JULY 20TH IS FINAL DATE TO SIGN U. S. ACREAGE RESERVE AGREEMENT

The final date to sign an agreement to participate in the 1956 acreage reserve part of the soil bank program is July 20, Barton B. McPherson, office manager of the Callahan County ASC, announced this week.

Producers are urged to sign agreements as soon as they have definitely decided to participate in the acreage reserve.

If payment is to be divided between tenant and landowner, both must sign agreement. Agreements are binding, and farmers should not sign until they understand the terms and are willing to abide by them.

Farmers who otherwise meet the eligibility requirements may take part in the 1956 acreage reserve under the following conditions:

1. Wheat, cotton, or peanuts were planted on the farm, but were destroyed by natural causes such as drought, hail, etc.

2. A crop of wheat, cotton, or peanuts is growing on the farm, but the farmer decides to plow under a part of the acreage in order to take part in the acreage reserve.

3. Underplanting the 1956 allotment of wheat, cotton, or peanuts either because of abnormal weather (drought) conditions, or in anticipation of taking part in the Soil Bank Program.

As nearly every farm is an individual case, farmers interested in the acreage reserve are requested to call at this office for complete details on the program.

Burleson Condemns Agriculture Department's Soil Bank Program

Anson—Congressman Omar Burleson has lodged a strong official protest with the Secretary of Agriculture in Washington against the method being used in paying for cotton acreage placed in the Soil Bank.

"It simply does not make sense", Burleson said, "that the man who has planted should be paid only \$6 an acre, while \$18 or more per acre is being paid on unplanted acreage. No such thing was intended by the Congress and it shows that the Department of Agriculture does not know what it is doing."

The Congressman says the whole Soil Bank provision of the farm bill is holding out false hopes, and that the administration of it is now adding insult to injury. He states that it was the best bill the Congress could pass without its being vetoed by the President, but was not nearly good enough.

Juvenile Car Thieves Caught At Cross Cut

Two Abilene juveniles, 13 and 14-year-olds, were caught in the Cross Cut community last Saturday about 11:00 a.m. after a running chase which saw area officers from Callahan, Brown and Coleman Counties close in on them for arrest on car theft charges.

The youths were charged with theft of a 1953 model Plymouth in Abilene Saturday morning. They stated that they were enroute to Lake Brownwood for a week end outing when they ran out of gas in the Cross Cut area. They were seen trying to steal gas out of a tractor belonging to Donald Baird of this city and Deputy Sheriff Alec Shockley was notified. White Plans New Legislation To Provide Protection For Farmers

Austin—New legislation to provide greater protection for the Texas farm industry is being planned by Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Commissioner White is conducting a series of conferences with farmers and agricultural businessmen over the state, mapping out proposals for submission to the Texas Legislature next year.

"My purpose is to let the farmers set up their own future goals and outline their needs", White said. "The Department of Agriculture will inaugurate programs on a self-supporting basis, eliminating the need for additional tax money from the state."

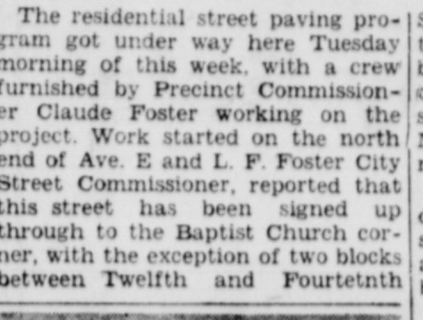
A major part of Commissioner White's departmental expenses are self-provided by fees for services rendered.

"This is the only practical way to adequately cover the increased demand by fees for new services to agriculture in the state", said White. The Commissioner, who is seeking re-election to the top agricultural job in Texas, pointed out that activities of his department have been expanded 400 percent since he first took office five years ago. Yet by putting the costs on a self-supporting plan, the burden of expense is kept from the shoulders of the taxpayers.

"My major concern is to improve our farmers' and ranchmen's economic outlook in these critical drought years", White added. "Our farm industry must have every opportunity to help itself pull out of the current slump."

This low-cost paving is made possible because the city agrees to do the base work and assume the cost of paving intersections and alley crossings. All blocks to be paved must be signed complete by all property owners on a voluntary basis. This program will give residential streets a 24-foot pavement at the nominal cost of \$6c per running foot to adjacent property owners. Specifications on the pavement are the same required by the State on Farm-to-Market roads.

