COUNTY SERIES

Both Elevens Won Openers

Fresh from their most successful season opener for a Friona football team in four years, the Chieftains of Friona High School will try for their second win Friday night, when they host the Bovina Mustangs at Chieftain Field.

Game time for the 1972 home opener is 8 p.m.

Coach Bob Owen, participating in the donkey baseball game Tuesday night, suffered a shoulder separation when thrown by his "trusty" mount. He'll still be available Friday.

However, James Perea, starting guard, will miss the Bovina game, due to an arm injury suffered against Farwell, and Bill Fallwell is out of action due to a slight concussion.

The Mustangs, who opened their season with a 16-0 win over Boys Ranch, would like nothing better than to add a Chieftain scalp to their collection.

Bovina is in District 3-A along with Farwell, and would like to play the Chieftains a better game than did the Steers.

Local fans will remember last season when Friona was off to a similar start, only to have Bovina play the Chieftains to a 6-6 standoff on a drizzly, wet field that saw both teams try last quarter field goals, and both narrowly missed.

Only a couple of weeks ago, Friona scrimmaged Boys Ranch

on the Ranchers' home field, and were only able to score one touchdown in the scrimmage.

However, the Chiefs will be out to sustain the momentum they began in last Friday's season opener, which has local fans thinking about all sorts of possibilities for this year's team.

The Mustangs have 11 returning lettermen, including seven offensive starters from their team that was 5-4-1 a year ago. The entire backfield returns, including quarterback Billy Shelby, fullback Larry Wiseman and halfbacks Jeff McCormick and Eddie Pesch.

Split end Ben McCain (5-10, 160) is as capable a receiver as Shelby is a thrower, and that tandem could cause the Chieftains some misery on Friday.

Both tackles also return. They are Danny McKay (6-1, 185) and Weldon Beardain (6-0, 210), giving the Mustangs good size in the interior line.

Unlike the Farwell series, Bovina has not been met on the gridiron as often by Friona teams. Friday's game will be the 13th between the two, compared to 36 games in the Friona-Farwell rivalry.

However, Friona has a little more success in this county rivalry, holding an 8-3-1 margin in the 12 games played to date. Bovina has not won a game in the series since the Mustangs clobbered the winless 1962 Chieftain team, 35-6. However, last year's tie snapped a four-game winning streak for Friona.

RICK ROYAL WINS

Record 220 Enter Football Contest

Ricky Royal was the first week's champion in the Friona Star's annual football contest. A total of 220 contestants participated in the first week of guessing, an all-time high for the contest.

Only three of the 220 entrants scored as high as 12 correct out of the 16 games on the slate, as upsets began to pop up right on the first week.

Besides Royal, Sam Mears and Kathy Cain each scored 12 correct. Royal was the closest on the Friona-Farwell tiebreaker, picking that score at 34-10, to miss by only four points. Mears claimed the second place money by picking the score at 21-14, and Kathy Cain was off by 27 points, guessing it at 14-7.

Only seven other contestants got as many as 11 games correct. These were Kevin Welch, Alan Hamilton, Herb Seright, Mitchell Smiley, Elaine Wardlaw, L.F. Jacobs and Mrs. F.G. Crofford.

Otherwise, 38 contestants scored a ten; 57 had scores of nine; 50 scored eight; 34 had seven right; 19 had six right, ten had five, one contestant scored a four, and one scored a three.

The most popular team on the first week's slate proved to be Littlefield, which was picked by 214 contestants, with only six picking against the Wildcats.

Right behind Littlefield, the Texas Aggies were named to win on 200 ballots.

Biggest upset must have been the Arkansas-Southern Cal battle, since the Razorbacks were picked by 195 fans, to only 25 for Southern California. Close behind, there were 189 disappointed contestants who picked Canyon to beat Spearman, with only 31 choosing the actual winner.

A total of 181 people chose Houston over Rice, with only 39 going for the Owls, who emerged as winners. There were 159 fans who thought Lazbuddie would beat Hart, with 61 correctly picking that game.

