Postal Rates Take Effect Friday

WASHINGTON - Starting next Friday—Aug. 1—you will have to put a 4-cent stamp on all first class letters, which now go for 3 cents. It will cost 3 cents to mail post cards and the charge for air mail letters will go up from 6 to 7 cents. The Post Office Department an-

nounced the rate changes, authorzed by Congress, will be made effective promptly at midnight local time July 31, and mail postmarked before that hour will have to carry the additional postage.

Mail posted with insufficient stamps won't be delayed, but will be delivered on a postage - due

The department is making one concession to permit public adjustment. Effective Aug. 1, there will be a temporary suspension of the new 5-cent penalty for delivering postage-due mail which will be continued for three months. The penalty charge will be resumed

The new rates are expected to yield half a billion dollars more a year but the Post Office Department said even that won't take it out of the red.

The present estimate is that the postal service will wind up the present fiscal year next June 30 with a deficit of about 600 million dollars. About 270 million of this represents the recent pay increases for postal employes.

Here are the department's calculations on the additional postage which the public will pay during the 11-month period between Aug. 1, 1958, and June 30, 1959:

On the domestic side, for firstclass mail, 363 million dollars; for air mail, 18 million; for secondciass mail, covering newspapers and other publications whose major adjustments will be effective Jan. 1. million; and for third class mail. covering advertising circulars and similar material, 66 million dollars. No changes in parcel post rates are planned at present.

Says Germany, "Disastrous droughts, the alarming loss of rural population and the stark realization that the state no longer can depend on its oil revenue, all emphasize the need for developing our industrial resources.

SCHOOLS "BUST OUT"-Som seam-splitting from Texas' expanding population was reflected in the reports of Texas Education Agency survey teams on conditions in the state's public schools.

As a result of the reports to the State Commission on Accreditation, nine schools were removed from the accredited list, and accreditation was withheld from six others. Fifty-one were warned they face loss of accreditation unless they improve standards.

Most of the school's troubles seemed to stem from pupil populations and needs that outran community leadership and financing. Samples from the unfavorable reports: not enough textbooks, few or no library books, no laboratory facilities for science courses, unsanitary or outmoded facilities, use of condemned or "miserably overcrowded" buildings, teachers instructing courses in which they had had no college study.

Actually, the number of schools having trouble meeting standards was only about 3.5 per cent of the total-or 66 out of Texas' approximately 1,800 school districts.

NEW ROADS AHEAD-Better driving days are seen ahead as the State Highway Department unveiled its plans for 1959-60 interstate highway building.

A \$260,000,000 program has been authorized to add 567 miles of controlled-access highways to Texas' portion of the national network. Of this, \$210,495,300 is earmarked for construction, \$16,272,100 for right-of-way buying and an additional \$33,322,500 for advance rightof-way buying

in its border FRESH START-National Bankers Life Ins. Co. of Dallas may continue in business, but without the control of its founder and majority stockholder, Pierce Brooks. This was the effect of a ruling

by State Insurance Commissioner William A. Harrison after a threeday hearing on NABLICO's affairs. State officials conceded the solvency of the company, but objected to certain investments and management practices.

Result: Brooks' controlling interest has been signed over to a trustee. Brooks has said he will sell the stock as soon as the transaction can be arranged.

STILL NEED A JURY-Before going into summer recess until Oct. 1. Texas Supreme Court knocked down a portion of the state's new mental health code.

It declared unconstitutional the part which denies a jury trial to a mental patient seeking to have a court declare he is sane again.

High court also closed the door to any further consideration as to whether price advertising of eyeglasses is legal. In a ruling last month the court held that a new state law does not bar optometrists from advertising prices as long as the ads are not fraudulent or misleading. It's definite now that optometrists can advertise and quote prices in their ads.


