**STAIN REMOVAL FROM "SPECIAL FINISH" FABRICS**

College Station.—Special finishes now being used on many cottons, linens and rayons give wrinkle-resistance, extra sheen and body to these fabrics.

Problem now is, how to remove stains from fabrics that have these special finishes. Chlorine bleaches may be used on some, according to instructions attaching specialists. Other finishes are damaged by such treatment, because special resins in the finish absorb and retain chlorine.

Best rule to follow, according to the USDA Agricultural Research Service, is to look for directions regarding use of bleaches on the garment. If no information is given, avoid use of chlorine bleaches on fabrics with special finishes.

Some staining cannot be removed without bleaching. In such cases use sodium perborate or a powdered bleach that contains it. Soak washable colorfast fabrics for several hours, or overnight if needed, in a warm solution containing one or two tablespoons of sodium perborate to a pint of water. Another method is to sprinkle dry bleach on the dampened spot, then dip in a pan of very hot water for a few minutes.

This reminder from the clothing specialists. Always check garments for stains before laundering, and remove. Otherwise hot water may set stains.

**"Safety Is Here To Stay — Are You?"**

Austin—"Safety is here to stay—are you?"

This question was put to Texans by J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, as he sought public support for the Association's current Slow Down and Live campaign.

Musick reminded drivers that 451 persons were killed in Texas traffic crashes during July and August last year, two of the peak vacation months.

"Everyone can give the Slow Down and Live program a boost by simply becoming safety conscious. Most people are familiar with the laws, rules and courtesies of the road, but all too often there is a tendency to forget them—then is when the accidents occur," Musick said.

He reminded motorists that the Texas Department of Public Safety and other traffic officials are doing all they can in Texas to protect summer travelers by maintaining a firm enforcement policy.

"Highways are loaded with people who want to get away from it all and if they are not careful they won't live to get back from it all," the safety expert said. "Every driver must appreciate the fact that accidents don't always happen to the 'other guy.' If he is to survive in today's volume of traffic."

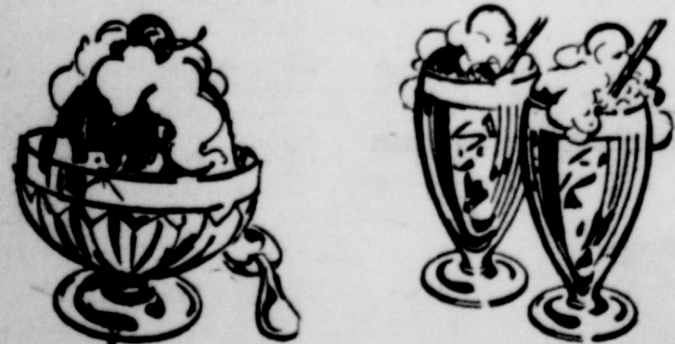

**STATE CAPITAL**  
*Highlights*  
**AND Sidelights**

Austin, Tex.—Focus of interest in Texas this week is not on the State Capitol.

It'll all over Texas, in a school building or a fire station or a church house—wherever a man stands in a little pasteboard booth with a piece of paper and a blunt pencil.

In the booth is a man who looks like an average, unimportant sort of guy. Chances are he's not very rich, not very interested in politics, as a rule. But John Q. Poll-Tax-Payer is the most important man in Texas this week. With a few strokes of his pencil Saturday, he'll decide who'll be who in Texas for the next two years or more.

When John Q. glances down the ballot, he may see a number of names he's never heard of. He'll pause, scratch his head, wonder which name "sounds best," finally shrug, make a mark and go on.

Such a possibility gives office-seekers the cold shakes. For fear their names may yet be unknown to some, they'll try to be everywhere at once this week.

In addition, a lot of people will be pleading with John Q. to come back to the polling place Saturday evening for his Democratic precinct convention. Gov. Price Daniel, supported by moderate-conservative party officials, is asking him to come and vote for "majority rule." Opposing the governor are the liberal Democrats of Texas who want John to join their drive to assure that "only real Democrats shall participate in Democratic party affairs."

Nobody can positively predict what John will do. Past records show that some years he feels liberal; some years, conservative. And some years, both ways at the same time.

Oil Quota Up Again—Texas oil allowable for August will be 328,185 barrels a day more than for July—a hopeful sign for an industry that's been "in the dumps" for more than a year.

Railroad Commission set next month's allowable at 2,978,058 barrels daily. Number of producing days will be increased from 9 to 11. Last month production rose from its all time low of 8 days.

Reason for the increase was not so much the disturbance in the oil-producing Middle East, said one commissioner, as the fact that Texas had finally reduced its excess oil stocks to correct levels.