Finishing out the tabulation, the picking went as follows: Dalhart 177, Guyton 43; Lockney 145, Post 75; Morton 170, Springlake 50; Pampa 121, Herford 99; Muleshoe 164, Dimmitt 56; Tulia 178, Olton 42; Bovina 144, Boys Ranch 76; Palo Duro 149, Dumas 71; Tennessee 138, Georgia Tech 82 and Dallas 189, Oakland 31.

Another weekly contest appears on an inside page of this issue, and sports fans are urged to try their skill. With 12 weeks

remaining, and a total of 182 potential points still to be earned, it's still "anybody's ball game."

Maize Days Events Are Taking Shape

Events for the 1972 Maize Days celebration are beginning to shape up, it was reported at the monthly Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday at the Farmer House Restaurant.

At least two new events will add spice to the celebration. One is an air show, to be sponsored by the Friona Volunteer Fire Department and the Friona Kiwanis Club.

To be held the Saturday climaxing the celebration (September 30), the air show will be held at Benger Air Park, beginning at 2 p.m., and will feature all types of aerobatic acts.

Jimmy Franklin of Lovington, N.M. will be flying his Waco UPS-7. Sky-divers from the Amarillo Sky Diving Club will

perform. A drawing will be held for two free trips to Las Vegas, for two couples.

Admission of \$1.50 for adults and \$1.00 for students will be charged.

Dan True of KFDA-TV, Channel 10, will serve as announcer for the show.

The motorcycle races will be held the Sunday prior to the start of Maize Days week (September 24).

The races are expected to draw entrants from throughout the High Plains, from Amarillo to Clovis.

The race will be held two miles north and one mile west of Friona. Three trophies will be awarded in each class. Larry Taylor, chairman, says he expects to hold class races in a number of divisions.

An early-morning shower Tuesday of this week amounted to only .02 inch officially, and another shower late in the day Tuesday left .21 inch of moisture locally.

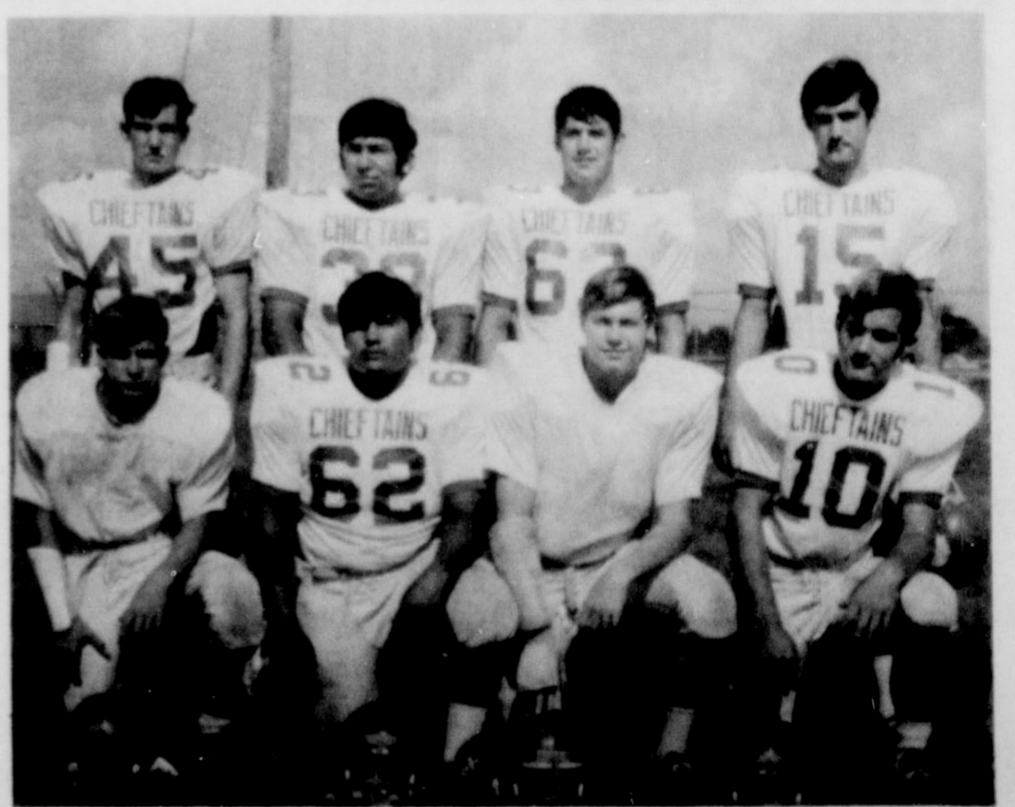
Temperatures ranged from 81 to 90 for the week's high, with the nightly low being at 62 practically every night.

