The Salk vaccine, made from by Dr. Jonas E. Salk, who announced Tuesday of this week that two shots instead of three, as previously announced, are enough for immunization. The two shots are to be followed in seven months by a booster shot, which he believes will give protection for years and perhaps even for life in some cases.

Dr. Salk emphasized two points: that the vaccine is safe, and that no vaccine has ever been 100 percent effective, so the 80 to 90 percent effective report is quite good. He also pointed out that the vaccine seems to be more effective in older children, six years and older.

The reducing from three to two shots at this time means that many additional people will be able to receive the shots before polio season. With the amount of vaccine Rain, Windstorm on hand, it is estimated that 52 million children can receive the vaccine this year.

Results listed Tuesday were the outcome of last spring's test on 1,800,000 children. The government at 3 p.m. Tueday officially licensed the vaccine

Following release of this favorable report, the Texas State Health Department gave the go ahead signal all over the state.

Students of the first and second grades will receive these shots free of charge, under the direction of the County Health Officer, according to an announcement made here this week by Schol Supt. The U. S. Department of Agriculture had originally dropped this county from the disaster area, effective March 15, of this year, and had granted farmers and ranchers until April 15, to use their drought feed certificates.







Hybrid Grain Sorghums Make Debut In Texas

College Station — Hybrid grain orghums which are expected to increase yields 30 to 40 percent will be grown commercially in Texas this year. It marks the first such production anywhere in the world.

Production during the 1955 growng season, however, will be limited to one-acre crossing plots on several selected farms. Foundation seed stocks will go to seed growers in 1956 and the new hybrids will be available for large scale planting n 1957

Development of grain sorghum lybrids has been underway since 1927 at the Chillicothe substation of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station by J. Roy Quinby and C. Stephens. Dr. N. W. Kramer and R. E. Karper of the Lubbock substation also have contributed to the research.

There is an oddity in the new hybrids. Due to the percentage of hybrids farmers will plant white seed but harvest red grain.

Thursday, April 14, 1955 | Accidental Poisoning Death Figures Released

Austin-For the first time the Naonal Office of Vital Statistics has issued tabulations of fatal accidental poisonings by age, sex, and kind of poison, said Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health officer. A total of 1,497 such accidental deaths occured in one year.


Petroleum products (including kerosene) and aspirin and salicylates were involved in 40 percent of the deaths in infants through 4 years of age, 165 such deaths. Dr. Holle declared this indicated that parents are not as aware of the dangers of these substances as they are of such substances as lye, iodine, phenol or strychnine. It should also be pointed out that three out of four fatal child poisonings occur at ages 1 to 2. This indicates that prevention of these accidents involves keeping poisons away from children rather than teaching them about poisons

Any item that can be poisonous should be kept out of reach of children. This includes medicines, and many other items. Adults label to make sure the medicine you wanted is not something pois-