Insurance Board Upheld—State Insurance Board finally scored a technical knock-out in its prolonged bout with an Austin district judge.

Texas Supreme Court ruled that Judge Charles O. Betts did not have authority to name V. F. Taylor receiver for insurance cases in his court. High court says the receiver must be the state liquidator appointed by the Insurance Board.

Board had appointed C. H. Langdeau as state liquidator. Judge Betts said he did not regard Langdeau as acceptable. He named Taylor receiver for cases in his court.

Supreme Court also ruled void Betts' action in raising salaries of liquidation attorneys working on cases in his court.

Division of Authority between the courts and Insurance Department over insurance company liquidation has been a source of dissension for years.

50-50 Plan—State Highway Department will reimburse cities and counties half the court costs of

highway building. Up until last year costs of obtaining right of way were borne solely by local governments. Last Legislature passed a law authorizing the state to share the cost 50-50 with cities and counties.

At first this was construed to mean the state would pay half the cost of purchasing the land. Now it has been expanded to include half of court costs and appraisers' fees.

More Prison Cotton—An increase of 10.35 per cent has been ordered in the Texas Prison System's cotton acreage allotment.

Officials of the Texas system had been actively dissatisfied, contending the prison farms had been dealt a bigger-than-average cut. Less production means less money for operating the prisons, they pointed out, and, hence, greater cost to Texas taxpayers.

On their behalf, the Texas Attorney General's Department appealed to the Agricultural Stabilization Committee and, finally to federal court.

Adjustment obtained will mean 334 more acres of prison cotton can be harvested. It'll save \$100,000 in tax money, prison officials estimate.

City Tax Proposals—City officials are laying plans to ask the next Legislature to extend and adjust city taxing powers.

Legislative committee of the League of Texas Municipalities has drawn up a two-pronged proposal to:

1. Allow cities to broaden their tax base and lighten the burden on property owners.

2. Substitute another tax to be collected at time of auto registration for the present "unworkable" property tax on cars.

School Fund Fight—A rough-and-tumble time can be expected next year when lawmakers consider just how permanent the permanent school fund should be.

Rep. Louis Dugas of Orange has announced he will introduce a bill which would allow the state to use part of the revenue from school lands for current expenses instead of putting it all into the permanent fund.

Dugas was the author of a bill last session to divert 1 per cent of

the permanent fund each year to the available fund.

State School Board and numerous other school officials have come out strongly against all moves to tap the schools' multi-million-dollar endowment. They compare it to "eating the seed corn".

Report on 'Rainy Days'—Texas Employment Commission's report for the first half of this year showed that 185,000 Texans received jobless benefits.

Payments totaled \$33,164,378 for this period.

Average claimant was eligible for 19.8 weeks of assistance, but drew for only 12.7 weeks. "This proves that unemployment compensation serves as a rainy day tideover be-

tween jobs," commented TEC Chairman Maurice Acers, "and not as a prolonged dole."

Unemployment picture was still "rainy" in TEC's latest weekly report. Total of 74,734 persons, more than twice as many as a year ago, were receiving benefits.

### Spot Treat for Cheapest Johnson Grass Control

The newest, easiest, cheapest and most effective way to control Johnson grass in row crops is to spot treat with oils or dalapon, according to Fred Elliott, extension cotton work specialist.

Many naphtha oils and oil mixtures are satisfactory for the crown treatment of established Johnson grass, while dalapon may be applied to the foliage and terminal swirl, says Elliott. Naphtha may be used for cool weather treatment but a 50-50 mixture of naphtha with kerosene or diesel is recommended in hot weather.

Oil-soluble dinitro and other proven forficers can be added to diesel fuel oil or kerosene according to the manufacturers' directions to increase the effectiveness of these oils. Diesel fuel oil or kerosene fortified with one per cent pentachlorophenol by volume is usually as effective in killing Johnson grass as the naphtha-type oils used alone.

Several kinds of sprayers may be used to apply these oils, points out Elliott. The Texas gravity sprayer is best suited for crown treatment of six-inch Johnson grass sprouts in crops as the non-selective spraying of thick stands of Johnson grass in spots sparse enough for the crop in the spot to be sacrificed.

The Texas jetgun permits efficient, economical and selective treatment of sprouts in row crops with either oil or water sprays. It is a squirt gun and works like a water pistol. It can be used to hit a target varying in size from a dime to a dinner plate.

County agents have full information on spot oiling Johnson grass, the materials and equipment to use and where they can be obtained.