Pause and Reflect

"If you plow a crooked furrow, you will reap a random harvest" (old English proverb)

The tragic affair at Munich's Olympic Village is a classic example of what we may expect when we are universally committed to a "go-easy" policy toward criminals.

Before the smoke had cleared from the Munich airport eight Americans lay dead in the clubhouse of a golf course in the Virgin Islands.

Horribly similar in results entirely different in motives, these two crimes rocked the shaky world.

Whereas the Munich affair was merely the most recent act in a centuries old drama of political differences, the club house debacle was the result of a well planned robbery with overtones of insanity.

In a broader sense there is another similarity; both orgies were committed by people who realize that if apprehended their chances of suffering the extreme penalty are almost nil.

The fate of the captured Palestinian guerillas will rest in the hands of the West Germans.

The Virgin Island murderers will be tried in courts under the laws of the United States where they know full well they cannot be executed no matter how heinous their crime.

One cannot help but think of Chicago's Speck relaxing in a comfortable jail with good food and medical services assured; and all at the expense of the taxpayers, eight of whom he killed in cold blood.

In the profession of structural engineering one of the most important courses is called "Strength of Materials" wherein the maximum load bearing capacities of wood, steel, and concrete are carefully studied.

Our Congress should spend time examining the "load" of crime the citizens can bear before cracking up and taking the law into their own hands. An act which could eventually result in open rebellion against any law considered unfair (income tax for example).

Before we reach this point of no return we had better attain the happy medium between all out permissiveness and "an eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth."

To continue favoring lawlessness is to subject our way of life to pressures that cannot be contained indefinitely.

40 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 16, 1932

Five new teachers have been secured in place of some of last year's instructors. Three of these are in the grade school department of the school, and two are in high school. The complete faculty list is as follows: Glenn F. Davis, grade school principal, piano, voice and public school music; O.M. Stewart, geography and history; G.C. Applewhite, geography and history; Miss Arvie Lewis, writing and art; Miss Vivian Boston, fourth grade; Miss Louise Jacobsen, third grade and public school music; Miss Herta Meyer, third and first grades; Mrs. H.B. Whitley, first grade and primary superintendent.

30 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 11, 1942

Enrollment in the Friona schools reached a total of 446 this week as the new term got off to a good start. Largest class in the grade school was the fifth grade, with 65 students. A total of 331 were enrolled in the first eight grades. High school had 115 enrolled, with 49 freshmen, sophomores, 32 juniors, 19 and seniors, 15.

20 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 11, 1952

Ground was broken Monday at the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona, for a \$5,000 addition, providing five more rooms and emergency capacity of nine more beds. Henry White and Bill Hannold are doing the construction and work schedule calls for completion in 45-60 days.

The annual Parmer County Fair is scheduled this weekend in Friona. A big free barbecue will be served beginning at the park at 6:30 p.m. Presentation of community candidates for Fair Queen will immediately follow.

10 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 11, 1962

Curtis Murphree put a little meaning into Friona's Maize Days celebration on Tuesday of this week, when he delivered the city's first load of grain for the 1962 harvest season, and thereby collected the \$25 premium from Arthur Drake, manager of Friona Wheat Growers.

