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### Postmaster Gives Pointer On Christmas Mailing

In anticipation of the largest holiday mail volume in history, Postmaster F. R. Anderson called attention to ten basic pointers outlined this week by Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield for users of the mails to follow in order to assure prompt and safe delivery of their Christmas cards and gifts.

1. Address mail fully and clearly. Write legibly or print plainly. Where applicable, use zone numbers on the address and return address. Avoid using abbreviations which might confuse mail handlers.

2. Be certain that a return address is printed on the upper left hand corner of both Christmas cards and parcels. This will prevent any undelivered mail ending up in a "dead letter" office.

3. Do not enclose coins or hard objects of any kind in letters, without marking the envelope for hand stamping. High speed canceling machines cannot process such letters, often jam and damage letters.

4. Do not mail cash in any Christmas gift. For safety's sake, use Postal Money Orders or checks.

5. Make sure parcels are well packed and securely wrapped in strong containers. Cushioning material, such as excelsior, shredded newspapers or tissue paper should be evenly and firmly placed on all sides of the Christmas gift. The carton should be wrapped in heavy paper and securely tied with strong twine.

6. Gifts of a delicate nature, such as glass, china, electrical appliances, radios and musical instruments must be marked "Fragile" by the mailer. Food stuffs should be marked "Perishable" if subject to spoilage.

7. Insure parcels. Register letters of real value. Where only proof of delivery is required for letters of no

intrinsic value use Certified Mail. Use Combination Mail where a letter or message — other than a gift tag — is to be enclosed inside a Christmas package.

8. Ask at any post office for the free pamphlet, "Post Office Department Publication No. 3" which contains rates of postage and limits of size and weight for domestic mail. Another free pamphlet at post offices entitled "Packing and Wrapping Parcels For Mailing."

9. Mail Christmas cards and parcels early to avoid the last minute rush and waiting in line at the post office. The best times to avoid crowds at stamp windows in most post offices are before 10 a.m. and between 1:30 and 3:30 p.m.

10. Every postal employee is happy to answer questions on postal rules and regulations. Anyone with problems about mailing his Christmas parcels should avail himself of the opportunity of discussing the problems with postal employees, and take advantage of their experience.

### Marine Corps Seeking Young Aviation Recruits

The United States Marine Corps is now seeking qualified young men for direct assignment to aviation schools.

The invitation of the new program was announced this week by Technical Sergeant L. R. Posey of the Marine Corps Recruiting Sub-Station, in Abilene.

Sergeant Posey said that, "Young men who are interested in aviation and who are qualified for enlistment in the regular Marine Corps may request assignment to aviation. The Marine Corps," he went on, "will guarantee assignment to an aviation school of the man's choice in so far as school quotas permit."

Under the new program, men requesting this type of duty will be assigned to an aviation school of their choice upon completion of recruit training.

Young men selected for or who choose aviation, will have over 20 schools to which they may request assignment. They range from Aviation Fundamentals and Jet Aircraft

and Helicopter Mechanics through Radar, Radio and Training Devices, Electronics and Electricians schools, Photo Technician and Air Launched Guided Missiles.

Sergeant Posey stressed that men who are interested should contact the Abilene Recruiting Station located in the Old Postoffice Building at 900 N. 3rd. Street, immediately to take advantage of his program.

