Satisfied With Your Community?

What is your community like? Is it the sort of place where families enjoy living? Are school, church, health and recreation facilities adequate? Or, do you often hear people say, "Our community is dying... if something could only be done about it."

One hundred and eighty-seven of these were enrolled in the Rural Neighborhood Progress contests sponsored by the Agricultural Extension Service and the Farmer Stockman Magazine. Deadline for enrollment in the contest for '57 is December 31.

"Group action and interest achieved amazing results in communities that were on the verge of dying out," says Reagan Brown, extension rural sociologist, who assisted other extension personnel in planning with community leaders—"Individuals have different ideas about what is lacking in a community and what should be done about it. They need to pool and discuss ideas, to agree on what solutions are worthy of effort."

Some groups centered their interests around social activities such as recreation, church, school and drives for public facilities. Still others began by improving their homes, farms and ranches. Some organized to improve health conditions and service. In every case, as other needs arose, the programs were expanded to include more activities.

Begin now to do something about your community. Talk to friends and neighbors. Discuss it with your extension agents. There are bulletins available that give suggestions on how to proceed. Ask for a copy of "NEIGHBORHOOD PROGRESS THROUGH ORGANIZED ACTION".

an all time high Nov. 6. Comptroller's estimate is 2,410,188, compared to the previous record of 2,338,261 in 1952. More than 90 per cent of Texas counties now are eligible for emergency drought relief. A low bid of \$977,659 was received by the Texas Turnpike Authority for erection of four buildings along the Dallas-Fort Worth Toll Road. Structures will include two restaurant-services stations, a maintenance building and an operations building. With school enrollments going up, number of prospective teachers is going down, reports the University of Texas Teacher Placement Bureau. This year, 1,143 candidates for teaching positions registered, compared to 1,172 last year. Texas November oil production has been set by the Railroad Commission at 3,314,390 barrels a day on a 15-day production pattern. This will be a 72,986 barrel-a-day increase over October. Texas Department of Health is urging intensive mosquito control campaigns to halt increased outbreak of encephalitis (sleeping sickness). More than 300 cases have been reported in the state this year. Atty. Gen. William King has named to succeed Bradley Bourland as state securities commissioner to practice law in Austin. He is a former assistant attorney general. Texas December draft quota this year, according to State Selective Service Headquarters, is 877 men. It is the largest quota in Texas this year. The draft law has passed the total for time a year ago.

Austin—Eight decisions on state policy soon will be square up to the voters. In addition to party candidates, eight proposed amendments to the state constitution will appear on the general election ballot.

Through a procedural slip-up a ninth will be considered at a special election on Nov. 13.

Each amendment will be printed on the ballot twice—once preceded by FOR and once by AGAINST. Voters must mark out the statement they oppose and leave the other clear.

Gist of the amendments and arguments pro and con:

1. Authorizes the legislature to compensate persons fined or imprisoned for crimes they did not commit. PRO: Would make amends for hardships unjustly imposed on the innocent. CON: Might open the door to fraudulent claims.
2. Allows county commissioners courts to vary allocations of tax money without special elections. PRO: Greater flexibility would make for greater efficiency in county financial management. CON: Commissioners courts would have too much authority.
3. Adds other colleges to the building program financed by the University of Texas Permanent Fund and authorizes investment of the fund in corporate stocks and bonds as well as government bonds. PRO: Would provide an increase in college building money without new taxes. CON: Risk involved in wider investments is not worth the possible return.
4. Increases the benefits of the teacher retirement system. PRO: Would attract more persons to the dwindling profession. CON: Would increase taxpayer obligations by \$4,500,000, take a larger nick out of teacher's salaries.
5. Authorizes another \$100,000,000 bond issue for veterans land buying. PRO: Program has been put in order, and additional money is needed to enable more veterans to participate. CON: Program does not permit public confidence; only about one per cent of Texas veterans have benefited.
6. Provides a different oath of office from the elective and appointive officials. PRO: Would clarify present inconsistencies. CON: Clutters constitution with minor details.
7. Requires competent medical or physical testimony before commitment of a person to a mental institution and allows waiver of jury trial, except in criminal cases. PRO: A mentally ill person should not be "convicted" as a criminal. CON: Jury trial is a safeguard against "railroading" of persons into mental institutions.
8. Permits judge to deny bail to persons convicted of two previous felonies. PRO: Would curb habitual criminals. CON: Right of bail is one of our fundamental civil rights.
9. Authorizes the Legislature to give aid with federal assistance to citizens permanently and totally disabled by a mental or physical handicap. PRO: State has a moral obligation to these needy persons. CON: Tie-in with federal program would lead to more federal encroachment.

as simple as that. Machine voting is even simpler. All you do is pull the lever by the name of the candidate you want to vote for, in whatever column you choose. The machines are so designed that you can vote only for one candidate for any office.

