

TWO TRAINS COLLIDE; FIFTY BELIEVED DEAD

And Five Persons Meet Their Death—Many Injured CARS BURN UP AND FIRST REPORT SAYS MANY PERSONS VICTIMS OF FIRE. FIFTY PHYSICIANS AID

VALPARAISO, Nov. 12.—Fifty out of 167 immigrants who were on the Baltimore and Ohio train which collided head-on with a freight train this morning at Woodville, ten miles north of here, are missing, and it is believed that their bodies were consumed by fire which destroyed the six coaches of the immigrant train.

A head-on collision between two passenger trains on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad occurred at Woodville, ten miles north of this city, early today. Reports have five dead, twenty-five injured and twenty to thirty burned up on the train which was destroyed. All the physicians in this city have gone to the scene of the wreck.

Reports so far are conflicting, but the majority of them place the number of dead at five killed outright in the collision, twenty to thirty others caught in the wreckage and burned to death and twenty-five seriously injured. The majority of the killed and injured were immigrants. It is said to have been caused by confusion regarding the signals, which allowed the immigrant train to pass the station when a freight train was approaching on the opposite direction.

Woodville is a small station about ten miles north of Valparaiso and aid of the train was immediately summoned from that place. The train was on the track when it was struck and was completely wrecked along the line to secure medical attention every physician within twenty miles and immediately the train and hospital back to Woodville.

Later reports from the wreck declared the number of dead to be but two and none of the immigrants were burned to death in the wreckage. The express train had 150 passengers on board, nearly all of whom were immigrants. The railroad company gathered physicians from every available point to the wreck, and from Chicago brought others. There are fifty at the scene attending the injured.

MOBILE HAS A BIG FIRE Blaze in That City Causes a Loss of \$60,000

FURNITURE MAN GETS THE KIBOSH

Parts With \$30,000 Worth of Finished Wood AND RECEIVES LEMON Burnett Tiffany, a Swift New Yorker, Deals Out a Little Bunco to House Furnisher

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Burnett Y. Tiffany, son of the late Charles Y. Tiffany, the jeweler, and who first married a seamstress, lived eleven days with her and after divorce proceedings, married another woman the day she obtained a decree divorcing her husband, has used strange and shrewd methods to obtain \$30,000 worth of furniture for his bride, without paying a cent for it, altho his income is \$15,000 a year.

The facts were revealed today in the appellate division of the supreme court. Edward S. Conway, as trustee in bankruptcy and representative of various large furniture houses, had brought suit against Tiffany to have set aside a transfer of property the young man made to his present wife, who was Mrs. Solomon Kaufman. The Tiffany's won a verdict in the lower court. The appellate division ordered another trial because of exclusion of evidence.

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PROFESSOR ARRESTED

Man Believed to Be Carl Hau Held in London

MURDER CHARGED Claimed He Killed Mother-in-Law—May Be Prominent United States Man

LONDON, Nov. 12.—A man who gave his name as Karl Stau, but it is believed to be Carl Hau, a member of the faculty of George Washington the Hotel Cecil here when he was arrested at the Bow street police court Saturday for extradition to Germany on the charge of murdering his mother-in-law at Baden-Baden.

The prisoner declared that the charge was due to a misunderstanding and asked for magistrate to send him to Germany immediately for trial. Stau's wife and child were with him at the Hotel Cecil here when he was arrested. The police found a loaded revolver and \$1,400 on the person of the prisoner.

