

Saturday is another important election day in Friona and Parmer County.

We hope that everyone will avail themselves of this voting opportunity, and take the small amount of time it takes to cast their ballot.

Those who think that their vote doesn't count for very much need only recall the recent Friona city election, in which only two or three votes one way or the other could have thrown the mayor's race into a runoff.

This is also a good argument against wasting a vote by writing in someone's name just as a joke.

There are many instances in which elections have been won or lost by a single vote, so it behooves voters to be serious when they mark their ballots.

Across the state, there has not been the interest in the primary election this year as there has on the average.

This is due in part to the fact that there is no opposition to Governor Preston Smith for the Democratic nomination.

However, the U. S. Senate race, between Ralph Yarborough and Lloyd Bentsen has begun to stir up more than passing interest, and this year for a change many of the lesser state officials have opponents in the primary.

Some of the races, such as for Railroad Commissioner and Land Commissioner, might turn out to be real interesting.

Many voters have become dissatisfied with some of these officials, and with qualified opponents, we might see some new faces in some offices come next January 1.

Naturally, the race that ought to cause a big turnout in Parmer County is the County Judge's race, between W. L. (Preach) Edelman and Archie Tarter. It hasn't been a heated race, with each candidate campaigning quietly, but it should be enough of a reason to bring the voters out on Saturday to register their preferences.

Saturday will also be precinct convention day, and will offer citizens another opportunity to exercise their rights as citizens in a democracy.

You may have read about a week ago about the \$2 million fire at the University of Kansas, Lawrence, in which the Student Union Building burned, apparently by arsonists.

Friona City Manager Jake Outland attended a city manager's school in Lawrence a day or so after the fire, and the convention had to be moved on account of the fire. It had been scheduled to be held in the building that burned.

Outland said it was his second trip to the Lawrence campus. The other time had been in the late 30s for a football game.

"Naturally, the campus had changed quite a bit. However, the most noticeable change was in the students," Outland said. The city manager explained that the big majority of the students were of the long-hair variety, as opposed to the clean-cut type students that we are accustomed to seeing.

City Manager Outland said it was brought out at the school that city residents are beginning to take standard services such as water, sewer and trash for granted.

The trend seems to be, he said, to carry the social problems to city hall.

CROW TO BUILD

New Slaughter Plant Announced For City

A contract has been signed here for the construction of a federally-approved custom meat processing plant.

W.S. (Red) Crow, custom meat processor in Friona for the past 20 years, announced that Malcolm Hinkle Refrigeration Company of Amarillo will build the new facility, which will be located south of the Santa Fe Railway, west off State Highway 214.

Construction is to begin immediately, and will be completed by September 1. Cost of the new facility will be \$150,000. It will contain 4500 square feet of floor space.

The announcement adds to the already-impressive building projects for the city of Friona this year. Building permits for the first quarter of 1970 stood at \$1,228,375, and included a new building for Friona State Bank, and a 60-unit apartment complex.

VOTE SATURDAY

County Judge Race Primary Highlight

A race for the county judge nomination should spur a better than average turnout in Parmer County for the Democratic Primary election on Saturday.

W.L. (Preach) Edelman opposes Archie Tarter in the county judge race. Tarter has served as judge for the past two years, having been appointed to fill out Loyde Brewer's term following his death late in 1967.

The Edelman-Tarter race is the only one of county-wide nature, although Precinct 4 has two candidates for commissioner, namely J.D. Carpenter and Raymond G. Treider, Jr.

Another race which has stirred up some voter interest is the nomination for United States senator, where the incumbent, Ralph Yarborough, is opposed by Lloyd Bentsen.

Bentsen was a slow starter, but his campaign has now generated a challenge to Yarborough, the senior senator.

Other interesting statewide races have developed. Three men are seeking the nomination for Land Commissioner. They are Bob Armstrong, Fred Williams, and Jerry Sadler, the incumbent.

David H. Brown is contesting incumbent Crawford C. Martin for the nomination for attorney-general.

Ben Ramsey, the current Railroad Commissioner, also has an opponent--Connie Lawson.

In the race for associate justice, place 3 to the Texas Supreme Court, there is another three-man race. Matt Davis, James G. Denton and Hawthorne Phillips are the candidates.