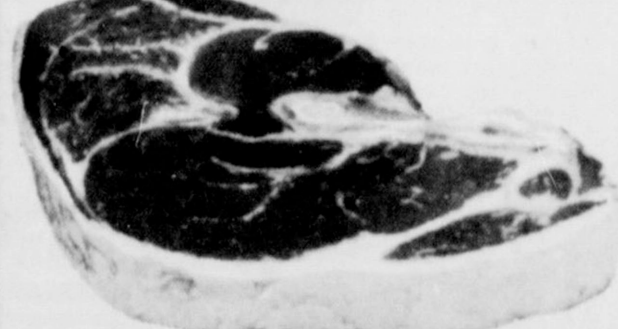

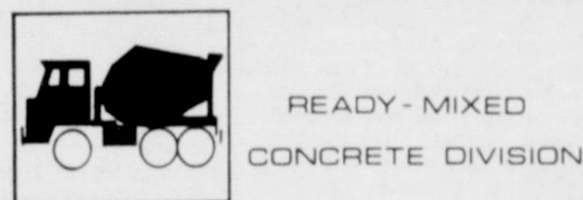

Elliott Installed As School Board Member

Elliott replaces Steve Messenger on the board, and will serve out the remainder of Messenger's term, which will expire in April of 1973. Messenger resigned because he has moved from Friona.

In other business, the board affirmed the "clean shaven" policy of the school, which prohibits beards or moustaches for either the boys or men teachers.

Superintendent Alton Farr reported that enrollment figures on Friday, September 8 stood at 1476, which was 37 less than the same date a year earlier. However, the 1971 figure stood as the peak enrollment for the year.

Farr also gave his regular reports on the school budget. Tax assessor-collector Porter Roberts reported that a total of \$855.33 in delinquent taxes was collected during August.

CITY BUSINESS

Annual City Budget Gets Council Okay

The Friona City Council approved the annual city budget for 1972-73 at its regular monthly meeting Monday. The budget, calling for expenditures of \$387,890, is an increase of \$61,828 over that for 1971-72. It is also estimated that the city will collect an additional \$79,739 in revenue during 1972-73.

"We should end the next fiscal year with a better cash balance than we will this year," City Manager Jake Outland told the councilmen. Outland indicated that the 1971-72 budget year, which ends September 30, will end with the city in the black.

In other business, the council passed an ordinance exempting certain non-profit organizations, including churches, from the tax roll.

The board passed on second reading the new electrical code for the city.

Walt's Quality Printing was given the contract to supply furniture for the new fire station, on a low bid of \$2,694.05.

Tentative approval was given to Ag-Chem Farm Supply for locating within the city, if the company can work out a deal for the land it is considering.

The council heard the protest of Bill McGlothlin, owner of the trailer park in the western part of town, to the proposed closing of an alley leading to the trailer park.

Residents at the end of the alley on the street had complained of the traffic by the trailer park residents, the cutting across driveways, etc. McGlothlin is to attempt to enforce an "emergency use only" policy for residents using the alley as a means of going to and from their homes.

A motion was passed whereby the city withdrew its offer to maintain the proposed show-barn-community center if it is built outside the city, as is now proposed by the committee.

Outland was authorized to solicit bids for a new pickup truck for use by the city sewer department.

A request for re-payment of \$2,964.60 to the Friona Development Corp. for cost of utilities installed in Western Addition was tabled until the next meeting.

Signup Underway For Pass-Punt-Kick Event

Local boys, ages eight through 13, will be blowing the dust off their footballs and loosening up their throwing arms soon for the 1972 Punt, Pass and Kick Competition.

Again this year the local level of PP&K will be co-sponsored by Friona Motors in conjunction with participating Ford Dealers in the area.

Nationally PP&K, now in its 12th year, is co-sponsored by the National Football League and the Ford Dealers of America. Since it was started in 1961, the program has attracted over 8 million boys, ages eight through 13, and participation this year is expected to top the 1,100,000 mark.

