AMERICAN PROPERTY IS SAVED BY BLUE JACKETS

Presence of Marines Prevent Ravages of Insurgents. INTERIOR CUT OFF. All Traffic Ceases and Cuban Interior Suffers from Lack of Supplies.

OSTON, Mass., Sept. 17.—A private cablegram received here today by E. T. Atkins from Cuba says the general conditions in the south of the Santa Clara province are desperate, but the Atkins factory of automobile manufacturers buildings on the island estate have been saved from the ravages by the presence of marines from the gunboat Marletta. About two thousand people are employed on the island estate, one of the largest in Cuba, controlled by Americans, and the buildings and property are in no danger from revolutionists.

Interior Without Supplies. The partly because of representations of danger made by Mr. Atkins to the state department at Washington, the state department at Washington, a steamer was dispatched to the southern side of the island to protect American interests at and near Cienfuegos. Mr. Atkins said today all transportation has been suspended in the southern country and the interior towns are practically without supplies and are being starving more helpless.

QUIET DAY IN MEXICO

Predicted Outbreak Against Americans Fails to Mature. CHEER ROOSEVELT

Thousands Celebrate Independence Anniversary and Land Presidents of Two Countries.

MONTEREY, Mexico, Sept. 17.—The celebration of Mexico's day of independence was observed here yesterday by a general merry-making. At break of day the national flag was hoisted over all federal and municipal buildings and a salute was fired at the barracks.

At 9 o'clock the governor, accompanied by his staff and many prominent citizens, proceeded to the Jurez theater, where they listened to the reading of the declaration of independence and the singing of the national hymn by a prominent vocalist. Band concerts were given on the various plazas during the afternoon and evening. At 5 o'clock a grand military pageant, participated in by thousands, was formed and marched through the principal streets of the city until 7 o'clock, when it was disbanded. There was not the slightest disorder to mar the celebration, and so peacefully was the affair carried out that the authorities say it will tend to counteract the effects of rumors of an anti-foreign feeling which have been rife for some months past. No reports of trouble have been received from any point in the states of Tamaulipas, Nuevo Leon or Coahuila, the three states traversed by the lines of the merger system and the Mexican Central.

BRYAN AND BAILEY CLASH

Texas Oil Affair Causing Trouble Among Leaders. ONE MUST FALL

Sullivan Declares Nebraskan Will Be Forced to Drop Senator from Party.

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—The Chicago Record-Herald says: "What will William Jennings Bryan do with Senator Joseph Bailey after yesterday's testimony by H. Clay Pierce in the Grute case at St. Louis?" was the question Illinois democrats, more especially those of the Roger Sullivan and John P. Hopkins brand, were gleefully asking today. "These men insist that Bryan must not only read Bailey out of the party, but practically chase him out of the political pasture."

"Bryan cannot make fish of one and food of another," said Roger Sullivan. "If he proposes to put me out of the party because I have an interest in Oden Gas, a small local concern, he must take fully, if not more, drastic action concerning Senator Bailey, whose close connection with H. Clay Pierce of the Standard Oil Company was shown in the testimony at St. Louis." Mr. Sullivan had just read the testimony of H. Clay Pierce, who, in defending a suit for alleged salary filed by Grute, testified that he had turned Grute over to Bailey to be used as he saw fit, and that he had also turned over to Bailey oil and railway stocks to the amount of \$1,000,000 to handle as he deemed best, as he (Pierce) was too busy to attend to this trifling.

DOWIE SEVERS ZION CITY TIES

Deposed Prophet Announces His Farewell Sermon. GOES TO MEXICO

Wife Denied Admission to Shiloh—Voliva's Unanimous Election Is Conceded.

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—John Alexander Dowie, who, according to general belief in Zion City, is in an extremely low condition, yesterday announced a farewell service at Shiloh house for next Sunday. Immediately after this service he will leave for Mexico if his physical condition will permit, and it is not expected that he will ever see Zion City again. In a communication from the old leader which was read at the Tabernacle he advises his loyal followers to remain away from the polls at the election for a new general overseer tomorrow.

Wife Denied Admission. Reports of Dowie's condition were taken to his wife at her summer home, Ben Mac Duhl, White Lake, Mich., and she has started for Zion City accompanied by her son, Gladstone. They arrived at Shiloh house Thursday night but were denied admission. Mrs. Dowie came to Chicago yesterday to remain with a friend, and her son returned to Michigan. The polls for the election tomorrow will be open from 6 a. m. to 9 p. m. The election of Voliva, who spoke to a large outdoor meeting yesterday, is conceded by nearly an unanimous vote.

