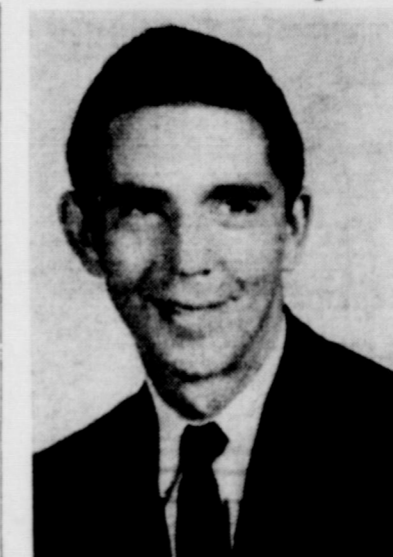

#### PHILOSOPHER ADMITS ECONOMIC SCENE IS CONFUSED BUT CLAIMS IT ALWAYS IS

**EDITOR'S NOTE: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou writes about confusion this week, a topic he may be an authority on, if you get what we mean.**

Dear editor: According to an article I read last night in the Wall Street Journal—and how a copy of that paper got out here on my Johnson grass farm is no harder to explain than how some men got to be Congressmen, how some teachers ever got into teaching, how some men got married, how some women stay married, how some editors . . . this has gone far enough—at any rate, according to this article, the present economic situation is confused.

I have been thinking this over and I've decided it's right. The present economic situation is confused. You take the car manufacturers. I understand they have about 800,000 new cars on hand and they're not moving fast enough, so a campaign to buy now was launched. Even President Eisenhower urged people to buy now. And what happens? The United States sees its foreign aid money wind up in the hands of a spendthrift son of the Dominican Republic's dictator, who comes to this country and buys a foreign made car for an imported actress. This is called getting nowhere fast.

But speaking of the surplus of cars and other products now bothering manufacturers, you mean to say the business tycoons haven't

got more judgement than us dumb farmers? You mean to say they pile up surpluses the same as you and me? Everybody knows a farmer hasn't got any more sense than to keep on producing, regardless of how big the surplus is, but I always figured big business was different.

This is the reason you can say the economic situation is confused. Everybody has come to expect the farmer to keep plowing and planting, filling up warehouses and depressing the market and writing letters to Congress, but I always figured big business was smarter. However, this is a democratic country, and what's fair for one ought to be fair for another, and I'm proposing that Congress set up a Car Relief program with a Car Bank, etc., for the automobile industry. You let the industry keep on turning out cars and filling up warehouses and it won't be long till the price drops to nothing and car manufacturers and car dealers will be forced to give up and find a job in the country. This would be bad for the land.

The family size car manufacturer and the family size car dealer are necessary to the economy of this country, and if Congress is on its toes it'll work out this Car Bank idea immediately and keep things on an even keel.

I would like to say though that I'm not worried just because the economic situation is confused. It's always been that way with me.

The child's parents were in Mexico at the time of the accident, where Mrs. Beasley has been ill. Mrs. Beasley is the former Inez Cross of the Burkett community. Surviving in addition to the parents are the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Beasley of Bryan; three sisters, Carolyn Beasley, Barbara Drury Beasley and Ida Mae Drury Beasley, all of Mexico.

Low bids tabulated at the department's May letting totaled \$19,187,933. State Highway Engineer De Witt C. Greer, in opening the May letting, said that about \$25,000,000

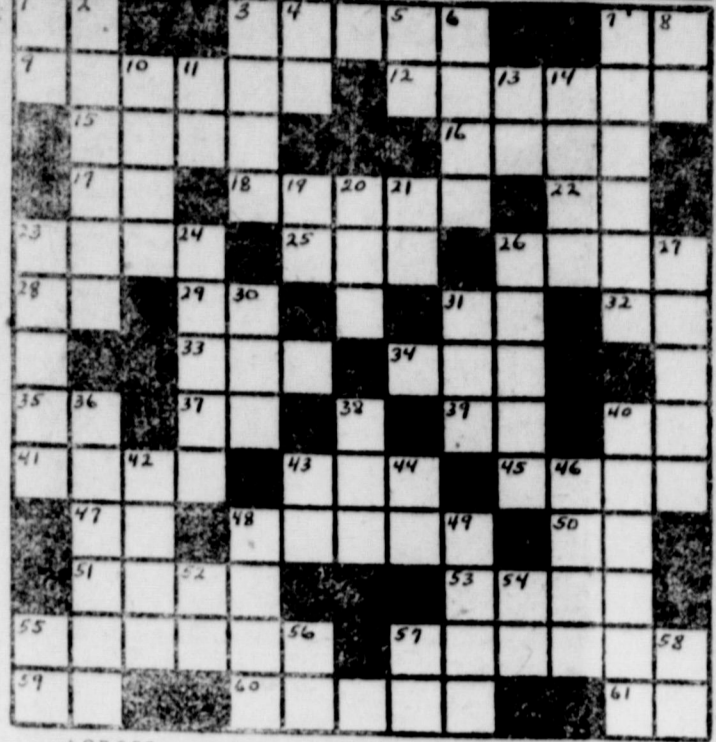

bids next month. This figure, if reached, would set a new record.

