



#### **Bayou Philosopher Favors Pay Raise For Congressmen; Wants Farmers Included, Too**

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou seems to want to attach a rider on the Congressional pay bill, his letter this week reveals. Dear editar:

Being interested in the welfare of the country, which includes the welfare of Congressmen, I naturally have been interested in the efforts being made to increase the salary of the latter up in Washington.

A lot of reasons have been given as to why Congressmen

ought to make more money, that is, more money in their regular gov- , ernment pay, this has no reference to anything that comes in on the side in some cases.

I don't know if Congressmen are as smart as state office holders or not but I know of one or two cases where a state employee can take a \$6,000-a-year salary and in a few years become wealthy, by sheer economy and financial genius, I guess, like turning off the lights at home except the one he's sitting under, at any rate, to get on with what I was saying, out of all the reasons given why Congressmen ought to have their salaries increased, the one I liked best is this:

Living costs have gone up, and it wouldn't do to keep the pay so low that only a rich man could afford to serve in Congress.

Now that makes sense to me, and what I want to know is why don't they spread this idea round to take in other lines of work? For example, take farming. The price of everything a farmer sells has come down, outside of uranium, while the price of everything he buys has stayed high, and it seems to me it'd be bad too for the country to have an agricultural situation where the income is so low only a rich man could afford to farm.

I'm in favor of a Congressman getting paid enough to where a poor one can serve, although I will not go into the technical problem of who's going to decide where the dividing line is, where be held there Friday night and March 5. he gets just enough salary to live and stay poor and not enough to become rich, but I'm also in favor of applying the same rule to farming.

If you agree, I hope you will get in touch with Congress and get my point over. When a pound of beef on the hoof that used to buy two gallons of tractor gas now buys only one, a farmer is left in the same shape as a poor honest Congressman. It will not be healthy for the country to allow law-making in Washington and farming out here on my place to become professions only the rich can afford to engage in. There just ain't enough rich people to carry the burden, not out here, anyway.


Some people contend, with substantial argument, that certain tax arrangements for a certain type of operation are a tax loophole. Those who benefit by it contend it is a ustified concession

The Labor Committee of the Congress has discovered to its great surprise that some of the big union welfare funds are partly or wholly tax-exempt. The Committee now wants to determine if this exemption gives unions the edge on investments. Union investment in business and finance has been on the increase in recent months. The United Mine Workers has an annual contribution to their welfare fund from employers of more than onehundred million dollars. Here in Washington the United Mine Workers, which is run by John L. Lewis, has bought the controlling interest in two of the largest banks in the Nation's Capital The Brotherhood of Electrical Workers has recently purchased a majority of the stock in a big Washington insurance company. The Teamsters' Union has recently bought a million dollars' worth of stock in Montgomery-Ward. What the Committee would like to learn is whether these transactions came from regular union funds or from the tax-free or partly taxed welfare funds.

Ship Subsidy-The bill passed by the Congress last year, in which I had considerable responsibility, permitting the sale of surplus farm commodities for foreign currencies, carried a provision that one-half of such shipments must be made in American ships. This provision of the law came as an amendment, which I opposed.

It now turns out that it is cost-





ing upwards of ten percent more than it would to use ships available in our ports from other countries. It is also delaying the delivery of these sales of surplus commodities. When these commodities are exchanged for the currencies of foreign counrties, we can then use those currencies to purchase critical materials which we are stockpiling for defense of this country. The end result is that by being forced to subsidize American shipping, we are failing to deliver the farm commodities to our customers, and we are failing to stockpile strategic defense materials as rapidly as we should. In addition, the Government continues to pay out more than a half-million dollars a day for storage. FEPC-You remember these letters we heard much about a few years ago - you will recall they stood for Fair Employment Practices Commission. Such a commission would force an employer to hire people against his will. In other words, the employer could not deny work to anyone because of race, creed, color, etc. It seems a way has been found to establish a FEPC without an Act of Congress. The Administration now has a "Committee on Government Contracts". This Committee can deny a Government contract to firms unless they agree not to "discriminate" against any person because of race, religion, color, or national origin. It does not leave the employer the free choice of determining whom he wants to hire. An afterthought - "Where there is enough patience, there is rarely