MURDERS AND ROBBERIES HOLD SWAY IN BALTICS

Revolution Crushed but Reign of Terror Continues. ASK PROTECTION

German Embassy Takes Action on Killing of Manufacturer by Revolutionary Agents.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 17.—Insecurity of life and property in the Baltic provinces, which culminated last Saturday in the murder of Herr Busch, a rich German manufacturer and leader of the German colony at Riga, led the German embassy here again to make energetic representations to the foreign office concerning the adoption of measures for the protection of German subjects. Busch was killed by agents of the revolutionary organization engaged in levying a tribute. Mr. Von Miquel, first secretary of the German embassy, called today at the foreign office and presented the report of the German consul at Riga regarding the killing of Busch, who was struck down in his own factory.

Murders Continue. He called attention to the length of time the reign of terror has lasted. Although the revolt was crushed and the country reconquered by the forces under General Orioloff last winter, robberies and murders continued unchecked for over a year and a half. Are 5,000 Germans in Riga. There are 5,000 German subjects living in Riga. The American consulate at Riga has not joined this demand for protection. There is a scarcity of any Americans there. From Odessa, where conditions are almost as bad as in the Baltic provinces, embassies have been informed that guards have been furnished for consulates and residences of the various consuls.

PALMA WORSE THAN WEYLER

Insurgent Junta so Rates the Island's Executive. CUBA'S DICTATOR

Rebels Declare New Election and Fair Vote to All Only Object.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—The revolutionary junta of New York has issued a proclamation giving the liberal insurgents' reasons for taking up arms against the Palma government. The proclamation says: "In the first place this movement must not be confounded with the insurrection of South and Central America. In these latter movements the one object of the leaders is to gain control of the presidency. With us it is not so. We have been careful not to overdraw the seriousness of the political situation in Cuba and have made charges that cannot be fully substantiated by unbiased investigators."

Accuse Palma of Fraud. "We charge that President Palma obtained his election to office through fraud and intimidation and by the denial to the liberals of their right of suffrage. We charge that the government of President Palma was directly responsible for the killing of Colonel Enrique Villuendas, a member of the house of representatives at Cienfuegos, on Sept. 22, 1905. We charge that President Palma has usurped the powers and functions of the governing bodies of the municipalities and has annulled arbitrarily and without warrant of law, the election of liberal officials, displacing them with members of his own political party, the moderates. Removed Judges. "We charge that he has in like manner removed from the bench judges who refused to act in their judicial capacity according to his dictation. President Palma has also imprisoned without judicial procedure members of the liberal party because they voiced protests against his dictatorial acts. Arms Only Recourse. "The liberals have made continued peaceful appeals that justice be righted, but to all these the government has turned a deaf ear. Denied the constitutional rights for which the Cubans fought and died for nearly half a century, we decided that our one recourse was again to take up arms. Ask New Election Only. "We now ask only one thing, and that is that the illegal and fraudulent election of last December be annulled and a new election held, at which every Cuban citizen will be given a fair chance to vote. Palma in Weyler's Shoes. "That Palma is today the dictator of Cuba instead of Weyler" and declares that men who surround him are the same as those who surrounded the Spanish regime while patriotic Cubans were in the field fighting. English Claim. The Times today states that according to a story which is being told in financial circles here, the real cause of the action of President Roosevelt in regard to the Western Railroad, the appeals of American sugar planters near Cienfuegos, but a complaint made through the British embassy at Washington regarding the damage done to the property of the Western Railroad, which is owned by British capitalists and the head office of which is in London. Hope Lies in Taft. Nicholas Rivero, proprietor and editor of the Diara de la Marina, arrived in New York Sunday from Havana. He said: "When I left Havana on Thursday the situation was considered grave, but I think that Mr. Taft will reach an agreement with the revolutionists by supporting some of their claims. I do not think that the rebels will accept anything less than a new election. Says Palma is Patriotic. When asked if he believed that Palma would resign, Senator Rivero replied: "I do not think he would resign of his own accord, but if it were necessary for the peace of Cuba I am sure President Palma is patriotic enough to do so." Another Cuban who arrived here Sunday is quoted as stating that there were over 14,000 well armed insurgents in the field at the present time, which was more than there were in the last war with Spain. It is announced that the Cuban government, through agents here, has purchased the steam yacht Peerless, owned by Charles W. Harkness. The Peerless is the third steam yacht that has been bought here by the Cuban government since the beginning of the insurrection and will like the other two be used for coast patrol duty. NOTED HORSE DIES. Highland Denmark, World's Greatest Sire Horse, Passes Away. By Associated Press. LEXINGTON, Sept. 17.—Highland Denmark, probably the world's greatest saddle horse sire, was found dead in his stall today. He died of a severe attack of influenza, which was the cause of his death. He was 12 years old and had won many titles in the history of the American show ring, and himself was unbeaten up to his six-year-old form.

