



We received a clipping in the mail this week from a newspaper in Loveland, Colorado, regarding a former Friona resident.

The article was about Bernie Meeks, who lived in Friona some 35 years ago. He was decrying the fact that small town baseball teams have gone the way of the "flivver," the ukelele and the raccoon coat.

Baseball was big entertainment in Friona about 35 years ago, Meeks pointed out in the article. When the team played, the businesses in town locked up and everyone went out to the game.

"Friona didn't consider its team 'small potatoes' either," Meeks said. Team members had regulation uniforms and belonged to the Texas-New Mexico League. No one received any pay, "but we sure had lots of fun," Meeks said.

It was a special challenge to play a team from a larger town, Meeks pointed out. He said the players' biggest problems were wind and dust.

Meeks played centerfield for Friona for several years, and says he could cover his territory.

He says he's sorry that this activity has faded from the American scene. Not so much for the importance of the game, says Meeks, but because it gave an activity and a challenge to teenage boys.

(E.S. White, owner of White's Supermarket, was the team's statistician and wrote up the games each week for the Friona Star. He says he used to work with Meeks when both were employed by T.J. Crawford. He had lost track of his old centerfielder.)

We bet that Bernie Meeks will be glad to hear that a group of Friona men are diligently working to complete a new baseball diamond at Third and Prospect --not too far from where he and his teammates used to engage teams from all over West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

The new park will enable some of those teenagers Meeks talked about to participate in the Senior Little League.

Who knows... maybe when the park's completed, we'll get our "town team" going again, and try once more to prove we can beat Hereford, or Amarillo (7). Activities of this sort don't have to be packed away and forgotten. They still might create that community spirit Meeks spoke about.

An article in the past Sunday's Avalanche-Journal pointed out a reason for spending money on importing water to West Texas that hasn't previously been discussed much. It is "population dispersal."

Trigg Twichell, head of the U.S. geological survey's water resources division for Texas, says the \$9 billion Texas Water Plan, which would move water to West Texas is "not an unreasonable thing for the government to do."

Twichell points out that the two richest soils in Texas are the Lower Rio Grande Valley and in the High Plains. But there are more important factors, he says.

"You want to spread your people out," says Twichell, pointing out that crowded urban areas are more vulnerable to attack.

Also, by spreading the population out, you would eliminate the slums of the big cities, the geologists says.

We subscribe to Twichell's theory. In fact, his arguments are basically the same which led us to return to West Texas to live.

Before Easter is too far gone, we intended to mention the "Easter Dog" that runs around Elroy Wilson's neighborhood.

Wilson says the little black pup apparently gathered up some colored eggs and deposited them in the flower bed alongside his fenced yard. Wilson pitched the eggs over the fence where he supposed they belonged and then later in the day discovered them back in his flower bed, and the dog nosing around.

The dog might even have "laid" the eggs, Elroy suggests. After all, if a rabbit can lay eggs, why not a dog?

The 60-unit complex was completed about February 1 and renting began on February 15. Currently, 17 of the apartments are rented.

Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Huckabee have recently been named managers of the complex. They are the parents of Don Huckabee, manager of West Friona Grain.

Mr. and Mrs. Huckabee invites residents of the area to come and take a tour of a one, two and three-bedroom apart-

ment on Saturday or Sunday, sign the register, and have coffee and doughnuts.

The apartments are located in the northeastern corner of town, at 1300 N. Walnut St. The manager's apartment is number 38, and refreshments will be served there.

Each apartment is provided with refrigerated air and central heat, cable for television, and all bills are paid. Playgrounds are provided for children. The managers state that children are more than welcome in the apartments, but that they prefer no pets.

The apartments are composed of eight one-bedroom, 20 two-bedroom and 32 three-bedroom units. They were

built specifically to aid moderate income families in overcoming the ever-increasing housing problem, particularly in the rent area.

Friona Area Gets A General Rain

The Friona area got its best rain in more than six months during the past week, a week that also produced turbulent weather in the area.

Thursday evening, April 15, produced the most general rain. It didn't start in the city area until about 7 p.m., although some outlying areas got a good

rain during the afternoon Thursday. Official measurement in the city gauge for Thursday night was .65 inch. However, some area farmers received a shower of up to .7 inch Thursday afternoon, and another inch that night.

Then on Sunday night, or early Monday morning, another .55 inch was logged by the city, making an official measurement for the four-day period of 1.2 inches.

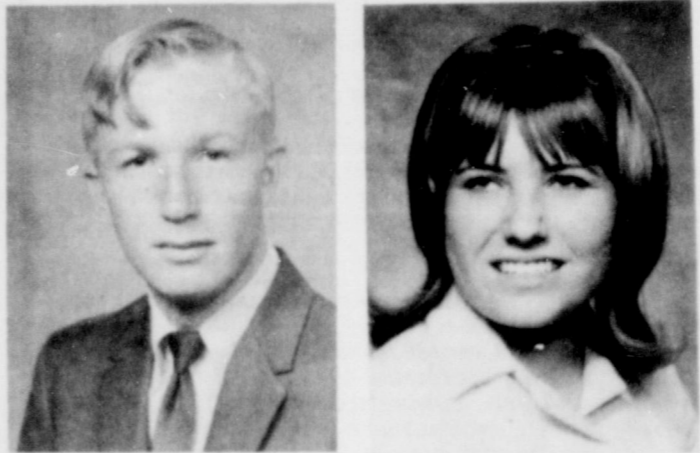
To the west of Friona, on farms of J.G. McFarland and Ralph Wilson, in particular, the measurement for the period was more like 2.1 inches.

