, which is an exact measure of his lack of logic and his ignorance of economics."

Under a government entrenched with such power, perhaps, nothing short of a revolution could bring about a change of administration and a successful revolution against such a centralized power would be almost impossible.

And there is another feature of the situation that should not be lost sight of. It has been but a few years since every democratic newspaper and democratic politician in the country was engaged in denouncing the populist party, which grew so strong in the south and west as to constitute a positive menace to the democracy.

The unfortunate trouble in the democratic ranks, and especially in the south, caused by the speech of Colonel Bryan on government ownership of railroads ought to be conclusive to him that he is on the wrong track, and that he ought to desist from pressing the matter if he expects to be the democratic nominee in 1908.—Denton News.

Texas should roll up the biggest democratic vote in all her history in November. The nominees and platform are well worthy the fullest indorsement of the party.

One of the strongest arguments, it seems, against government ownership of railroads is the tremendous addition of power it would give to the government.

Government ownership is a proposition sprung by the populist party, and has always been repugnant to the cardinal principles of true democracy.

The comptroller's department has received the tax rolls of about 175 counties in the state, all of which, with one or two exceptions, shows a material natural increase in valuations over the previous year.

The unprecedented increase in taxable values throughout Texas tells the story of the state's prosperity in terms that cannot be misunderstood.

It will be a bad proposition for Texas to amend her constitution, allowing \$1,000 salary to legislators, unless before doing so the present number is cut down about half.

There is not much danger of the people of Texas voting to increase the salaries of members of the state legislature to \$1,000 per annum.

The Farmers' Union has decided on eleven cents as the minimum price for middling cotton. This means that thousands of farmers will refuse to sell their cotton for a less sum and only time can demonstrate the wisdom of such a course.

If Tarrant and Dallas counties have that joint local option election on the day we vote for state officers, there is no doubt they will top the state in bringing out the full vote of each county.

It will be gratifying to the cattlemen of Texas to learn from Washington that the work of extermination of the cattle tick is progressing satisfactorily to the department of agriculture.

Colonel Bryan's declaration in favor of government ownership has weakened him greatly throughout the country. The business men of America regard his latest fancy as far more dangerous than the free silver issue.

Members of the Southern Cotton association should association found guilty of dealing in futures unqualifyingly very particular about matters of this kind.

