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





Nichols announced today. This tax returned should be filed with the District Diector of Internal Revenue, Dallas Texas together with the social security taxes on the wages shown on the form. Howard O. Nichols emphasized that this annual report of wages paid for agricultural labor must be filed with the Interna Revenue Service before January 31. 1956. 


