Saturday is another important election day in Friona and Parmer County.

We hope that everyone will avail themselves of this voting opportunity, and take the small amount of time it takes to cast their ballot.

Those who think that their vote doesn't count for very much need only recall the recent Friona city election, in which only two or three votes one way or the other could have thrown the mayor's race into a runoff.

This is also a good argument against wasting a vote by writing in someone's name just as a joke.

There are many instances in which elections have been won or lost by a single vote, so it behooves voters to be serious when they mark their ballots.

Across the state, there has not been the interest in the primary election this year as there has on the average.

This is due in part to the fact that there is no opposition to Governor Preston Smith for the Democratic nomination.

However, the U. S. Senate race, between Ralph Yarborough and Lloyd Bentsen has begun to stir up more than passing interest, and this year for a change many of the lesser state officials have opponents in the primary.

Some of the races, such as for Railroad Commissioner and Land Commissioner, might turn out to be real interesting.



Frauds Of All Sorts Deserve Punishment

We have checked several dictionaries, and there appears to be common agreement that a "church," whether a building (the Lord's house), or public worship (he goes to church regularly), or a particular denomination (the Baptist Church, the Catholic Church, etc.) has to do with the love of, or worship of, or belief

Not necessarily

In Austin, Texas, the militant athiest and independently wealthy Madalyn Murray (now O'Hair) has organized the Poor Richard's Universal Life Church. Mrs. O'Hair is best remembered, of course, for the sympathetic (and legal) support she received from the United States Supreme Court in 1963 to protect her poor little boy in public school from being offended by school

But now Mrs. O'Hair, who boasts her use of four-letter words ("They're direct, aren't they?") and Mr. O'Hair, who is proud of his ability to consume alcohol ("I'm very raw this morning, so I'm drinking straight gin") operate a "church." To procure the trappings commensurate with their grave responsibilities as "church" leaders, both of the O'Hairs obtained \$20 "doctor of divinity" degrees by mail. Thus, Mr. became Bishop, or the Rev. Dr. Richard O'Hair, while Madalyn adopted a more restrained title of Reverend O'Hair. With this and nothing more in hand, however, the Murray-O'Hair's with no building, no congregation, no theology except for the apparent belief that religion is bad for people, applied for and claim to have received tax-exempt status from I.R.S.

It seems to us that for the protection of those who indeed do worship God "in spirit and in truth," steps should be taken to eliminate the imposters. You cannot put the label "malted milk" on a bottle of arsenic; you cannot write a check for \$1,000 if you have nothing in the bank; you cannot sell beef if the meat, in fact, came from the carcass of a horse. We suggest that the fakes, frauds and phonies who call themselves "ministers," "priests," or "rabbis" when they are, in fact, nothing of the sort, should be dispatched to the same place we send other crooks-to jail.

Timing of irrigations is the key factor for top corn yields. "Irrigating at the proper time will increase corn yields more than either the number or amount of applications," says Leon New, area irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

During the past growing season, the Extension Service and the Texas Sesame Division of Paris Milling Co. teamed up with seven corn producers in the Muleshoe area to pinpoint irrigation procedures that are most effective in growing high

"Plant moisture stress occuring after the 10-leaf stage and through the milk stage of kernel development will limit yields severely," points out New. "In the study, highest yields were produced in fields where three rather than two irrigations were applied during this 30-35 day critical moisture period. Yields were as much as 36 bushels per acre more and averaged 21 bushels more where three irrigations were applied."

The first of the three irrigations in the study was applied by the 10 to 12-leaf stage, the second, during the tasseling to silking and the third, during the blister to milk stage of early grain development. Yields were 150 bushels per acre in four yields that received three irrigations during these periods of

"Plant moisture stress prior to the 10-leaf stage and later during the dough stages of grain development will also cut yields," according to New, "but normally not as much as during these peak moisture requirement periods." "In years of light early rainfall, an irrigation by the eight-leaf stage has been profitable. An irrigation during the dough stage has generally always been a profitable application as in this test."

The highest yield of the bushels per acre was produced with five irrigations. Number of irrigations varied from four to seven and yields ranged from 120 to 156 bushels per acre. Both the highest and lowest yields were produced from five irrigations. Time of application was one of the main reasons for the yield difference. One hundred thirty-two bushels were produced using only four timely irrigations. This practice produced the highest average yield per irrigation with 33 bushels. Highest yield with seven irrigations was 150 bushels. This averaged 22 bushels per irrigation,

"Using four irrigations, the best yield response was obtained from application at 8 to 10 leaves, tasseling, blister to milk stage, and dough stage," "With five irrigations, application intervals were a little less, beginning by the eightleaf stage and following at 12 to 14 leaves, tasseling, blister to milk stage and dough stage. Best response was received when the irrigation interval between the tassel and blister to milk irrigation was 12 to 14 days."

Individual irrigation amounts ranged from two to seven inches. Lighter, more frequent applications such as the alternate row method stood out as efficient water management There was no evident benefit from the larger

The specialist contends that good corn yields can be produced using smaller amounts of irrigation water. Twelve inches of summer irrigation were applied using six alternate furrow applications with a 150-bushel yield. Irrigation intervals were 15 to 20 days between the first and second and fifth and sixth irrigations but only 10 to 12 days between the 10-leaf to milk stage. The irrigation at pollination followed in only seven days. The test's top yields of 156 bushels was produced using a total of 16 inches of summer irrigation. Seasonal irrigation amounts ranged from 12 inches up to about 30 inches. Higher yields were produced using both small and large quantitles of water, but the higher water use was also more costly.

"Although production potential between fields varied due to factors other than irrigation, water management procedures for minimizing production costs and conserving water are evi-

When corn is grown for silage, adequate soil moisture prior to the 8 to 10-leaf stage is more important for good early vegetative growth. The first irrigation should be applied early



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

The inscription on the 18 x 28inch marker reads:

NEAR ROUTE OF CORONADO EXPEDITION One of first explorations of North America by Spain began in Mexico, crossing into Texas at or near present Parmer County. The party, led by Francisco Vasquez de Coronado, was sent to investigate reports of great wealth among the Indians. In one city, Quivira, the ruler reputedly ate from Gold Plates. After entering Texas, Coronado and 36 men separated from the main group and continued

In August, 1541, on the present Kansas-Nebraska line, he found Quivira -- an ordinary Indian

After the winter of 1541-42, he returned to Mexico.

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




