PHILOSOPHER SAYS IF NATION NEEDS MORE BASIC RESEARCHERS, HE'S AVAILABLE

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou is misinterpreting the news again, his letter this week indicates.

Dear editor:

I found in a copy of a newspaper which a north wind blew in here the other afternoon, where you can get newspapers from any direction you don't care which way the wind is blowing, an article that said Washington officials are concerned about the number of scientists the schools are turning out. They say it's not enough.

That is, we're turning out a lot of scientists, all right, but they're being trained for such things as designing lower cars, cars that get lower from the top down but still stay far enough off the ground to keep from burning the seat of your pants, or working out new color blends for refrigerators, making radios you can drop without breaking, watches that never have to be wound, cigarettes with twice as many filters as any other brand, etc.

What we need now, Washington has decided, is more scientists for basic research. More egghead scientists, men who work on the-

ories without any consideration for whether the idea will be worth anything commercially or not.

Well, now, I'll tell you, I might qualify on this thing. That research, if a basic researcher is somebody who works at a job regardless of whether it'll pay off or not.

Farming the way I do it comes as close to being basic research as anything I can think of. When a farmer starts a year's work, he has no more idea whether it's going to turn out commercially profitable than a scientist working on abstract mathematical theories. I know farmers who have plowed ahead for years with practically no attention to whether or not their venture would show a profit.

But there must be some mistake. If Washington thinks there's a shortage of us basic researchers, it ought to take another count of the farmers in this country. Instead of counting how much we produced, it ought to find out how much we made. This country is filled with basic researchers, but our trouble is we've been researching in the wrong field.

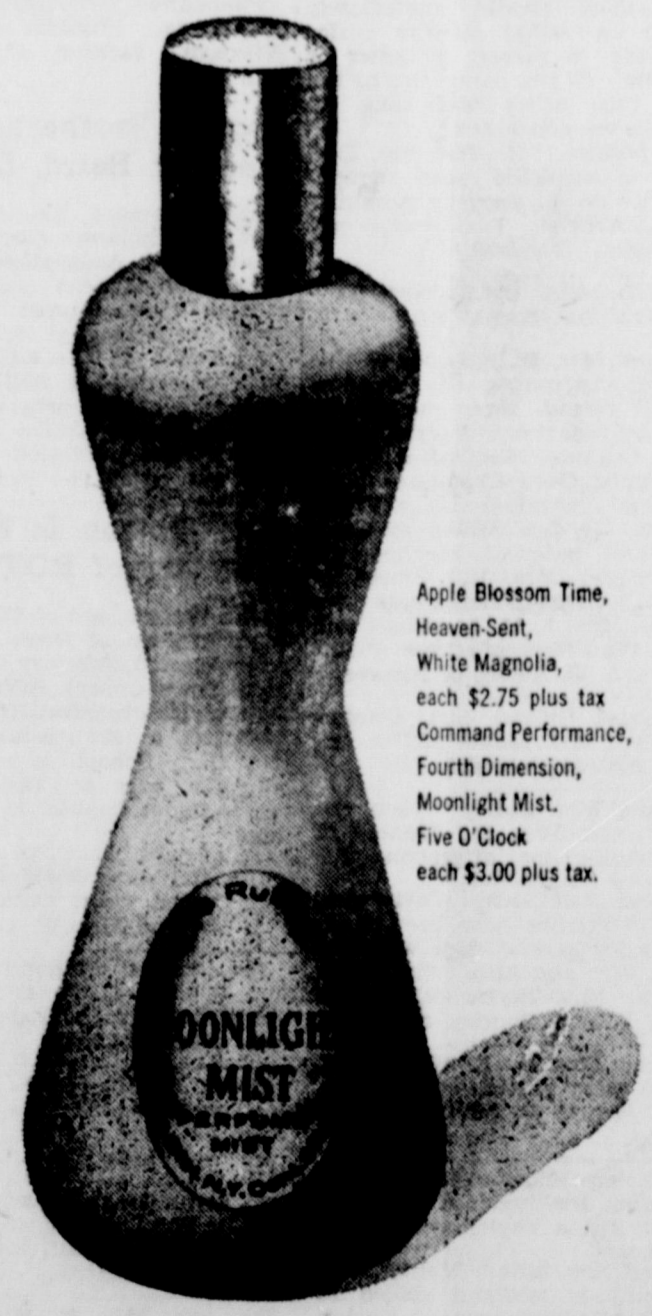
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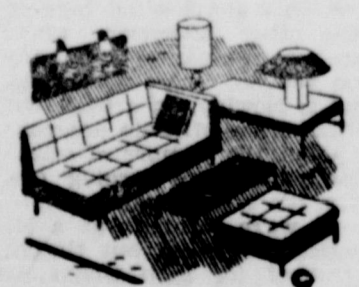