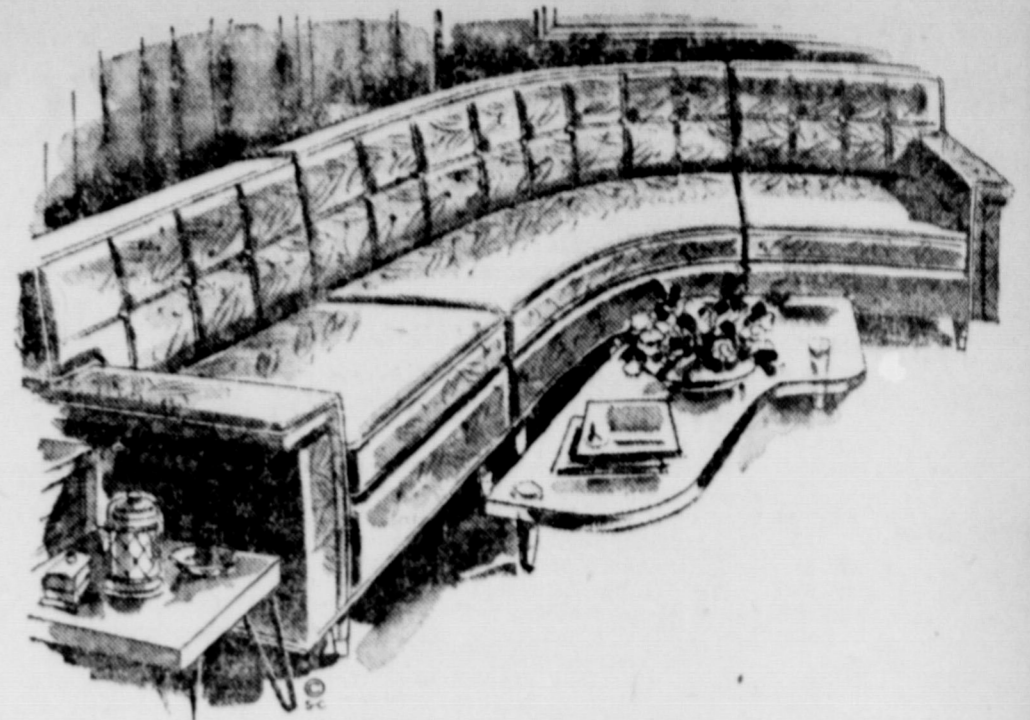

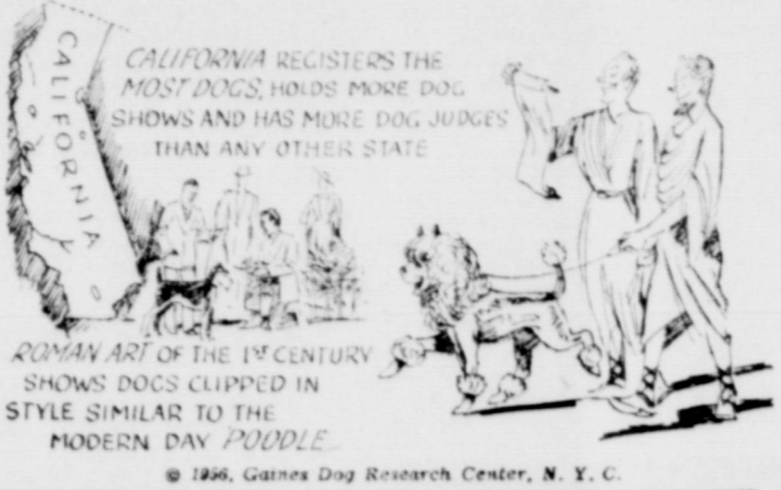

## State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Austin's feud over O. Henry's "Honeymoon house" has people over the state taking sides.

Bone of contention is a weather-beaten frame cottage where the famed short story writer took his bride 69 years ago. History-lovers want to preserve it as a "beautiful tribute." Austin Heritage Society gained City Council permission to move it into a park adjoining an executive westside residential area.

Nearby homeowners call it a "vermin-infested junk heap." They say they'll sue.

While park-lovers fumed, history-lovers got the house loaded on a truck, began inching it into the park. Stories went out across the country and brought back a tide of advice for each group. But no solution.

**Co-Op Case Reopened**  
Texas Supreme Court has agreed to take another look at a case to decide electric power selling rights. Issue is whether rural electric cooperatives can continue service in areas after they are annexed by cities. In August the Supreme Court refused to review lower court decisions in favor of the co-ops.

Suit was brought by the attorney general, numerous private utility companies and the League of Texas Municipalities. On the other side is the Upshur Rural Electric Cooperative, backed by 54 other co-ops and the City of Gilmer.

Private utilities contend the law restricts co-ops to towns of 1,500 or less. Co-ops say they can't be thrown out once they've legally entered an area.

No date for argument was set by the high court.

and increased discharge of industrial waste have greatly increased its responsibilities in checking local water supplies, reports the State Department of Health. Accelerated growth of Texas cities created another problem. Officials estimated some 25 to 30 per cent of the 800 domestic sewage units inspected were overloaded. **Experts Urge Consistent Safety Habits For Public**

Increasing pressure is being exerted by professional safety men, as 1956 draws to a close, in urging consistent safety habits on the part of the general public.

"One of the primary factors in any safety program is the responsibility of the individual," said J. O. Musick, General Manager, Texas Safety Association, in his Austin Office Monday.

"You must be your brother's keeper! This rule of life goes hand in hand with the natural instinct for self-preservation," Musick said. "If a careless act of yours provokes an accident, you are the one responsible for any injury or loss of life that results—to yourself or to another."

