Diplomas May Come Harder. If the State Board of Education adopts its study-committee's proposals, future diplomas will come a little harder for Texas high school students. Suggestions included (1) two years, instead of one, of laboratory science, (2) a half unit more of government or history, (3) making physical education and health non-credit courses and (4) limiting athletic practice during school hours. Bus Segregation Still Law. Texas citizens still have the right to file criminal complaints against violating bus segregation laws. Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd has reiterated his official opinion that a recent U. S. Supreme Court decision did not invalidate Texas law in this area. "Any citizen may file a complaint against any bus driver or other person failing to comply with these laws," said Shepperd. His statement came in response to a query from Rep. Joe Pool of Dallas.