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State Capitol NEWS

Both special sessions of the Legislature passed all bills for which Gov. Price Daingerfield had asked them. Mostly, by wide margins.

In final days found every-thing in a state of confusion. House and Senators wrangled themselves. Each house did its own thing. And numer-ous bills were found ways to show up on the floor.

House gave top-sided ap-propriations to the two bills requested by governor to bolster local schools. One allows for schools threatened with occupation. The other em-powers the attorney general to an-ticipate suits in fighting anti-trust suits.

Another bill was proposed to require county judges to require organizations to interfere with public operation. Sponsors said it was at the NAACP.

There seemed to be no lack of opposition to the bill. Haggling technical-ly out the time table. Legislators accused others of prolonging the ses-sion to embarrass the governor.

Emergency fund. House passed a bill to allow \$11,600 bite into the gov-ernor's emergency fund. House also passed a bill to have the last word in the feud with the Insurance Commission.

Renewal of the federal title to tidelands ownership. Criticism of Governor's role in the federal title.

Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Antonio said he felt Daniel should not be allowed to recog-nize Texas' claim to 10 1/2 miles out.

U. S. Senator. Federal suit challenges Tex-ans to land beyond three miles.

Hardeman read the bill he would give each state title to "as they existed at the time the state entered the union."

Happy—Dissatisfaction of members of Senators with the In-terior Department seems un-like-ly to simmer down.

Investigating committee. It is still not through with inquiry into the Department's inaction on an unfavorable report on Preferred Life. It re-ports hearing two assistant auditors confirm the exam-inations of irregularities in the company.

Grady Hazelwood stressed committee's findings in a speech. Why the Senator had shown the Insurance Board's report of William A. Harrison's resignation. He said the Sen-ator Harrison had been remis-sive in taking immediate action on the company.

Finance committee turned questions on the three board members for having questioned the right to pass on Harrison's resignation. Board appeared to

ask a bill authorizing the depart-ment to reduce the number of ex-aminers and raise salaries.

LAND BUY OKAYED—Legisla-ture moved forward another step: the plan for a consolidated state government center in the heart of Austin.

Both houses passed a bill author-izing purchase of two blocks north-east of the Capitol for a Texas Em-ployment Commission Building.

Overall plan is to ring the Cap-itol on three sides with five new buildings. Included will be the State Courts Building, State Office Building, Insurance Building, TEC Building and Library and Archives Building. Cost is estimated at \$20,000,000, all to come from various special funds rather than general revenue.

OLL. LEASING HELD UP—Ex-cessive importing of foreign oil was blamed for the Texas School Land Board's decision not to hold an oil and gas lease sale in January.

Board members said the market is too depressed to make a sale worthwhile. "There's no use put-ting up our school lands at a cheap price to let the oil companies pro-fit still more because of their ex-cessive imports," said Governor Daniel.

At least one large oil company has informed the state it may pay rentals on present leases of sub-merged land under protest pending outcome of a federal suit contesting state ownership of a portion of the tidelands.

A CHANCE TO SPEAK—Citizens in every county will be given a chance to say what kind of school-ing is needed to equip Texas young-sters to live in a space age.

A school study committee set up by the last Legislature plans to ask local county committees to sub-mit ideas. Called the Hale-Aiken Committee, the 24-member panel is made up of legislators and private citizens.

They've promised to heed the wants of interested citizens in the report they're to make to the next session. Already, there's been a large response.

Suggests a range from a "crash" program in science to cutting new building needs by using facilities 12 months a year.

