

42 STATES TO HOLD ELECTION

Twenty-three New Governors to Be Chosen

STATEHOOD IS UP

Oklahoma to Vote on Constitution; Arizona and New Mexico on Statehood

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—There will be elections Tuesday in forty-two states and three territories, Oregon, Maine and Vermont have already elected state officers and members of the Sixtieth congress. In twenty-three of the states a governor and other state officers (in twenty of them, also a legislature) in ten, minor state officers or justices of the supreme court; in two, congressmen and a legislature, and in seven congressmen only, are to be elected. Oklahoma is to vote on a state constitution, and Arizona and New Mexico on joint statehood.

The terms of thirty United States Senators—fifteen democrats and fifteen republicans—expire March 3, 1907. Virginia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Kentucky and Arkansas have already selected democrats, and Georgia has a legislature which will elect another, while Maine and Oregon have legislatures which insure the return of republicans. Of the twenty-two states in which is to be chosen Nov. 6 a legislature that will elect United States senators, fourteen are now represented in the senate by republicans and eight by democrats.

A national house of representatives is to be elected—the Sixtieth congress, with 356 members. The present house is composed of 250 republicans and 156 democrats. Maine has already elected four republicans, Oregon two and Vermont two.

There is fusion in only one state—Nebraska—where the democrats and populists agreed upon a division of the state nominations, tho in several other states the republican or democratic candidates for congress have been nominated or endorsed by one or more of the minor parties.

Twelve tickets in Pennsylvania
As usual, there is one state ticket—the democratic—in South Carolina. Pennsylvania leads this year with the greatest number of state tickets—twenty-seven. Parties are numerous, those having tickets in the field being Independence League, Referendum, Jeffersonian, American, Anti-Administration, Republican, Reorganized, Republican and Lincoln Republican. Six of them, however, are confined to Pennsylvania.

The socialist has tickets in twenty-five states, the prohibitionists in twenty-three, socialist labor in seven, populists or peoples' in four and the Independence League in three, while public ownership has a ticket in one state.

MAN IS MISSING; FUNDS ARE GONE
Chicago Order Shy About Forty Thousand Dollars

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—J. Christian Eskilson, three supreme treasurer of the United Brotherhood of America, is missing and simultaneously it is found that \$40,000 to \$50,000 of the order's funds is gone. Eskilson has not been seen since Oct. 20.

H. H. Voght of Davenport, Iowa, supreme president, and Martin Larson of Racine, Wis., supreme vice president, yesterday concluded an examination of Eskilson's account, which shows, they say, the immediate withdrawal of the funds. They declare that practically all of the reserve fund is gone.

Eskilson's whereabouts are unknown. Seven thousand dollars of the short-term reserve fund, however, was lost in the Chicago bank of Paul O. Stensland's bank. Eskilson is reported to have been a close friend of some of the officers of the defunct Milwaukee avenue institution.

STRANGE PLANT IS DISCOVERED

Will Forecast Storms, Fogs and the Like

PACIFIC GROVE, Cal., Nov. 5.—Information has been received here of the intended establishment of rival weather bureaus in San Francisco, Cuba and in Mexico.

There has been found a "weather plant" which is said to have extraordinary powers in forecasting not only storms but also seismic disturbances. Its scientific name is *abus praecursor nobilis*.

Professor Josef Norvack, an eminent Austrian, recently arrived in England with twenty cases of these remarkable plants.

They have been found peculiarly sensitive to magnetic and electric influences and when changes in these occur the plants twist and leaves perform peculiar and abnormal movements, which, with these having its definite signification, weather forecasts can be made from two to seven days ahead for rather fog and earthquake forecasts can be made as much as twenty-six days in advance over an area of 300 square miles. It also predicts volcanic eruptions and accumulations of fire damp in mines.

Norvack will establish bureaus in San Francisco, Bombay and Tokio.

ESTIMATES VARY

Both Republicans and Democrats Claim Illinois

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—Since the closing of the campaign on Saturday night both Boedchenstein of the democratic party and the republican party and Chairman West of the republican committee busied themselves with what they term accurate forecast of Tuesday's elections.

Estimates of results vary widely. Chairman Boedchenstein claims the democrats will carry Cook county by 10,000 votes and they will certainly get in six to eight congressmen. Chairman West asserts that republicans have a plurality of at least 35,000 in Cook county, and allows the democrats one congressman in addition to the one they already have in the Twenty-sixth district. It is admitted generally that the legislature will elect a republican successor to Senator Cullum.

The independent league claims 115,000 votes in Cook county, while the democratic estimate allows them 15,000 and republicans give them 22,000.