Farmers all over the area

hailed the rain, which was the first general rain of 1971, and the first moisture of any consequence since last September for many farms.

Jan Wallis, Friona's American Field Service Student from Australia, began to wonder if she would see any rain during her stay in America. "You did have a little rain shortly after I arrived, but this is the most I've seen since I've been here," she said this week.

Although Friona area residents were keeping a watchful eye peeled during the storm warnings, most were thankful for this "beginning of the end" of the drought, and hopeful that it truly would be just the beginning.

Dale Schueler Named FHS Valedictorian

Dale Schueler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Schueler, was named this week as valedictorian for Friona High School's 1971 graduating class.

Debra Wylie, the daughter of Bob Wylie, is the salutatorian. Dale's four-year average came to 94.31, and Debra's average was 92.98.

A dead heat resulted in the race for third place, and as a result, two students were named co-historians of the class. They are Larry Johnston and Glenda Deaton, who each compiled a 91.98 average.

Fifth-place student in the class is Mike Mills, with a 91.57 four-year average. Ellen Denny is the only other senior averaging over 90 for four years with a 91.07 mean.

Rounding out the top ten in the class were exchange student Jan Wallis, 89.33; Donnie Lewellen, 89.12; Susie Spring, 88.86; and Gloria Brown, 87.85.

Both of the top two students have been active in extra-curricular activities during their four years in high school. Sch-

ueler has especially excelled in science, music, agriculture and math.

He received the Lone Star Farmer degree last year, one of the highest honors available to an FFA member. Earlier, as a sophomore, Schueler had been a member of the senior farm skills team which placed second in state.

A class officer throughout his tour in high school, Schueler has also been a member of the National Honor Society the past three years.

He was named to the all-regional band and entered the solo and ensemble contests three years. Schueler won the science, music and math underclassmen awards of the school last year as a junior.

The class valedictorian has also been active in Rhea's Emmanuel Lutheran Church. He indicates an intention to attend Texas A&M University following graduation.

Miss Wylie also received a state degree, hers coming in Future Homemaking. An FHA member four years, she served as fifth vice president of the area last year.

An active member of Thespians, Debra also is a three-year member of the National Honor Society, serving as its president this year.

The class salutatorian was elected "best citizen" in Friona High School as a freshman. She also has been actively associated with the Student-Faculty Congress for four years, was a member of the Thespian Troupe, and entered Interscholastic League contests.

Miss Wylie says she plans to attend West Texas State University in the fall.

Hereford, Lazbuddie Hit By Twisters

Neighboring Hereford was cleaning up this week following that city's first tornado, which left more than \$2 million in property damage, but miraculously, no fatalities.

Some five persons were hospitalized overnight, by the twister which struck about 12:45 a.m. Monday. Some 25 homes, mostly in a two-street area, were destroyed, although up to 100 homes and businesses in all were hit.

The bulk of the damage was done on Star and K Streets. Some businesses along East Highway 60 were also devastated.

Witnesses said apparently the funnel never did get on the ground, hence the saving of lives and explaining the "hop-skotch" nature of the damage. Homes along the two streets were hit in a patchwork nature--some totally destroyed while their neighbors would be

lightly affected. In Parmer County, a separate funnel ravaged the Lazbuddie area almost a year to the date after the killer cloud of a year earlier. The funnel slammed into a trailer occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mendoza and their 13-month-old son. The trailer was destroyed, and the infant was treated at a Muleshoe hospital.

The roof of the home of Mrs. Laura Treider, 85, two miles west of Lazbuddie, was blown off. Mrs. Treider was not injured.

Outbuildings, power lines, trees and fences on the Marvin Mimms place, northeast of Friona, were blasted. Mrs. Hattie May, who lives five and one-half miles northeast of Muleshoe, was slightly injured when the storm blew her car off the road two miles south of Lazbuddie. Her home was twisted off its foundation.

Survival Rate Increased

In the early 1900's few cancer patients had any hope of cure. In the late 1930's fewer than one-in-five was being saved--that is, alive five years after first being treated. Ten years later one-in-four was being saved. Since 1956 the ratio has been one-in-three.

This small difference from one-in-four to one-in-three currently amounts to 52,000 lives each year. Of every six persons who get cancer today, two will be saved and four will die.

Numbers 1 and 2 will be saved. Number 3 will die but might have been saved had proper treatment been received in time. Numbers 4, 5, 6 will die of cancers which cannot yet be controlled; only the results of research can save these patients.

This means that about half of those who get cancer could and should be saved--by early diagnosis and prompt treatment. Thus, the immediate goal of cancer control in this country is the annual saving of 313,000 lives, or half of those who develop cancer each year.

