WASHINGTON, D. C .- Since the Congress adjourned last week, there is opportunity to catch up on a lot of "loose ends". There were a great many things which could not be done during the last weeks of a very hectic session. Most everything which could be put off during this

period must be done now. It will be towards the end of this month of August before I will return to my Congressional District.

It is encouraging to note that the Commissioner of Narcotics reports a steady decline in the users of

When the first Narcotics Control Law was passed in 1909, one out of every 400 Americans was a drug addict. Today the figure stands at one in 3,000, which means a total of about 60,000 addicts in this Country The increase in drug addicts among adolescents sharply increased following World War II and reached a peak in 1951.

A Senate Judiciary Subcommittee is now studying ways to strengthen our Narcotic Control Law. The Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives is to conduct a study between now and the first of the year to find ways to prevent illegal narcotics from coming into the United States.

Water consevation will continue to be high on the list of important legislation during the next session of Congress. Not too long ago, only people in areas of scarce rainfall were critically aware of the situation. The entire Country now has a


