Dr. Powell and John Pruet Honored At C-C Banquet Here

More than 100 members and guests of the Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce were in attendance at the first annual chamber banquet held in the school cafeteria here, Friday night of last week.

Paul L. Whitton, superintendent of schools here, served as toastmaster and an excellent program, including a challenging address on "Community Development" by Fred H. Husbands, executive vice-president and general manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

A unique feature of the affair was the shirt sleeve dress without ties for the men. A vote of the organization beforehand settled the issue and comfort was the theme among males present.

Banquet guests assembled in the school auditorium where the Rev. Gordon Dennis, pastor of the First Methodist Church, gave the invocation and the group filed through the cafeteria and were served buffet-style.

After the banquet meal and introduction of out-of-town guests by Whitton, S. F. "Fos" Bond made a speech of tribute to Dr. Powell, 82-year-old family doctor of this community who was unable to be present because of ill health.

In his address, Husbands called on the businessmen of Cross Plains to work together for their mutual benefit.

Jimmy Fleming read the Scripture lesson and offered the evening prayer.

Cynthia Hickman spoke on the subject, "Why Be A Member of the Church?"

Linda Vaughn discussed, "The Church - How Did We Get It and Why Do We Have It?"

Sandra Illingworth told, "Why Do We Worship As We Do?"

Charles Barr showed the relationship between faith in Christ and daily Christian living.

Dr. Powell, long-time family physician was honored for a long life of unselfish service to the citizens of this community and John Pruet serviceman for the West Texas Utilities Co., was recognized as "The Man of the Year."

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Water Consumption Here Reaches All-Time High

Lloyd McMillan, City Utilities Superintendent, stated this week that water consumption by Cross Plains residents reached an all-time high Friday of last week, when the master water meter showed a reading of 162,000 gallons.

He said that his crew had been successful in keeping up with the consumption and barring breakdown of pumping equipment, he felt that it would not be necessary to curtail use of water here.

Increased water use is caused by citizens who are endeavoring to keep their yards in an attractive condition and also by an increased number of evaporative coolers now in operation.

Local Men Are Training With Guard At Ft. Hood

Five Cross Plains men are training for two weeks with the 36th Division, Texas National Guard at Ft. Hood, Texas. They are 1st Lt. Harold Garrett of Headquarters First Battalion and Sgt. Bill Freeman.

Lt. Garrett reported to Ft. Hood July 4th for a three day training school on Operations and Training. Garrett is serving on the Battalion Commanders Staff as Assistant Operations and Training Officer.

His duties during the two weeks will include organization and scheduling of training and all motor movement scheduling for the Battalion. He will also conduct a special class for the Battalion on the effects of Communist Propaganda and Brain-washing on American POWs.

This instruction will be based on information just released from the Department of the Army.

Sgt. Freeman, Spec-3 Baugh, Pvt. Dubree, and Pvt. Bell are receiving training on tactical field problems. These include the new army concept of the fast mobile units to be used in case of atomic attack.

All five men will return home Sunday July 21st.

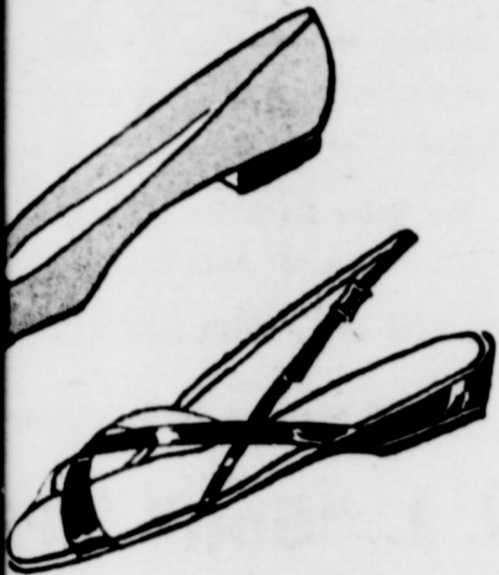

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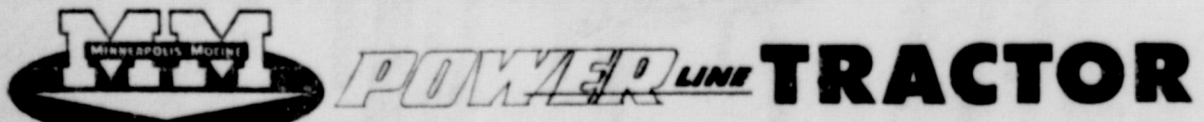