He said too many walkers take their obligation lightly, and thereby add to the alarmingly high traffic toll each year.

"Now, while the Texas Safety Association is conducting its pedestrian protection program, is a good time for each of us to take a critical look at our own traffic behavior," Musick suggested.

He offered the following safe walking rules, approved by the Texas Safety Association, as a guide to sensible pedestrian behavior.

1. Cross street watchfully and at intersections only.
2. Never walk into street from behind parked cars.
3. Obey traffic signs and signals, cross on GREEN or WALK only.
4. Wait on sidewalk, not in street, for green light or walk signal or for gap in traffic if intersection has no traffic signal.
5. Cross streets in crosswalks, and do not cross intersections diagonally.
6. Look left and right for traffic, while crossing. Watch sharply for turning cars. Be especially careful at one-way crossings to check the direction of approaching traffic.
7. Do not go around a bus or streetcar, front or rear, after alighting from it. Wait till it leaves before crossing the street.
8. Do not rely on a driver seeing you on poorly lighted streets or in roadways at night. Carry a flashlight, wear light-colored or reflective clothing, or carry something white or reflective.
9. Face traffic and walk on left while walking in areas where there are no sidewalks.

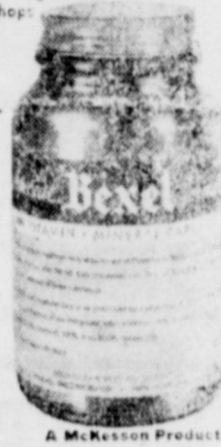

**HEALTH NOTES**

Austin, October 18—All of us at one time or another have pain and cramping in the abdomen. Fortunately, most of these pains are unimportant. However, if the pain persists it should not be ignored. It may be the beginning sign of appendicitis, a disease which, although far from being simple, is easily and safely cured if surgery can be performed in time, says Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health.

There are two main types of appendicitis—acute and chronic. Acute appendicitis strikes suddenly. It is usually marked by severe pain, that generally grows sharper and stronger. Occasionally, the pain may let up or stop entirely, but this must not be taken to mean that the attack is over. In fact, it may be a warning signal that the appendix has ruptured, thus lessening the localized pain, while a more serious condition—peritonitis—usually gets a start. Other usual signs of acute appendicitis are slight fever, nausea, vomiting and tenderness over the region of the appendix. Chronic appendicitis is just what its name implies, it comes and goes. But it may, at any time, become acute. It results from acute attacks that have been mild enough to subside without an operation. Symptoms in general are the same as in the acute type, but they are also similar to other adverse abdominal conditions, and only a physician can determine accurately what is wrong.

Operations for the removal of the appendix are comparatively simple and safe, if the patient has not taken a laxative and has called the doctor in time. The use of laxatives or enemas is one of the leading causes of appendicitis deaths. The action caused by the laxative or enema increases the pressure in the appendix and may cause it to burst. A ruptured appendix spreads infection and peritonitis often results. Modern drugs are now quite successful in the treatment of peritonitis, but this condition is still serious and may cause death.

Usually the pain begins abruptly, often mild at first, but it also may be quite severe. It may disappear for a while, and then return in increasingly severe cramps. It is important to note the location of the pain. It does not typically begin in the right lower part of the abdomen as is commonly thought, but is generally over the whole abdomen. In a short time it begins to localize, first toward the middle and later to the right lower part of the abdomen. By this time, the inflammation is quite active and the muscles overlying the diseased appendix are sore to touch. A better sign is the sharp grabbing pain that occurs if the pressure of the hand on the abdomen is suddenly released. This reaction, known as rebound tenderness, indicates irritation of the peritoneum beneath.

If sudden persistent abdominal pain makes its appearance, there are three important rules to follow. They are: go to bed, call your doctor, and do not take any laxative or enema.