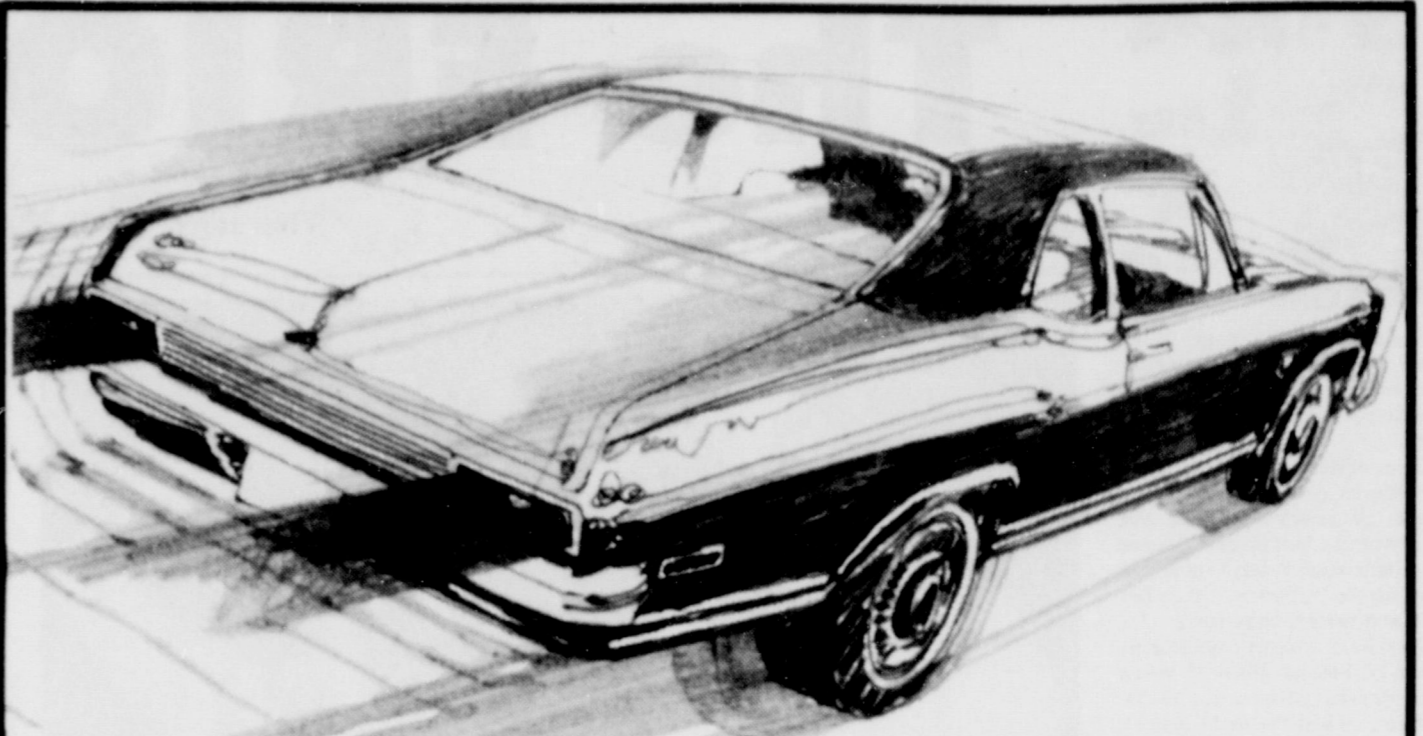

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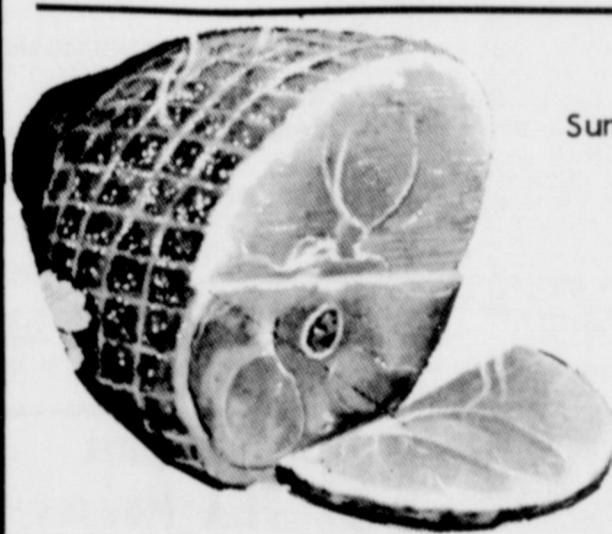

RE-DISTRICTING

Rep. Says Panhandle Slighted By Plan

Rep. Tom Christian revealed today that discussions with Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock, Chairman of the Legislative Redistricting Committee, indicate that Jones is not interested in saving the Panhandle's representation in Congress.

According to Christian, "Jones (the only West Texan on the Redistricting Committee) is in a position as chairman to salvage the representation of the Panhandle counties on the Congressional level. However, he shows no indication that he will endeavor to retain our seat in the Congress. This post is now held by Cong. Bob Price of Pampa."

"In fact, the latest Congressional redistricting plan to come out of Jones office would divide the Panhandle, lumping Randall County with the counties of the lower South Plains and the far West Texas counties of Winkler and Ector (Odessa), Christian said.