Participants in the Punt, Pass and Kick program compete only against boys their own age. Any boy eight through 13 years of age may register to compete at a participating Ford Dealer. There is no entrance fee and no body contact during competition. No special equip-

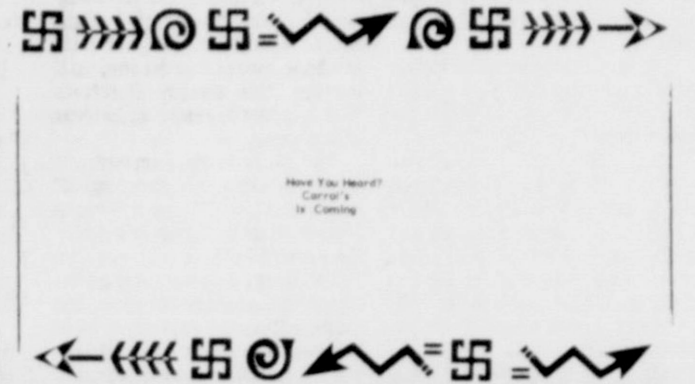
ment is needed and participation does not impair a boy's amateur standing.

Chiefs Look Good In Opener

Except for their over-anxiety, last Friday's season opener at Farwell was a near-perfect performance by the Friona Chiefs.

The Chiefs routed their county-seat rivals, 34-14, winning with surprising ease. Friona bolted to a 34-0 lead, and could have gone on to an even more lopsided win except that Coach Bob Owen substituted liberally in the second half, allowing all 33 players who made the trip to see action.

However, there was some anxious moments in the early part of the game, when four red flags either erased excellent field position plays for Friona, or gave the Steers momentum.

Friona took the opening kickoff, and methodically marched 70 yards to the Farwell 15. However, a fourth down pass completion from Johnny Bandy to Scott Lillard, who was forced out at the Farwell two, was called back for an illegal motion penalty.

Bandy completed another pass following the penalty, but it lacked three yards making a first down.

Then Friona dug in and allowed Farwell just one yard in three plays, and forced a punt. Bandy fielded the punt at midfield and raced inside Farwell's 10. This time, a clipping penalty shoved the Chiefs back to their own 35.

Bandy again cranked up his passing arm. He passed to Teddy King on a 35-yard gain, and then three plays later hit the same player for a touchdown. The Chiefs had covered 70 yards in only three plays.

King made a fine catch on the scoring play, going up with a defender and taking the ball away from the Farwell player, and then sprinting into the end zone. Kevin Wiseman's kick was wide, but Friona led, 6-0 with 1:51 left in the opening quarter.

Farwell had to punt, however, and King gave Friona great field position with a 28-yard punt return to the Steers' 17-yard line. On the first down play, Lee went over for his third touchdown, using his blocks effectively. Lee also ran for two extra points, and the score became 34-0 with 2:27 left in the quarter.

From this point, substitutions began to be evident in the Friona lineup, which halted the massacre.

Friona lost the shutout in the final quarter, when the Chiefs

Lee took a pitchout and raced around left end for two extra points, and it was Friona leading by 14-0 with 6:16 left in the half.

Later, the Chiefs again held Farwell and forced a punt. The Steers got a bad snap from center, with the ball sailing over the punter's head, and he was downed at the Farwell five by the charging Chieftain defenders.

Two handoffs to Lee resulted in Friona's third TD. Wiseman kicked it good the first time, but a five-yard penalty erased it, and the second kick was wide, leaving the halftime score Friona 20, Farwell 0.

Early in the third quarter, Friona held the Steers and took over on their own 30 following a Farwell punt.

On second down, halfback James Bartlett charged through the Farwell line, and was in a footrace with the Farwell safety man to the goal. Bartlett was nailed by a flying tackle right at the goal, but officials said his knee touched at the one, still leaving the speedy Chieftain with a nifty 63-yard run, longest of the game.

Two plays later, Bartlett iced down his run by plunging off tackle for the TD, and Friona led, 26-0 with only 3:15 gone in the second half.

Ted King, who earlier had intercepted a Farwell pass and made a fine return, only to have it erased by offsetting penalties, got his hands on one that counted on Farwell's first play from scrimmage following the kickoff, and Friona was back in business at midfield.