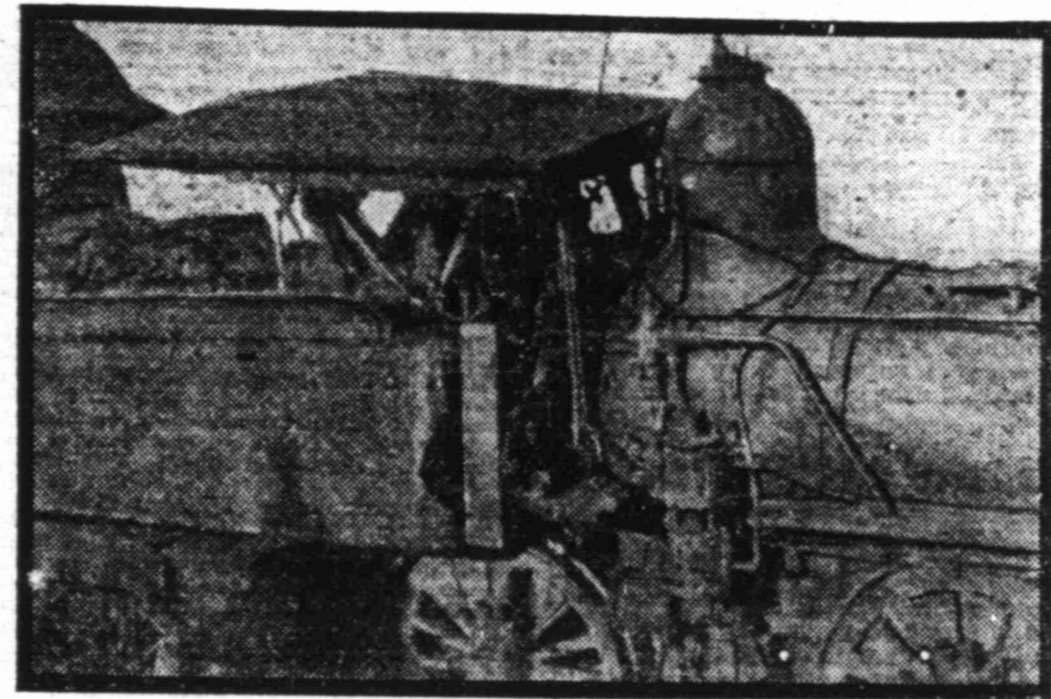
**OFFICIALS SAY WRECK PLANNED**

Head-End Collision on Frisco Early Sunday

**BRAKEMAN IS KILLED**

Engineer Robert Fallon is Seriously Injured at His Home on Wheeler Street

A wreck of northbound Frisco train No. 12 inside the city limits near the intersection of the tracks with Pennsylvania avenue at 6 o'clock Sunday morning resulted in the death of the brakeman, Joseph D. Wilkinson, 1003 West Railroad avenue, and the serious injury of the engineer, Robert V. Fallon, 405 Wheeler street. None of the passengers was injured. The train is

made up at Brownwood and leaves there at 10 o'clock each evening, arriving here at 6:20 a. m.

The wreck which occurred in a twelve-foot cut and on a curve, one mile from the Texas and Pacific passenger station, was the result of a collision of the train with an engine which had been abandoned on the track, apparently with malicious intent. The passenger train was running at about twelve miles an hour when it struck the abandoned engine. The curve and deep cut made it impossible to see the obstruction until the train was almost upon it and the train probably struck it at full speed. The abandoned engine was given far down the track by the impact and the track was torn up for several yards. The engine of the passenger train was derailed, the baggage car telescoped, the tender and the tender was thrown forward into the cab of the engine.

When passengers who were awakened by the shock came forward to the engine they found the brakeman caught between the boiler of the engine and the front end of the tender, his body mangled by the heat of the fire box and the escaping steam. The engine was hanging out of the cab window in an unconscious condition, part of his body being scalded by escaping steam. He was removed at once, but it was impossible to take the brakeman from his position until the arrival from the roundhouse of an engine which pulled the wreckage partly aside.

In the meantime the bystanders listened to the cries of the brakeman, but were unable to do anything to aid him. Finding he could not be helped, the doomed man called the names of his wife and children, expressed his wishes regarding his funeral and told his address. He was taken to St. Joseph's infirmary, where he died at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

The engineer was removed to his home, 405 Wheeler street, Fort Worth, where he will probably remain until he is regarded as miraculously that the passengers in the forward portion of the train escaped injury. Many of them were thrown across the aisle and precipitated over the seats in front. In the sleeper the passengers were preparing to leave the car and were thrown violently against each other. However, not a single injury of any consequence was reported among the passengers.

One of the first theories of the wreck was that the engine had been left on a siding at the round house, a half mile distant, and had from there run away down the main track of its own accord. It is said that engines left with a throttle partly opened in this manner. However, an examination of the wrecked engine showed that the throttle was closed and it was further found that the engine was for an engine to stop of its own accord on the track at this place.

**FOUR FIRES SUNDAY**

Fire Broke Out in Mattress Factory  
Four alarms called the fire department to different sections of the city Sunday, fire resulting in an estimated damage of \$500.