State Senator Jack Hightower is unopposed for re-election; as are Representative Bill Clayton and District Judge Pat Boone, Jr.

County officials running for re-election who are unopposed, are Mrs. Dorothy Quicke, district clerk; Mrs. Bonnie Warren, county clerk; and Mabel Reynolds, county treasurer.

Charlie Jefferson, commissioner for the Bovina-Rhea area is unopposed, as are Justice of Peace candidates J.R. Thornton, Frances Euler and Wilbur Charles.

Nelson Welch is unopposed for county Democratic chairman; and precinct chairmen on the ballot are Herschel Johnson (2); Dolph Moten (3); Albert Smith (4); Wylie Bullock (5); Wendol Christian (6); Raymond Schueler (7); and Otho Whitefield (8).

No name is on the ballot for precinct 1.

MBP Moves Main Office

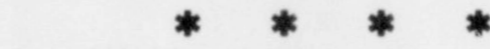
Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. announced last week that the company will establish executive offices in Amarillo.

Just Two Contests In GOP Primary

Republicans will hold a primary in Parmer County on Saturday, with five precinct polling places. Only two contested races are on the GOP ballot this year.

Contesting for the Republican nomination for Governor are Paul Eggers, the 1968 nominee, and Roger Martin.

In the race for the nomination of United States Senate, George Bush and Robert Morris are running.

The GOP has candidates for all state offices, but none on the county or district level.

Glenn Lust, county Republican chairman, is unopposed for

re-election. Glenn Reeve is a candidate for chairman of the Friona precinct.

Polling places in the county are as follows:

- Friona (for Black, Friona, and Lakeview precincts)--American Legion Building; Bovina (for Bovina and Rhea)--Bovina High School; Farwell--City Hall; Lazbuddie--School Cafeteria; and Oklahoma Lane--Community Building.

Precinct conventions are slated for Friona at 8 p.m.; Bovina at 4 p.m.; Farwell at 1:30 p.m.; Lazbuddie at 4 p.m.; and Oklahoma Lane at 2 p.m.; all on election day.

The Republican County Convention will be held in the District Courtroom in the Court House, Saturday, May 9 at 8 p.m.

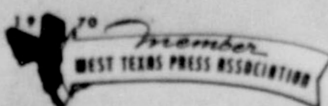

Frauds Of All Sorts Deserve Punishment

We have checked several dictionaries, and there appears to be common agreement that a "church," whether a building (the Lord's house), or public worship (he goes to church regularly), or a particular denomination (the Baptist Church, the Catholic Church, etc.) has to do with the love of, or worship of, or belief in God.

Not necessarily.

In Austin, Texas, the militant atheist and independently wealthy Madalyn Murray (now O'Hair) has organized the Poor Richard's Universal Life Church. Mrs. O'Hair is best remembered, of course, for the sympathetic (and legal) support she received from the United States Supreme Court in 1963 to protect her poor little boy in public school from being offended by school prayers.

But now Mrs. O'Hair, who boasts her use of four-letter words ("They're direct, aren't they?") and Mr. O'Hair, who is proud of his ability to consume alcohol ("I'm very raw this morning, so I'm drinking straight gin") operate a "church." To procure the trappings commensurate with their grave responsibilities as "church" leaders, both of the O'Hairs obtained \$20 "doctor of divinity" degrees by mail. Thus, Mr. became Bishop, or the Rev. Dr. Richard O'Hair, while Madalyn adopted a more restrained title of Reverend O'Hair. With this and nothing more in hand, however, the Murray-O'Hair's with no building, no congregation, no theology except for the apparent belief that religion is bad for people, applied for and claim to have received tax-exempt status from I.R.S.

It seems to us that for the protection of those who indeed do worship God "in spirit and in truth," steps should be taken to eliminate the imposters. You cannot put the label "malted milk" on a bottle of arsenic; you cannot write a check for \$1,000 if you have nothing in the bank; you cannot sell beef if the meat, in fact, came from the carcass of a horse. We suggest that the fakes, frauds and phonies who call themselves "ministers," "priests," or "rabbis" when they are, in fact, nothing of the sort, should be dispatched to the same place we send other crooks--to jail.

