Some people have asked why the special summer water rates, which the City of Friona used to adopt for the summer months, have been discontinued.

City Manager Jake Outland this week pointed out some of the reasons. The national economy, and inflation is as much to blame as anything, Outland says.

"With the value of the dollar constantly going down, the overall operation and costs of water production and distribution has slowly increased," Outland stated.

Last year the city added a new well, at a cost of \$14,000; and repaired another well this year—for another \$3,500. The annual electrical bill just for pumping water amounted to over \$13,000.

Outland pointed out that under the old special summer rates, probably 90 per cent of the residents never made it to the first discount, which was 15,000 gallons per month.

The city manager says that the current rate of 25 cents per thousand gallons is in line with the rates of neighboring cities. The current rate was established in 1969, and was the first adjustment in water rates since 1961.

...from the files of the Friona Star

40 YEARS AGO--MAY 29, 1931

In a reply to the city's request for additional crossings, the Santa Fe Railway stated that it was their option that the city did not need the additional crossings, and that the state law forbids crossings where there were three lines of track. Santa Fe was written in an effort to relieve some of the congestion that develops at harvest time, with lines of trucks.

35 YEARS AGO--MAY 29, 1936

During the past nine days, beginning on Monday, May 18, it has rained at Friona and some part of the surrounding territory each day with the exception of Tuesday, when it rained sometime during the night. At this writing, an estimated ten and one half inches have fallen at Friona during this period, most of which has fallen in gentle showers, allowing practically all of it to be absorbed by the soil.

30 YEARS AGO--MAY 30, 1941

25 YEARS AGO--MAY 31, 1946

In connection with our proposed sewer system, the City Commission has approved a plan whereby we will be able to finance the cost of this system without having to raise the tax rate more than 30 cents on the \$100 valuation, Mayor Glenn E. Reeve said this week. A bond issue of \$82,000 will be voted on; this being the engineer's estimate of the cost of the system.

20 YEARS AGO--MAY 24, 1951

Is there any truth to the claims made by those who say they can increase rainfall, temper hail and electrical storms, and even withhold precipitation and still keep skies cloudy? The Amarillo Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a talk by a representative of Water Resources Development Corporation on Saturday, to discuss the possibilities of controlling the weather. All farmers and ranchers are invited.

15 YEARS AGO--MAY 24, 1956

The Black Community of northeastern Parmer County, in its first attempt to win the annual community improvement contest sponsored by Farmer-Stockman Magazine in cooperation with the Extension Service, this week placed second in the state. McMahon, in Caldwell County, was named state winner. There were 185 rural communities in Texas which competed for the prizes given by the farm magazine.

10 YEARS AGO--MAY 24, 1961

A burglar broke into the office of Friona Consumers sometime during the night Saturday and made off with \$200 in cash. Entrance to the building was made by breaking the glass to a south door and unlocking the night latch.

5 YEARS AGO--MAY 19, 1966

Continuation of the service of the High Plains bookmobile was assured in recent weeks, when the four counties involved gave their official okay to the program. Commissioners and judges from Parmer, Bailey, Lamb and Cochran counties met at Muleshoe and agreed to underwrite the \$14,000 annual budget for the mobile library. The cost is to be pro-rated according to population of each county.



Pause and Reflect

I had thought to write of things political but a soft spring afternoon is not to be sullied by mundane affairs. A couple of sparrows are chirping, angrily I think; she wants him to fly away with a tumbleweed branch and he has neither the wing span nor horsepower necessary for the task. Children in shorts cavort along the street; excited squeals and animated conversation punctuated by thumps of a basketball. The coffee pot mutters and complains in protest of working overtime. A light breeze bends the too tall grass we were supposed to mow yesterday afternoon. New leaves tremble and monarch butterflies pause on slender pear branches to reflect upon the remainder of their miraculous voyage. The glorious blue bowl of the Panhandle Sky stretches infinitely overhead while I sit day dreaming and decide to abandon, for a week, the "State of the Union."

Everyday sights and sounds are not to be ignored; for of them are memories made. A voice, a face, a scene, a sound are all woven into the fabric of life and as the years pass fact becomes indistinguishable from fancy until the dreams and ambitions of youth ripen into the nostalgia of age.