GIBBONS REPLIES

Explains Resignation From Policyholders' Committee. NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—The Herald today publishes a letter from Cardinal Gibbons to W. A. Gallagher of Baltimore in reply to a letter from Mr. Gallagher, asking the cardinal the reasons for his resignation from the international policyholders' committee. Cardinal Gibbons' letter follows: "Baltimore, Sept. 14, 1906.—Mr. W. A. Gallagher, New York Insurance Company, Baltimore: My Dear Sir:—I reply to your communication this morning. I beg to say that when I accepted the position on the international policyholders' committee, I did not adequately comprehend the duties, responsibilities and scope of its members. I therefore resigned. Confidence in Leaders. "I do not enjoy an acquaintance with considerable number of the members nominated on the administration ticket of the New York Life and the Mutual Insurance Companies. As to those whom I know personally, I am happy to say they possess my fullest confidence as gentlemen of the highest moral integrity. "Yours very truly, "JAMES CARDINAL GIBBONS."

The absence of drunken men was particularly noticeable, due, of course, to the fact that the saloons were all closed tight. There was not a street fight or brawl; in fact there were no fights of any kind. The crowd was perhaps the largest in the history of the city, due to the fact that the bull fight season opened. The celebration consisted of a big parade in the morning, band concerts and popular diversions in the afternoon, speeches by prominent citizens, and a grand display of fireworks at night. No reports have been received here of trouble anywhere in the republic. Disturbers Jailed. EAGLE PASS, Texas, Sept. 17.—Mexican independence day passed in Ciudad Porfirio Diaz without any disturbance whatever. Last night there were some cries of "Muero los Americanos," but the shouters were promptly put in jail by the police. Laredo Quiet. LAREDO, Texas, Sept. 17.—At the close of the ninety-fifth anniversary of Mexico's declaration of independence of Spanish rule, on which sensational reports have been persistently published in many American newspapers that a blood revolution would be inaugurated against the Diaz government and all foreigners, has passed, and reports from all over Mexico reached by wire from Laredo state that a more quiet and peaceable day has never been observed in that country. FOREIGN FOOD COMES UNDER BAN

