### Veterans' Box

Q—A veteran friend of mine forgot to pay his GI insurance premium when it was due, and he died during the 31-day grace period. Will his beneficiaries receive his insurance proceeds, or are they out of luck?

A—Inasmuch as the grace period had not expired, his beneficiaries will receive the insurance proceeds, minus the unpaid premium.

Q—I am enrolled in a two-year business course under the Korean GI Bill. I understand I am entitled to 30 days' absences a year. If I don't use up all my absences the first year, can I carry over the rest to use in the second year?

A—No. Unused absences may not be carried over from one year to the next. During your second year you still will be allowed no more than 30 days' absences—regardless of how many days you used up your first year.

Q—I bought a house with a GI loan. Recently my house was completely gutted by fire. Would it be possible to have my GI loan rights restored, so that I can buy another house?

A—Yes. It is possible, under the law, to restore your GI loan rights. However, VA must be free from liability on the original loan. Your nearest VA office can provide you with all the details.

Q—I have just been separated from service, and I intend to apply for Korean GI term insurance. What's my deadline?

A—You must apply, and pay your first premium, within 120 days after the date of your separation. Remember, 120 days is not always four calendar months, so be sure you apply within the 120-day period.

### FARM, RANCH AND HOME NEWS

## A LOOK AT FARM AND HOME DEVELOPMENT

G. G. Gibson, Director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service

for the individual farm. Records have a place but are not all important. They will be used to determine progress.

Farm and home development means making the best use of resources, such as land, equipment, labor and production opportunities, along with improved practices to achieve the family's goal. The Agricultural Extension Service has been assigned the responsibility for its initiation. Every group and agency concerned with serving agriculture has an opportunity to make a full contribution.

Farm and home development is an educational method of approach to the total problems of rural living. Furthermore, it is an effort to develop a planned operation which will yield the greatest financial returns and satisfaction for the farm family and at the same time conserve and improve the soil and other resources.

The Service will strive through organization and intensive work to provide farm families with assistance and information to enable them to identify and analyze major farm and home problems and opportunities; determine the definite courses of action for producing the best continuing economic returns and family satisfactions; put the plans into operation as rapidly as feasible and make adjustments in the plans as conditions change.

Basic parts of farm and home development include: a written plan made by the farmer and his family with assistance from the County Extension agents and other trained agricultural workers; following the plan which will be directed toward providing a satisfactory income for the family and at the same time building and conserving the soil and other resources of the farm and developing an understanding of how best to put science to work on the farm. It is an educational job since reliable information—based on research and practical experience—will provide the basis for decision making.

All agencies, based on their resources, have a part in carrying out farm and home development plans

Three types of county operations will be used in carrying out farm and home development in Texas. In most counties there will be no increase in the county staff but some work will be conducted. In 12 counties an associate county agricultural agent will be added to the county staff. In another 12 counties, associate agents in agriculture and home economics will be employed. The associate agents—who will be cooperatively employed with the counties in which they work—will devote full time to this educational effort but will work under the general supervision of the County Extension agents.

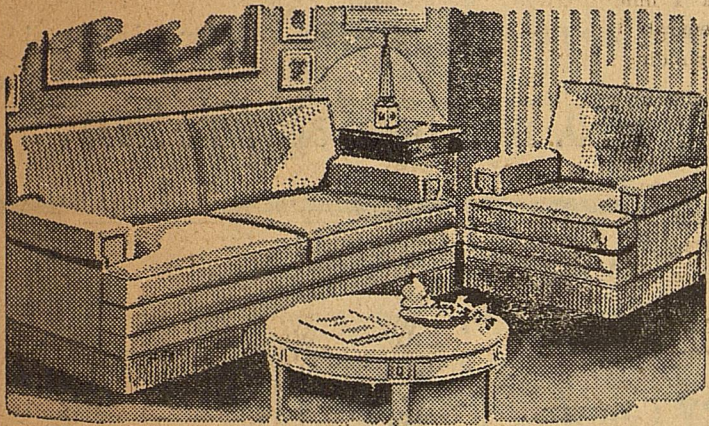
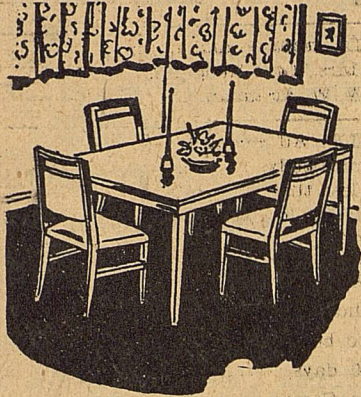

Both have proposed depths of 1,700 feet with rotary.

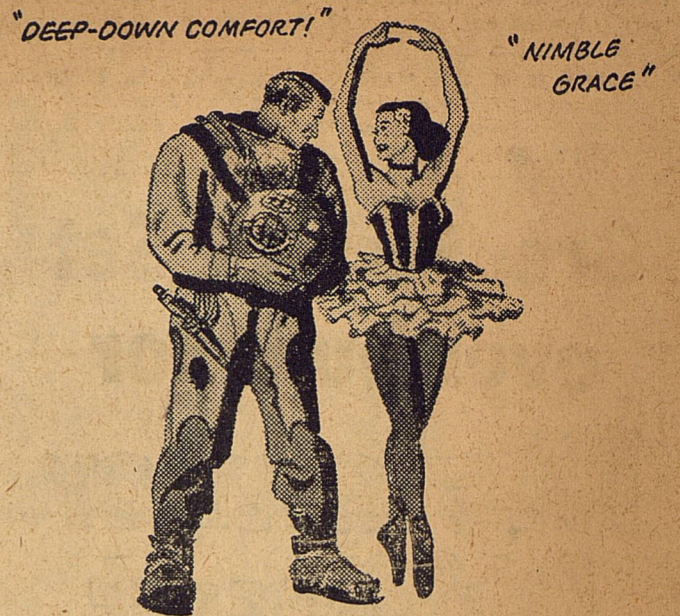
**WCSO To Observe Week Of Prayer Program**