"This plan would also move the upper Panhandle counties and the Eastern Panhandle counties into a district that would be combined with counties as far east as Wichita Falls."

"The most vicious portion of this move is the splitting of Amarillo, the economic, education, medical and cultural center of the Panhandle, between two districts. Citizens of Amarillo living in Potter County would be part of District 24 and Amarillo citizens in Randall County will be joined with the 22nd District which also contains Lubbock and Odessa. This would destroy Amarillo's historical position as the unifying point of the High Plains."

"Certainly the economic interests of the Panhandle area are not compatible with areas this far removed and our interests would not be represented by men from these parts. The majority of their counties would not be of a similar geographic-economic pattern, yet this is where the majority of influence will rest. Splitting our economic-geographic base would destroy the influence the Panhandle now has as a tightly-knit unit."

"Apparently the purpose of this maneuvering, according to Austin sources, is to save the district of Cong. John Dowdy of Athens, currently under indictment by the Federal Government for bribery. Not that the Democrats are particularly interested in saving Dowdy. His activities have pretty well embarrassed the Democratic Party at home and in Washington. But the plan seems to be to retain the seat in East Texas where another Democratic candidate would have a better chance of winning."

"Both of these areas, the Panhandle and East Texas, have

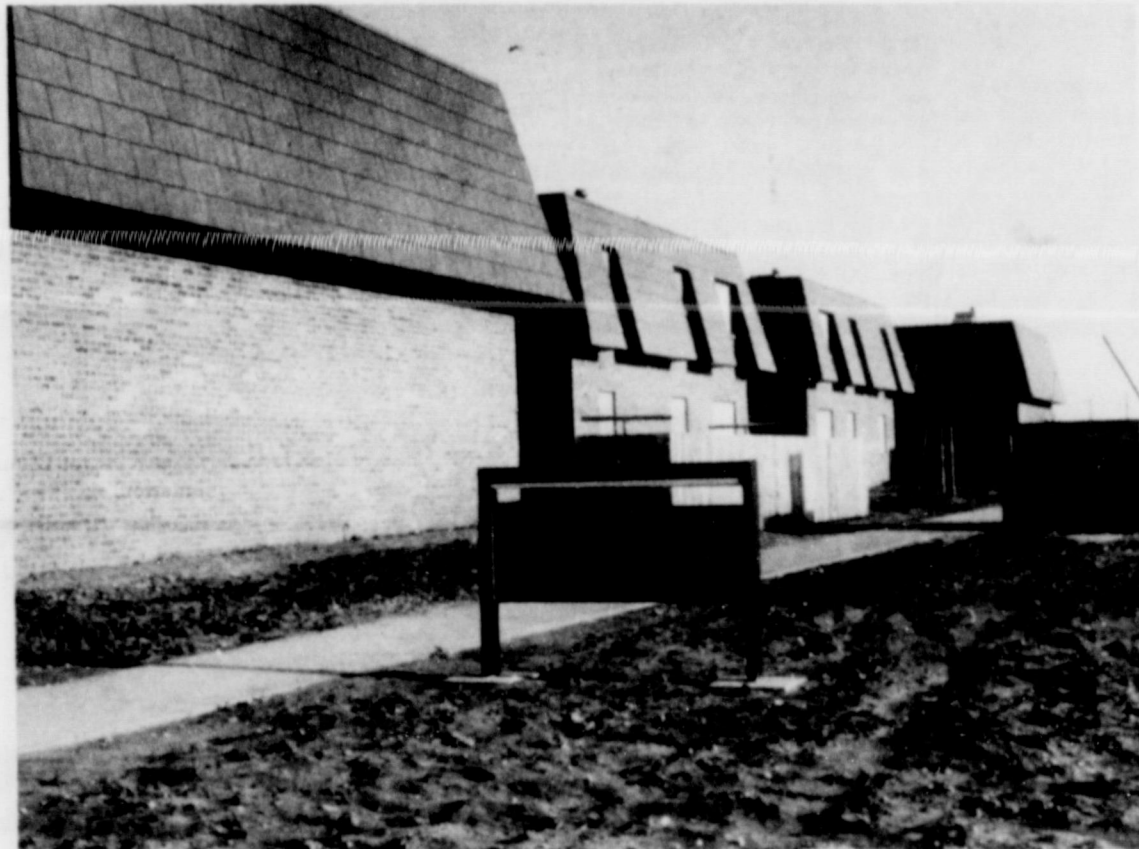
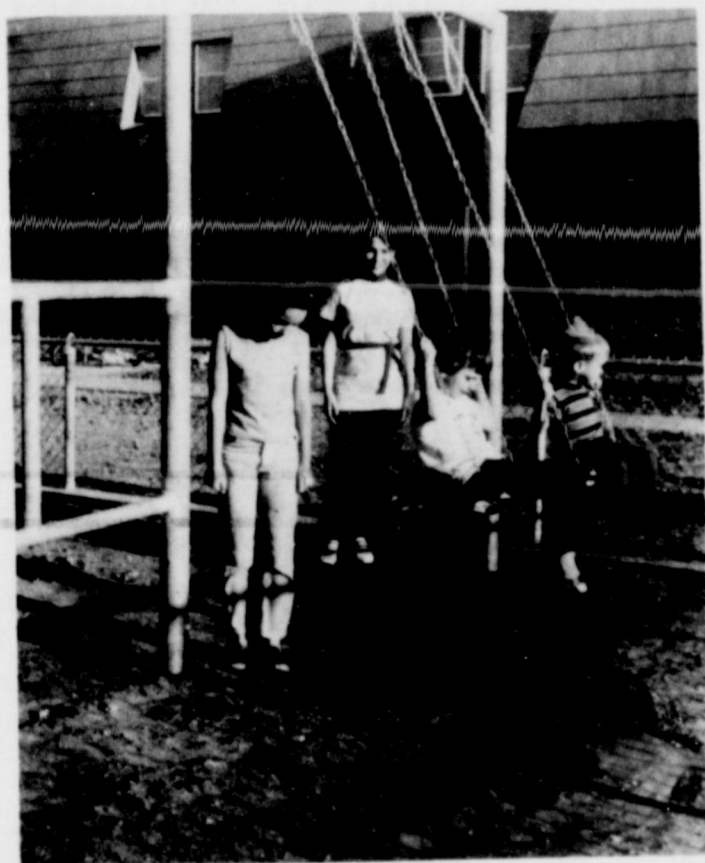