If you want to vote for a candidate whose name does not appear on the printed ballot, you can write his name in—in the write-in column which is provided for that purpose. Such column appears on both the paper ballots and the machine ballots. On the paper ballots you should scratch out the names of all candidates for the same office.

Election laws say that your write in ballot will be counted even though your spelling may not be exactly correct—and even the last name of the candidate is sufficient.

NAACP Ban Granted
Pending further court tests, the NAACP is out of business in Texas. After a tedious five-week hearing, Tyler Dist. Judge Otis T. Dunagan granted a temporary injunction brought by the state against the NAACP.

State Loses Land Case
Private owners won out in an argument with the state over what constitutes "submerged land." Texas Supreme Court ruled that "ordinary high tide" rather than "highest tide" is the determining factor. As a result, private owners retain 472 acres in Copano Bay, Aransas County, Texas had sought to claim the area, which is near oil and gas fields, as tidelands.

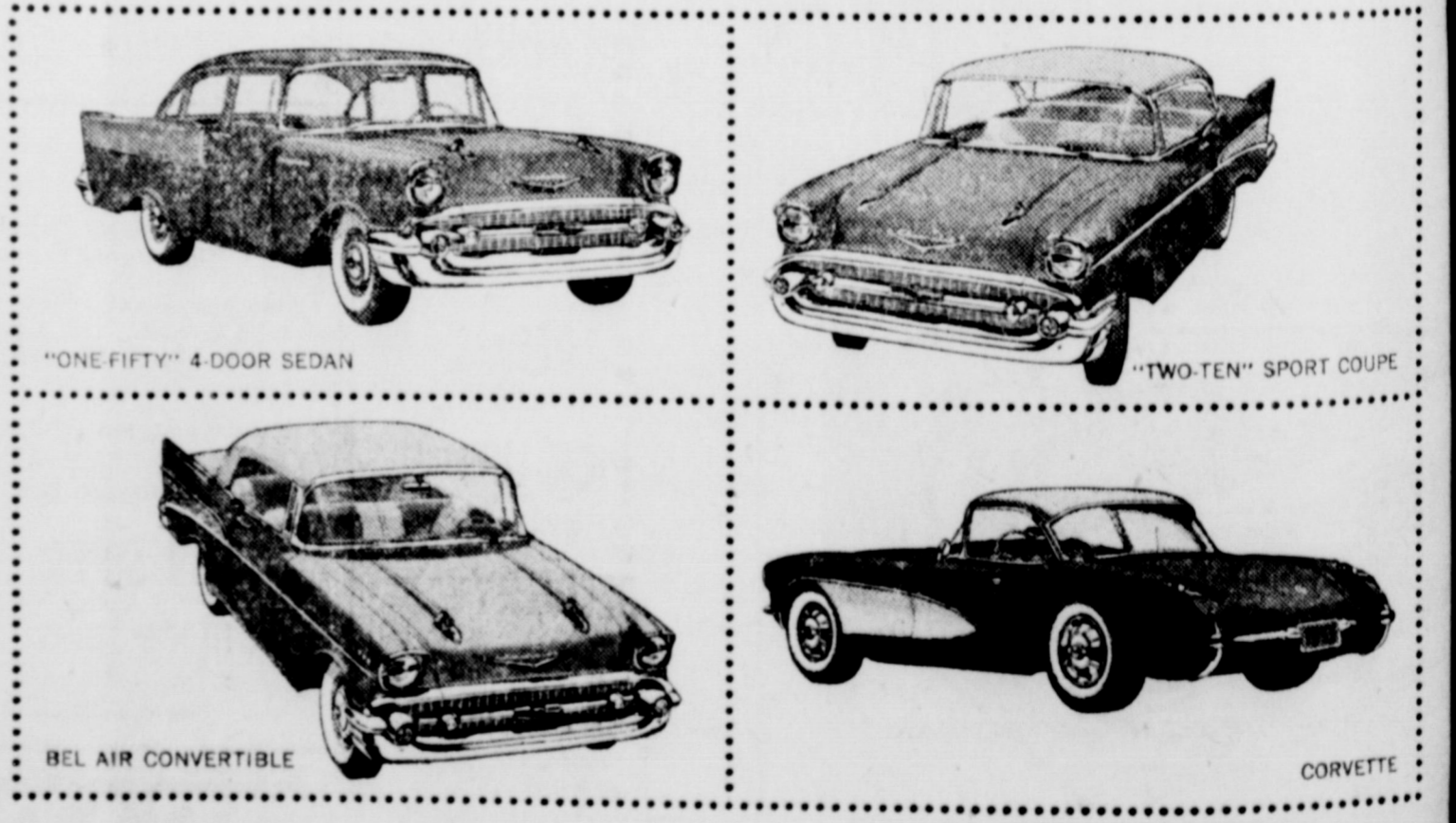

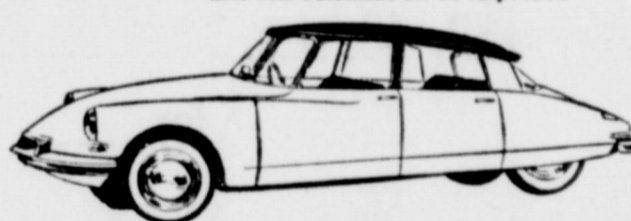

Callahan County TB Association Announces Opening Of Christmas Seal Sale Drive

Mrs. Jessie Pyeatt of Clyde, President of the Callahan County Tuberculosis Association, announced this week that the county organization is joining in the annual nation-wide TB Christmas Seal Sale program, beginning Nov. 15, and asks that citizens of the county back this worthy drive by purchasing the stamps.

County Association officers are: Mrs. Jessie Pyeatt, Clyde, president; Mrs. Fred Cutbirth, Cross Plains, first vice-president; Mrs. W. P. Brightwell, Baird, second vice-president; Mrs. H. W. Hartin, Baird, secretary-treasurer and Mrs. C. H. Sadows, Seal Chairman.

One third of the people in the United States today are infected with live tubercule bacilli.

This fact stands out in the face of the tremendous progress made against tuberculosis in recent years. For the first time in history, progress against tuberculosis has overshadowed the tragedy of the disease. The death rate has been reduced drastically—95 per cent since 1900, bringing it down to 10 per 100,000 populations today. Yet—

Tuberculosis is still the giant among infectious-disease killers in this country, killing more people than all other infectious diseases combined. It is killing 45 persons, a day, causing one death every half hour.

Nearly 150,000 Americans are suffering from active tuberculosis today. 150,000 of these unreported to health authorities.

Approximately 100,000 new cases of tuberculosis are being reported annually, at the rate of one every five minutes.

Between 50,000,000 and 60,000,000 people in this country are tuberculin reactors. In other words, the tuberculin skin sensitivity tests shows that one third of the population is harboring the seeds of tuberculosis. If the rate of breakdowns among the infected continues as at present, then 2,700,000 people who are tuberculin reactors today will have active tuberculosis during their lifetime.

Progress in saving lives of tuberculosis patients has been tremendous. Unfortunately, progress made in preventing tuberculosis disease has been relatively slight.

Medical and Public Health Advances