A big chunk of this upsurge comes from Texas' \$36,000,000 share of the federal emergency fund, authorized by Congress this year to get extra money into the economy fast and provide needed roads. All of this work must be put under contract by December.

Texas highway officials hope to beat the deadline by several months. Greer announced that \$8,000,000 of the May lettings represented the first of the extra federal projects. He noted with quiet pride "the speed with which the projects were made ready." Bids were taken just four weeks after the federal bill was signed. Department officials expect all the \$36,000,000 to be under contract by the end of the summer—bringing record or near-record lettings for the next few months.

A short time back monthly highway lettings of \$9,000,000 to \$12,000,000 were about average. Time was, too, when the emphasis was mainly on the need for fine, new roads to accommodate the growing stream of fine, new cars. Today there's also emphasis on the number of people who'll be put to work, the money they'll spend on groceries, cars, clothes.

**HIGH TENSION**—With millions involved, the highway lettings are scenes of high tension. Sunburned, sport-shirted contractors, plus materials men and insurers flock to the department's hearing room, where the sealed bids are opened and read, item by item.

Department personnel have an electronic computer to add up the item bids and determine the low bidder. Results are announced later in the day. But contractors or their representatives take down the bids on the spot and make rapid calculations.

It isn't hard to spot the man who's just realized he missed a million-dollar job by bidding a few hundred dollars high. Typical muttered comment: "He can't do it for the money!"

**BUMPY ROAD**—Though the mammoth highway building program is moving forward, top speed, there are problems along the road.

Chief bone of contention, now in the courts, is whether cost of relocating utilities to make way for new construction should be borne by the cities and utility companies or the state.

A law passed by the last Legislature authorizes the state, with 90 per cent federal aid, to pay the utility relocation on the federal projects.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has ruled that part of the law invalid in "donating public moneys to corporations and individuals... for private and individual purposes." Wilson filed a test case in an Austin district court.

City officials, through the Texas League of Municipalities, take the opposite view. They contend that in other states cities get this money for utility moving and that Texans, through federal taxes, contribute to the cost. Besides, they add, it'll cost the cities some \$20,000,000.

**HOSPITAL OFFICIALS**—The Texas Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools has a flock of new names topping its roster of officials.

W. W. Heath of Austin was named chairman of the board. He succeeds Dr. Raleigh Ross, also of Austin. Howard Tellepsen of Houston is the new vice-chairman.

Raymond W. Vowell was appointed executive director of the hospital system. This post has been vacant nearly a year.

It was announced, also that Dr. C. J. Ruhlmann, now commissioner of mental health for Tennessee, will become director of Texas mental hospitals in June.

Heath, appointed to the board by Gov. Price Daniel last fall, is prominent in business circles as an attorney, banker and rancher. He also is a former county judge, secretary of state and assistant attorney general.

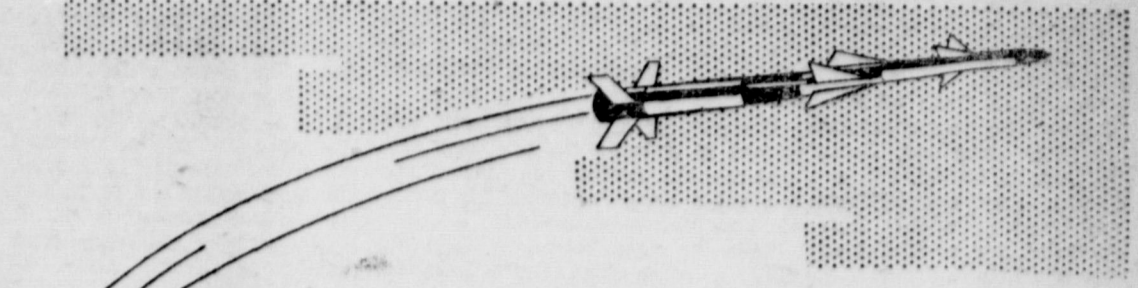
### SHORT SHORTS

A slight downward trend in joblessness was noted in the Texas Employment Commission's latest report. Number of persons receiving unemployment compensation checks dropped from 90,949 to 90,193.

A former TEC attorney, Lee G. Williams, has filed suit in an Austin district court for reinstatement to the job from which he was fired last month. Williams contends that his position in Texas merit system corresponds to federal civil service status and he can not be fired for the reasons given. A majority of the three-man commission said they

had "no confidence" in Williams. Twenty-two bus companies operating in Texas have asked the Railroad Commission for permission to hike intrastate (within the state only) fares by 10 per cent. They're being squeezed by increased operating costs, say the companies. Fred Erisman of Longview has named chairman of the new Texas Council on Administration of Justice. Council's purpose is to work with other groups in curbing crime and delinquency. Maco Stewart of Galveston, former assistant attorney general, was elected new president of the liberal-dominated Young Democrats' Club at its Austin meeting. Young Democrats officially criticized recent legislative action designed "to illegally circumvent the U. S. Constitution as interpreted by the Supreme Court."