Broad areas being explored in the study are (1) what to teach and for how long, (2) how to get teachers, (3) how to build buildings and (4) how to pay for it all.

MONEY READY—State Liquid-ator J. D. Wheeler repeated an earlier statement that he is ready to start making payments of about 33 cents on the dollar to US Trust and Guaranty Co. creditors.

He's been ready since Septem-ber, said Wheeler, but a court fight among creditors has block-ed action. His statement appear-ently was prompted by legislative criticism of "too slow" liquidation proceedings.

SHORT SNORTS—Texas' Janu-ary draft quota will be 493 men, highest call since August, accord-ing to State Selective Service Headquarters. This compares with a call of 340 for December. Also in January, local draft boards are to send some 2,000 men for re-education examinations.

Travis County Judge Tom Johnson is mak-ing another try at getting the state to pay cost of returning criminals from other states. Previous Legis-lature and governor cold-shouldered his plea. Records show extradi-tions cost Travis County \$1,117 in 1956.

A 14-member citizens ad-visory committee named by Gov-ernor Daniel will assist the Texas Employment Commission in sort-ing out the various jobs of state employees. Last regular legislative session authorized formation of the committee "to develop an orderly classification plan based on actual duties and responsibilities."

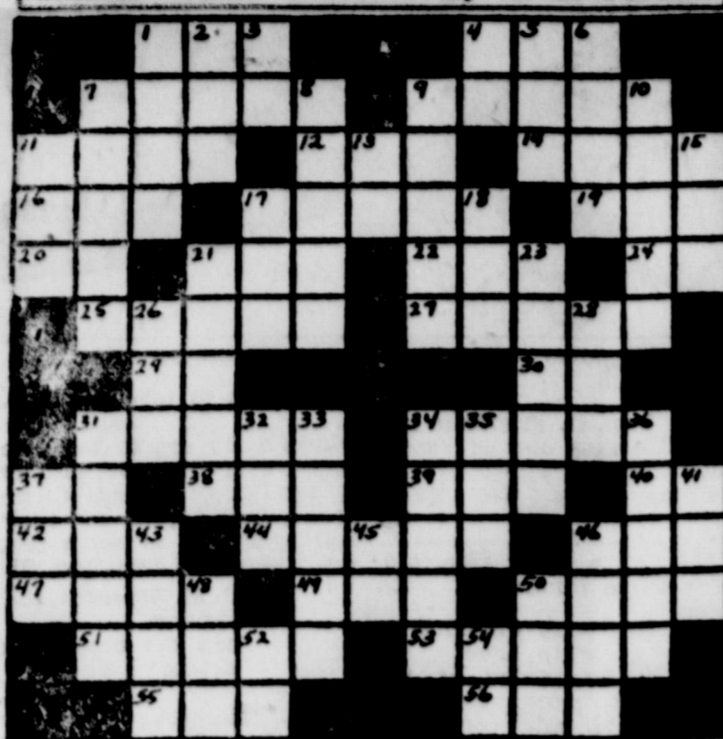

There was turkey on the Thanksgiving table of many lucky Texans this year!

Turkey season opened Nov. 16, along with the white tail deer season, in many areas of the state.

Most of the birds were killed in the Edwards Plateau, better known as the Hill country of Texas. But other spots of the state also provided a few gobblers.

With the beginning of the deer and turkey season, only one more open season is awaited by the hunters . . . quail season. It will be legal to hunt quail in most of the countries of Texas after December ends.

As new seasons come on, others pass out. It no longer is legal to kill doves in either the North or South zone.

It will be legal to kill mule deer west of the Pecos between Dec. 20-27, inclusive.

The white tail season will end Dec. 31, as will the goose season. Then it will be legal to kill only ducks and quail until Jan. 16.

After that the shotguns can be wiped clean and put away until next Sept. 1, unless you like to shoot crows.

Incidentally shooting crows at the end of the season is a good way to get rid of old shells and at the same time do your bit in killing off those black rascals.

Many towns will have crow shoots. If you have a few crows around, get busy and organize an eradication campaign. It will pay off.

