County Baptist Ass'n. Met At Clyde In Annual Meet

Churches in the Callahan County Baptist Association will join 1,800 other Southern Baptist Churches in Texas this fall in a mammoth program of Schools of Missions and Stewardship. During the week of study and discussion night will be set aside for a "Church and Denomination" program.

Churches in Callahan County will be holding their school of missions October 2-7, 1955. 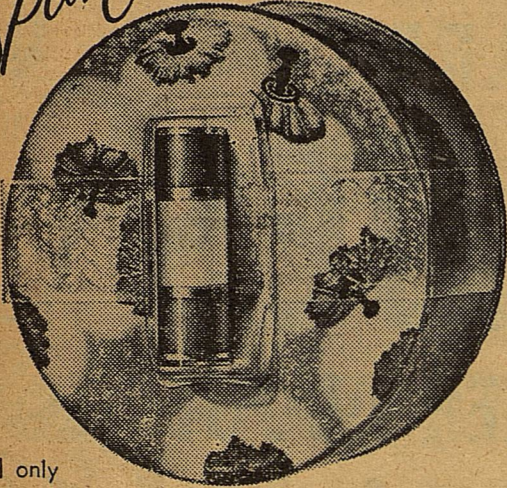

Appointment With Death . . . !

As the sun "signs off" with a brilliant flourish at the end of the day, we feel a sudden drop in our spirits . . . we are tired, irritable, anxious. The way home seems long, traffic seems to creep, our senses are hazy. Not only does the motorist experience this impatience and tension, but the pedestrian does too as he scrambles in and out of traffic in a mad rush to get home.

Strangely enough, says the Texas Safety Association, facts bear this out too. More traffic casualties occur between the hours of four and eight o'clock in the evening than any other period during the day or night. According to the National Safety Council, more than one-fourth of all fatal traffic accidents occur between the hours of 5:00 and 7:59 p.m.

Now what is there peculiar to the span of time between four and eight o'clock in the evening which makes this period particularly lethal to motorists and pedestrians alike?

For one there is heavier traffic, both cars and pedestrians—rushing home from work, rushing out for the evening. So we have the deadly combination: congestion, speed, and heedlessness.

To this pattern of danger we must add the hazards of night itself. The fading light seems to twist and turn, changing the perspective of things and dimming our vision. It is then that our sense of alertness, caution, discretion, should be increased. So often do these dangers of the night loom up suddenly, unexpectedly, and strike an old person hobbling across our path in the murky darkness, a child skimming out of nowhere, another car bearing down upon us in a great white glare.

What can we do to cancel this appointment with death which so many men, women, and children keep each evening between the

Pastures Can Cut Pork Production Costs

pastures in figuring how to cut swine production costs," says E. M. Regenbrecht, extension swine husbandman. The pasture, he adds, is the best place to keep the bred sows at all times except during bad weather in the farrowing season.

The exercise, sunshine and nutritious pasture will help to farrow a stronger and more vigorous litter. But a clean, dry, well-bedded shelter is an essential for the cold weather months, says Regenbrecht. The sows will need plenty of water and a balanced ration but the pasture will reduce the feed bill. Too, with lowered hog prices, any management practice which will cut costs is an important item.

It is now time, says the specialist, to plant the pasture for fall, winter and spring grazing. Oats, rye, winter wheat or barley are suggested as crops which can be planted in most sections of the state. Moisture conditions are now favorable and for maximum yields, Regenbrecht suggests that from two to three bushels of seed an acre be planted. The plants should be five to six inches high before being grazed.

The spring litters will be able to graze the small pastures before most other pastures are ready. The earlier the sow and litter can be turned on the pasture the better.

A good acre of small grain, fertilizing is recommended before planting and nitrogen applied as a side dressing when needed, should produce sufficient grazing for about six sows and their litters during the spring season.

hours of four and eight? Shall we call in the "know-how" boys—the planners, engineers, scientists—to help us cancel some of these appointments? But they are already working on his problem and have come up with some excellent safety barriers—reflected traffic signs, glareless street lighting, expressways, safety gimmicks on automobiles, and other devices designated to help pedestrian and motorists protect themselves from this "Date With Death".