LOCAL CHAPTER FORMED Opportunity Plan Has Aided 16 Local Kids

(Editor's note: Friona has begun a local chapter of Opportunity Plan, Inc., and will conduct a drive within the next three weeks for funds.)

In the 16 years of operations of OPI, 16 students from Friona have been sponsored by the plan. They have borrowed a total of \$13,766.35. They have repaid \$12,414.54. Ten of the students have completely repaid their loans. The remaining six owe \$1,351.81; of these, three are still in school.

If the Friona Fund grows as its committee hopes, the number of students from the area who receive college degrees or complete technical or vocational training programs will increase greatly.

Three West Texas State University students from Friona, being sponsored by the Opportunity Plan, Inc., strongly recommend the plan. Karen Agee, Mollie Seright, and Billy Nazworth report success in financing their college program.

Karen Agee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Maynard Agee, a 1967 Friona graduate is now a junior. She is majoring in elementary education. In addition to her school work, Karen usually works part-time keeping her educational debt as low as possible. She sees the Opportunity Plan as insurance. In case she does not receive federal money or earn money enough, she can rely on a loan from C.P.I. Karen says, "I realize that if it hadn't been for C.P.I. I couldn't have furthered my education. There is just no way I could have worked my way through school without some help."

Mollie Seright, a 1969 graduate, started to college last summer and is now a sophomore majoring in Spanish and speech. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H.A. Seright. She says, "The Opportunity Plan is just wonderful a real good plan."

Mollie advises high school students, "If you need financial help to go to school be sure to look into all the possibilities, especially the Opportunity Plan." She adds that the plan is real good and probably would be able to help a deserving student.

Billy Nazworth, a freshmen accounting major, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J.R. Nazworth of the Black Community. Billy says, "C.P.I. is a great idea. It really saved me." Discussing some of the problems of college life, Billy advises, "When everything else seems in a mess and you are about to worry yourself to death, C.P.I. gives you a secure feeling, a feeling you wouldn't have if you were trying to make your money as you went. It's something you can count on." Billy likes having someone to help him with budgeting and scheduling. "The biggest cost of college is living," he says. Of C.P.I. he feels, "It has financed me so far and I hope to stay on it."

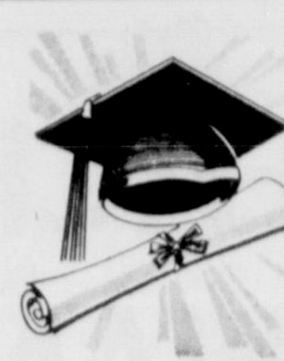

Outland Attends Nat'l City Managers School

A.L. (Jake) Outland, the city manager of Friona, has just returned from attending the 23rd Annual City Managers School sponsored by the University of Kansas, Lawrence, and cooperating agencies. The three-day School was held April 22-24 at the Ramada Inn in Lawrence (a last-minute change necessitated by partial destruction of the Kansas Student Union on April 20.)

