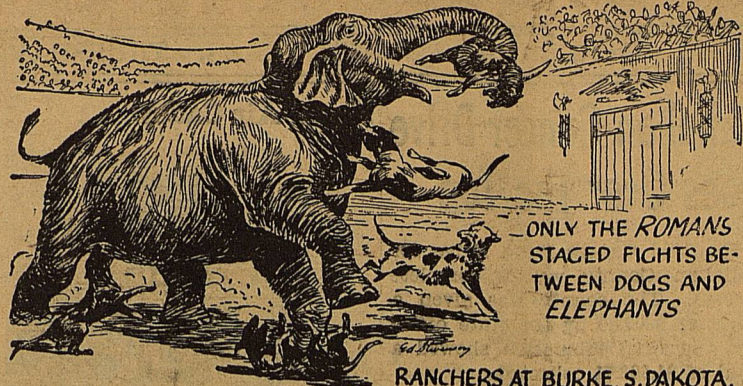

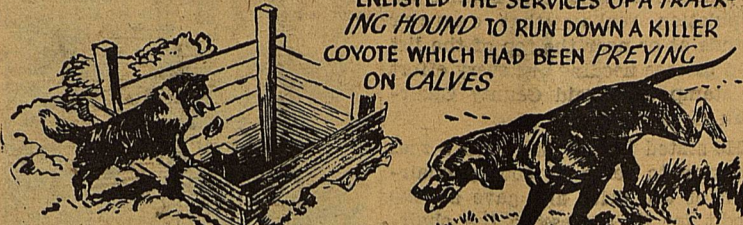

state officials testifying in the Senate phase of the Land Office investigations.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert and State Auditor C. H. Cavness were the witnesses.

Cavness showed a form used by Giles to request funds for loans. Bearing the seal of the land board, the form carried no signature other than Giles'.

"Nothing came to us to cause us to have any suspicions," Cavness said, adding that he had assumed the deals had been approved by a majority of the three-member board.

Governor Shivers and Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd recently have made affidavits to the effect that they were absent from board meetings on certain dates when the minutes cited that they were present.

From San Antonio, the district attorney's office announced it was demanding the maximum 10-year prison term for Giles, in his scheduled trial on charges of accepting a \$30,000 bribe. Also that C. V. Wynn and Arthur McKenzie of San Antonio, charged with offering the bribe, would "turn state's evidence" against Giles.

Week end discussion of a further postponement of the trial was based on the reported employment of an unnamed member of the Legislature as counsel. This is automatic grounds for continuance until 30 days after adjournment of the legislature.

Q. I have been out of military service for a year and a half. If I apply for disability compensation, is there any chance that my payments could be made retroactive to the date of my discharge?

A. No. For veterans who wait longer than one year to apply, compensation payments may be made retroactive only to the date of the application. For those who file within one year's time, it is possible for payments to become effective as of the day after discharge from service.

Q. My three-year starting deadline for Korean GI training is coming close. I want to apply for a correspondence course. What does VA consider as the starting date of the course?

A. The starting date of your correspondence course is the date the school sends you your first lesson.

Q. Is it possible to convert Korean GI term insurance to permanent plans? I understand this could be done with World War II GI insurance. I am not a disabled veteran.

A. Under the law, Korean GI of the Duval County area, has been transferred to Austin.

Sen. Wm. H. Moore of Bryan has pending in the Senate a resolution to investigate Southwest Conference athletic recruiting, following accusations against A. and M. College.

A Senate committee struck from the House-passed "unfair sales" bill authority for a trade association to sue a merchant for selling goods below cost. Sponsors said they wanted that proviso because an individual merchant might hesitate to sue—and give housewives the idea he was trying to keep them from buying as cheaply as possible.

Cuts in allowable oil production, made by the Railroad Commission, whittled the state's prospective revenue from oil. June allowable was out 64,820 barrels daily and July 67,219.

The Senate joined the House in passing Rep. Dolph Briscoe's stringent bill regulating veterans' land sales and outlying block deals. Briscoe's constitutional amendment replaces the Governor and Attorney General as Veterans Land Board members. Two appointive members would serve with the land commissioner.

Cooperators with the Central Colorado, Lower Clear Fork and Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation Districts are finding that properly grazed land is directly related to good fishing in this area. Where the land is overgrazed it results in soil erosion from the pasture land, thus muddy water collects in farm and ranch ponds. Game fish, such as bluegill and bass feed by sight. If the water coming into the pond is muddy, fish can not feed.

Tanks in this section are constructed primarily for livestock water. These tanks are located so as to get better distribution of graz-

ing. They can have the added value of fish production, provided the grasses are protected from overgrazing. Long periods of overgrazing our native ranges destroys the grasses. Grasses are the most valuable plants for holding the soil in place. Water will penetrate well into the soil when a good cover of grass is left on the land. This additional water produces more grass. The increase in grass production results in more feed for livestock. This also prevents the pond from filling with mud and allows for better fishing.

Overgrazing hurts the pasture in addition to filling up farm ponds

with eroded soil. Weeds gradually replace grasses, gullies are formed on hillsides and the top soil is washed away into farm or ranch ponds and creeks where it loses its value for grass production. This also results in the pond becoming muddy and destroying fish food.

