shots, and in only 22 per cent those who had all three shots. In other words, in all cases of polio reported last year, paralysis developed in three out of five cases without any shots, but in only one out of five cases in persons with all three shots.

Despite a continuing barrage of publicity concerning adult vulnerbility to polio, many adults apparently must still be convinced. The truth is that about 16 of every 100 cases of polio in Texas hits at people 15 and over. And when it does hit it hits with greater impact. The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis reports that three out of four respirator patients today are 20 or older

Another misconception is that a child can be too young to be vaccinated. This is a judgment for the individual physician to make. Beore the vaccine, children age 5 to vears were polio's principal targets. But last year it struck hardest at children age 1 year.

As far as the picture in Texas is concerned, we need a higher level of protection among persons 20 to 40 years old, and among children under 5.

Texas has an estimated population of 6.230,000 persons between 6 months and 40 years of age-the age recommended for polio vaccinations. It would require more than 18 million doses of accine to fully protect that numer of people But as of April of this year, total vaccine shipments into Texas totaled 10.5 million