Credit for the strides made in preventing deaths from tuberculosis should go to medical advances, improved and stepped-up case finding and other public health measures, better living and working conditions.

Outstanding among the medical advances are the availability of drugs effective in treating tuberculosis and refinements in surgery.

But before treatment can begin, the disease must be diagnosed. And health authorities believe there are at least 150,000 people in this country suffering from tuberculosis whose disease has never been reported and who may not be under medical care.

The principal drugs in use are isoniazid, streptomycin, and paraaminosalicylic acid (PAS). None of these actually kills all the tubercule bacilli in the patient's body. The drugs slow up or inhibit multiplication of the germs.

With drugs, the period of infectiousness may be relatively brief. As a result, the stay in the hospital has been shortened for many patients. But even after leaving the hospital the patient must continue treatment at home. Unless the utmost precaution is taken, there is always danger that the disease will flare up and the individual will become infectious again.

To prevent the breakdown of patients who are already on the road to recovery, it is necessary not only to see that they continue to receive satisfactory medical treatment, but also that they receive help in emotional and economic problems which may hinder their complete recovery.

More and more people are living today with tuberculosis that has been converted from active to inactive—approximately 800,000. This number can be expected to increase. Until permanency of cure can be assured, this high prevalence of inactive TB is a constant if quite threat to control of the disease.

High Cost of TB
Satisfaction of saving of lives of tuberculosis patients is tempered by the realization that even today 1,200,000 Americans require medical care or supervision for active or inactive tuberculosis, that another 50,000,000 or more are unwilling hosts to live tubercule bacilli, that tuberculosis is costing this country \$600,000,000 a year, largely in tax dollars.

The drive against tuberculosis in the United States is conducted by the U. S. Public Health Service, state and local departments, and the voluntary associations affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Association.

The NTA has constituents in every state and a number of large cities. The state associations have affiliated local associations which carry on tuberculosis control work within their city or county. Thus, there is a vast network of 3,000 voluntary tuberculosis associations across the country. The work of the associations falls into the broad categories of health education, case finding, rehabilitation, and medical and social research. It is supported by the annual sale of Christmas Seals. Of the money raised each year, 94 per cent remains within the state and 6 per cent is allocated to the NTA.

In 1956, the tuberculosis association are carrying on the 50th Christmas Seal Sale in the United States. The first sale of Christmas Seals was conducted in December 1907 by Miss Emily Bissell to raise funds for a small tuberculosis hospital in Wilmington, Del. Since that year, the Christmas Seal Sale has spread to every state and territory of the United States.
