QUESTION: Bill is a traveling salesman. On a recent sales trip he decided to take his wife along. She spent her days sightseeing; but in the evenings she acted as a hostess and helped her husband entertain

prospective clients. Can Bill deduct her expenses?

ANSWER: Probably not! The Tax Court has held that for a wife's expenses to be deductible, a valid business reason for her presence must be shown. Simply taking notes or helping to entertain clients probably was not a sufficient





### Students May Now Collect More Money

Students who get monthly social security payments may now get checks for a short time after their 22nd birthday, according to Carl H. Thompson, manager of the Clovis Social Security office.

Under a change in the law, an undergraduate student can continue to get social security payments through the end of the semester or quarter in which he reaches age 22.

If the student's school does not use the semester or quarter system, payments can continue until he completes the course he's taking or 2 months after he reaches 22, whichever comes

"The change means that students will no longer face the problem of having their benefits stop in the middle of a semester.

"Over 4,000 students in New Mexico are now getting monthly checks because a parent insured under social security retired, became disabled, or died. Checks for dependent children normally stop at age 18, but payments continue as explained above for young people who are in school full time and remain unmarried," Thompson concluded.

The first completely revised introduced by Rep. Bill Clayton.

Clayton said it was a short and simple document containing the basic Bill of Rights and other articles relating to the executive, legislative and judicial branches of government. Two important sections to the Bill of Rights were added. One would provide Texas with a permanent right to work law, and the second would require the State to remain on a pay-as-you-go

Clayton said the main reason he introduced a resolution calling for a new constitution at this time was to start legislators thinking about ideas they might want to consider at the constitutional revision session next year.

A feature he considers unique in his bill would allow for a smooth transition from the old to the new constitution by providing that the new constitution shall prevail and conflicting sections of the old would be repealed; however, the old constitution would remain in effect as statutory law until amended or repealed by a two-thirds vote of both houses. The resolution is H.J.R.

Actual drafting of the resolution has been completed in the last few days, Clayton said, but added that he had been working on it for over a

The resolution was introduced on Friday, the last day in which bills could be introduced into the House. But legislators were faced with the consideration of a total of 1,398 bills, and were working 18-hour days, five days a week, in many cases. The controversial ethics bill took up two days of debating, with sessions going on into the night. Committees were sandwiching in their meetings with sessions scheduled at 7:30 a.m. and 10:30 p.m., and sometimes during meal breaks.



### Conservation Service Activities Are Given

Editor's note: Following is Santa Fe Railroad were two the second of a two-part article on the work of the local Soil & Water Conservation District during 1972].

Dues were paid to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, the local Council of Government, and the Regional, State and National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Although the district did not participate in the 1971 Goodyear Program, the Board of Directors was wholeheartedly behind participation in the 1972 program.

Soil Stewardship was promoted in the district in a number of ways. Publicity was obtained through the newspapers and radio.

The district ministers were informed about Soil Stewardship and encouraged to use district provided information through a luncheon program at Bovina. Attractive bulletin blanks, bulletin inserts, posters and booklets were distributed to all churches in the district.

#### ASSISTS SCHOOLS

In the spring the board laid the ground work for starting an outdoor classroom. Along this same line the board sponsored a scholarship to district teachers for the West Texas State University Summer Conservation Workshop. This course was accredited for graduate work.

The booming cattle feeding industry in the county was assisted by furnishing inventory and evaluation information to three feed lots of over 30,000 head capacity each. Missouri Beef Packers' Friona plant and

more concerned land users who requested and received inventory and evaluation informa-

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is active in the watershed program. As one of the sponsoring local organizations it assisted in clearing all of the easements in the Running Water Draw Watershed. The Board of Directors also signed as one of the sponsors of the Tiera Blanca Creek Watershed

The District Board of Directors attended and participated in the Regional and State meetings of the Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Farm Safety Week was promoted in 1972 by the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District. The week was emphasized through radio and newspaper publicity.