Boat Care

Have you checked your boat lately? Most of us have been so busy with our hunting in recent week, that we've neglected our boats.

A visit to any boat dock area will reveal many boats with six inches of water in the bottoms. The recent rains have almost filled other.

If boats are to last a long time and give good service, they need care. Mark it on your calendar to dedicate the next pretty week-end, or at least a portion of it, to checking your boat. Perhaps it might need to be hauled out of the water for a good scrub job, inside and out, or a coat of paint.

Paint is helpful to the life of a boat, as well as its appearance.

You may want to dry-dock your boat for the winter, but this isn't necessary in Texas. There'll be plenty of week-ends during the winter months when you can get in some good fishing or boating.

While you're at it, check your trailer.

See that the bearings have plenty of grease and that the tires are in good condition.

Crappie Are Plentiful

Most of the fish being caught now are crappie and sand bass. Every lake and stream in Texas is producing plenty of crappie. Most of them are on the small size, but they are big enough to make a good meal.

During the past year there have been many fishing barges and doughnut shaped barges built on the major lakes. They are baited down and furnish ideal spots for crappie fishing. Some of them are steam heated. There is one on Whitney that even provides TV.

Other fishermen just tie their boats up to dead trees sticking out of the water, or anchor at well-marked spots and catch their crappie with minnows.

For sandies most of the fishermen right now are following the gulls and jiggling. With a limit of 25 sandies you can have plenty of fun during the day.

One of the favorite lures is the

Dixie Jet, which, by-the-way, is made at Houston. It is a spoon of exactly the right weight to get these sandies.

There is one good trick to remember, if you've never fished this way before. A light rig is very important. Say a 6 1-2 foot light action rod with a 6 to 9 pound test line. Let your lure go to the bottom, take two or three turns on the reel, quiver the rod very slightly by moving the tip slowly up and down.

The sandies hit almost invariably on the down motion. For that reason they usually are on the hook when you start the upward movement. If you aren't careful you can yank the hook out of its mouth

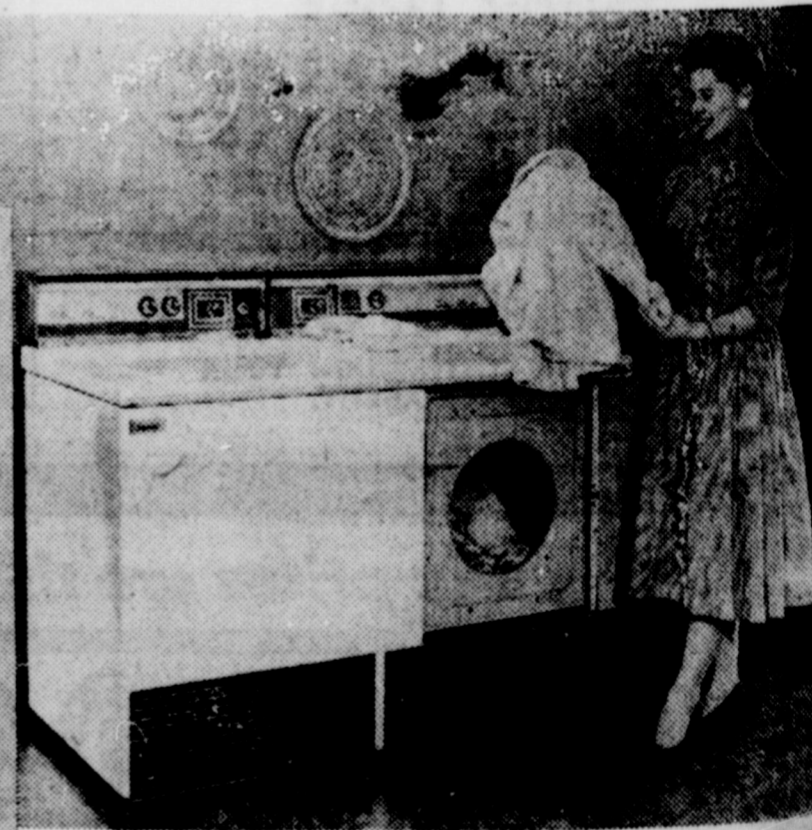