The roof of the residence property of J. H. Fitzgerald, at Jackson and Huffman streets, was damaged Sunday afternoon by about \$100, the blaze being confined to the upper part of the house.

Fire originating in one of the upper rooms of the two-story residence of L. Quinn, 801 East Sixth street, damaged the roof and upstairs furnishings to the extent of about \$400 late Sunday evening. At first the flames struck the destruction of the entire building, but the fire companies soon gained control and extinguished the fire with the chief damage to the roof.

Late Sunday fire again started in the ruins of the old mattress factory building, owned by the Ellison Furniture Company, at the corner of Third and Elm streets. It is presumed that the new blaze was ignited by sparks from a passing engine. The building was practically destroyed less than two weeks ago by fire of unknown origin.

Sunday afternoon an alarm was turned in from the east portion of the city, by persons burning a trash pile, as the wind threatened to gain control of the flames. No damage was done to property.

**NOTED AUTO WRECKED**

The Occupants Escaped Any Serious Injury  
An automobile belonging to Ralph Kindel of Weatherford was struck by a street car of the Northern Texas Traction Company on Third and Main streets, about 9 o'clock Monday morning and the car half way overturned and slightly damaged. Mr. Kindel was driving the car, which was occupied by Mrs. Ralph Kindel, Miss Mary Kindel and Lloyd Kindel, all of Weatherford. Mr. Kindel is a member of the Kindel-Clark Drug Company, which is moving to this city from Weatherford, and drove his car up from Weatherford Sunday afternoon, intending to return again Monday morning.

Mr. Kindel was driving north on the right-hand side of Main street and had allowed a northbound street car to pass him. He turned to cross the tracks and to proceed on Third street when the southbound car hit his machine, breaking the forward lights and damaging the machine generally. Mrs. Kindel and Lloyd Kindel were thrown from the auto, but all the occupants escaped injury except for a slight cut on the hand of Ralph Kindel. The machine was taken to a repair shop and is being repaired.

The car which was injured is known all over the northern half of the state, as Mr. Kindel has been in the habit of touring to all sections. He has made the run from Weatherford to Fort Worth several times and also from Weatherford to Dallas. The latter run has been made in a little less than five hours, which is very good time for a sixty-five mile run over Texas roads.

**ANOTHER THAW BEFORE COURTS**

He Is Not a Man-Slayer, But a Regular Drunkard

PITTSBURG, Nov. 12.—The courts of Allegheny county have been petitioned by members of the famous Thaw family of Pittsburgh to have William Thaw, a name sake of the original millionaire, and nephew of Harry Kendall Thaw, hold in New York for the killing of Stanford White, declared an habitual drunkard. Judge Marshall Brown received the application in common pleas court No. 1 and appointed Attorney A. C. Johnson as commissioner to take testimony in the case.  
The application was signed by Mrs. Thaw Jr., mother of the young man; Mrs. Eurd Thaw Collins, his sister, and Henry D. Collins, his brother-in-law. The petition requests that the property of the young man be taken in charge by a trustee, and sets forth that William Thaw enjoys an income of \$25,000 a year, practically \$15,000 a month; has \$100,000 behind that and an estate of unmentioned value in reserve. All told he is worth probably \$250,000.

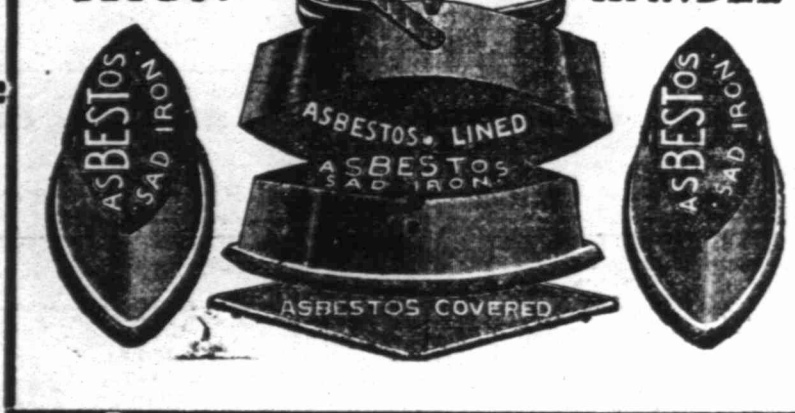