How perfectly fitting it is that "graduation" comes in the Springtime! Fall--with all its warmth and beauty--still faces Winter; but Spring is the marvelous annual manifestation of awareness and opportunity. Far too many people have come to consider graduation as the finish of education. Actually, no one ever "graduates"--living is learning and the process continues until the Fates confer the final diploma. All along the way we are influenced by seemingly unimportant sights and sounds that are automatically filed away in our subconscious memory banks. The unrestrained giggle of a little girl in Sunday School. The awful crashing, crunching, chewing sound of sea waves as they demolish a landing dock. The preacher's voice as he reads the 23rd Psalm at the funeral of a loved one. The soul lifting music of an Italian accordionist--playing in a junkyard! The beautiful softly spoken Spanish of the M.C. at the Santa Fe fiesta. The crack of a rifle and the hair raising ring of a bullet. A mockingbird heralding a new day. The utter stillness of Palo Duro Canyon at sunset. The rumble of the Santa Fe--trading Friona beef for Detroit cars. A coyote serenade with the after supper coffee. The splash of a jumping fish. Little voices in school singing "America The Beautiful." And the same little voices at home--"God is great, God is good." The snap and pop of Old Glory flying above the Post Office. The roar of a tractor plowing. The deadly murmur of the Mississippi lapping at the levees. A cow howling as she calves in a snowstorm. The sight, sound and smell of a "million dollar" rain.

Congratulations to all of you who have passed another milestone on the long road of learning. Remember that--"Man does not live by bread alone."

Hortons Attend Alumnae Dinner

Mr. and Mrs. H.H. Horton, Jr., and daughter Kathy, Box 1148, were among Stephens College alumnae, husbands and daughters from the Friona area attending the college's recent (April 30-May 2) annual reunion and Alumnae College on the campus here. More than 375 graduates of the four-year college for women, representing some 40 states, attended class reunion, a reception at the home of President and Mrs. Seymour A. Smith and sessions of Alumnae College, a three-day program of talks, discussions and activities focusing on "Arts Alive." The reunion and study program were sponsored by the 36,000-member Stephens Alumnae Association, largest such organization of any private women's college in the country.


From Around The Country

The Census Bureau reports the average income in 1968 of men 25 years or older with a college education was \$4,500 more than the average income of men with no more than a high school diploma. The mean income received by American men 25 and older in 1968 was \$7,900. For men with more than a high school diploma, the mean income was \$8,400. For those with four or more years of college it was \$12,000.

According to the Arizona Farm Bureau Federation, "Part of the reason farm exports to Japan have soared is changing food preferences of the Japanese. Per capita consumption of poultry, red meats, spaghetti, pizza, and other macaroni products has soared at the expense of sharply lower per capita consumption of rice and fish."

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

Friona young people must be the exception to the rule. Of course, I wouldn't want to leave the impression that all of our young people who go away to college return. However, a lot of them do.

Maybe you are thinking, "The trend is changing and in recent years some are returning." That is probably true, too. But, I still maintain that Friona has had young people coming back for a number of years and can think of a large number who have done so.

Frank Spring, who was the first baby born in Parmer County after it was organized, grew up here and after graduating from high school attended West Texas State, Canyon, one year. Then transferred to Texas Tech at Lubbock.

After graduating from Tech in 1930, he returned to Friona and went into business. For the past twenty five years or so he has been president of Friona State Bank. Frank and his wife, Ethel Ruth, were in Lubbock Saturday for the 40th reunion of the graduating class. In re-counting the day's activities, he remarked, "There surely were a lot of old people there."

He went on to explain that this year's reunion was for two classes, 1930 and 1931. Last year's reunion was postponed one year due to the devastating tornado which struck the Hub City about the middle of May.

Frank has two younger brothers, who went away to college, then on to medical school. Both of them, Dr. Paul and Dr. Lee, chose to return to Friona to make their homes and have been taking care of the sick and injured for more years than either of them likes to re-count.

One of Friona High School's home economics teachers, Mrs. Ernest Osborn, is also a graduate of Friona High School and Texas Tech. We could almost claim the other home economics teacher, Mrs. Dale Gober, since she grew up near Bovina. Dale is also a native of Parmer County. He and his wife, the former Tonya Ivy, are both graduates of Texas Tech.

Then we have Louis and Mamie Lou Wilson Welch. After their graduation from Friona High School, they attended Texas Tech and received degrees in the spring of 1949. That same summer they built a home west of town and have been busily engaged in farming and homemaking for the past 21 years.

Dr. Jon Mack Roden, one of our two doctors of dental science, is also a graduate of Friona High School. He and his wife, the former Nancy Outland, lived in Weatherford, Oklahoma and Houston until Dr. Jon was ready to go to work, then they returned home with their two sons, Ricky and Russ. Two other farm couples are Wesley and Doris Jane McFarland Barnett, who live in the Black Community, and Mickey and Shirley Phipps Wilson. These four returned and have been living here since.

Then, we have a few, who have returned with husband or wives from other places. Lunell McFarland Horton and her husband, Hollis, have lived here a number of years. Hollis owns and operates Parmer County Pump Company and they live just north of the city limits on State Highway 214.