There's a limit to what they can do. They can't redesign the night nor restructure the human organism. That is a task that can be done by people like you and me—by our fortifying our own defense, by our taking on a new awareness, personally, of dusk and darkness traffic hazards. This goes for us both as motorists and pedestrians. What's needed is caution that guards against darkness that hides danger . . . and death.

If you want to keep up with the Joneses, just live your own life. In a few years you'll meet them coming back.

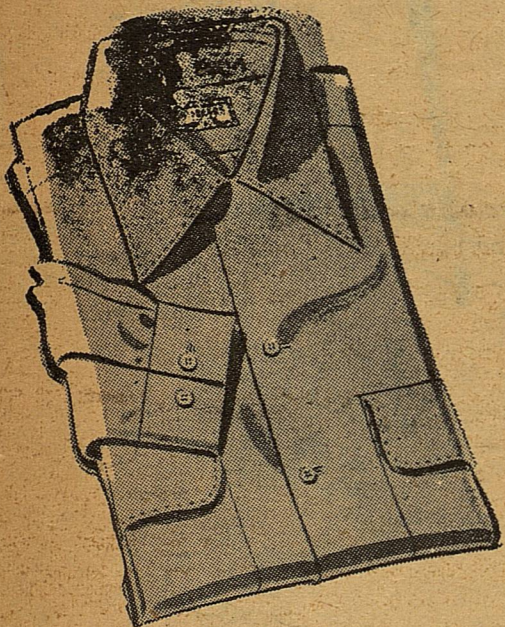

Veterans ? Box

Q—My deadline for starting school under the Korean GI Bill comes in November. I applied to start class this fall, in plenty of time. A family problem has come up so that I won't be able to begin until around the first of the year. Will I still be able to get in under the Korean GI Bill, since my deadline will have passed?

A—No. Under the law, a veteran actually must begin his Korean GI training before his starting deadline. Filing an application alone is not sufficient and the law grants no exceptions.

Q—A friend of mine applied to VA for disability about two years ago, then failed to report for a physical examination when he was asked. He now would like to reopen his claim. Is it too late?

A—It is too late to reopen the original claim, since VA considers that claims are abandoned when the veteran takes no action to comply with VA's request within a one year period. However, the veteran may file a new application. If he does, and if it is approved, his payments may begin from the date of the new application, not the old one.

Q—If I buy a house with a GI loan, I understand I will have to make a down payment of two percent. Does the lender have any right to ask for a larger down payment?

A—Yes. The lender has the right to request a larger down payment than the two percent minimum.

Q—I am a disabled Korea veteran. If I apply for vocational rehabilitation training, will I receive the same GI allowance as a veteran training under the Korean GI Bill?

A—No. The vocational rehabilitation training program operates differently than the Korean GI Bill program. Under the former, VA will pay all training costs directly to your school and, in addition, pay you a monthly subsistence allowance. Veterans under the latter program receive a single check each month, out of which they must meet their own costs of training.