CONTEST PROBABLE

One Will Result in Utah if Howell is Elected

SALT LAKE, Utah, Nov. 5.—According to the Herald, the official organ of the democratic party in Utah, if Joseph Howell, republican, is re-elected to congress from this state, a contest will be filed on the strength of alleged ecclesiastical interference by the Mormon church.

DOUBLE TROUBLE IN REAL LIFE

This Man Suggests Telegram Serial Story

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 5.—A remarkable instance of a man endowed with a dual personality, living the life of another person for many years, even marrying a young woman while under that hallucination and giving her the name of a supposed dead friend, whose life he was unconsciously living, has been made public here by physicians who treated the case.

The young man is Horace Robbins, who came to this country 11 years ago from England. Two years later he became subject to nervousness. Scientists declare the story of his life to be like a modern collection of Canterbury tales; for when under the consciousness of his other self, he would last for months at a time, Robbins has experienced the emotions that are common in the personality of the other, and even lost his money fighting for the estate of the dead father of a dead friend, Horace Robbins, in whose spirit his consciousness was merged.

While in one of these spells Robbins married a young woman whose home is in Rochester. The wedding ceremony took place in her grandfather's house at South last Christmas day. The next day Robbins became ill and had a doctor attend him. Ten days later he was found in a neighboring town.

He was placed under special medical treatment, the doctors being H. Vary, a general practitioner, and Edward E. Angell, a specialist in neurology. Dr. Vary and his wife took him home and nursed him for a fortnight. Robbins, like a day of his former self, occasionally writing business letters and then having spells of delusions, but by Feb. 4 he appeared normal and well.

Then he gave the first story of his life—the first of a contradictory series. His home is in Musselburgh, Scotland, he said; his father is an army officer, who shot himself through grief, and he himself, the sole survivor of his family, emigrated to Canada and enlisted in a Canadian contingent for the Boer war, returning by way of England to the dominion.

Subsequently going back to England, he said, he awoke one morning at an unknown hour to find he was cured, went to New York for his wedding, but lost all his wedding presents.

This tale held good till his aunt, Miss C., arrived on medical leave, and gave glimpses of his real history. His name was not Robbins, but Horace Rawlins, he said. He left England in 1894, and wrote regularly to his friends until last summer, since which time all letters have been returned unopened.

Thus confronted, his true story was a puzzle to his friends. He admitted his real name and gave out a second extraordinary narrative to explain having taken the name of Robbins. He and Horace Robbins, he said, now graduated from McGill university, Montreal, in engineering, went to Manitoba, where both were ill, Robbins dying, and leaving him his property. He assumed the name of Robbins and henceforth lived Robbins' life, with different adventures.

But this story, on inquiry turned out to be a flight of fancy, his friend Robbins being a myth, but he mixed the fiction up with several true incidents such as his wedding.

As time wore on, medical attention improved his health physically and restored his normal mentality. Then he committed to writing his final tale, a long narrative with the proviso, "I cannot vouch for all the statements, so write them, knowing they may be either fact or fancy."

His name, he says, is Horace Rawlins, born on Nov. 18, 1871, at Finchfield, Essex, and his mother, sisters and brothers reside at Cedar Road, Hampton Wick, Middlesex.

Neurologist Dr. Angell, who narrates the case, says: "Dr. Vary and myself are satisfied his tales are but creations of an unbalanced imagination. I am of the opinion that his consciousness when in this state is so akin to hysteria he registers fact and fiction alike. Our belief is absolute in his honesty of purpose and frankness of mind. There is no trace of guile in word or act."

PREPARATIONS FOR ELECTION

Polis Will Open at 8, Close at 7 o'Clock

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The lists of nominations given out by the congressional campaign committees of the two parties show the republicans have made nominations in 32 districts, while the democrats have made nominations in 365 districts. This excess in the number of districts in which the democrats made nominations is accounted for by the fact that in only fifty-nine of 109 districts in ten southern states have the republicans made nominations.

