

During this early period, these few recovered alcoholics were in close association with the Oxford Group but this relationship ended in 1937. Henceforth the tiny fellowship was to be completely independent, working only for the recovery of alcoholics who still suffered.

During the Spring of 1938, plans were made for a campaign to raise funds among people who, it was thought, would be interested in the new movement. It was also decided to publish a textbook incorporating the experience and thinking of the men and women who had already found sobriety. A non-profit, unincorporated charitable organization, The Alcoholic Foundation, now known as The General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous was organized to supervise this and other activities during the Summer of 1938. The 60 ex-drunks in Akron, Cleveland and New York had high hopes-but no funds, no public standing and no name.

of fate. Liberty magazine published an article about "The New Way Out." Shortly thereafter, the Cleveland Plain Dealer published a series of stories. The movement began to grow, particularly in Cleveland. And in March 1940, Mr. Rockefeller sponsored a dinner for A.A.

The Rockefeller dinner did more than yield desperately-needed funds at a critical period. rided favorable public recognition for the work of the group. News of he dinner was reported throughthe country. Almost immediately inquiries began to pour into newly-established New York serce neadquorters

Membership reached about 2,000 a few months. The movement spread from the Cleveland-Akron rea to Chicago, Detroit and Little Rock in the Midwest: to Philadelphia and Baltimore in the East and to Houston, Los Angeles and San Francisco in the West.

While the movement grew rapidly in 1940, it caught fire and swept the ountry in 1941 with the publication, in the Saturday Evening Post, of a feature article by Jack Alexander. The first Canadian group was formed in the same year. The growth of A.A. has continued to accelerate. Today, it is estimated that there are about 7,000 local groups (or lone members) in more than 70 countries. Hundreds of persons continue to turn hopefully to A.A. each week
