

MOBILE, Ala., Nov. 12 .- Fire which started at midnight last night and finally extinguished at 4 o'clock this morning, destroyed the big saw mill plant of Hieronymous Bros., on the river front, and the sparks from which ignited the plant of the Mobile Hardwood Company, which is seven blocks away, causing a loss of about \$60,000, with only small insurance.

The entire river front south of Madison street was in danger of destruction at one time on account of the high north wind that was blowing at the time, but the firemen by hard work stopped the blaze.

A large amount of fine hardwood timber recently purchased by the Lewis Thompson Company of Philadelphia, Pa., was lost in the flames.

Several large sea-going vessels were in danger at one time, but saved by tug boats coming to their assistance. No loss of life occurred.



The police are looking for William Neely, known as William Mitchell, and the husband of the woman.



Rev. McKenzie Lectured at Greenwall's Sunday

Rev. William P. McKenzie, a meniber of the board of lecturesship of the First Church of Christ, Boston, lectured to a good-sized audience at Greenwall's opera house Sunday afternoon. He said in part:

#### ----THE PULLMAN CAR HEARING

The railroad commission of Texas has given notice of a hearing on Nov. 27, at which time it proposes to take in hand the matter of regulating the Pullman Car Company in this state. and the first step in that direction is notice of a reduction in the rates of Mirror. this concern aggregating 20 per cent. In plain words and to the point, the commission gives notice that hereafter the Pullman Company shall charge but \$1.60 for a lower berth in Texas, in place of the charge of \$2 heretofore made. And the commission is only doing what should have been done long ago. The only trouble with its pro-

posed action now is that it does not go far enough. The charges for upper berths in Pullman cars should be mission. The Pullman Car Company eight

years ago had a capital stock of \$36.-000,000, when a stock dividend of 50 per cent was declared and a distribution of 20 per cent made. The Chicago Tribune in speaking of the affairs of this great corporation says:



According to the last annual report out. the company had on July 31, 1905, a surplus of \$22,151,946, earned almost wholly since August, 1898. The surplus on July 31, 1904, was \$18,017,374. The increase in surplus in one year, therefore, was \$4,134,572. If the earnings were equally good for the year ended July 31, 1906, then the surplus on the latter date was \$26,286.518.

The amount indicated is equal to a little more than 35 per cent on the \$74,-000,000 capital stock. In fact, if a 35 per cent stock distribution were declared, there would remain in the surplus \$386,518. If the directors care to give a cash distribution as well as a free stock one they might declare 9 per

What with the clamor for more taxe to be paid by the Pullman Company and the popular sentiment against excessive profits by corporations, the directors of the Pullman Company may be in doubt what to recommend. They cannot at this time recommend any disposition of the surplus which will not attract the attention of the authorities to the bonanza business which the traveling public is making for the Pullman Company. A distribution of the surplus may even suggest a reduction in Pullman fares and the attempt at regulation of the corporation's railroad business under the terms of the rate regulation act passed by the last congress. To cut this melon or not to cut it, is therefore a question. To cut it means to invite criticism, and not to cut it means that it will simply grow larger and confirm in the minds of certain part of the public that the fares are too high and on the part of the legislators that a correction is needed, and on the part of taxing bodies that more revenue should be collected for the state. No one objects to any corporation earning a proper and legitimate profit on the money honestly invested in its business, but when it comes to a matter of more than \$26,000,000 piled up within a period of eight years, it is time for the affairs of that corporation to be looked into. The railroad commission of Texas has taken the proper step and its action will meet with the unqualified approval of all Texas people.


## **Big Day at Aqueduct**

COLEMAN, Texas, Nov. 12 .- There is an almost forgotten legend told of the early happenings in this county. Some forty or fifty years ago three men and a boy lived on Elm creek, in the southern portion of Coleman county. These men followed the art of making spurious coins when at home and disposing of them for anything that would bring good money when abroad, and following this traffic for years these men accumulated quite a fortune. Lawlessness was at that time rather a virtue, and the hoarded wealth thus acquired caused some of the cowboys employed in that vicinity to look upon it with much covetousness. One night while the heavens were covered with clouds. lightning flashing and thunder pealing these cowboys descended on the camp of the ounterfeiters, and the rattle of firearms and shricks and groans of death oon mingled with the angry noise of the heavens. When the morning dawned there were three dead men. some empty holes that had held the hoarded and ill-gotten wealth, and one wild-eyed and frightened boy

speeding in the direction of Arkansas. All else was as the day before. This frightened boy reached his former home in Arkansas without mishap, and with bated breath told of the frightful happening away out on the prairies of Western Texas. Some of his hearers later came to Coleman county with a voodoo" and sought the lost wealth, but it was never recovered. 

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 .- With several weeks to spare the present year has passed all others in the total valuation of the precious stones and pearls brought into the port of New York. Figures compiled by customs authorities showed that the record of last year was \$37,146,337, the highest up to that

time already has been passed. The American demand for foreign gems is mostly in diamonds and pearls. Importers say that the tendency of prices is still upward because never before has it been as difficult as now to obtain the better grade of stones demanded by American buyers.