Many Republicans Renominated

In only thirteen districts, and they in northern states, have the democrats failed to make nominations. The renominations number 304—137 republicans and 167 democrats. The present complex of the house is 249 republicans and 137 democrats; 52 republicans and 30 democrats have not been renominated. This year the republican prohibition parties made nominations in an unusually large number of districts, the former having 103 and the latter 140. 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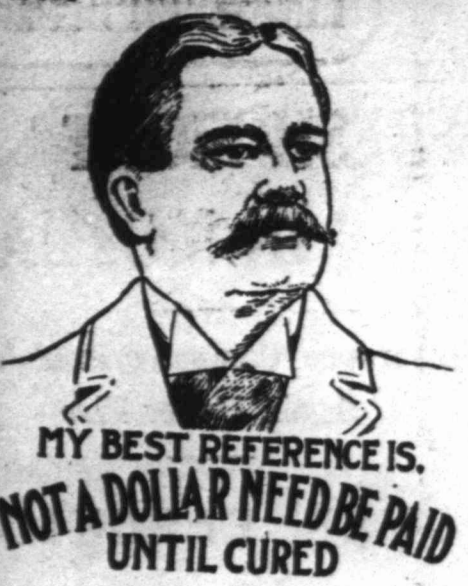

CHARGE BROUGHT AGAINST COLLIER'S. Declared That Weekly Has Suppressed Trust Story. Special to The Telegram. BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 5.—District Attorney John B. Moran sent a letter to District Attorney William T. Jerome of New York today, in which he stated he was informed by State Senator Arthur D. Hughes of Michigan that there is in the possession of Collier's Weekly evidence in the form of original documents, letters, telegrams and secret codes which tend to show that an organized method of legislative corruption is practiced by the so-called tobacco trust throughout the country. The letter follows: "I am credibly informed by one A. D. Hughes, formerly a state senator of Michigan, that there is in the possession of the proprietors of a publication by name of Collier's Weekly, having its principal place of business in New York City, evidence in the form of original documents, letters, telegrams, secret codes and the translation thereof, some copies of which I now have and which I attach herewith for identification, which tends to show the organized, systematic and general method of legislative corruption practiced by the so-called tobacco trust throughout the country. I am informed that some of the documents, copies of which I do not have, tend to show that several bills affecting the interest of the said tobacco trust were defeated at the capitol of this commonwealth at the last session of our legislature (Massachusetts legislature) by practices which are a part of this systematic scheme. I am informed that the proprietors of said Collier's Weekly have purchased the evidence for a large sum of money under a contract to publish the same not later than ten weeks after the first day of August; that the last day for publication has expired and that said Collier's Weekly has refused to publish the same according to contract. "I am further informed that Collier's Weekly is delaying publication of this evidence in violation of its contract until after election, lest it should have an injurious effect on republican candidates on election day. Therefore I respectfully request you to obtain the same evidence and transmit forthwith in order that I may begin an immediate inquiry into such occurrences in my jurisdiction as may be disclosed by an investigation of said acts." In making public the letter Mr. Moran also gave to the press copies of many letters, telegrams and codes, one letter being from Hughes. Hughes asserts that he bought a second-hand desk in Marion, Ind., last April. Mr. Hughes said the desk was full of correspondence and documents revealing certain transactions with the so-called tobacco trust. Hughes states in his letter that he endeavored to interest President Roosevelt and Governor Hanley of Indiana, but was unsuccessful. He then sold the documents to Collier's under contract to be published Oct. 9 last.

INCREASE CAPITAL STOCK. Extra Stock Will Be Used Buying Other Properties. Special to The Telegram. The contract will continue the same as heretofore.

WATERS-PIERCE DEPOSITIONS. Will Be Taken in St. Louis Wednesday. Special to The Telegram. ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 5.—Depositions in the suit to oust the Waters-Pierce Oil company from the state of Texas as an alleged unlawful combine will be taken by R. V. Davidson, attorney general of the Lone Star state, before Notary Robert Funkhouser in room No. 705, Carleton building, Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Doyle and Watson, process servers, have served subpoenas on a number of prominent St. Louis men during the last week. H. Clay Pierce, whose testimony and arrest will be remembered in connection with the proceedings against the Waters-Pierce Oil company, brought by Attorney General Hadley of Missouri, will be one of the conspicuous persons called upon to give evidence against the Waters-Pierce company. Mr. Pierce will be requested to tell what agreement was made between the Waters-Pierce Oil company of Texas made with the Standard Oil company. It is believed that his testimony given before Notary Funkhouser next Wednesday will be as sensational as his efforts to keep away from Attorney General Hadley of Missouri. The name of United States Senator Joseph Bailey of Texas is likely to be linked with the alleged deal between the two great oil combines, it is said. Senator Bailey recently came into prominence in connection with the case, and it was stated that some sensational testimony along that line would be divulged when the taking of depositions begins. The Waters-Pierce Oil company of Texas is operating under the laws of Texas as an independent company, but evidence now in the possession of Attorney General Davidson, it is said, shows that the Texas company has been absorbed by the Standard Oil company. Several prominent attorneys in St. Louis in defense of the Waters-Pierce Oil company.

Working Up Interest. TEMPLE, Texas, Nov. 5.—W. W.