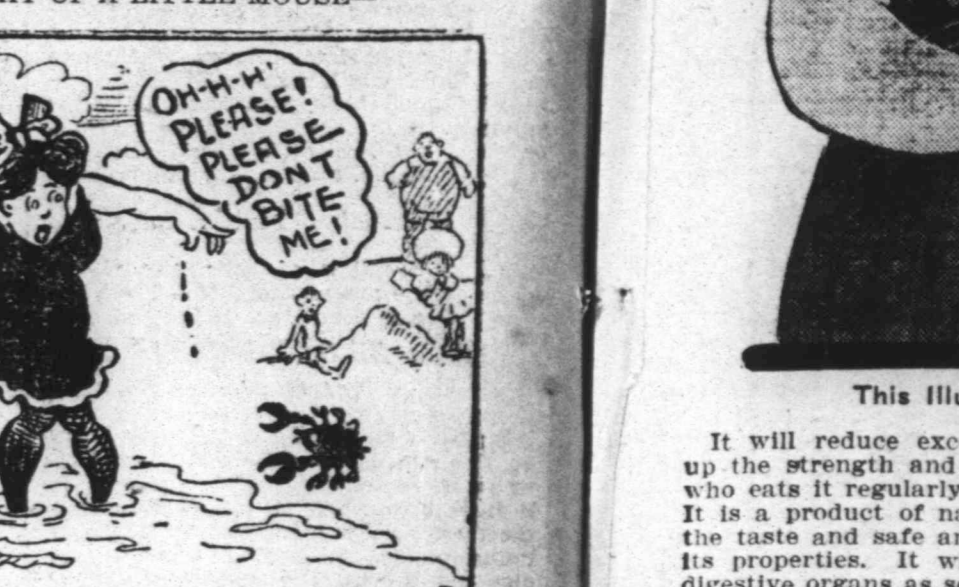

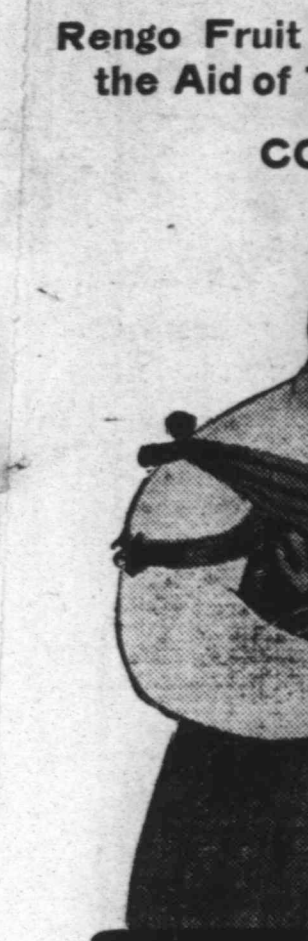

REWARD OUT FOR CHINAMAN

Fellow Countrymen Have Posted Money With Police

HAS DISAPPEARED

Highbinder Theory Is Scouted, But Reason for Woo Chang's Leaving Is Mysterious

A reward of \$100 has been posted with the Fort Worth police by local Chinamen for information leading to the location of Woo Chang Tao, who disappeared from Fort Worth Sept. 5.

Woo Chang Tao was one of the most prominent and best liked Chinamen of Fort Worth. He was in good financial circumstances and was conducting a successful restaurant business at the San Antonio restaurant on Main street, near Eleventh, Sunday the 24 instant, he disappeared and since then his fellow countrymen have not heard of him in any way.

The \$100 is offered as a reward for any information which will lead to the discovery of his whereabouts. Some of the best known Chinamen here are in consultation with the police department and together they are striving to solve the mystery of his disappearance. They think Woo is still in the state and that he has, for private reasons, gone from the city. The most careful investigation fails to disclose any financial difficulties.

Woo Chang is about 35 or 40 years old and of medium height.

For the local Chinese to raise a reward for any purpose is something unusual in local police records. It is taken to indicate they are completely baffled and have no means of learning what became of their countryman.

COUNCIL WANTS TO CLEAN UP

City Will Make Effort to Get Rid of Stagnant Water

The question of draining ponds of water that have stood in low places, several of which are in the heart of the town for many years past, occupied attention of the North Fort Worth city council Tuesday night.

Many recommendations were made, bringing much discussion for and against proposed plans and at various times discussion became acrimonious. Chief attention was given the alley in the center of the blocks between Main and Lake streets and Central avenue and Twelfth. Some time ago it was proposed that ditches be cut from the pond to the streets, upon hearing this many complaints have been filed with the street and alley committee. Tuesday night a letter from Miss Florence Colson, who had been hearing this, in which she recommended filling in the low lots and the low places in the alley, that the entire block might be above the danger line. A question of law brought up by this was: "Can the city compel property owners to improve their holdings to improve the condition of conditions in the city?" And "Would the city be liable for damages if the alley were raised, thus throwing the water on the lots?" It was finally referred to the city attorney and the street and alley committee, with power to pursue in their judgment the best course to improve the condition.

It was reported that no action has been taken by Sam Rosen toward repairing the alley back of the Rossen lot. This matter will be referred to the attorney and street and alley committee with instructions to see that early repairs were made. Chairman Danforth of the police committee reported that a contract has been closed with Mr. Calloway to feed all city prisoners for 162-3 cents a meal.

Sanitary Officer Clardy reported progress made by his department in pursuance of ordinance to clean up the city, having stagnant water pools drained where possible. He stated that a number of property owners had expressed their willingness to cooperate in the movement and some effective steps are now certain.

A petition was read from several property owners complaining of the poor condition of the street, resulting from recent heavy rains. The matter was referred to the street and alley committee with power to act.

The need of new pipe and specials for the waterworks system was again brought up and the council voted that \$500 to be used by the chairman of the waterworks, purchasing and finance committees for the purchase of materials and to cooperate with the board of equalization made its last report to the council, showing a total valuation of \$3,559,522 on the city's property.