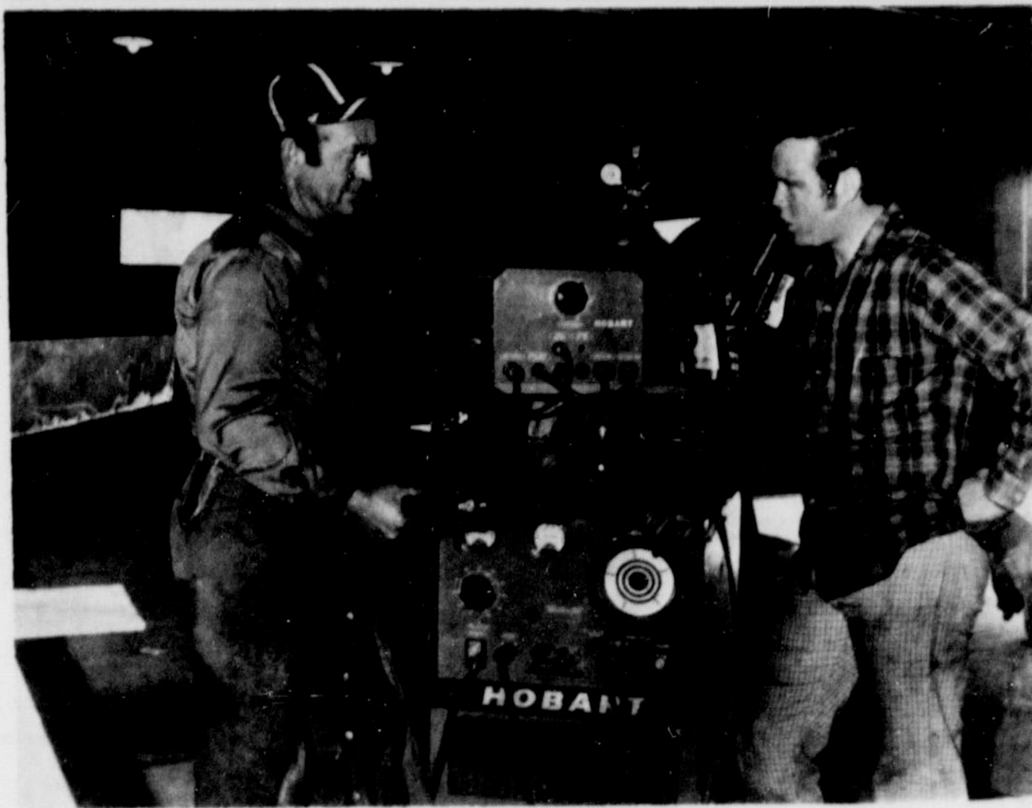
The theme of this year's City Managers School was "The City Manager and the Crisis of Confidence in Local Government." Such topics as the nature of this problem, the expectation of citizens, service demands, new technology, and the problem of citizen representation

in local government were among the many subjects covered in the course of the School's program. These subjects are of great concern in Friona as well as nation-wide, and their presence on the program enabled Outland to gain a great deal of viewpoints from others at the School as well as to make a valuable contribution to the general sessions.

This year the School experimented with a new, unstructured format that placed primary emphasis on small-group discussions, open panel discussions, and input from an impressive group of resource persons. Out-of-state speakers and resource persons at the School included David Burkhalter, city manager of Springfield, Missouri, and the President of the International City Management Association, (ICMA); Philip Kronenberg, Director of the Institute of Public Administration at Indiana University; Fred Fisher, Director of the Professional Development Center at ICMA Headquarters in Washington, D.C.; Clyde Wingfield, McElvany, Professor of Political Science at Southern Methodist University, Dallas; and Gerold Fox, City Manager of Wichita Falls, Texas.

Each registrant at the School was assigned to small groups for more individual participation and the chance to exchange viewpoints with city managers from other cities. The interplay between city officials representing other areas of the country and of varying populations was particularly valuable and has suggested new ideas that may be appropriate for use here in Friona.

Over 120 persons attended the 1970 City Managers School, and represented cities in 16 different states. Included in the attendance were city managers, assistants, University professors representing the University of Kansas public administration program, elected officials, and city management graduate students. The professionalism, dynamism, and free exchange of ideas was most beneficial, both to Friona specifically and to the field of public administration generally.

On The Farm In Parmer County

Timing of irrigations is the key factor for top corn yields. "Irrigating at the proper time will increase corn yields more than either the number or amount of applications," says Leon New, area irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

During the past growing season, the Extension Service and the Texas Sesame Division of Paris Milling Co. teamed up with seven corn producers in the Muleshoe area to pinpoint irrigation procedures that are most effective in growing high corn yields.

"Plant moisture stress occurring after the 10-leaf stage and through the milk stage of kernel development will limit yields severely," points out New. "In the study, highest yields were produced in fields where three rather than two irrigations were applied during this 30-35 day critical moisture period. Yields were as much as 36 bushels per acre more and averaged 21 bushels more where three irrigations were applied."

The first of the three irrigations in the study was applied by the 10 to 12-leaf stage, the second, during the tasseling to silking and the third, during the blister to milk stage of early grain development. Yields were 150 bushels per acre in four yields that received three irrigations during these periods of plant growth.