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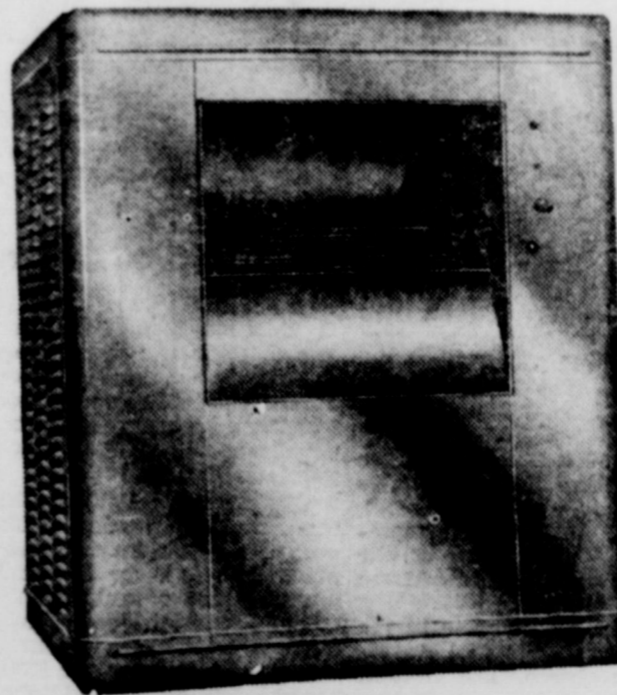

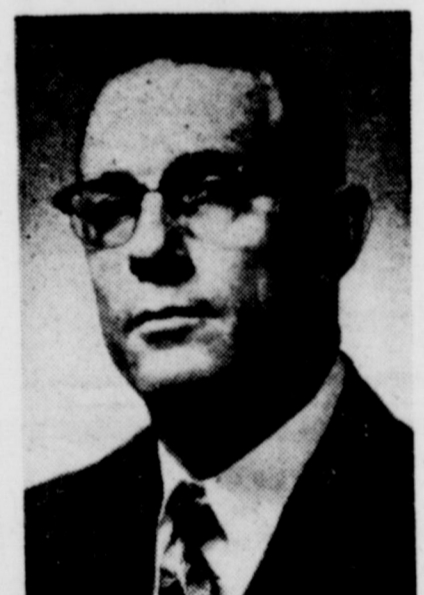

Value of County Farm Products Is Published

The value of products sold in 1964 by operators of 946 farms in Callahan County was \$3,356,772, according to a preliminary report of the 1964 Census of Agriculture published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The value of all crops sold was \$731,225 and included \$711,332 for field crops, \$5,857 for vegetables, \$12,936 for fruits and nuts, and \$1,060 for horticultural specialties.

The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$2,625,240 and included \$412,912 for dairy products, \$247,752 for poultry and poultry products, and \$1,964,576 for livestock and livestock products.

The value of forest products sold from the county's farms was \$307. Information on the value of farm products sold is presented for each county in a preliminary State report, copies of which may be purchased from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C., at 10 cents each.



Austin—Reunions, Rodeos, Fishing trips. From now until school starts, vacationing Texans will take to the highways by the thousands.
 They are likely to find the roads more crowded than at any time in the state's history.
 From year to year, total traffic volume has climbed steadily. Highway Department surveyors show. In addition, vacation months bring a steep jump.
 August especially is a headache for the Department of Public Safety. Accident rates climb sharply. During the past five years August accident rates have been from 3 to 27 per cent higher than in July.
 "People try to over-ride on a long vacation trip," says Asst. Chief C. G. Connor of the Texas Highway Patrol. "Fatigue is a particular problem. Speed is another."
 They can't do much about people who drive when they're too tired, Connor admits. But something can and has been done about speed.
 "Installation of radar detection has had a tremendous impact on driving practices," said Connor.
 Studies made before and after radar use was begun on state and federal highways in November, 1954, show: (1) excessive speeding dropped from 21 to 15 per cent, (2) accidents dropped 3.4 per cent and (3) deaths dropped 1.9 per cent.
 During the same period accidents on the non-radar-patrolled stretches—farm to market roads, city streets, etc.—climbed 13 per cent. A similar increase could have been expected on the state and federal highways, Connor believes, especially since total mileage increased also—nearly 5 per cent.
 Had normal trends continued, 181 more lives would have been lost in 1955.
Operation Alert Scheduled
 Would Texans know what to do if atomic bombs fell? To find out, a full-scale drill will be held July 20.
 Five key areas—Houston, El Paso, Austin, Waco and the Fort Worth-Dallas area—will be assumed hit by bombs between 11 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. that day.
 Smaller towns and rural areas also will participate in Operation Alert. Many have been designated as reception centers for evacuees from cities.
 State Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Headquarters in Austin has asked all mayors, county judges and other local civil defense officials to cooperate.
 Strategic industrial centers, such as Beaumont-Port Arthur, will

