## Rain Drenches This Area and Wind Does Minor Damage

### Farm Home Burns On Willis Connellee Place During Rain Storm

A three-room farm home on the Willis Connellee place, located about eight miles southwest of Cross Plains, was struck by lightning during the electrical and rain storm last Wednesday night, and burned to the ground, according to a report given here Thursday morning by R. T. Watson, whose place joins the Connellee tract.

The house was being used as a hay storage and some 300 bales of hay were also destroyed by the fire.

### Millard F. Ray, 75, Dies Saturday; Buried Monday, Sept. 16

Millard Fillmore Ray, 75, resident of the Cross Plains-Cottonwood area since 1893, passed away in the Callahan County Hospital Saturday afternoon, September 14, where he had been a patient since Thursday after suffering a heart attack at his home here.

Funeral rites for Mr. Ray were conducted at the First Baptist Church here Monday afternoon, September 16, at 2:00 o'clock with the pastor of the church, Rev. V. D. Walters, officiating. Interment was made in the Cross Plains Cemetery under the direction of Higginbotham Bros. & Co.

Mr. Ray was born January 9, 1882 in Gibsonville, Clay County, Alabama and came to Texas in 1898, settling at Cottonwood where he was engaged in the operation of a mercantile store before moving to Cross Plains in 1932.

He was married to Miss Mittie Holdridge of Cottonwood September 5, 1905.

He had operated the Ray Hotel here since 1932.

### Farm Bureau to Hold Dairy Meeting Sept. 20

Bill Lawrence, secretary-treasurer of the Callahan County Farm Bureau, has announced that a meeting will be held at the City Hall in Cross Plains Friday, Sept. 20, at 1:00 p.m. for the dairymen of this area.

Speaker at the meeting will be Gene Leach, Farm Bureau field representative. Also having a part on the program will be J. Walter Hammonds, president of the State Organization and Millard Shivers, Director of Organization.

A terrific rain storm, accompanied by a brilliant lightning display and storm winds, dumped over two inches of moisture over this area Wednesday night of last week, shortly after dark. The wind caused considerable damage to trees, TV antennas, signs and the lightning knocked out power in the area. Residents of the city were without power for about 35 minutes, and rural electric users were out of power for three hours or more in some sections. It was stated.

The official U. S. Weather Bureau gauge, kept here by S. F. "Pos" Bond, recorded 2.25 inches of rain, and the fall was general over this territory, with all communities reporting as much as 90.

Along with aiding the crop situation, the rain brought a break in the prolonged hot weather and nights have been cool enough for light wraps the past week.

Farmers are optimistic over the prospects for a better than average peanut crop, if frost will delay its arrival and pastures will be in excellent shape for winter grazing. Farmers are busy now breaking land and preparing to sow small grain and cover crops.

### Paul Whitton Named To Committee on TV Series

Dr. Joe Humphrey, Dean, McMurry College, Abilene, has been appointed by J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education, as chairman of the West Texas Area Coordinating Committee for the television classroom series, "Adventures in Education," which begins over most Texas television stations on Sept. 28.

Other persons serving on the committee in this area are: Dr. Walter Adams, Dean, Abilene Christian College, Abilene; Dr. J. B. Smith, Dean, Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene; Mr. Paul L. Whitton, Superintendent of Cross Plains; and Olaf South, Superintendent of Sweetwater.

Teaching permits valid for three years will be issued by the Certification Division of the Texas Education Agency to college graduates who complete the course. Fully certified teachers also have the opportunity to add this course to their professional qualifications. "Adventures in Education" is designed also to interest parents, students, and non-teachers, any of whom can become enrolled if they have a college degree.

Dr. Arthur H. Moehlman, an education professor with broad teaching experience, will conduct the course. Most participating institutions are requiring enrollees to attend an orientation meeting at the beginning of the course and to take an examination at its conclusion. Virtually all the course requirements can be met at home.

### Nimrod Area May Get Caddo Oil Production

Area oil men state that prospects for Caddo lime oil production in the Nimrod area, 10 miles northeast of Cross Plains, showed promise last week as completion work continued on Low Drilling Company's No. 1 Ed Townsend, a wildcat test.

Bottomed at 2,905, the well began testing Wednesday of last week and swabbing work indicated that a good producer was in prospect.

Operators drilled the well on a 194-acre farm-out from the Magnolia Petroleum Co., which has large acreage holdings in the area.

Magnolia is expected to drill an offset to the well.

A new wildcat for the area two miles west of Scranton in Callahan County is the Moore & Moore Drilling Co. No. 1 M. E. Fitzpatrick, a 3,500 foot project. Location is 2,922 feet from the north and 2,582 feet from the east lines of Section 20, BOA Survey, Callahan County.

Creole Oil Corp. of Rising Star No. 1 R. E. Neff will be a re-entry and deepening project six miles southwest of Burkett in the DeBusk (Gardner) Field.

Slated for 2,350 feet with cable tools, it spots 4,234 feet from the south and 7,652 feet from the east lines of W. T. Dunlavy Survey 259.

Five new drilling projects have been announced for the Cross Cut Field.

N. M. Dillard, owner and operator of the Dillard Drilling Co. here, staked five proposed 1,500-foot rotary test wells. All are on the C. J. Newton lease and in Stephen Jones Survey 282. They are 3 1/2 miles southwest of Cross Cut.

No. 3 Newton is 2,900 feet from the west and 1,605 feet from the south lines of the survey. No. 4 Newton spots 1,650 feet from the south and 3,350 feet from the west lines.