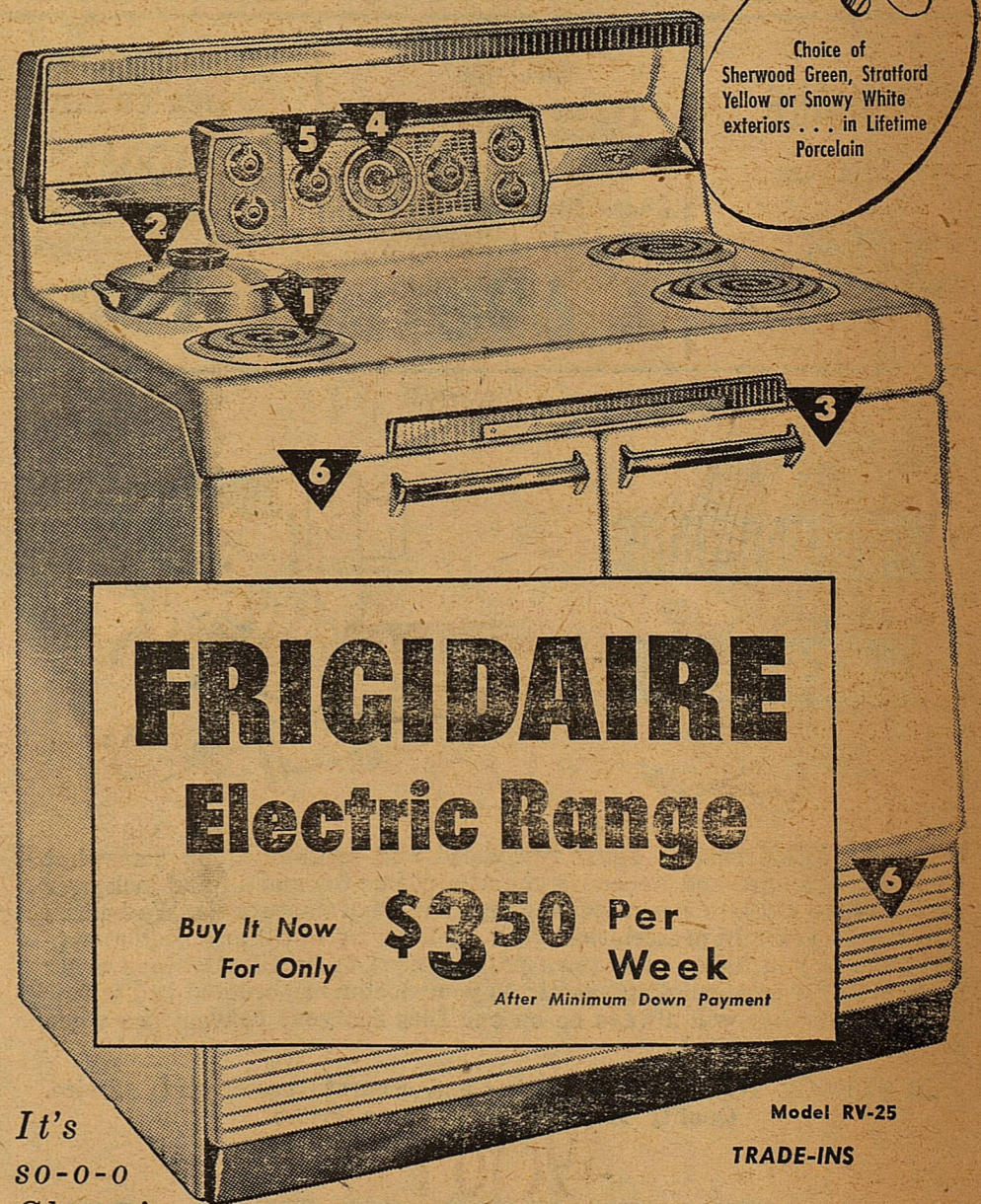

They take several million dollars annually from livestock income in the form of damaged hides, lowered meat quality and reduced dairy production, says F. M. Fuller, extension entomologist.

The grubs during the fall months appear as lumps under the hide in the back's of dairy and beef animals and are easier to kill at this stage than any other in their life cycle, says Fuller. Rotenone used as a spray, dip or dust is very effective for controlling the pest. Fuller says that seven and one-half pounds of derris or cube powder containing five percent rotenone to 100 gallons of water makes a good spray solution. The material should be applied with a powder sprayer with

200 pounds pressure. Fuller says that 10 pounds of wettable sulphur should be added to the above solution if a dip is preferred. As the animals go through the dip, the entomologist says their backs should be scrubbed to assure a thorough penetration of the insecticide and to knock the scales from the holes made by the grubs. A long-handled brush with relatively stiff bristles is recommended.

A dust can be made from one pound of derris or cube powder containing five percent rotenone and two pounds of a heavy non-alkaline dust such as talc, tripoli earth or pyrophyllite.

Ready prepared dusts should contain at least 1.67 percent rotenone. Fuller says that about three ounces of the dust should be rubbed into the back of each animal treated.

