August Primary Ballot To Carry Three Races

BAYOU PHILOSOPHER FINALLY FINDS THE TYPE OF WORK HE'S CUT OUT FOR, MAYBE

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou will get nowhere with his idea this week, but its doubtful if he wants to get anywhere.

Dear editor:

I was sitting out here on my farm yesterday afternoon watching the skies and wondering if it was going to rain when a puff of dry wind landed a newspaper right at my feet and since I'd noticed a red ant crawling on my shoe and needed to bend over to knock it off anyway I went ahead and bent over and while I was I picked up the paper and leaned back against the tree trunk and the first thing my eyes encountered was an article on rain-making.

I know a lot has been written about rain-making, some cities have hired rain-makers and while its hard to say whether they stirred up dry rain, there's no doubt about it they stirred up a lot of letters to the papers.

But this article was by a man who wasn't proposing we hire a rain-maker for a few isolated spots, but for huge sections of the country. As he viewed it, an attempt should be made to make more rain fall over wide areas of the United States where it's dry.

Now this sounds like a good proposal to me and won't cost nearly as much as foreign aid with very little difference in the results. In fact all it lacks really is one thing; a man who has discovered the trick of making it rain for sure. I know in every dry spot in the country candidates invariably include in their platform a mention of the drought situation, but it's sort of like being opposed to higher taxes, all candidates are but taxes haven't gone in any direction but up during my lifetime.

But what I started out to say was if they can't find this man, I'll substitute. I'll admit I can't make it rain, any more than Dulles can make Egypt behave, but I'm perfectly willing to take credit for any rain that falls, if there's pay in it for me. And if I go into this type of work, I'd want to go in on a big scale. No small, isolated spots for me. I'd like to undertake to make it rain somewhere in the United States at least once a week, every week in the year. Any week it didn't rain somewhere, my services wouldn't cost the government a cent. I'm all set up for this type of work and will appreciate your help in landing this job for me.

change-over possible.

For Dr. Holle it was the end of a several months' fight to get shots for persons 20 years of age and more.

Health Department statistics show that 16 per cent of all Texas' paralytic polio cases this year and 29 per cent of polio deaths hit persons over 19.

So far this year Texas has had 688 polio cases, 15 of them fatal. During the same period last year 701 cases were reported. Health officials credit vaccinations for the drop.

A statewide rainmaking effort may be launched to combat Texas' prolonged drought.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas has called a September meeting of the Texas Water Resources Committee to study this possibility.

First to advance the idea publicly was O. G. McClain, Corpus Christi member of the committee. A petroleum geologist, McClain contended that rain making is the "most economical way to get more water."

Even "with complete conservation and development," he said, "the water supply still would be terribly inadequate. What we need are some good rains. We cannot legislate them. They are not coming naturally. The only alternative is to work for them."

Employment Down After Peak

Rain and strike settlements are the twin keys to Texas' unstable employment outlook.

Texas jobholders hit an all-time high in June. More than three million, said the Texas Employment Commission. But by July the drought and the steel strike had dragged the figure down.

Whether employment picks up in August hinges on improvement of agricultural conditions and ending of labor disputes. Although the strike in the steel industry has been settled, two Texas plants are affected by the steel union strike against aluminum manufacturers.

Western Super Road

A superhighway to El Paso is being considered under the new federal state building program.

"We've been looking for a long time for an East-West alternate to U. S. Highway 80 through far West Texas," says DeWitt Greer, state highway engineer. "And our chances are increased with all this new federal money for interstate and defense highways."

Veterans' Land Judgments

State recovery of veterans' land funds eventually could total \$3,000,000.

An Austin district court has just awarded the state \$112,742 from a South Texas dealer. This brings the present recovery total to \$1,770,000.

Still pending are suits involving another \$1,130,000.

This recovery program has been a mammoth job. Few people realize how intensive this investigation has been. "Investigators of the Land Office and the Veteran's Land Program," says Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd, "have been the most extensive and thorough in the State's history."

Latest reports from the Attorney General's office show that 35 cases have been filed, 24 have been tried, and the state has won them all. Twenty-three grand juries have been active in 18 counties. Every transaction of the Land Office has been checked. Over 200 witnesses have been called in to testify. And every bidder on every type of lease has been contacted.

How thorough the investigation has been is indicated by the fact that the bank accounts and income tax statements of employees of the Land Office for the past ten years were voluntarily submitted and carefully examined.

In addition each of the 16,000 veterans who purchased land under the program has been contacted. Also the 3,000 whose applications had been denied.

A total of 800 depositions and 30,000 questionnaires were examined and four separate courts of inquiry held.

Making independent investigations have been the FBI, Internal Revenue Department, U. S. Post Office, State Auditor, Department of Public Safety, five Legislative Committees, the AG's office and the American Legion.

Fall Cattle Movement Under Way Early?