### Try Lake Texarkana.

Ordinarily, new lakes are very productive about the second year after they have been filled. Fishermen who are looking for a hot spot this year might well consider Lake Texarkana. This reservoir was created by a dam across the Sulphur River a dozen miles southwest of the Texas-Arkansas city. It is served by U. S. Highways 59 and 67.

This reservoir is the result of another flood control project. It was built by the Corps of Engineers. Recently the marginal land around the lake was licensed to the Game and Fish Commission. It will be developed as a wildlife management area.

Right now the lake is so new it lacks many facilities, but they are in the making. The main thing is that it is full of fish. Already some very fine bass have been taken in great numbers. According to biologists, there was a fine spawn of blacks there last year, and they are now keeper size.

Also below the dam the Sulphur River is a fine fishing stream. Thousands of persons line the banks of the river at the tailraces below the dam for sand bass fishing. 

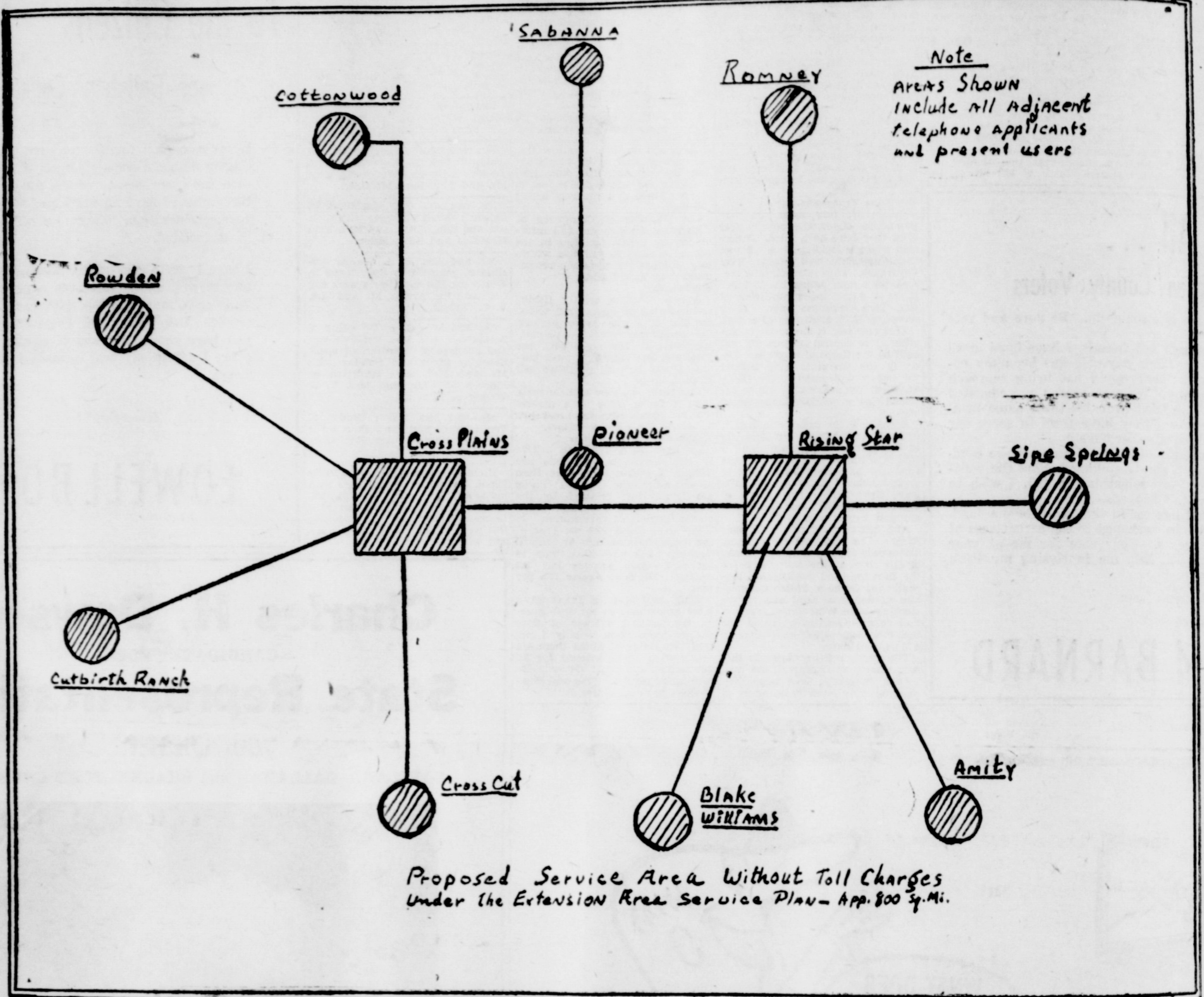