practice vacating plants and schools. Military bases will test their full-scale emergency measures.
 Purpose of the drill is to show up any flaws in the plan whereby federal, state and local officials and trained volunteers would cooperate to cope with a major catastrophe.
 Nationally, Operation Alert will presume 52 cities bombed. FCC has ordered all radio and TV stations off the air at 3:10 p.m. July 20. Special civil defense frequencies, 640 and 1240, will be used for test broadcasts of disaster instructions.
Physical Ed Teachers Reassured
 Physical education teachers won't be out of jobs if proposed new high school graduation requirements are adopted.
 Commissioner of Education J. W. Edgar clarified the plan for alarmed teachers. Physical education and health courses still are required by state law, he said.
 A state Board of Education study committee recommended they no longer be counted among the 16 units required for graduation. Committee suggestions were part of an overall effort to strengthen high school curricula academically, especially in scientific studies.
Vaccine Seen For Adults Soon
 Texans over 20 may be able to get polio vaccinations within "a month or so."
 But, said State Health Department officials, this is still "purely speculative." Actual timing will depend on when the vaccine supply exceeds that needed for youngsters and expectant mothers.
 In Texas, polio takes its heaviest toll among tots under four years old. They have 51.2 per cent of all cases, 69.1 per cent of paralytic cases.
 Persons over 20 account for only 17.4 per cent of total incidence, 6.8 per cent of paralytic cases.
 Forty-one new cases were reported in the state last week, bringing the 56 total to 440.
Worse And More Of It
 More and more Texans have less

and less water. In its monthly report, the State Water Board listed gloomy details:
 Texas reservoirs were down 17 percent, and observation wells and springs were at all-time lows.
 Storage in Trinity River basin lakes was at 27 per cent of capacity; in Red River Lakes, 55 per cent; in Lake Texoma, 51 per cent.
 Famous Comal Springs near New Braunfels ceased to flow for the first time in history.
 Ground water levels, below average in almost all areas, hit record lows in four areas.
 No general area of the state could claim normal rainfall. Statewide precipitation was 46 per cent of normal.

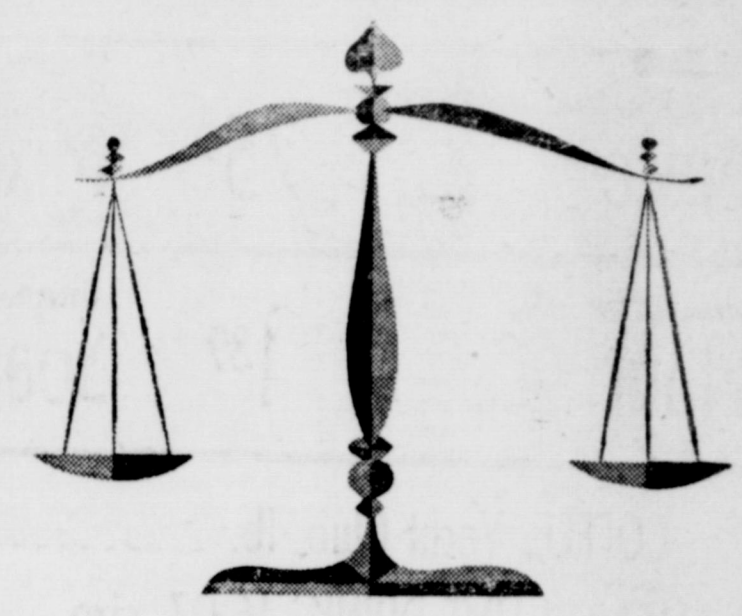

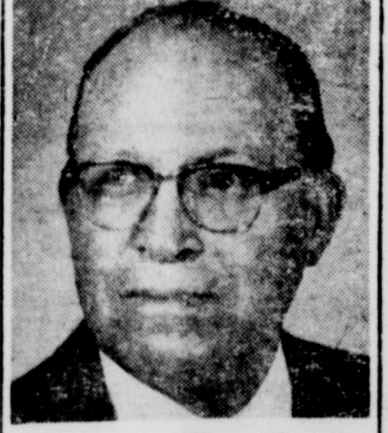