Fort Worth—Numbers of cattle and calves being moved in the Southwest indicate that the Fall movement is underway from 30 to 90 days ahead of normal shipping dates, in the opinion of many observers at Fort Worth this week.

Rail car movements of cattle out of principal grass areas lend strength to this belief, and the runs at Fort Worth's Stockyards in the past few weeks have been well ahead of the same interval last year.

The situation is not limited to Texas alone. Conditions in the Flint Hills of Kansas and the Osage of Oklahoma recently have led to some early movement out of these sections. Unless conditions change abruptly the general exodus from these areas will be under way at least a month ahead of normal shipping dates.

Dry conditions are blamed for the situation and all observers agree that to avert serious price breaks the livestock producers will have to stay in close touch and avoid excessive bunching of shipments.

One important meeting along this line will be held in Fort Worth this week when representatives of the market agencies and others on the market will get together and try to work out means of cooperation in spreading receipts out through the week so that excessive price breaks can be avoided.

Lighter Runs Brings Stable Cattle Prices.

Monday the 12 major markets reported about 33,000 less cattle and calves than a week earlier. The result was a stiffening of prices on most kinds. At Fort Worth good fed cattle were stronger, and grassy slaughter steers, yearlings and heifers were steady.

Cows were steady to strong, with some sales of strongweight canners and cutters 25 to 50 cents above the low close of last week. Bulls were steady to 25 cents or more higher, some of the medium weights selling to better advantage.

Slaughter calves were generally steady, and stocker and feeders sold at firm prices. Higher grade stockers were quite active and in too small supply to fill the needs.

Comparative prices: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings \$16.50 - 21.00, quotable above \$22.

Plain and medium butcher cattle \$10 to \$16.50. Fat cows drew \$8.50 to \$11, and canners and cutters sold from \$6 to \$8.50, a few light canners below \$6. Strong weight cutters sold to \$8.75 and \$9. Bulls returned \$8 to \$12.50. Good and choice slaughter calves \$14 to \$17, with baby teeves \$17 to \$18.50 weighing around 575 pounds and upwards.

Lower grades killing calves \$8 to \$14. Stocker steer calves \$13 to \$19 and steer yearlings mostly \$17 downward. Heiferettes in stocker flesh sold \$2 to \$3 under steers.

Hogs Open Higher With Top \$17.00 - 17.25.

Choice mead hogs at \$17 and Thursday. The big crop over last week's close. Less desirable weights and grades cashed at \$13 to \$16.75. Sows drew mostly \$13 to \$14, and stags sold around \$5 to \$8.

Lambs Close Weak To \$1.00 Lower, Top \$21.

At Fort Worth Monday the offering of sheep and lambs was again largely medium and lower grades and prices were about steady on all classes, except slaughter lambs. Killing types of lambs sold weak to \$1 lower and good and choice kinds topped at \$19 to \$21. Cull to medium lambs sold mostly from \$12 to \$18, with some light culls downward to \$8 that weight around 35 to 40 pounds or less. Stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$12 to \$13.50, and were considered quotable above that in load lots closely sorted.

Slaughter ewes sold from \$4.50 to \$5.25, and some old wethers drew \$8 to \$12.50.

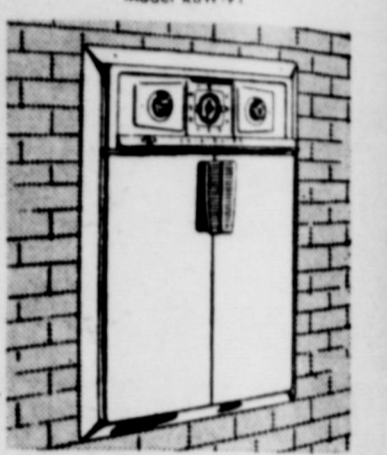
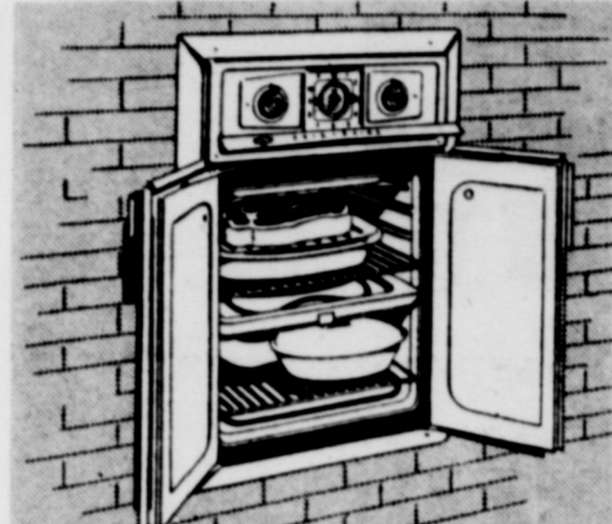