The Chieftain express marched to the Farwell eight, with Lee picking up most of the yardage, but on fourth down, Lee hobbled the pitchout, and Farwell recovered at the 12 to stifle that drive.

Farwell had to punt, however, and King gave Friona great field position with a 28-yard punt return to the Steers' 17-yard line. On the first down play, Lee went over for his third touchdown, using his blocks effectively. Lee also ran for two extra points, and the score became 34-0 with 2:27 left in the quarter.

in the game. Point try running was stopped.

A minute later, with Friona subs again getting game experience, Farwell covered a Friona fumble, and another opportunity.

Buoyed by his previous success, Boling again completed a pass, this time for 35 yards, to end David Danheim. Boling ran for two points, for the final margin of 34-14.

Officials set some sort of record by throwing the flag 21 times. Friona was penalized 12 times for 107 yards, and Farwell eight times for 70 yards. Another time, it turned out to be offsetting penalties.

The Chiefs had two backs gain over 100 yards rushing. Lee gained 143 yards on 15 carries, and Bartlett 116 on 17. The team's 383 yards total offense

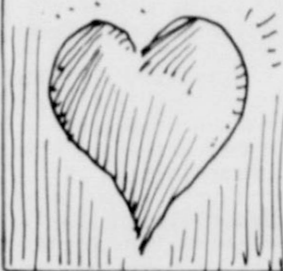
was the best opening game since the 1968 team rolled up 500 yards against the Steers, thanks to a whopping 237 yards rushing by Tony Perea.

It marked the first time since 1934-35 that Friona had beaten their rivals three straight games, and tightened the all-time series record to 18-17-1, with Farwell still holding a one-game edge.

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'Cats, Friona Only Winners In Openers

District 3-AA teams took two of five openers, with Friona joining Littlefield as a first-game winner.

The Wildcats brushed aside Silverton 38-0 despite a big rash of fumbles. Five times, Wildcat ball-carriers fumbled away the ball to the Class A Owls but still they won with ease. So strong was their defense as they forced Silverton into two bad snaps good for out-of-the-end-zone safeties.

In other games, Friona blistered Farwell 34-14, Dimmitt fell to Muleshoe 20-6, Tulla outlasted Olton 12-6 and Springlake-Earth blanked Morton 13-0.

Pat Henderson scored three times, twice on short runs in the fourth quarter and on a pass, to pace the Littlefield verdict. Tailback J.E. Johnson inaugurated the season for the defending district champs with a 40-yard touchdown sprint in the first period.

The early district scoring leader, however, is Friona's little "we might stretch him to 140 pounds," says coach Bob Owen. Louis Lee who peppered Farwell with three scoring shots and added four points on PAT runs. Lee's scoring runs measured 13, 2, and 20 yards and helped the Chieftains to a 34-0 lead before Farwell could score.

Olton shocked heavily favored Tulla with a 61-yard sprint by quarterback Tim Givens in the second quarter and took a lead into the final period. In that last quarter, however, interceptions ruined the Mustangs' victory hopes. Interceptions set up both Tulla tallies.

Two Dimmitt fumbles set up Muleshoe's first TDs, and a recovery by Muleshoe set up Dimmitt's score.

Travis Hampton Jr. caught a 20-yard pass from Terry Powell for Dimmitt's TD in the third period.

The start for Friona was the way coach Owen wanted it. "We made a lot of mistakes, but you can credit that to the first game. We picked up quite a few penalties which we will have to eliminate. But, still, I'm well pleased."

"We didn't fumble the football much. We fumbled one pitch but got it back. And we had tried to pick up a punt at full speed and lost it. But we didn't have any busted plays to speak of."

Lee was not just a scoring ace; he showed it can run in all areas of the field, as he

rushed for 143 yards during the game.

This week, the Chieftains host Class AA Bovina, which blanked Class AA Boys Ranch 16-0 in its opener. Littlefield will take on Class AAA Levelland, a 43-0 loser to Andrews.