Regardless of whether a dust, dip or spray is used, applications should be made at 30 day intervals as long as grubs continue to appear.

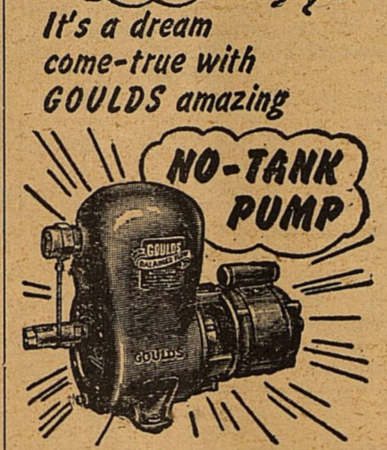

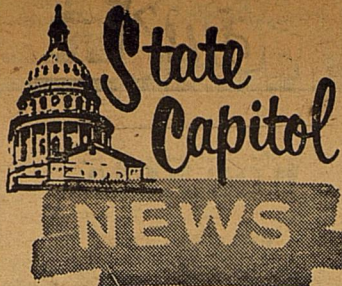

AUSTIN—Adlai Stevenson, 1952 Democratic presidential nominee, kept his political thoughts and hopes mostly to himself during his Texas visit.

He made only one jibe at political foe Allan Shivers.

Shivers has said he will not support Stevenson if he is the '56 presidential nominee.

In his University of Texas lecture, Stevenson said that, while not a full-time economic expert, he is a full-time Democrat. He sidestepped a question from the audience on Tideland's issue on which he and Shivers broke in 1952.

Stevenson was joined by Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn in an overnight visit at U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson's farm. Plane schedules allowed the three top-level Democratic leaders very little time to discuss their party's brightened prospects. They all disclaimed any political significance in the get-together.

Johnson and Rayburn said no change in Democratic Congressional tactics is planned as a result of President Eisenhower's heart attack. They said Dem leaders would, nevertheless, try to draft a Congressional program that will put a Democrat in the White House.

Apparently well on the road to recovery from his own heart attack, Johnson sent a telegram inviting President Eisenhower to Texas to hunt with him.

Shivers Criticizes Court
Last year's desegregation ruling by the U. S. Supreme Court was part of a long series of moves toward centralized government, Gov. Shivers contends.

U. S. Supreme justices "stepped out of their judicial roles" in their desegregation decision, he said. "Nine men, sitting 2,000 miles away, are not going to tell Crossroads, Texas, how they are going to run their schools," the Governor emphasized.

Shivers spoke at a meeting of oil well drillers in Houston, at the same time Adlai Stevenson addressed an Austin audience.

Earlier he pointed out the court ruling can be overridden by act of Congress or amendment to the U. S. Constitution. He cited recent tideland legislation as an example.

Political Speculation
Sen. Price Daniel has indicated he may disclose his political plans during a series of speeches scheduled during November. He has kept the door open for a possible race for governor next year. His Senate term still has two years to go.

Meanwhile, Daniel will open hearings of the Senate judiciary subcommittee on narcotics in Austin, Oct. 12, and will hold other hearings in San Antonio, Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth.

Political speculation has swung to ward the idea that Gov. Allan Shivers and other top office-holders may choose to seek re-election next year, Shivers for a fourth elective term.

Among the possibilities were Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey, Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd, and Agri. Comm. John C. White. The same speculation hinted that possibly U. S. Sen. Daniel might decide against the governor's race for which he has been discussed.

Gov. Shivers decision to run for re-election would greatly thin the ranks of prospective candidates. So far, only former Speaker Reuben

Senterfitt has announced. Ralph Yarborough, twice defeated for the office, is regarded as a certain candidate. White and State Senator Jimmy Phillips are probable entrants.

Teachers Due Jury Duty

This fall, for the first time in Texas history, some school teachers will have to interrupt the three R's to answer jury summons.

Legislators, apparently by an oversight, deprived them of their traditional exemption. Jury service laws were rewritten last session after constitutional amendment made women eligible for duty.

Old laws, specifically exempting "school masters," has been interpreted as meaning all teachers. That new statutes had dropped this classification did not come to light until school and fall court sessions began.