"Plant moisture stress prior to the 10-leaf stage and later during the dough stages of grain development will also cut yields," according to New, "but normally not as much as during these peak moisture requirement periods." "In years of light early rainfall, an irrigation by the eight-leaf stage has been profitable. An irrigation during the dough stage has generally always been a profitable application as in this test."

The highest yield of the bushels per acre was produced with five irrigations. Number of irrigations varied from four to seven and yields ranged from 120 to 156 bushels per acre. Both the highest and lowest yields were produced from five irrigations. Time of application was one of the main reasons for the yield difference. One hundred thirty-two bushels were produced using only four timely irrigations. This practice produced the highest average yield per irrigation with 33 bushels. Highest yield with seven irrigations was 150 bushels. This averaged 22 bushels per irrigation.

"Using four irrigations, the best yield response was obtained from application at 8 to 10 leaves, tasseling, blister to milk stage, and dough stage." "With five irrigations, application intervals were a little less, beginning by the eight-leaf stage and following at 12 to 14 leaves, tasseling, blister to milk stage and dough stage. Best response was received when the irrigation interval between the tassel and blister to milk irrigation was 12 to 14 days."

Individual irrigation amounts ranged from two to seven inches. Lighter, more frequent applications such as the alternate row method stood out as efficient water management procedures. There was no evident benefit from the larger applications.

The specialist contends that good corn yields can be produced using smaller amounts of irrigation water. Twelve inches of summer irrigation were applied using six alternate furrow applications with a 150-bushel yield. Irrigation intervals were 15 to 20 days between the first and second and fifth and sixth irrigations but only 10 to 12 days between the 10-leaf to milk stage. The irrigation at pollination followed in only seven days. The test's top yields of 156 bushels was produced using a total of 16 inches of summer irrigation. Seasonal irrigation amounts ranged from 12 inches up to about 30 inches. Higher yields were produced using both small and large quantities of water, but the higher water use was also more costly.

"Although production potential between fields varied due to factors other than irrigation, water management procedures for minimizing production costs and conserving water are evident."

When corn is grown for silage, adequate soil moisture prior to the 8 to 10-leaf stage is more important for good early vegetative growth. The first irrigation should be applied early enough to prevent moisture stress. All irrigations may then be slightly earlier than for grain, according to New.

With the census being taken now, I found some information that you might be interested in reading. The Census Board in Washington can graphically present what's happening to our population by seconds. This "Census Clock" recently showed some interesting figures:

- 1 birth every 9 seconds
- 1 death every 16-1/2 seconds
- 1 immigrant arrives every 60 seconds
- 1 immigrant leaves every 23 seconds

The net going in all this coming and going is:

- 1 person every 15-1/2 seconds
- 5,574 persons every day
- 2,035,510 persons every year

Some of you have asked about a Baked Deviled Egg Recipe. I found this one to share with you.

BAKED DEVILED EGGS
Shell and cut 6 hard-cooked eggs lengthwise. Remove the yolks and set aside whites. Mash yolks and blend in 3 tablespoons sour cream, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard and 1/4 teaspoons salt.
Fill whites with this yolk mixture. (You may want to use your own special recipe for fixing deviled eggs.)
To prepare the sauce--
Saute--1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/3 cup chopped onion
in 2 tablespoons margarine.
Remove from the heat and stir in--
1/4 cup chopped pimento
1 can of cream of mushroom soup
1 cup sour cream.
Place half of the sauce in a shallow, 1-1/2 quart casserole. Add eggs, cut-side up, in a single layer. Pour the remaining sauce over the eggs.
Sprinkle 1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese over the top.
Bake in a preheated 350 degrees oven for 20 minutes or until the dish is thoroughly heated. Remove from the oven and allow to stand 5 minutes before serving. This recipe makes 6 servings.