Site for No. 5 Newton is 1,605 feet from the south and 2,450 feet from the west lines of the survey. No. 6 Newton is 2,055 feet from the south and 2,900 feet from the west lines. Location for No. 7 Newton is 2,055 feet from the south and 3,350 feet from the west survey lines.

### Callahan Baptist Ass'n. to Meet At Cottonwood

All three were taken to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene in a Higginbotham Funeral Home ambulance.

Mrs. Bristol suffered fractures of both legs broken above the knees and lacerations about the face and head, and was described by hospital attendants as being in critical condition.

The accident occurred when the car driven by Bristol, traveling north on State Highway 279 from Brownwood, skidded through the stop light and crashed into the side of a 1956 Ford truck-semi-trailer driven by Clarence F. Lucas, D. Leon, which was traveling east on Highway 36.

Editor's Note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou has had a visitor from town, his letter this week indicates.

Dear editor: I've got a situation this week I don't know how to handle, so I'll just report on it and let somebody else decide on it.

A friend of mine from Cross Plains was out here visiting me on my farm yesterday afternoon after he got off from work in town and he said he was getting tired of hearing how inflation has hit the farmers.

"You farmers think inflation is limited to the farm, but I'd like to tell you it's in town, too," he said.

"I sympathize with you country folks. I know what it must be to fight low prices and high costs, but I'd like to point out to us folks in town have got some problems, too.

"One tractor blows out, I know, and you're on the rim, but did you ever stop to think if one motor burns out on one of my appliances, I'm sunk? Have you ever stopped to think what a strain it is on a man's constitution to hear the washing machine motor stop suddenly when the machine ain't paid for yet? Do you know what it is to have the television set go blank thirty days after the guarantee runs out and a year before the last payment is made? You ever stepped on the starter of your car and found the battery dead on the day you're overdrawn at the

The extra point by Riley Seymour was good. The score read, Merkey 7—Cross Plains 6. But the Buffaloes were not through yet.

Hutchins received the kickoff on his own 10, and moved to the mid-field stripe before being brought down. Hutchins on the next play sped to the Merkel 18, a 32 yard pick-up. This set Cross Plains a first and 10 on the Badger 18. Vaughn carried for five, on the next play a Buff fumble cost them four yards recovering the ball. It was now 3 down, 9 needed. Hutchins again carried for 3, fourth down six needed for a Buff first. Hutchins took a pitch-out from Scott around right end for the marker to put Cross Plains out in front. Scott converted with Hutchins holding. Cross Plains 13—Merkel 7.

After the kick off and Merkel's series of downs, the Badgers punted. After three Buff plays Scott rambled 48 yards around left end on a keeper play to score the final Buff touchdown. With Bill Mays holding, Scott attempted the extra point try, but it was blocked.

As he game ended the Buffaloes were again threatening as they had driven to the Merkel 18 yard line. Audrey Gary did fine work on offense while the outstanding defensive players for the Buffs were Jim Fleming, Johnny Pancake, and Joe Gary.

**Paul Brashear Believes Special Session Will Be Waste of Tax Money**

State Representative Paul Brashear believes that the Oct. 14, special session of the Texas Legislature will be a needless waste of approximately \$500,000 in taxpayer's money. His attitude toward the session just called by Gov. Price Daniel was expressed in a statement to The Review, Wednesday.

"It has been my understanding that special legislative sessions should be ordered to deal with emergencies," Mr. Brashear said. "The governor has called this session to (1) provide for registration and regulation of lobbyists, (2) require registration of persons who represent others before state agencies, (3) recommend to the next session ways and means for improving law enforcement, and (4) create and finance a water planning agency for research and flood control."

Brashear, who represents Callahan, Eastland and Shackelford Counties in the Legislature, pointed out that Articles 180 and 182 of the state penal code, which has been a law since 1907 provides safeguards and penalties against lobbyists. There has been little effort to enforce this law which provides, that in the event of conviction \$200 to \$2,000 fine or six months to two years in penitentiary. He added that the crime commission, lobby control bill, and water planning proposals were before the Legislature during the last session without results.

"None of these four subjects mentioned by the Governor in his call could possibly be construed as an emergency," Brashear stated. "As the elected representative of this district, I will attend the session and do my job, but it seems needless to waste half a million dollars without a good reason for it."

A copy of the special session call reached Representative Brashear on Monday. It ordered him to be in Austin Monday, Oct. 14, at 10:00 a.m.

He stated that he was pessimistic about anything being accomplished at the special session in view of the Legislature's handling of the subjects at the regular session and in view of the fact that a majority of House members said in a recent poll that they were opposed to the session.

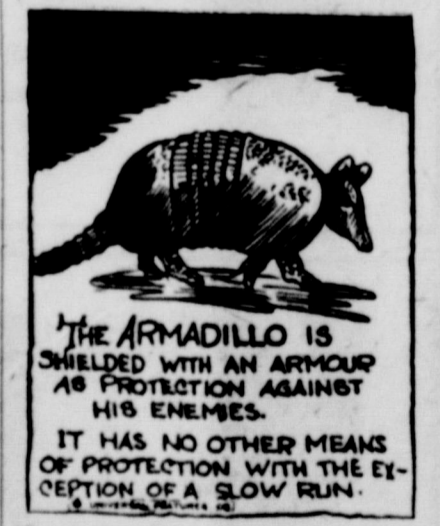