Other local people who teach here are Cheryl Neill Weatherly, Myrna Bennett Gatlin, and Kay Neel. Cheryl is a Tech graduate and Myrna and her husband, Carroll, who is connected with John Bingham Land Company, and Kay are all three graduates of West Texas State.

Coach Dub Cleveland is also a local product. There are others, but space doesn't permit us to list all of them. From these listed we have a banker, two doctors, one dentist, several farmers and business men, several teachers and several homemakers.

All of these have contributed a great deal to the growth and progress of our town and we are grateful that we are able to say, "Many of our young people grow up here, go away to college, then return to live among us."







**GREENBUG INFESTING SOME
GRAIN IN COUNTY**

Light greenbug infestations have been detected in several fields of seedling grain sorghums in Parmer County. Most infestations are light and scattered but counts averaged almost one greenbug per plant in one field.

Since greenbugs are capable of reproducing rapidly, producers should keep a close check on seedling grain sorghum. Small grain sorghum up to about six inches in height is much more susceptible to greenbug injury than the larger plants.

Control on seedling grain sorghum should be taken if damage is visible or if greenbug colonies build up on the plants.

Greenbugs do not increase as rapidly during May and June as they do later in the summer. During the past few years, early infestations usually phased out without causing much damage.

Since early infestations are very spotted, plants should be inspected at several locations within the field. Producers should be sure that greenbugs are present in damaging numbers before starting a spray program.

Most of the cotton in the county is up to a stand. Several producers have stated that they have had less trouble this year in getting a good stand than in past years. However, many producers seem to be having a problem with poor grain sorghum stands.

Dr. Robert Metzger, area agronomist, Lubbock, states that the slow, erratic germination of grain sorghum may be due to the extremely low seed moisture content at harvest last fall. Although these seed showed a high germination percent in laboratory tests, studies have shown that seed moisture reduced to unusually low levels of six to eight percent may result in dormancy. Poor stands have been most prevalent in cool soil with limited planting moisture. The same seed planted in a warm moist seedbed gave good, healthy stands. Metzger stated that increasing the moisture content of these dormant seed to 12 to 13 percent prior to planting will help reduce this germination problem.






Terri Lynn Wilson Graduates From Eastern



HARLEY MERRITT, who has been one of the senior class sponsors this year, taught science in junior high before becoming a high school science teacher two years ago.





An important--and controversial--page in the county's history will be recalled on Sunday, when an official Texas Historical Marker is dedicated at Parmerton.

Parmerton in 1971 brings forth no great amount of feeling, one way or the other. However, during the period from 1907 to 1916, when the location of the county seat and court house were the big issues, Parmerton was the center of controversy.

Parmerton had been chosen as county seat in the original election May 10, 1907, getting 21 votes. Bovina had 19, Farwell either 17 or 11, and Friona had six.

Legend says that one night, the records were "stolen" from the Parmerton court house and taken to Farwell. However, there was an election held, duly recorded in county records, with Farwell running away with the vote.

A third election was called in 1913, by those who wanted to move the county seat again. The vote was very close, this time between Farwell and Bovina. Farwell narrowly won out, and the results set off a series of hearings that were not finished until 1916.

Meanwhile, Parmerton has all but vanished. Only a small grain elevator and a railroad switch mark the townsite.

However, the historical marker will be a permanent reminder of the site's place in county history, long after the pioneers who lived through the era are gone.

We'd like to commend Hugh Moseley, County Tax Assessor-Collector, who is also chairman of the county's Historical Survey Committee, for his part in seeing that the Parmerton story is preserved.

Moseley, in addition to spearheading the move to secure the Historical Marker, has done considerable research on Parmerton, and the majority of his findings are being presented in this issue.

It has been almost 64 years since an official county meeting was held at Parmerton. This Sunday will change all that. Let's all attend the service, as Parmerton has its "day."

It had been some time since we had visited the West Texas Museum at Canyon, and we were much impressed during our visit on Sunday to find how much has been added, and of an interesting nature.

In the museum's basement floor has been reconstructed a "Pioneer Village," showing homes and a model town just as it might have appeared in the Panhandle of Texas around 1900.

We were impressed by the many authentic pieces of furniture, machines, and run-of-the-mill objects from the bygone era which have been located and put on display in this section of the museum.

Included is a log cabin, which was used as a line camp by Col. Charles Goodnight, which has been moved intact into the museum. The building is said to be the second oldest in the Panhandle, being constructed around 1881.

We thoroughly enjoyed this addition to the museum, and hope you will schedule a visit in the near future.