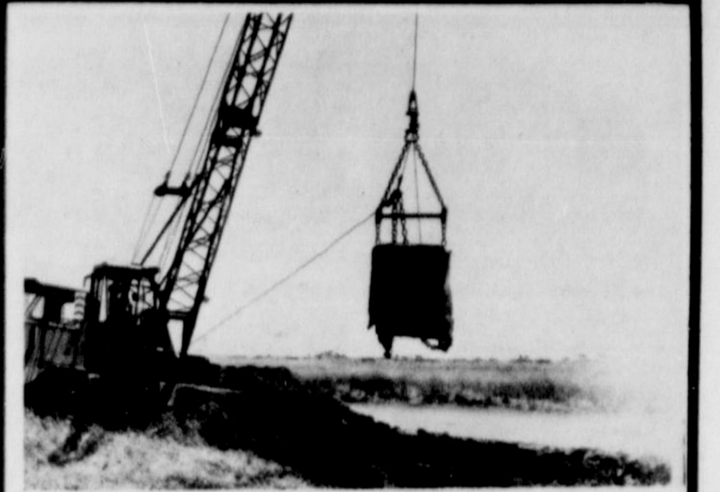

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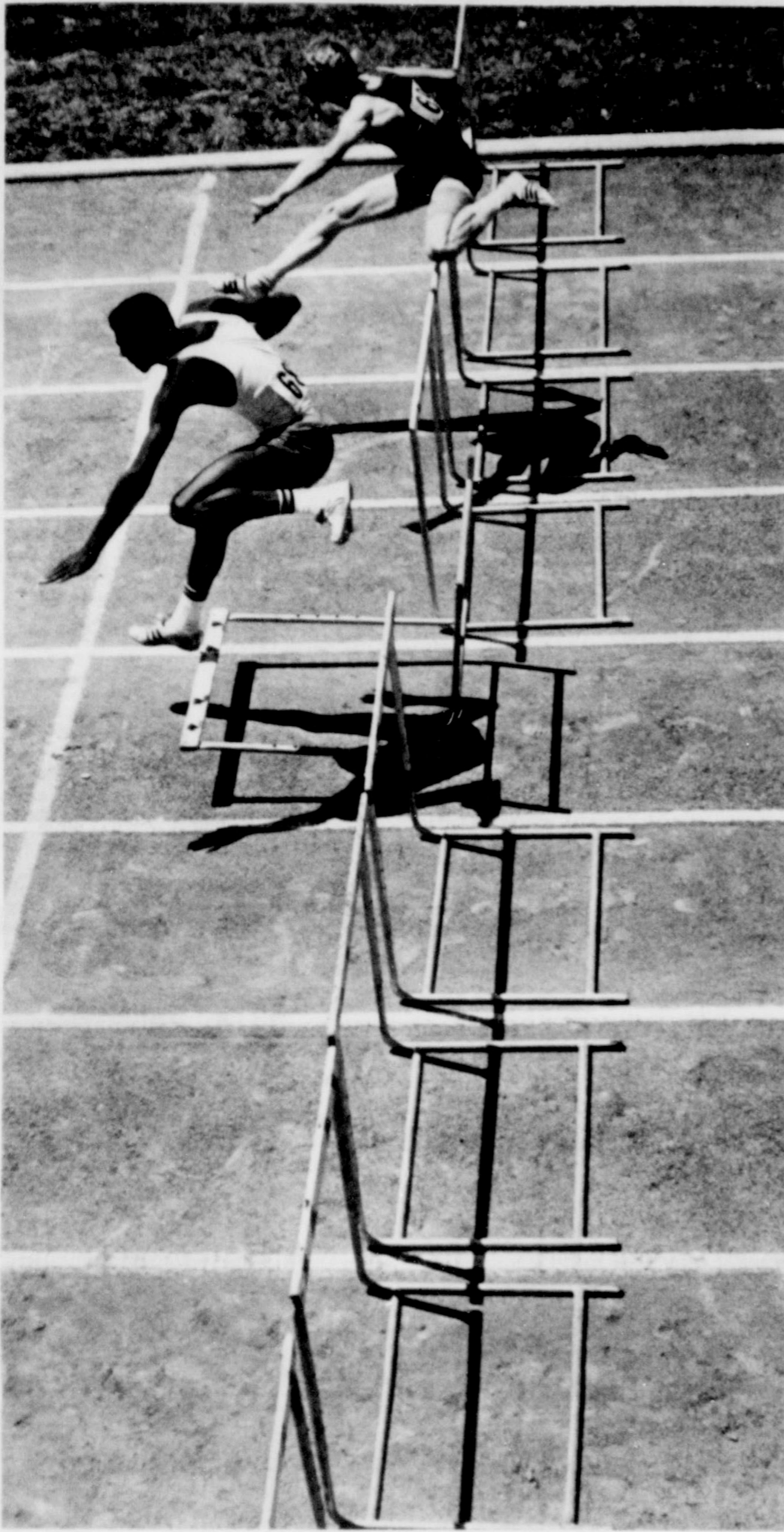

THREE EVENTS

Longhorns Qualify Two To State Meet

Lazbuddie Longhorns qualified for three events at the state track and field meet next week, in action at the Region I meet last Friday and Saturday in Lubbock.

