City crews complete the first spraying of the city last Saturday night to control mosquitos and other insect pests, according to an announcement made here Monday by Lloyd McMillan, City Utilities Superintendent.

McMillan stated that a heavy spray of chlordane and oil was used in the city fogging machine and all property within the city limits was sprayed, along with the city sewer farm, some two miles south of town.

He urges city residents to aid in the fight against mosquitos and flies by keeping their premises clean and all cans hauled off so that these pesky and dangerous insects can be controlled. Tall weeds and stagnant water in cans makes control by the city almost impossible, he said.

Abilene Man Seeks District Attorney Post

The Review is authorized to announce the candidacy of Reed Ingalsbe of Abilene, for the office of District Attorney of the 42nd Judicial District, subject to action of the Democratic Primaries.

His statement to the voters follows: "TO THE CITIZENS OF CALLAHAN, SHACKELFORD AND TAYLOR COUNTIES:"

With humble and grateful thanks, to the citizens of Taylor County who have permitted me to serve them as County Judge for these past five years, I would like to respectfully apply to all of the citizens of the 42nd Judicial District for a first term as District Attorney. You citizens of Taylor County have given me the finest kind of community support in the administration of your county affairs these past years, and I am truly grateful for your trust and confidence.

My first public office was that of Assistant County Attorney of Taylor County during the course of which I was able to play a small part in helping smash open and notorious bootlegging in Taylor County. I held this office for ten and one-half months during 1951, and then appointed to the office of County Judge of Taylor County, Texas, January 1, 1952.

I have tried hard to discharge the duties of your office in such a manner that the people of Taylor County could feel that their County Court had definite standards, principles and ideals which would be upheld to the honor of the people of this community.

I am a young man thirty-five years of age, and have lived in Taylor County since I was twenty-two years old. It was my good fortune to be able to persuade the former Nadine Hollingshead of Abilene, born and reared at Clyde in Callahan County, to marry me.

After completing thirty months of infantry service during World War II, I joined the United States Immigration Border Patrol, Department of Justice, and served tours of duty on both the southern and northern borders of the United States, following which I secured an indefinite leave from the Border Patrol to further my education.

As a young man with a wonderful wife and three fine children, I worked my way through Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene and Baylor University at Waco, graduating with a B. A. degree from Hardin-Simmons and a law degree from Baylor.

I am a member of the University Baptist Church and president of the Fellowship Sunday School Class, a member of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, Abilene-Taylor County Bar Association, State of Texas Bar Association, a member of the Board of Directors and past vice-president of the Abilene Kiwanis Club, a member of the Board of Directors of Abilene Boy's Ranch, a member of the Base Community Council, a charter member and officer of the Disabled American Veterans, and American Legion.

I am young enough to give you the untiring energy and vigorous attention to duty that your district requires, and yet old enough and experienced enough to conduct the affairs of the office with mature judgement and discretion.

I feel, and I believe that you feel, that the office of public prosecutor requires vigorous and efficient effort, if it is to be conducted successfully and reflect credit on the communities it serves.

Effective, vigorous prosecution is still the best deterrent to crime in any community.

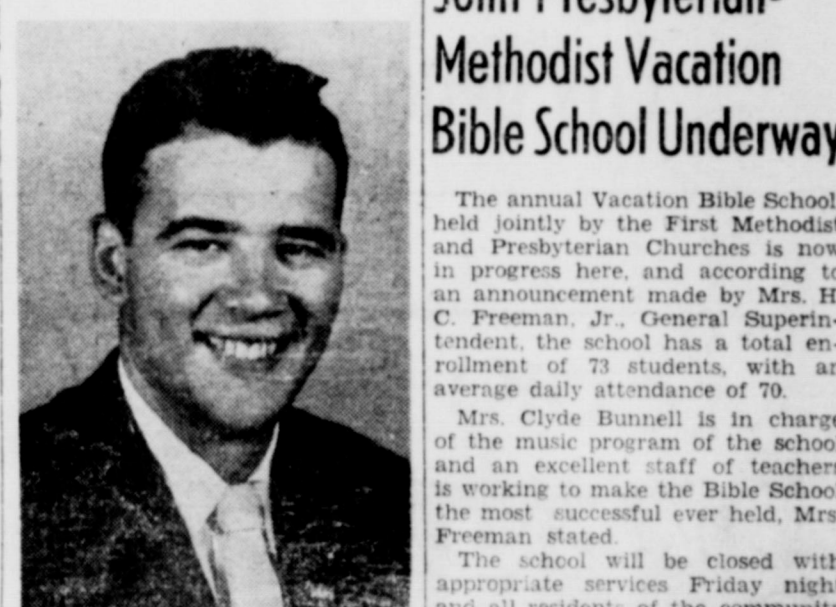
County Pioneer Ass'n To Hold Business Meeting In Baird, Saturday, June 2
