Passed by both House and Senate, it needed only conference committee adjustments and the governor's signature to send it to the polls for final approval. Issuance of \$200,000,000 in state bonds would be authorized by the proposed constitutional amendment to help finance local water conservation projects. It is the keystone

of an overall water program urged by Gov. Price Daniel for emergency action. Under the financing plan, local

districts could borrow from the state up to one-third the cost of projects or \$5,000,000, whichever is smaller. Lending would be supervised by a board to be appointed by the gover-