Monte Barnes will enter two of the events, the discus throw and shot put. Barnes won the discus event at Lubbock with a toss of 138 feet, three inches. He placed second in the shot put at 45-5-3/4, behind Jerry Guffey of Booker.

Charles Lee, the defending

state champion in the 120-yard high hurdles, was edged by Robert Benton of Whiteface in a new record time in the event. Lee still qualifies for the state meet, however.

Benton won the race at 14.8, which eclipses the class B regional record of 14.9 set eight years ago by Lazbuddie's Jimmy Seaton. Lee's time Saturday equalled Seaton's old record. At the state meet last year, Lee ran a 14.5.

Lee had beaten Benton all year, but was edged out this

time by an eyelash. It marked the second time this season the Lazbuddie flash had lost a race.

Also scoring points for the Longhorns were Larry Hodges, who placed fifth in the high jump with a leap of 5-8, and Dan Dawson, who was fifth in the intermediate hurdles.

The Longhorns, who were defending champions, scored a total of 30 points to place sixth in a field of 32 teams.

Barnes was only an alternate to the regional meet in the discus, but gained the right to compete. His win was Lazbuddie's lone first place.

Also taking part in the regional meet, but failing to place, were Dawson in the long jump; Jimmy Noland in the shot put, and the sprint relay team composed of Lee, Arthur Graves, Hodges and Dawson.

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours, and to acquaint the people of Parmer County with their own unique historical past.

The inscription on the 18 x 28-inch marker reads:

NEAR ROUTE OF CORONADO EXPEDITION One of first explorations of North America by Spain began in Mexico, crossing into Texas at or near present Parmer County.

The party, led by Francisco Vasquez de Coronado, was sent to investigate reports of great wealth among the Indians. In one city, Quivira, the ruler reportedly ate from Gold Plates.

After entering Texas, Coronado and 36 men separated from the main group and continued north.

In August, 1541, on the present Kansas-Nebraska line, he found Quivira--an ordinary Indian village.

After the winter of 1541-42, he returned to Mexico.

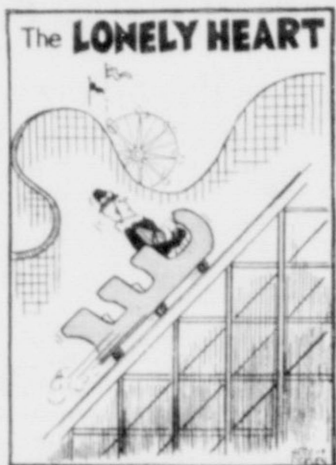
Art Sale To Aid Scholarship

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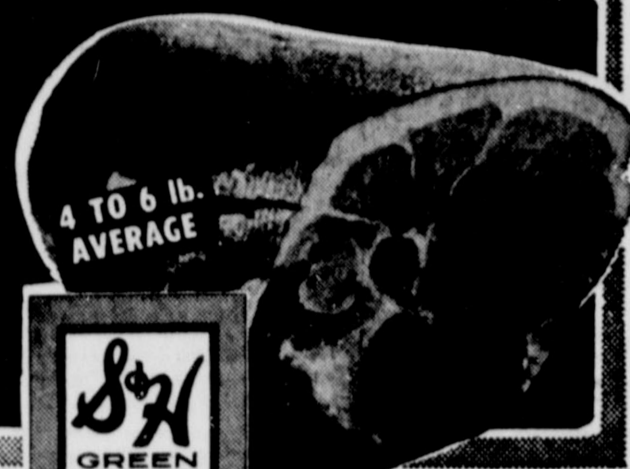