The cooperative will hold its Annual Meeting at the Bull Barn in Hereford, Texas, April 29, 1971, with registration beginning at 11 a.m. A barbecue luncheon will be served by the Hereford Rotary Club starting at 11:45 a.m. Entertainment will be furnished by the West Texas State University Stage Band during the luncheon. The business session will be called to order at 1:00 p.m., with a report to the membership and the election of two directors presented by nominating committee selection.

The men selected for Deaf Smith County for election or re-election for directors are

Raymond Higginbotham and Edgar Lemmons; for Parmer County for election or re-election are A.W. Anthony, Jr. and A.W. Gober. Both Higginbotham and Anthony are seeking re-election to their directorship posts.

Movies will be provided for the small-fry of the membership while the business meeting is in session. Drawings will be conducted throughout the meeting for over \$600.00 in prizes, and door prizes will be presented to everyone registering.

In a discussion of this year's event, Sloan Osborn, President of the Board of Directors, and James Hull, General Manager of the multi-million dollar organization, indicated capital credit checks will be paid to the membership for the year

1959 in the amount of \$84,068.37. This figure represents 10 per cent of the money each member paid for his electrical requirements in that fiscal year.

Both Osborn and Hull were reminiscent of the strides made by the cooperative with the closing of the year 1970's business. They pointed out the year 1970 was a year that brought many changes for the cooperative.

As the year began to unfold, it gave realization of an extremely tight money market that would affect member-owners and the cooperative for years to come. It also gave realization to the need and establishment of a new cooperatively owned bank for electric cooperatives. The bank will eventually loan all funds for electric plant expansion.

The year 1970 saw a tightening of belts and a greater determination of the member-owners to operate with greater efficiency on tremendously reduced margins and higher capital cost outlays than ever before experienced. It also gave insight to the tremendous strides being made in new equipment, modes of generation and what our manner of living might be for the future as a result of ecology and environmental controls.

Both agreed that the current year shows promise of being an even more exciting and demanding year than ever before.

Beet Growers To Receive Additional \$630,000

High Plains sugarbeet growers for Holly Sugar Corporation will receive an additional payment of about \$630,000 on April 20 for their 1969-1970 crop, Bob Ginn, Agricultural Manager for Holly's Hereford factory district announced today.

This will bring the total returns to growers to about \$7,400,000 which includes Holly payments and the Sugar Act payment.

Ginn reported that the 1971 crop looks "real good" and that based on current sugar prices and recent market trends, "there is a good possibility that total cash returns to growers for the 1971 crop could exceed

\$18.50 per ton of beets with improved sugar content."

Ginn said the current crop appears to be making excellent growth and if this growth continues, the beet contract agreed upon in December could mean the highest returns in history per ton of beets for Texas-New Mexico growers.

"With acreage restrictions lifted this year, High Plains growers are free to grow as many beets as the Hereford factory can handle," Ginn reported.

He said that the factory has the capacity to process 37,000 acres of beets and that additional acreage is needed this year.

Clarendon College Exes Invited To 1st Reunion

The college was organized and operated by Texas Methodists until 1923 when the church moved its facilities to Abilene to form McMurray University. The Clarendon College property was purchased by the people of Clarendon and continued to operate as a locally-supported school until recent years when it obtained additional support with a brand-new campus as a Texas junior college.