There is a close connection between livestock and fish production. Where pasture land is properly grazed there can be good fishing in local ponds, but overgrazing destroys the fishing. A pond with one acre of surface area can produce as much as 150 pounds of fish annually if it is properly managed.

Fish may be ordered through the Baird office of the Soil Conservation Service should they be needed for proper stocking of your pond.

Bass and bluegill fish were delivered to Baird on the morning of May 20, by the Fish and Wildlife Service from Burnet.

Farmers and ranchers who received fish were: R. L. Clinton, Lynn L. Williams and J. S. Freeman of Putnam; Will Johnson and Howard Chatham of Oplin, and Mrs. N. B. Holloway and Alton E. Hornsby of the Rowden Community.

Others receiving fish were J. M. Sparks and John Purvis of Cottonwood, James Snyder, E. O. Battles, Dr. Leland Jackson, Lee Brown, R. Z. Landrum and Buster Hatchett of Baird.

No channel catfish were delivered at this time. Delivery of the fish will probably be made sometime in July or August, according to a representative of the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Any farmer or rancher who wishes to stock his tanks with fish may do so by contacting a technician of the Soil Conservation Service at Baird. Applications for fish are now being received for future delivery.

How much of the recent rains did we store in the ground for future

use? After about 4½ inches of rainfall on heavy land with a good cover of Buffalo grass, Curly Mesquite grass and Texas Winter grass the moisture penetrated to a depth of 28 inches. Tests on bare about 10 feet away showed moisture to a depth of four inches. Penetration tests made by technicians of the Baird Work Unit of the Soil Conservation Service reveal this information.

Where some Texas Winter grass was present along with some annual weeds the rains went into the ground 18 inches. On bare ground nearby moisture had penetrated to a depth of six inches.

These findings bear out the fact that where there is a good cover of grass on the land the soil will take up water more readily than bare ground or where a poor cover of grass is present. Land with a poor cover will take up water very slowly although faster than bare ground.

The moisture that really counts is that which is stored deep in the soil. The moisture in the top four to six inches of soil will evaporate readily, usually within three or four days. The moisture that is stored deep is the moisture that carries grass through long dry spells.

Mental Disorders Present Major Health Problem

Austin — Mental disorders today represent a major public health problem. Nearly fifty percent of all hospital beds are occupied by patients with mental illness, declares Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer.

But it is estimated that in addition to these, at least one in ten in the general population is suffering from an emotional illness sufficiently disabling to interfere with work and family life. Both severe and minor mental illness appear to stem from organic causes, psychological causes, or a combination of the two.

Much progress has been made in reducing the amount of mental illness due to organic disorders. At one time, 10 percent of mental hospital beds in the south were occupied by patients whose mental illness was due to pellagra. Today, with improved understanding of nutrition, such cases are almost unknown.

Fifteen years ago, a large number of mental hospital patients suffered from "general paresis," or central nervous system syphilis. Today, due to strides made in control and prevention of syphilis, less than 2 percent of mental hospital admissions are patients with general paresis.

Only since World War II have extensive efforts been made in prevention of mental illness due primarily to psychological factors. Much additional research is needed here, as well as with organic factors.

However, recent studies are building up increasing evidence that early childhood experiences are of vast significance in mental health. Children need consistent, warm mothering, especially during their first years of life. And in our high-speed modern society, they need guidance in the home and in the school in learning to handle their feelings effectively and in building healthy resistance to pressures of daily living.

Just as attention is needed to building strong bodies in children, so is attention needed to building sound minds.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Fort Worth.—On Monday most cattle and calves sold around steady at Fort Worth. Exceptions to the steady trade were fed steers and yearlings which were around 50c or more lower. Some stronger prices were reported on slaughter calves of the upper grades and also on stocker kinds of cattle and calves.

The recent rains in the Southwest cut the receipts to market only slightly, and not enough time has elapsed to create any definite stronger tone to the stocker trade in most parts of this area.

Fat cattle were depressed despite a small offering here. The pressure on fed cattle came from reported heavy runs at Corn Belt points, Chicago reporting the biggest runs since October. Other midwest points also reported large numbers of fat cattle.

Most observers here agree that

while movement of cattle to market from the western two-thirds of Texans will be moved back some weeks by the rains, that normal seasonal patterns of shipping will prevail in the Eastern third of the state where June and July are usually periods of heavy shipping.

Prices included: Good and choice fed steers and yearlings \$18.00-22.50; heifers mostly \$21.00 down; common plain and medium sorts \$12.00-18.00. Fat cows \$10.50-13.50; canners and cutters \$6.50-10.50. Bulls \$10-14.50. Good and choice slaughter calves \$16.00-20.75; cull, common and medium sorts \$9.00-15.00. Stocker steer calves \$16.00-22.00 and loads choice quotable higher; yearling stockers \$21.00 down; older feeding steers \$20.00 down; stocker cows \$7.00-12; heifer calves and yearling in stocker flesh \$2 to \$4 under comparable steers.

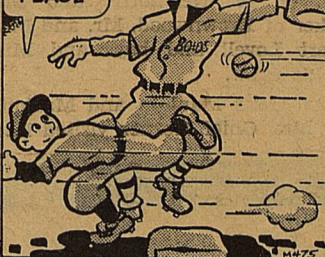
Lambs Continue Advance.