Morton will test Tulla, and Olton will take on Muleshoe. Dimmitt will play Farwell, as the 3-AA members start matching opponents.

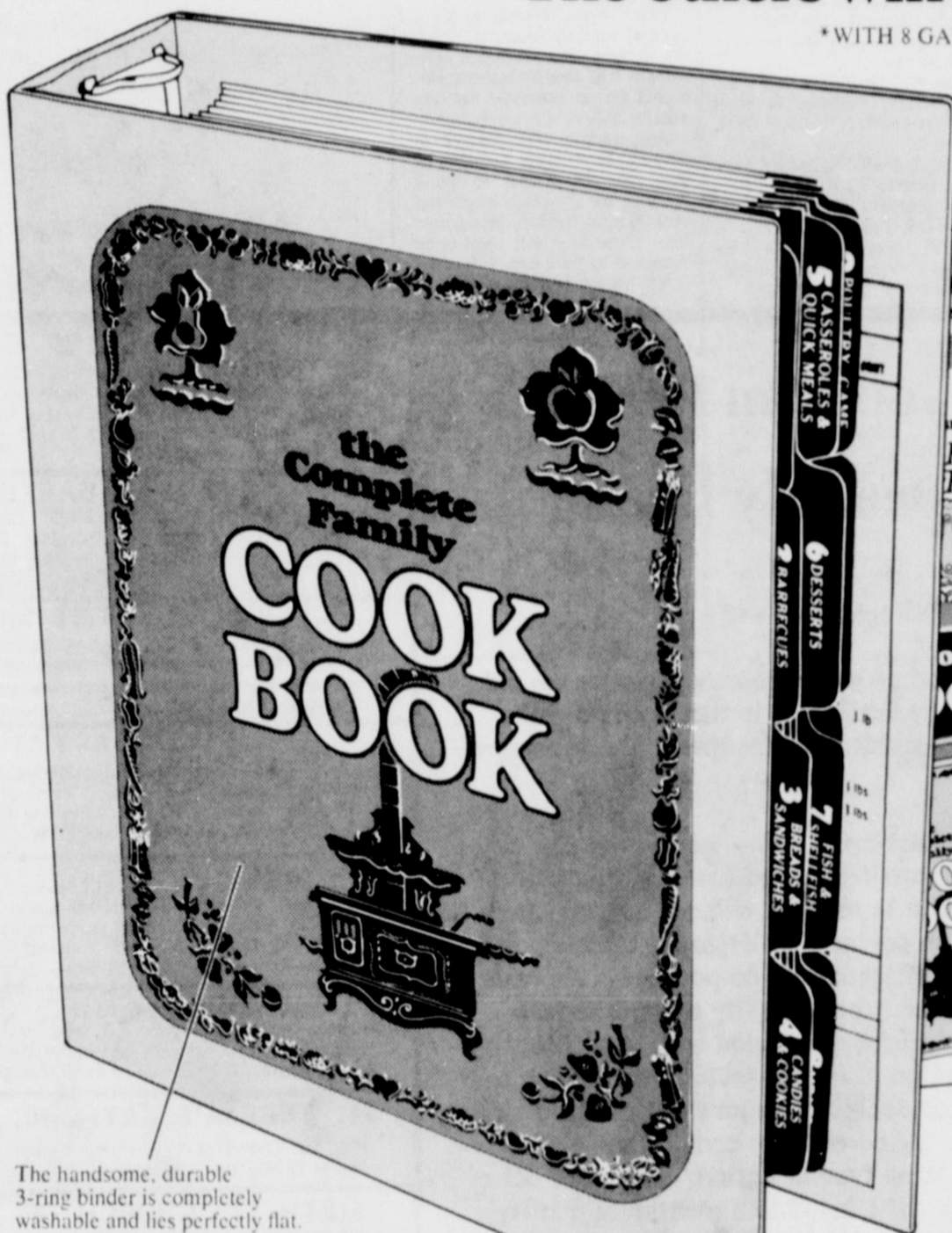

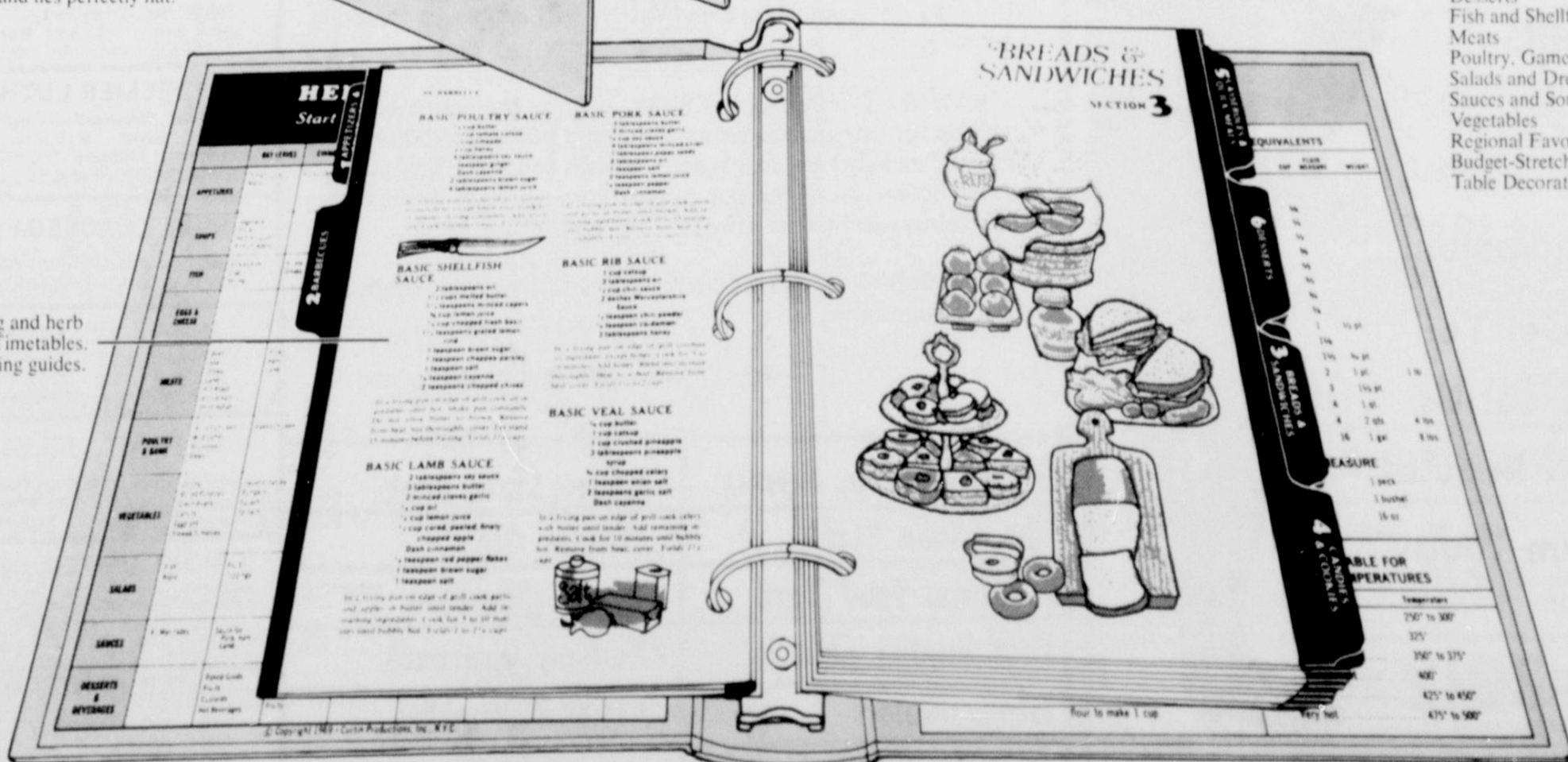