Teachers summoned are expected to seek repressive on the grounds that their absence would work a hardship on their schools.

Radar Reduces Accidents

Radar, says Public Director, Homer Garrison, Jr., has had a pronounced physical effect, slowing down highway speeders wherever it is used.

Facilities in major routes were down six per cent for the first eight months of the year, Garrison pointed out.

Total number killed this year is expected to be up two or three per cent because of increased fatalities on farm-to-market and other secondary roads.

The highway department said surveys show that 12 per cent of Texas motorists were exceeding the speed limit in checks this year. Last year the figure was 17 per cent.

Average high speed was higher, but there were fewer speed violations. Average speed for all vehicles this year was closed at 54 miles an hour, six-tenths of a mile faster than last year.

Building Planners Hired

A professional planning firm has been employed by the State Building Commission to map out a long-range program for housing the

state government.

An orderly building program covering needs for the next 25 to 50 years is the goal, said Gov. Shivers, chairman of the commission.

He said he favors a government center built around the Capitol, rather than an aimless sprinkling of buildings.

Funds already have been appropriated for a new state courts and office building and for partial air conditioning and remodeling of the Capitol.

SHORT SNORTS: Texas' 31 state senators reported they spent \$43,756 of state money for expenses this year. Highest was Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton, who reported \$4,187. Lowest was Sen. R. A. Wehnert of Seguin who spent \$402. . . . Ben H. Carpenter of Dallas was named by Gov. Shivers as temporary president of the Trinity River Authority, new state agency. . . . Texas business activity in August was within two points of the all time high.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Cattle Prices Tend Lower; Except High Grade Stockers.

FORT WORTH—One of the largest offerings of cattle of the year appeared at the nation's 12 major livestock markets Monday with over 150,000 cattle were reported. Prices were tending lower at all points.

It was noteworthy that while cattle numbers were large, the offerings of calves around the major markets were around 6,000 under the comparable date a year earlier. This trend toward smaller numbers of calves going to market has been evident all this year and the effect it will have on estimated cattle population, will be confusing.

At Fort Worth most kinds of cattle and calves were weak to 50 cents lower, except high grade stockers and feeders which were fully steady. Again the order buyers reported that most of the stockers and feeders they bought were destined for Texas or other Southwestern states.

Currently prices of replacement cattle and calves here are equal to or above prices at most of the Cornbelt centers, and it is evident that restocking of the droughty areas is going forward at a fast pace. Comparative prices at Fort Worth Monday included:

Good to choice fed steers and yearlings \$18 - 22.00. Common and medium sorts \$12.00 - 17.00. Fed cattle eligible to top \$21 appeared. Fat cows \$9.50 - 12.00; canners and cutters \$6.50 - 9.50. Bulls \$10.00 - 13.75; good to choice fat calves \$16.00 - 17.50, few baby beef kinds higher; cull, common and medium \$8.00 - 15.00. Stocker steer calves \$15.00 - 21.00, heifer calves \$18.00 down; stocker steer yearlings \$18.50 down; replacement cows \$8.00 - 13.50. Hogs Near Steady Despite Heavy Runs in North.

Top butcher hogs sold mostly from \$16.25 to \$16.75 at Fort Worth Monday, or just about in line with last week's close. The hog run around

the 12 major markets was near the 100,000 mark Monday, and some weakness developed at those markets. Continued heavy runs in the Cornbelt would mean some surplus hogs coming to this part of the country and could effect prices in the Southwest adversely.

Less desirable kinds of hogs sold from \$15 to \$16. Sows drew \$12 to \$14.50.

Considerable interest here among all interests as to whether Secretary of Agriculture Benson will inaugurate a pork buying program to support hog prices.

Word is that such a program similar to the one used to buy beef the past two years could be set up for pork in short order. Under those plans certain grades and types are bought under competitive bids from packers.

The meat used in foreign aid, school lunches, institutions, etc., conflicts very little with normal meat trade is at all. Funds for the program are already available.

Latest guess by some Cornbelt observers is that the low time on swine prices will likely be from mid-October to mid-November.