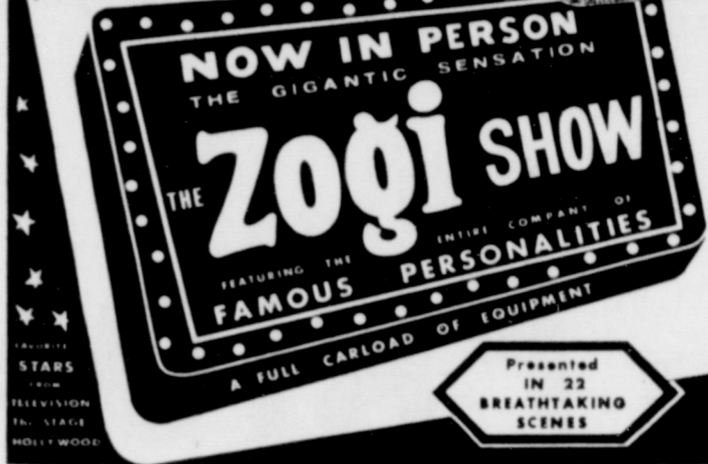

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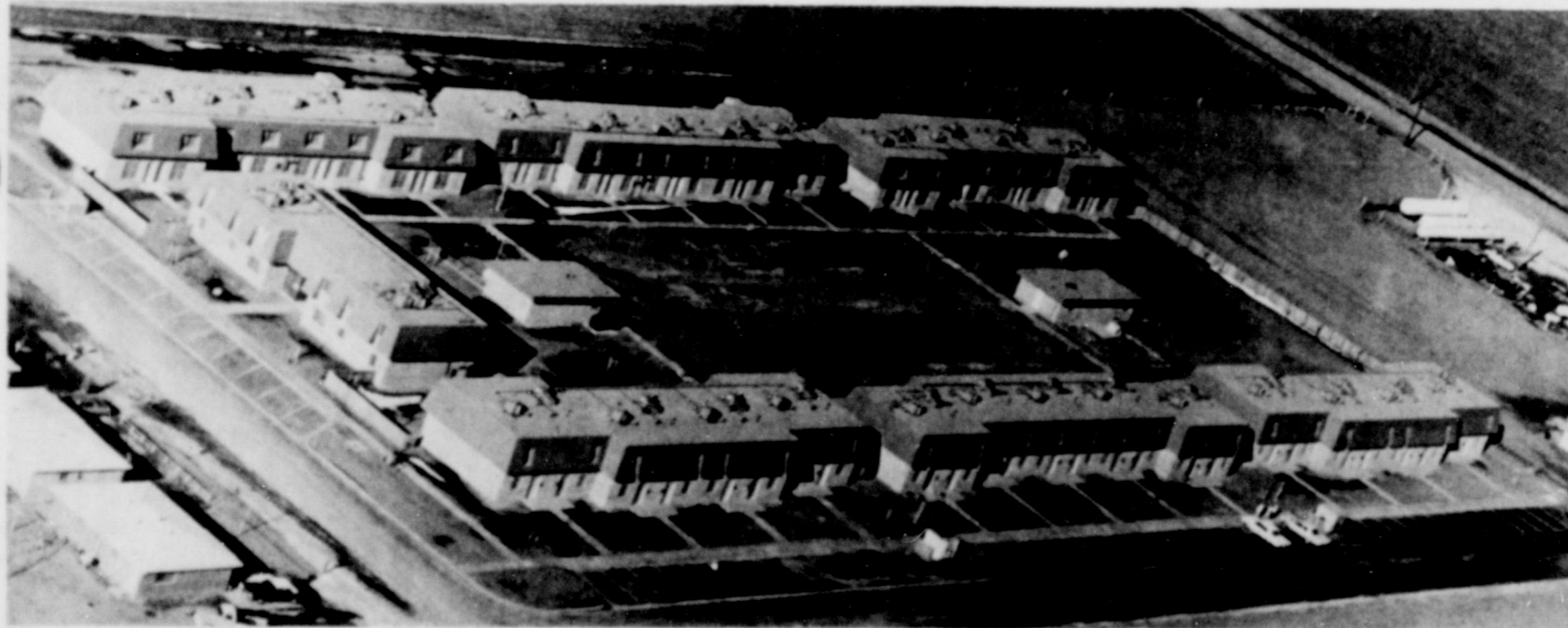

**On The Farm
In Parmer County
MACK HEALD
County Agent**

The rains that crossed the county last week and the first of this week were certainly a welcome sight. This will be of great benefit, what with spring planting starting to get into full swing. I believe the wheat is finally coming out of it. Some fields look as if they may yield in the 70 bushel range if the hail storms leave them alone.

Most of the corn and sugarbeets are in the ground. The county will probably see less beets planted compared to a year ago. With the sugar content being low, and prices depending on it, most producers would rather see their water applied on milo or corn.

More corn will probably be seen due to increased feedlot buying as well as contract corn being in good demand. Milo and cotton planting will be getting underway by May 1. Under the new farm program we may see a small increase in the cotton and milo acreage for 1971.

Wheat producers in Parmer County who desire to vote absentee in the upcoming wheat

referendum and producer board election will be able to do so at the County Extension Office beginning April 27.

"Ballots will be available for any producers who want to vote absentee in the election between April 27 and May 10." "On May 11 the Texas Wheat Producers Association will hold an election over a 34-county area to determine whether or not to assess producers not more than five mills per bushel on all wheat produced for purposes of research and promotion. At the same time, producers will have an opportunity to elect a nine-man producers board to administer funds for such a research and promotion program."

Parmer County producers who do not vote absentee are encouraged to vote in the election on May 11.

