

The Proof Of The Pudding

is in the eating, so is the proof of good soil conservation in the practice, says John Brazzil, Randall county agricultural agent.

When heavy snow and high winds hit Randall county in early February, fifteen miles of a farm-tomarket road became impassable in many places. Winds piled the snow into drifts in many places over the

A week later, Brazzil, in driving along the road, could tell by the drifts where stubble farming had been used on roadside farms. In those fields where maize stubble was still standing, the road was clean. In adjacent fields where the ground was left bare drifts were six

feet high on the road. Jack Barton, extension soil and water conservationist, said Brazzil made checks on moisture penetra. tions on these same fields as soon as conditions made it possible. The depth of penetration on stalk fields was 12 inches. On bare fields many spots could be found that were completely dry. Other spots wowed some moisture penetration, but under 12 inches

On February 24, the stubble was of even greater value. On that day, a severe dust storm with winds up to 80 and 90 miles an hour hit the county causing considerable wind damage to unprotected fields. Those fields amply protected with crop residue came through with no wind
