

### HUMAN LIFE IS PERSONAL Editorial

The growing number of fatal accidents on the streets and highways has engaged the attention of the White House, and soon a serious effort will be made to to do something about it. Last year (1953) a total of 38,300 persons young and old lost their lives in traffic accidents, and the economic loss was placed at 4 billion dollars in hospital and medical costs, property damage and other expenses.

The President's Action Committe for Traffic Safety has designated December 15 as Safe-Driving Day. It will be observed on a Nation-wide basis, under the Committee's sponsorship with the cooperation of various other city, state and national organizations.

Most of the fatalities charged to traffic accidents and much of the property damage and other economic losses could have been prevented if drivers and pedestrians alike would realize their personal responsibility for their own safety as pedestrians, and the safety of themselves and others if they are drivers. Traffic actually is a personal responsibility.

Pedestrians cannot overlook their responsibility in reducing the traffic toll. Following the laws and applying the courtesies of the road to themselves and others will bring this about.

Personal responsibility --- it's as simple as that.

Every once in a while somebody refers to me an non-progressive and I guess if you want to judge a man's thinkin ability by how clean his fields are there might be somthing to it, but that's what comes of taking a superficial

I would like to report that for

the past few years I have been neck and neck with no less an enterprise, than the aviation 3 industry, which everybody knows is progressive. While the avia-

tion industry has been hard at work on faster and faster airplanes, having now reached the point where it has broken through the sound limit, I have not been asleep, figuratively speaking.

My experiment, which probably has more relation to the individual than aviation's, has consisted of attempts to break the

deht limit. I have read of pilot's reports on their wrought-up feelings as they neared the sound limit and then crashed through, and I can report that edging toward the debt

limit and then crashing through is just as nerve-wrecking and perilous.

Furthermore, my experiments have been more independent. I didn't have a government appropriation or inexhaustable funds from a foundation behind me, I've had to do mine on my own, almost on a shoestring, with considerable grumbling from the people in charge of the debt limit.



limit, and then gets worse after you crash through. Some people do not appreciate scientific research.

I understand some people are contending the government, if it keeps on spending, will reach the debt limit, and I've heard of Congressmen trying to pass bills getting the limit extended, and if it can be done, if the limit can be extended every time the government approaches it, it'll be a fine thing, but I've got my doubts. For whatever it's worth, I would like to let the government know there is a debt limit and things are worse on the other side than this

side. The sound barrier is a much safer thing to crash.

The amended law also provides increases for persons who become Typewriter Ribbons - The Review eligible for benefit payments in the future. Beginning with 1955, the amount of covered earnings which may count toward social security will be raised from \$3600 to \$4200 in a year. This provision will make it possible to maintain a closer relationship between the worker's earnings and the benefits he and his family will eventually receive. Another provision in the new law permits a worker to drop out up to five years of lowest (or no) earnings in the figuring of his average monthly wage on which benefit payments will be based. This socalled "drop-out" applies to all workers becoming eligible for benefit payments after August of this year. Some persons now on the benefit rolls may qualify for the drop-out if they acquire at any time 1 1-2 years of covered work after June 1953, or if they become eligible after August 1954 to have their benefits refigured on account of additional earnings.

> The amended law, moreover, provides a new formula for figuring the worker's insurance payment. It increases the percent of his average monthly wage which will be payable in benefits.
