

#### FEDERAL QUARANTINE REGULATIONS

As there is considerable misunderstanding of the result of the supreme court decision in the Kentucky case recently with regard to the federal live stock quarantine line, Dr. A. D. Melvin, chief of the bureau of animal industry, has issued a statement as to the effects of the decision which will be read with interest. Dr. Melvin says:

"These cases arose and were decided under the act of congress of February 2, 1903. The supreme court did not pass on the constitutionality of the act of February 2, 1903, but held that on account of the form of the order of the secretary of agriculture, the verdict of the lower court would have to be reversed. In anticipation of the decision of the supreme court in these cases, an act entitled 'an act to enable the secretary of agriculture to establish and maintain quarantine districts to permit and regulate the movement of cattle and other live stock therefrom and other purposes,' was approved and became a law March 3, 1905. This act of March 3, 1905, virtually repeals and supersedes the act of February 2, 1903, under which the case referred to arose, and new orders controlling the quarantine of live stock have been issued by the secretary of agriculture. The President in a special message to congress at that time said:

"The right of the secretary of agriculture to regulate the interstate movement of animals exposed to any cattle disease must be recognized if the spread of such disease from state to state and to other countries is to be prevented, and yet this right has recently been attacked in two cases recently filed in the supreme court of the United States, and the secretary of agriculture is advised that the court may hold that the existing law is not sufficiently clear as to the steps which may be taken to accomplish this object."

"The practical effects of this decision is that hereafter the rules and regulations of the secretary of agriculture governing the quarantine of live stock must be confined in terms to interstate commerce; if a portion of a state be quarantined, the federal government can only control the movement of live stock from the quarantined part of the state to another state or territory, and must look to the state government to prevent the movement from the quarantined part of the same state. There will be some verbal changes in the quarantine regulations of the secretary to conform to the decision of the supreme court in these cases, and the department will be compelled to insist that any state, a portion of which is quarantined shall be absolutely prevented from the movement of live stock between the quarantined and non-quarantined parts of the state."

#### SHOULD BECOME A LAW

The bill introduced by Congressman Randell, of Sherman, is explained in the caption, and is a measure that should be speedily enacted into law. The bill is as follows:

A bill to prevent senators and representatives in congress and senators and representatives-elect from serving or receiving pay from public service corporations and other persons as officer, representative, agent, attorney, and providing penalties therefor.

tatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, that it shall be unlawful for any senator or representative in the congress of the United States during his term of service or for any such senator or representative-elect to directly or indirectly hold or take any office, employment or service, or to receive any salary, fee or pay as officer, agent, representative or attorney from any railroad company, national bank, ship company, express company, telegraph company, telephone company, sleeping car company, insurance company or public service corporation, or any corporation chartered by an act of the congress of the United States, or any firm, company or corporation organized or conducted in violation of the anti-trust laws of the United States, or any corporation engaged in interstate or foreign commerce, traffic or business between any territory or any state or territory, or between the District of Columbia and any state or territory of the United States or any foreign power, or any person, firm or corporation interested in legislation or other

Section 2. That any senator or representative in congress violating any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a high misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$5,000 and by imprisonment of not less than one month, nor more than one year, and shall be forever barred from holding any office of honor or trust under the government of the United States.

A bill of similar import should be introduced and passed under the emergency rule as soon as the state legislature is in session. Senator Bailey declares if he is re-elected he intends to do in the future as he has done in the past, and a law of this kind would be notice to him and those who come after him that the great state of Texas proposes to put a stop to the Bailey practices for the future.

#### PACKERS FAVOR STEPHENS BILL

The packing interests of the country are greatly pleased with the bill introduced in congress by Congressman Stephens, of Texas, for the purpose of extending the meat trade of the United States thru reciprocal commercial agreements. The bill proposes to give the President authority to reduce the tariff on foreign goods not extensively produced or manufactured in this country, provided countries so favored will admit American meats free of duty. A leading representative of the packing industry says of the Stephens bill:

"Such an arrangement would undoubtedly materially enlarge the market for American meats, and it seems to me the proper basis on which to do business. If we expect favors from a person or a nation, it is only fair that we should do favors in return, provided it does not injure us, and as I understand the main ideas of Mr. Stephens' bill, he does not purpose to bring our manufactured goods into competition with those of other countries. If other countries have goods we do not make in any considerable quantities, it strikes me it would be a good bargain to admit them under a reduced tariff if these countries will in turn admit our meats, or any other products for that matter, duty free.

"The depressing effects of the recent agitation against American packing house products have, I believe, spent their force, and the past year has shown greater exports of meat and live stock than any year in the history of the country. With some such arrangement as Mr. Stephens purposes, which will do away with all excuses for tariff reprisals by countries discriminated against in any way, the business should grow to still more immense proportions."

The cattlemen of Texas are deeply interested in this matter and disposed to push the reciprocity idea.

President Harvie Jordan is now after the New York cotton exchange with an application for a fraud order to deprive that organization from the use of the United States mails. And while President Harvie Jordan may be somewhat windy on general principles, it cannot be successfully argued that he is not also quite resourceful.

Advices from Washington indicate that Senator Foraker is going to be successful in his move for an investigation of the reasons for the discharge of the negro troops who took part in the Brownsville outrage. And Senator Foraker will be a wiser man at the end of that investigation than he is just at present.

The state legislature meets next Tuesday, and the Bailey matter will soon be up against the real thing. It is morally certain the legislature will take no action without some kind of an investigation.

Fort Worth has just passed thru one of the most prosperous years known in all her past history, and standing on the threshold of the New Year, there is not one cloud that bedims the Fort Worth horizon.

There was not a soul to meet Senator Bailey upon his arrival in the city of Austin, and yet his personal organ assures a gullible public that his advent was the occasion for a great ovation.

Texas people are still picking cotton, and those farmers who have finished gathering their crop are preparing to plant more cotton than ever before in the history of the state.