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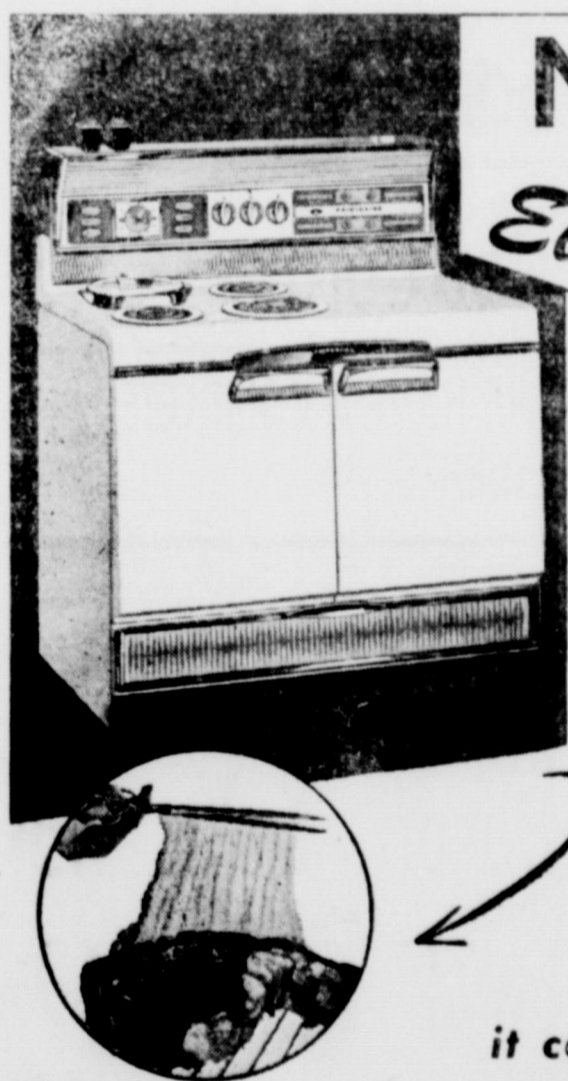

## Soil Conservation District News

John D. Clark, a diversified livestock producer in the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District has developed 400 acres of sandy brushland into productive pastureland. He has done this by bulldozing the brush and then chopping the bulldozed brush with the Caldwell Cutter and sowing the area to oats for winter and spring pasture.

Clark bought 400 acres of the Rea Estate, which is in Comanche County five miles east of Rising Star, in 1932. About 400 acres was unfenced sandy brushland, the production potential of which has been known for many years but the most practical and profitable methods of developing it has been questionable.

Clark has 147 acres of the brushland that was cut and sown to oats in 1953. This year the oats have volunteered to a good stand and are producing good pasture at the present time. The remainder of the 400 acres was cut and sown to oats this fall. He has a good stand of oats on this area now.

"Because of the present drought with its unfavorable moisture conditions for summer and fall pasture, I figure my best bet for good pasture development on this type land would be winter and spring grasses or grain. Ordinarily, I would plant rye on land as sandy as this but because the land is new with a high fertility level I selected oats because it is more nutritious," Clark stated.

"In a few years, after the brush is under control, I plan to sow all the brushland to native grasses. I don't think it is practical to do so now since it takes large numbers of goats to keep the brush down. I believe the goats will destroy small grass seedlings before they can get established. About five years of intensive control of the brush I believe we can sow this land to native grasses and come out with very good grassland," Clark said.

According to Clark's figures he has been able to get about five acres for an animal unit by sowing the oats after the cutting operation. He grazed cattle, sheep, goats and horses on this treated brushland in 1955.

"I believe I got more than three times as much production on this place as I got on my hardland place southeast of here. I have about \$25 an acre, including the cost of the land, invested in this place and by the time I get it in good grass condition it will have paid for itself," Clark stated.

"The cost of putting a net wire fence around 490 acres runs pretty high. The cost of livestock water development and bulldozing and cutting brush is high too but when you can make better than 20 percent a year on your investment I believe it is worth it," Clark said.

Clark believes that some of this area's most productive soil is in unused brushland which can be profitably developed into high producing grassland if properly managed.

## Father Of Correspondent Buried At Clyde

Luther L. Cutbirth Sr., 60, retired farmer, died at his home in Clyde Wednesday, Nov. 21 following an extended illness. He has been seriously ill the past five months. He was the father of Mrs. B. B. Crow, Review news correspondent of Rowden.

Mr. Cutbirth was born April 3, 1876 at Valley Mills. He married Ronda Mae Ragsdale July 13, 1899, and they moved to Callahan County in 1900. He farmed for many years in the Eula community.

He retired in 1940 and the couple moved into Clyde where they had lived since.

Funeral services were held Thursday at 3 p.m. at the First Baptist Church at Clyde. The Rev. Walter C. Dever of Abilene, former pastor officiated, assisted by the pastor of the church, the Rev. DeWitt Chandler.

Burial was in Clyde Cemetery. Survivors include his wife; three sons, T. O. and W. T., both of Fort Worth; six daughters, Mrs. W. J. Hannaford of Clyde, Mrs. Crow of Rowden, Mrs. A.
