#### **GI Survivors To Receive** Help In Choosing Benefits

Protection against the wrong choice of death benefits under the new Survivor Benefits Act will be extended to widows, guardians or children and dependent parents now receiving compensation for the service-connected death of veterans Scott B. Harrington, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office in Dallas, said today.

Every election of benefits submitted by beneficiaries under the new law will be studied to determine whether the person selected the lower instead of the higher monthly payment to which he or she may be eligible, Harrington said.

If the lower monthly payment has been selected, Mr. Harrington pointed out, no action will be taken on the election, but a letter explaining the difference between the two payments will be sent to the benefici-



#### Turkey Farmers In For Tough Times

College Station .-- Turkey producers will probably have a tough time marketing birds at a profit in 1957, say extension poultry marketing specialist F. Z. Beanblossom and extension economist John G. McHaney. Government purchases through the school lunch program eased last year's situation somewhat, yet little or no profit was realized from turkey enterprises.

Feed-dealer credit sources featuring risk-sharing plans of production financing are factors which may influence farmers to continue turkey production at a higher rate during 1957, although prices received for the record 1956 crop were the lowest in several years.

The specialists say some of the pressure from the expected large crop may be relieved by current trends which are lengthening turkey sales into a year-round business instead of seasonal holiday buying However, it will not completely solve the marketing problem of surplus production, they warn.

Both national and state testing reports indicate an increase in the number of breeder hens. In Texas, on Dec. 15, 1956, 40 per cent more hens had been tested than by the same date in 1955. USDA reports indicate that U. S. farmers intend to hold 18 per cent more heavy breeder hens and three per







Applications for SCS help under he comparatively new Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act Public Law 566) now total 113. mith reported. Modification of the Act has made it easier for municipalities and special purpose districts to make use of the program in Barr. meeting local water needs.

In the new watershed protection program, municipalities or other auhorized organizations can build water storage into a floodwater retarding structure by paying the difference in cost, Smith explained. The city of Kaufman, in the Kaufman-Van Zandt Soil Conservation District, was the first Texas city to take advantage of the water storing opportunity

Added capacity of 1.834 acre feet was built into a floodwater retarding structure on Big Cottonwood Creek, a small watershed in the big Upper Trinity flood prevention program

The 1,834 acre feet of storagenearly 600 million gallons-was provided at a cost to Kaufman of \$18,-

Smith said construction has started on a similar project near Coolidge, to provide 355 acre feet of storage for that city in the Pin Oak Creek watershed program.

In the new watershed protection program the government can lend to \$5 million for periods of as ong as 50 years at a rate of about 1-2 per cent. The loan is retired on an annual basis. There is no such loan provision in the older Upper Trinity and Middle Colorado flood prevention program.

SCS is authorized by the new law to cooperate with local subdivisions of government in building structures up to 5000 acre feet of floodwater detention capacity. Additional storage up to 25,0000 acre feet in total capacity can be provided for muniCross Plains Review - 6
