



The Service will strive through organization and intensive work to provide farm families with assistance and information to enable them to identify and analyze major farm and home problems and opportunities: determine the definite courses of action for producing the best continuing economic returns and family satisfactions; put the plans into operation as rapidly as feasible and make adjustments in the plans as conditions change.

Three types of county operations will be used in carrying out farm and home development in Texas. In most counties there will be no increase in the county staff but some work will be conducted. In 12 counties an associate county agricultural agent will be added to the county staff. In another 12 counties, associate agents in agriculture and home economics will be employed. The associate agents - who will be cooperatively employed with the counties in which they work - will devote full time to this educational effort but will work under the general supervision of the County Extension agents.


What Price Division?



SJR No. 14

Senate Joint Resolution No. 14, prohibits use of the credit of the State or any grant of public money for construction, maintenance or operation of toll roads and turn-

Purpose of this amendment is to write into the Constitution a prohibition now contained in the law, but which could be changed by future legislation.

It has the support of the Texas Good Roads Association and many other people particularly interested in the State Highway System, and no known opposition.

HJR No. 16

House Joint Resolution No. 16, would require women to serve on

There are only five states including Texas which do not permit jury service by women. This amendment would require

women to serve under the same rules for jury service as apply to men. It has the active support of many women's organizations. SJR No. 4

to do with the terms of elective district, county and precinct offices. It would change all of those which have two-year terms into four year

It has the support of the County Judges and Commissioners Associations of the state, and the organizations of many other county officials.

The terms of a great number of district, county and precinct offices would be changed immediately if this amendment were adopted. Other such offices are designated to change to four-year terms in 1956 so that, while all of them would be four-year terms after 1956, only about half of them would appear on the ballot every two years.

Wording of this proposal has resulted in confusion as to its effect on the terms of representatives in the Legislature. Many lawyers are of the opinion that the proposal would require four-year terms for members of the House and other lawyers have said that at least it presents a problem which can only be solved by court interpretation.

SJR No. 2 Senate Joint Resolution No. 2, would authorize creation of county wide hospital districts in Bexar, Dallas, El Paso, Galveston, Harris, Jefferson and Tarrant Counties.

The amendment is permissive and if adopted would not create any such districts itself. It simply provides that the property-owning taxpayers of the named counties can vote on such a proposal at a later date.

An active campaign for this proposal is being carried on by a statewide committee composed of mayors, County judges, members of hospital boards, and prominent citizens of the counties involved and some from other parts of the state.

HJR No. 10 Members of the armed forces of the United States or component branches would be allowed to vote under House Joint Resolution No.

They would be required to pay their poll taxes and could vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.



November 2 general election started October 13 but no one is expecting the peak of interest that saw 1.400 .-000 voters turn out for the Democratic August run-off primary.

However, Governor Allan Shivers said he hoped Texas voters would not by-pass the election.

Besides deciding the official election of political candidates and amendments, votes cast in the election will determine representation at 1956 local political party conventions.

Antitrust Laws

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd has told the Texas Supreme Court that it hindered state efforts to enforce antitrust legislation when it ruled it had no jurisdiction in an El Paso case.

The court decided in July to let the National Labor Relations Board handle the case of Truck Drivers Chauffeurs, Warehousemen and Helpers Local No. 941 against Whitefield Transportation Co.

By reversing decisions of two lower courts against the union and ruling that it did not have jurisdiction, the Supreme Court had the effect "of placing labor unions, as well as employers who conspire in restraint of trade," beyond the jurisdiction and enforcement of the state, argued Shepperd.

Minimum Wage

A state minimum wage law has been advocated as part of a legislative program adopted by the executive board of the State Federation of Labor.

The board favors setting a minimum wage of 75 cents an hour.

It also called for 200 additional state highway patrolmen and an increase over the present \$290 a month pay for a sixty-hour week.

Road Financing

A boost in gasoline taxes and a weight and distance levy on heavy trucks are being considered as ways of providing additional financing for Texas highways.

Pondering the ideas are members of 58 public and private organizations called together by the Texas Highway Commission at the suggestion of Governor Allan Shivers.