The Texas Commissioner of Agriculture has certified the TWPA to hold such a referendum and election and that a two-thirds favorable vote will be required to enact the self-assessment program. If the pro-

**Minimum Tillage Seen
As Farm Cost-Saver**

Farmers are finding that with increasing farming costs the use of minimum or no-till operations can be a big factor in realizing more net return from their crops.

According to Clyde W. Graham state conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service-- minimum tillage compared to conventional tillage is better, faster, cheaper,--and reduces erosion up to 95 per cent. Minimum or no-till is a new system of farming. Residues from a previous crop are left on or near the surface throughout the cropping year.

These farmers have found that this method of tillage has several advantages such as: retards deterioration of the soil structure; reduces soil compaction; improves soil aeration; improves permeability; improves till; less labor-- plowing and planting trips across the field are reduced; lower production costs--many farmers report savings of up to \$14 an acre; more moisture conservation; less soil erosion; protection of seedlings from wind damage--more food and cover for wildlife. Also, some farmers have found they can double crop with this system.

Some farmers in Parmer County who have used this method of tillage are Travis Dyer, W.L. Edelman and Frank Hinkson. These local farmers and many more from this High Plains area have followed the modern trend in reducing the costs of producing crops while improving the soil on which they depend.

The Soil Conservation Service in Friona has new information available which explains more about this new concept in farming.

**Enabling Legislation
Okayed On Waste Bill**

Representative Bill Clayton announced this week that the enabling legislation for Constitution Amendment 4, The Clean Water Amendment, was passed out of Committee this morning, and will be ready for floor debate probably next week.

The enabling legislation makes it very specific that the money from the \$100,000,000 bond issue, if passed by the voters on May 18, would be used only for municipal waste water treatment facility construction.

The money would be a loan from the State for 25% of the

total cost of the project, to be repaid with interest. This would provide for an increased level of federal funding from the present 30% to 55% of the total cost, which is a direct grant.

Clayton stated that it is a necessity for our cities to clean up their sewerage discharges. This would not only provide for clean water which could be re-used, but would also enhance the environment by protecting our streams and rivers from unnecessary contamination and pollutants from municipalities.

Friona had a big third quarter, with Keith Martin getting two layup shots and a free throw, and Mark Neill adding two

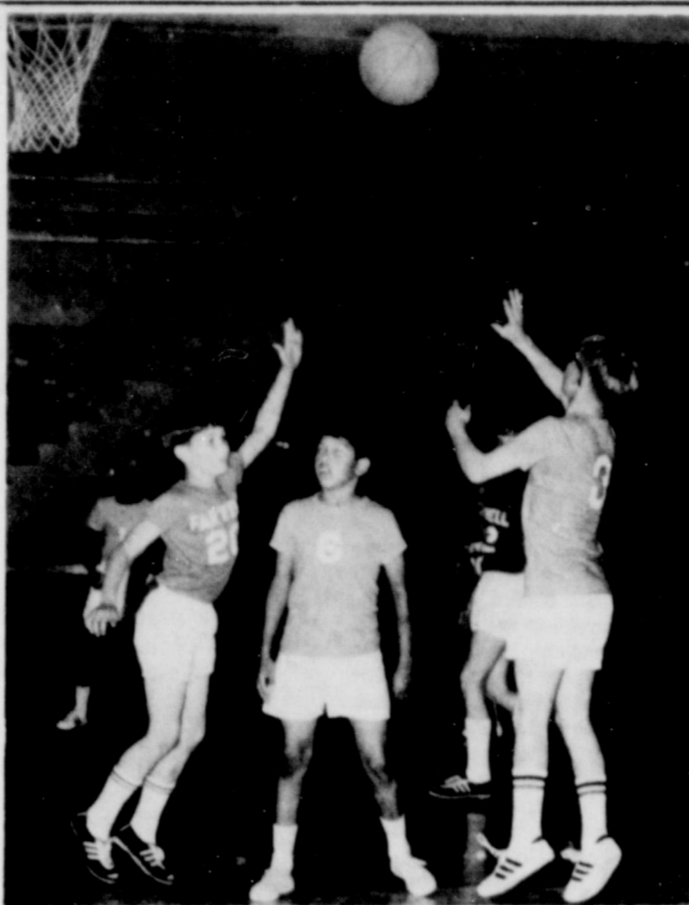
fielders. Broadhurst also popped the net with a long jump shot, to push the game out of reach, 31-8 by the end of the quarter.

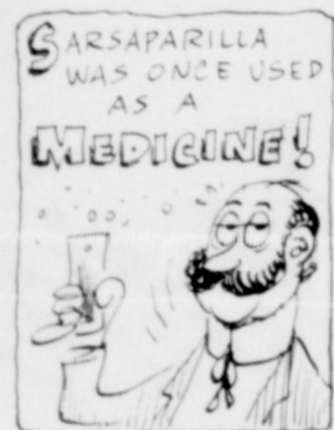

Reports**

Dear Friend:
Over half of the legislative session has been completed, and we have seen the introduction of more than twenty-five hundred bills and resolutions in the House and the Senate. Final action on several bills has been completed; however, the three major pieces of legislation that must be passed—the tax bill, the appropriation bill, and the redistricting bill—are still to be acted on. I am still hopeful that we can complete the regular session within the allotted constitutional 140 days.