However, if prices sag to such a degree that marketings are slower than anticipated, the low time could well be later in the year or early in 1956.

Overall supply of pork is currently low, because average hog weights are much lighter this year.

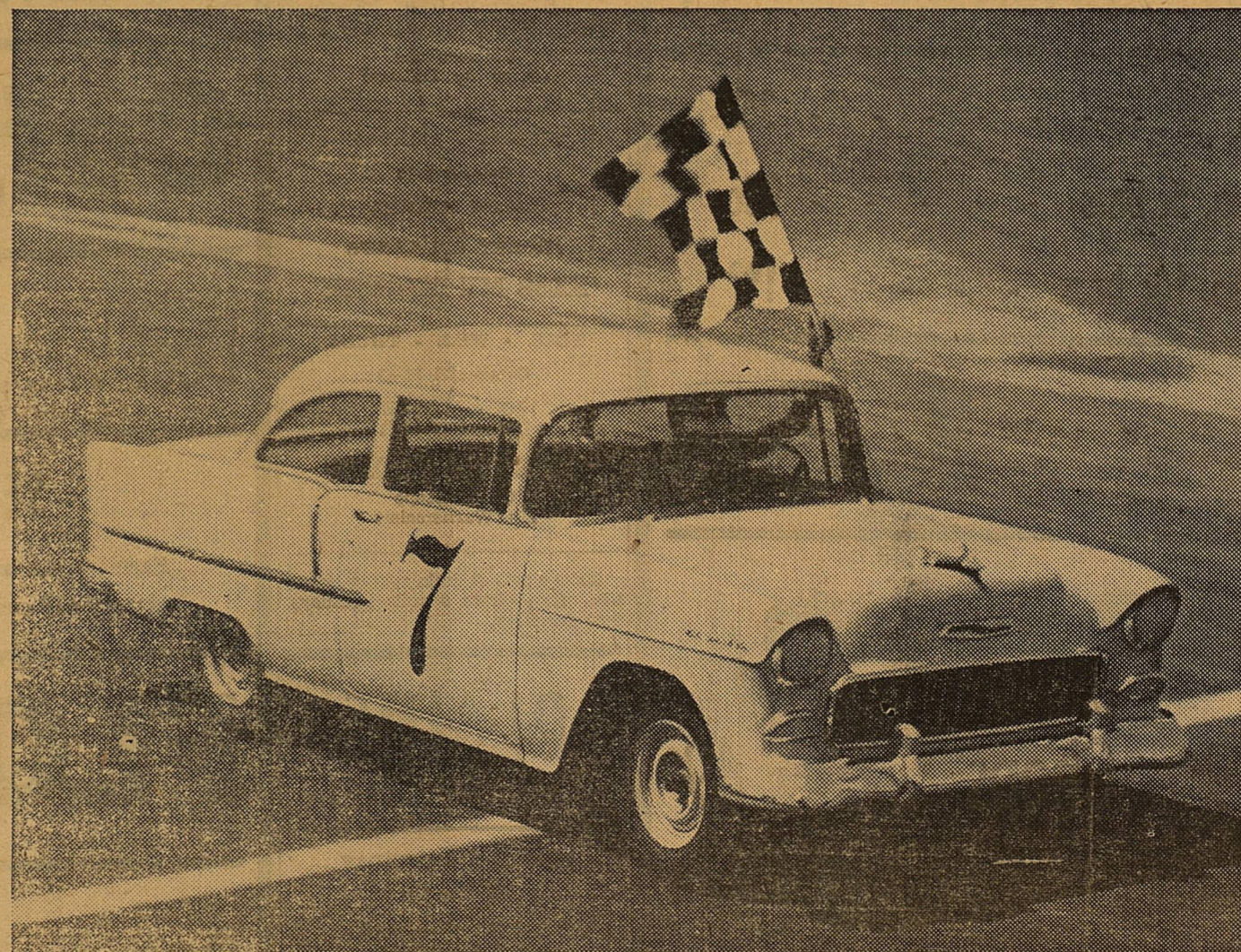