A new official map of the city was asked for by the city assessor and the city secretary was instructed to ascertain from City Engineer Hall if the tracings of the last official map have not been preserved.

The secretary was instructed to secure a report from M. L. Waller, architect on the jail plans, announcing that the work has been completed according to specifications. Upon a favorable report the secretary will issue warrants to E. Train in payment of the contract building work.

The waterworks committee asked that the secretary make a state with Mr. Blue of Fort Worth, at which time he will replaster intake well reservoir.

The city tax rate was fixed as follows: Ad valorem, 50 cents; street, 15 cents; school, 35 cents.

It was voted that the council meet at 7 p. m. instead of 8 o'clock from Oct. 1 to April 1, 1907.

Harry Palmer of the weights and measures committee, in telling of some of the experiences they had with short counts bore testimony to the aid given by The Telegram's reports of their meetings. Recently it was stated at one of the meetings that some of the produce men, handling fruits which came in boxes, as lemons, oranges, pears, the finer apples, etc., "ran" them and threw out the defective fruit, but they failed to make good the shortage. That was reported in The Telegram and it prompted one of the salesmen of one of the houses to take it as an imputation on the business methods of his house and he resented it.

"The result is," said Mr. Palmer, "and that publication helped a whole lot, that we have no more complaints about some of the houses, and we made a reclamation for shortage which was allowed and others of the members reported a similar experience," said Mr. Palmer.

From their experience, much good advice was given the clerks present by members, and then, like one big family, the meeting gathered about the tables where was spread the refreshments, to enjoy the good things provided.

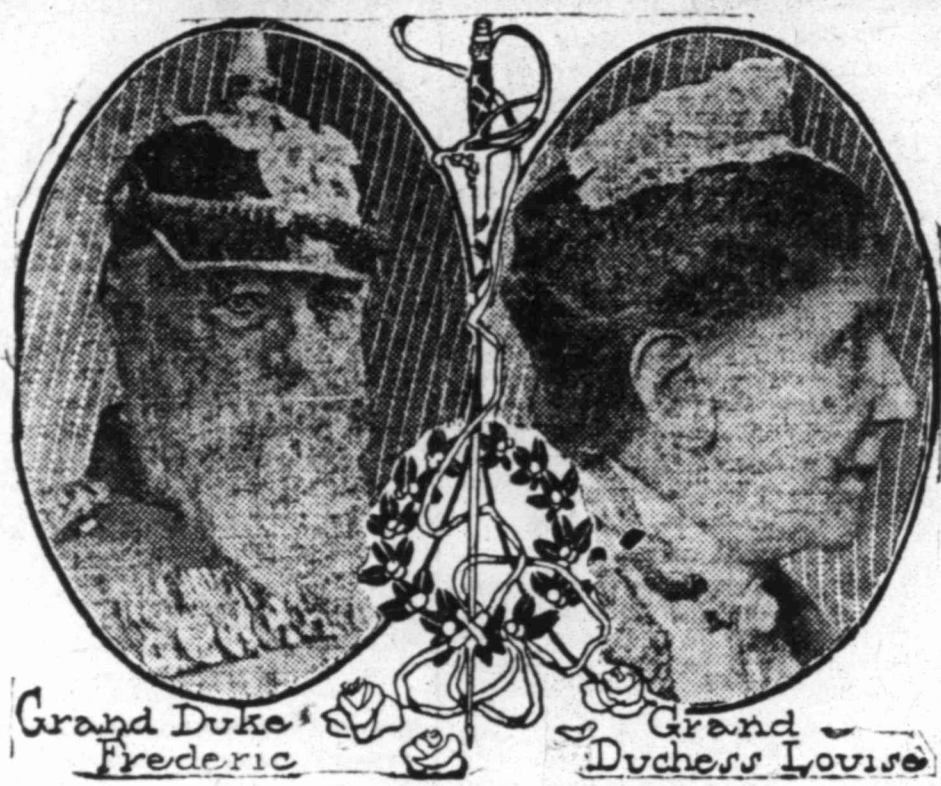

GREAT TIMES IN PANHANDLE NOW

Crops Running Races to Make Records for Yield

Colonel Stuart Harrison, the well-known breeder of Shorthorn cattle in Tarrant county, whose residence and farm are out Arlington Heights way, returned Monday from a trip up the Denver and was thus enabled to make the following report upon what he saw and heard:

"My trip took me as far north as Quahah and I visited in rotation the cities of Vernon, Iowa Park and Wichita Falls. I also made short trips into the country and had every opportunity to see conditions as they were and not from reports of others. That section is certainly in as fine condition as any in the United States and the people are simply happy and enjoying their prosperity to the fullest."

The only thing, however, that I thought might be improved was the grass. The meadow is at least twelve inches high and growing vigorously, but it is very sappy and getting stalky and sappy warm weather comes and a cessation of rain it will be wiped out when frost catches it. The cattle look all right, but are not as fat as they should be, but are simply full of grass, and if it stays away from food for twenty-four hours would show up badly. Of course this will end as soon as the grass has a chance to cure, and with a few warm dry days this will take place. Cotton is all right and will make a large yield. The flies are troubling the stock to some extent and causing them to run.

"I never in all my life saw such crops of forage as are to be seen in the Panhandle country. Sorghum, kafir, milo maize and others. It looks as if they had enough to last two or three years. There is no manner of doubt that the country is safe up there this year. Apples? Why, I saw some as fine as I ever saw in my life, and also saw wagon after wagon on their way to market and ready to sell their loads of apples. I went into the fields and looked at the crops and can say that nothing has been exaggerated in the accounts that have been heretofore sent out as to the general prosperity of the section of Texas known as the Panhandle. Land is selling fast and at a good price and wheat crop is a prospective home-seeker would see if he went there now there is no doubt on earth that he would return home, pack up and get at the neighbors and do likewise, for it would beat anything that he or any of his folk had ever seen."

"Wichita Falls has every appearance of a big growth and a forward movement. This can be said, of course, of all the towns, but Wichita is far in the lead up to date. In addition to her other attractions the big lake that she has built for irrigation purposes gives her a market and what I enjoyed my trip you may be sure, and certainly will avail myself of the first opportunity to pay another visit."

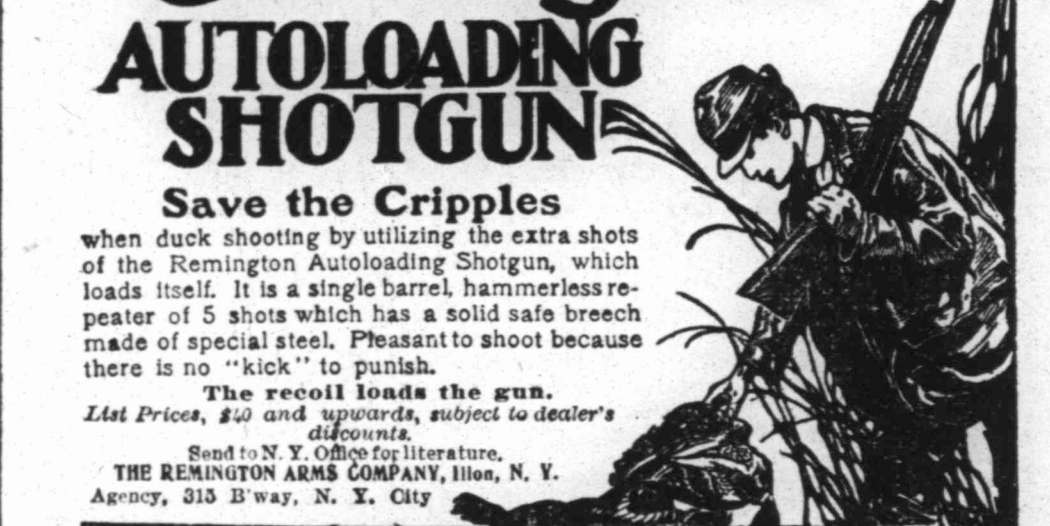