New Law to Be Applied to the Imports. NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Just what effect the new pure food law will have on the importers and domestic manufacturers of food products, will be the objects of hearings to be held in the rooms of the trade and transportation beginning today by a committee consisting of Dr. H. W. Wiley of the department of agriculture, S. N. D. North, director of the bureau of food inspection, and James L. Gerry of the treasury department. Importers and manufacturers will be asked to appear and give whatever data they may have. This hearing will include not only food products, but drugs as well. Discuss Foreign Foods. The committee is to decide whether the rules and regulations they prescribe to prevent adulteration or misbranding of domestic food sold in the United States shall apply equally to imported food products. Dr. Wiley, who is regarded as the principal author of the new law, declares that they will be. "There is no possibility of concession," he said. "We shall recommend the same enforcement of the law upon imported food products as upon domestic." Domestic manufacturers of food products are intensely interested in the regulations as to labels. The test of the law is intended to prevent all false pretenses. FIGHT OVER BILL. Prominent San Antonio Citizen Cut Up by Telephone Official. SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Sept. 17.—In an altercation between Henry S. Crawford, a prominent attorney of this city, and Louis Beze, an officer of the San Antonio Telephone Company, over a telephone bill, the latter was cut twice in the face with a knife. Crawford was arrested charged with assault and released on a bond of \$100. Beze's injuries are only slight. MAYS INSANE. Negro Sentenced to Hang Said to Have Lost Mind. SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Sept. 17.—Dr. Bert, Greenwood and Barner have been appointed as a board to inquire into the sanity of H. L. Mays, a negro. Mays was sentenced to death for the murder of Lee Woods, a young white man, and his attorneys assert that he has become insane since the sentence. This is the first case of its kind in the history of Bexar county. MORE PICKERS WANTED. Venus Gins Not Able to Keep Up With Market. VENUS, Texas, Sept. 17.—Every day this week has been a busy one from the fact that a great amount of cotton has been marketed. NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Born without a bone in his body and absolutely helpless, Antonio Congo of Brooklyn lived 21 years. He died Friday and was buried yesterday. From the day of his birth until his death Antonio was never out of a cradle. He could see but could neither hear nor talk. He was powerless to move hand or foot and was perfectly formed, except for the fact that he had no bones. Antonio was twenty inches in height and his body was broad. Despite the absence of bones, for years he apparently enjoyed the best of health. RECLUSE MISSING. Woman Believed Murdered to Obtain \$5,000 in Home. NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—The authorities of Haverstraw, N. Y., suspect that Mrs. Jane Gerow, 70 years of age, a wealthy reclus, who lived on a homestead in a secluded valley under Big Kohr mountain, has been murdered. District Attorney Thomas Gagan led a party which made a search of the premises Sunday. The investigation was fruitless and will be resumed today. Mrs. Gerow, some of her relatives asserted, had over \$5,000 in cash and in stocks and bonds in the house. Blood stains found in her home led to the belief that she was murdered. The authorities believe the body is buried on the premises. THREATENED DEATH. Black Hand Demanded \$1,000 of Hotel Keeper and Are Jailed. NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Five Italians were arrested by the Coney Island police in connection with an alleged "Black Hand" case. The intended victim of the plot, according to the police, was Frank Mazzea, proprietor of two hotels, who had received letters demanding \$1,000. The letters threatened that the hotel would be blown up if the money demanded of Mazzea was not forthcoming. BUYS NEW HOME. Harry Thaw's Mother Invests in Property Near Insane Asylum. NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—A Newburg, N. Y., dispatch to the World states that Harry K. Thaw's mother is reported to have secured an option on the Howland estate near Mattawan. The property is about a mile from the Mattawan state hospital, and the negotiations are taken to mean that Mrs. Thaw anticipates that her son will be committed to that institution.

No drunkenness or rowdiness marked the occasion. PUBLIC AIDS PRISONER. Fine For Theft to Be Made Up By Regular Subscription. WACO, Texas, Sept. 17.—Max Schrab, the foreigner who snatched a purse with \$19 in it recently from a residence here, and who was afterwards placed in jail, elicited a great deal of sympathy by the pitiful story he told of ill health, etc. He was brought into the county court yesterday and plead guilty to theft. He was let off with a \$10 fine and ten days in jail. A move is on foot to make up the \$10 fine for him. SHOCK THROWS SAILORS IN PANIC. Severe Earthquake Noted in Pacific Ocean. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17.—The lumber laden ship Robert Soarb arrived from Tacoma and northern ports. Captain Plitz, in command, says that among other incidents during the trip, the officers of the vessel recorded a severe earthquake shock, which caused a panic among the crew and threatened serious harm to the vessel. Captain Plitz says that on the morning of Sept. 12, when his ship was within 250 miles of her destination, a severe disturbance of the water was felt. As near as could be determined the earthquake was experienced at a point in the Pacific in latitude 41 degrees north, longitude 125 degrees, 53 minutes west. So severe was the disturbance that the cargo and upper works of the vessel were shaken. The captain and second officers recorded the length of the shock as 23 minutes.

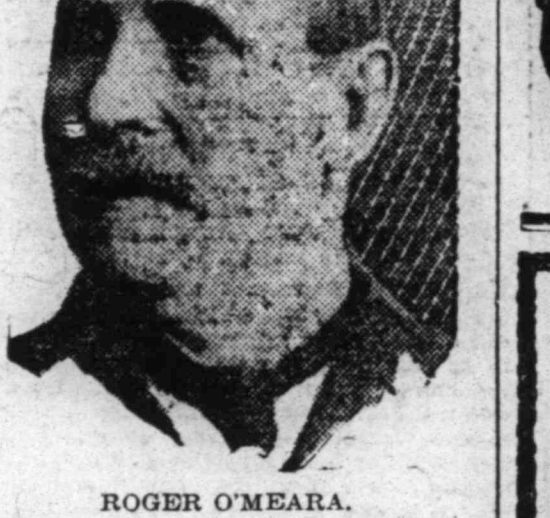