I know that a lot of work is being done that you are probably not aware of because of so much news concerning the S.E.C. investigations of the Sharpstown State Bank and National Bankers Life Insurance Company of Dallas. This has caused a great deal of unrest and uncertainty about State government and some State officials. I believe we have made the proper moves now to check into allegations of fraud. We have passed two resolutions setting into action two committees to investigate the matter completely and report their findings to see what needs to be done.

The Legislature has passed a number of bills beneficial to Texas and of particular importance to the West Texas area. Four constitutional amendments have been submitted, to be voted on May 18. These are very important amendments, and ones that should be given full consideration. Prior to the May election, I will try to get another news letter out, giving the pros and cons, and background information concerning all four of these amendments, which are as follows: (1) Creating a commission to set ethics for members of the legislature, as well as salary compensation; (2) Allowing the submission of constitutional amendments during any session of the legislature; (3) Raising the assistance level for public welfare recipients; and (4) The most important will be the clean water amendment, which would provide a \$100,000,000 bond issue for the purpose of making loans to cities, so that they may receive matching federal funds to build waste water treatment facilities.

One of the largest bills ever passed into law was signed Monday, April 12, by Governor Smith. It was the Texas Water Code, which is a complete reorganization and rewording of all the State's water laws. I was the author of the bill in the House and Senator Tom Creighton carried it through the Senate. The House has also passed a Model Municipal Utility District bill to be used in creation of districts in fast growing areas. There are over two hundred bills pertaining to water resource development, conservation, preservation and environment enhancement.

I am personally sponsoring approximately seventy bills and resolutions. Although most of my bills deal with water, I have introduced bills on the following subjects: (1) Mandatory inoculation of children against communicable diseases in day care centers and in educational institutions; (2) Child support by stepfathers; (3) College campus disorder and security measures; (4) Banks and banking; (5) State Unemployment Compensation; (6) Bills affecting the cattle industry; (7) Warehouseman's Bonds for elevators; (8) Data-processing services of the State; (9) Hauling of agricultural commodities and products; (10) Land use planning; (11) County government; (12) Several local bills; (13) Industrial revenue bonds for cities, towns, and counties, and (14) Texas' Federal Relations Office in Washington.

These are a few of the bills I have introduced. Handling all these bills and serving as Chairman of Counties committee, a Vice-Chairman of Banks and Banking, and a member of three other committees keeps us real busy. Our office, however, is yours and we always have the time to help or assist you in any way we can, so never hesitate to call on us.

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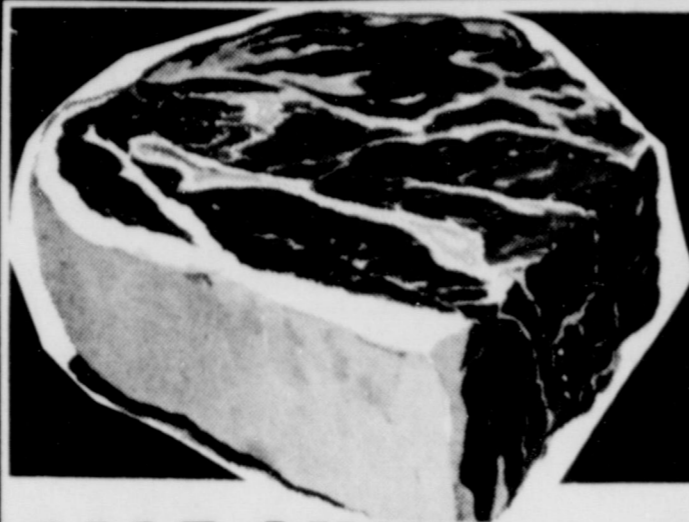
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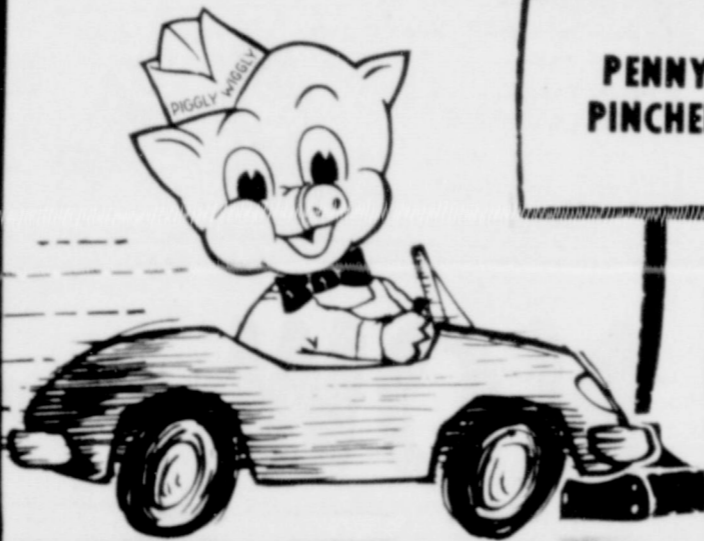
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