The city of Friona has been informed by the State that the city dump has to be closed. The City Council requested assistance in determining the best location for a sanitary landfill. In response, a color coded resource map was presented to the city showing desirable and undesirable locations within a five mile radius of Friona.

This well rounded and varied conservation program was made possible by a concerned board actively seeking out and assisting all land users in the district. The annual plan developed by the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District was of vital assistance in achieving

"It would be good if a few rows of sorghum or corn stubble could be left at the side of fields," Jack said. "This would give a good pheasant nesting area.'

It is common knowledge that turn rows or fence lines are not the best places to leave undisturbed for pheasant nesting. If you have watched varmints, especially skunks, travel down a fence row "a diggin and a snoopin" for any kind of eggs, you know this would be a dangerous nesting

Pheasants naturally want to get out in the fields. If an area in a field is left undisturbed it would be a "natural" for pheasant nesting.

At Home In Parmer County Jana Pronger

WITH THE WEATHER we had last week, I thought you might

like the following information on this year's rain wear-Most adults don't like dull, drab rainwear and children like it less. This spring, cheerful, sporty styles will be seen on children of all ages. Nylon, vinyl, cotton poplin, patent leather and polyester are all part of the rain/all-weather cover-up scene. Short jackets and above-the-knee-length coats are very popular as well as the longer midi coat, since all of these go well with

Parents are dressing children in clothes that look smart and wash easily. Most rain-wear, even some vinyls, can be washed and dried automatically but check care labels before buying. Plastics that cannot be machine-washed can be wiped off with a damp soapy sponge. Mud puddles are lots more fun if mothers don't worry about dirt either.

AND WITH SPRING AND SUMMER just around the corner I thought this information might be interesting-

There is a lot of life-and backyard fun-left in old, thread-bare tires. Instead of scrapping, recycle them with a thorough scrubbing of detergent suds applied with a heavy-duty brush. Hose rinse and let dry completely.

For young children, they can be used educationally. Arrange tires in a pattern close together and let children learn muscle control and balance by walking the edges, stepping from one tire to another, jumping from the rim into the center hole-all kinds of games.

Try making a small incline with a sturdy board leading to a solid platform. Stack two or three tires at the edge of the platform and see the fun as children "walk the plank" and jump into the center of the tires. Because the tires are not hard and have no sharp edges, slips while learning won't be serious.

Clean tires can even be used in a family room for rainy-day fun. But children aren't the only beneficiaries of these castoffs. Gardners can use old tires to create interesting oases of flowers or tiers of strawberry plants. After scrubbing, apply a coat of exterior enamel paint to the tires and add a design if you wish, either free hand or with stencils. When the paint is thoroughly dry, fill tires with soil and plants.

If you cannot use the tires yourself, wash them anyway, says The Soap and Detergent Association, and consider donating them to an interested local nursery school or kindergarten.


Jesus' church in the New Testament consisted of autonomous congregation. What does autonomous mean? Autonomy means having the right or power of self-government. In other words, the first congregations of Jesus' church were capable of existing independently, without outside control.

The church is subject to Jesus. "He is the head of the body, the church." Colossians 1:18 The ultimate authority for all the congregations of Jesus' church is Jesus himself. The church is made up of many members. "For in Christ Jesus you are all sons of God, through faith. For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ." Galatians 3:26-27 Thus, baptized believers make up the body of Christ, His church.

When Paul went on his missionary trips in Acts 13-21, he established congregations in various cities (like Thessalonica, Athens, and Corinth). These congregations in different cities were all a part of Jesus' church. These congregations were independent of one another, being ruled by their own local leaders. These leaders were called elders or bishops by Paul

Today, Jesus' church should still be self-governed, as was the first century church. Each congregation should be subject only to Jesus and its local elders. No state, national, or international board is authorized by the Bible to direct the affairs of a local congregation.
