When your rig is on the bottom, fish it something like fishing for crappie. When a snapper gets on, it's up to you to crank him up as fast as you can. Occasionally if it is a small snapper, a big old amberjack or ling may come by and decide it's hungry. If that happens, then you have a real fight on your hands.

Incidentally, you don't have to buy your own red snapper fishing equipment. It can be rented from any party boat operator. Also he'll show you how to use it. He wants you to make a good catch. If you do you'li tell your friends and his business stays good.

Party boats usually are pretty well dated up. It is a good idea to select one you want to use, early and make a definite date. The boat usually leaves the docks about 2 a.m. and returns about 6 p.m. with a load of fish and some pretty






